During the upcoming closure of the Quadra Island gas station, customers are reminded of the regulations related to the carriage of gasoline on ferries.

The federal Tranportation of Dangerous Goods regulations state:

 \cdot a maximum of one gas can is permitted per vehicle, up to 25 litres

 \cdot two 25-litre cans are permitted in a boat being towed on a trailer, as well as one 25-litre gas can in the tow vehicle itself

 \cdot foot passengers are not permitted to carry gas cans on board the vessel

BC Ferries staff and crew will be monitoring the carriage of gasoline on our vessel, and will assist our customers with information on the applicable regulations wherever possible.

Red Cedar Nomination And More Critical Acclaim For Jocelyn Reekie's Novel, Tess

The nominations for the 2004-2005 Red Cedar Awards are out, and Jocelyn Reekie's historical novel, Tess, is on the fiction list.

The purpose of the Red Cedar Awards is to promote quality Canadian children's literature. To that end, a committee of librarians, teachers, booksellers, authors and publishers select between 10 and 15 titles for each of two categories: fiction and non-fiction, from ALL CANADIAN FICTION AND INFORMATIONAL BOOKS published two years prior to the nomination date. To be eligible for nomination, books must: have been published two calendar years before the nomination date, be published by a recognized publisher, have been recognized in Canadian review journals, and be of general interest to students between grades 4 and 7. British Columbia school children in grades 4 to7 are then invited in November to begin reading at least five books on the list, and to cast their vote for their favourite book in April. The winners for the 2004-2005 awards will be announced in May. 2005.

In addition to the Red Cedar nomination, Tess, released in the United States in April, 2003, has been named in the influential U.S. review journal VOYA (Voices of Youth Advocates) as one of 26 books chosen from hundreds of submissions by Canadian and U.S. publishers as "the undisputed best fiction for middle school readers published in 2003". The list is published in Feb. 2004 issue of VOYA.

Homalco - RDCS Sign Accord

Campbell River: History was made today when the Regional District of Comox-Strathcona (RDCS) and the Xwémalhkwu First Nation (Homalco Indian Band) signed a protocol, which recognizes the rights, powers and obligations of each party to act in the best interest of their constituents. and endorses the benefits of establishing a long term working relationship between the two parties. "The relationship will be based on ongoing and regular communication on matters of mutual interest," said RDCS Board Chair Jim Abram, "and although the party's interests may differ from time to time, the Protocol stands to become one of the tools which will build community and regional strength and understanding."

"The Regional District and the Xwémalhkwu First Nation have agreed that their representatives will work together in the areas of long-term and specific land use planning within our traditional territory," said Chief Darren Blaney, "and by recognizing that the Xwémalhkwu have a traditional territory and aboriginal rights within that territory, the Protocol provides a framework to build on our common strengths."

The three-year agreement will increase understanding of each party's role in local governance. The signing ceremony took place at the Homalco Culture Centre and was followed by a luncheon provided by the Homalco community.

Homalco Band Carves First Canoe Since the 1930's

CAMPBELL RIVER – Chief Darren Blaney of the Homalco Indian Band today announced the carving of the Band's first canoe since the 1930's.

"I am very proud to have another cultural milestone completed in this quest to bring back the culture to the Homalco people," said Chief Darren Blaney. "This follows the totem pole ceremony last August which saw a 14 foot pole erected at Orford Bay to serve as a visual example of the Homalco Band's culture at the grizzly bear viewing site."

The Homalco Band has set a date for the ceremonial launch of the canoe on Thursday, June 17th, 2004 at 1 p.m. on the premises of Vancouver Island Air. Owner, Larry Langford, has generously offered the band use of his location for the ceremony.

"I want to express my gratitude for this gesture," said Chief Blaney. "The estuary at Vancouver Island Air is the perfect location for this most historic occasion. The Band is very pleased to be building relationships and partnerships in the community."

The canoe was built according to the Coast Salish tradition. It is 33 ft long and the original log from which it was carved weighed over 9,000 lbs. A total of ten carvers worked on this project in the traditional territory of the Homalco First Nation - Orford Bay in Bute Inlet on the west coast mainland.

The public is cordially invited to attend the ceremony.

Regional Director's Report

- June 7, 2004

Well, I hope this is the final instalment in the long running saga of the garbage situation on Pinetree Drive. The cleanup has been completed. The final figures are in. I am providing the following figures to quantify how serious the problem really was.

A total of 258.83 tonnes of garbage and contaminated soil, 32.51 tonnes of metal, 61 tires, 2,255 litres of waste canola oil, latex paint and contaminated containers; and four derelict vehicles were removed from the site.

According to one expert in the field, this would be equivalent to the total amount of garbage that would be expected to be contributed by a village of 2,500 people over a period of two years.

I sincerely hope that we will never have to go through this process again. I have been receiving many calls from islanders asking how they can keep this from happening again.

There are two contractors from Campbell River servicing the island right now. Please contact them if you wish to have your garbage picked up. There is also the long time Quadra solution of taking your garbage to the dump yourself. Some people prefer to do it that way. In response to those that ask about using the service that created the unfortunate situation in the first place, I can only quote the hackneyed saying about "if you are not part of the solution, you are part of the problem." We have options.

On a far brighter note, the population of Quadra Island has increased by two in the past few days. My daughter and her husband have moved back to Quadra after four years of university and five years of working in Vancouver. What a treat to have her back, along with her husband. Both are working here on the island.

I will be unable to answer your calls or emails from June 10th to the 20th. I would ask that you not leave voice mail on my phone (it fills up very quickly). Phone or email me after the 20th. n May of last year (DI #292) I wrote an article entitled Un-free Trade in which I described the inability of the World Bank or the International Monetary Fund to adequately carry out their respective mandates due to political interference in their operations. In the article I quoted Jeffrey Sachs, who worked for the IMF as a political advisor to the Bolivian government and directed the implementation of the "shock treatment" methods of economic reform. Sachs, in describing the failure of the Bolivian project, said "I've always told the Bolivians, from the very beginning, that what you have here is a miserable, poor economy with hyperinflation: if you are brave, if you are gutsy, if you do everything right, you will end up with a miserable, poor economy with stable prices." My opinion of Mr. Sachs was, admittedly, not very high at that time.

He has redeemed himself in my eyes somewhat with the recent publication of an essay entitled "A Simple Plan to Save the World" (Esquire - Vol. 141 May 2004). Sachs, who has a Ph.D. in Economics from Harvard and is also a full professor on Harvard's faculty, has served as an advisor to various governments, the IMF and World Bank, the World Health Organization and most recently as Special Advisor to UN Secretary General Kofi Annan. He is presently heading a UN project called the Millennium Project, in which he is examining the broad range of policies and investments necessary to help bring the billion or so poorest people up from the poverty that cripples their lives and destabilizes the world. Sachs is an optimist - "Every great challenge we face - climate, biodiversity, global health, extreme poverty, growing violence, and the "clash of civilizations" - can be solved, and at a modest cost with huge long term benefit."

He theorizes that many of the world's problems stem from the fact that many areas of the world live in a state of poverty, with mass unemployment and lack of education accompanied by hunger, disease and death. They are in dire need of major investment in social services and infrastructure but are not getting it. Consequently, "The result is a poverty trap in which solvable poverty gets only deeper because the basic investments needed to overcome it are beyond the means of the country", while the major world players offer help that is largely much too little, far too late.

A Simple Plan

Sachs and his colleagues have calculated that spending \$25 billion per year could do wonders to improve living conditions, which in turn leads to some stability. \$25 billion "could do the job, permitting a massive attack on AIDS, tuberculosis, malaria, vaccine-preventable diseases, and unsafe childbirth, among other killer conditions."

Sachs points out that while \$25 billion is a whack of money, the "rich world" (the USA, Canada, Western Europe, Japan, Australia and New Zealand) collectively have an annual income of some \$25 Trillion, so the required contribution is about \$0.10 per \$100 of GNP. Improving the health of the world's poor is vital - "Massive proportions of the poor are sick and dying, and sick people are unable to generate income and pay taxes" - and domestically their home countries have no economy to speak of, and certainly no health systems. But to really lift the world's poor from the poverty cycle more is needed. They need infrastructure in order to develop their economies, from roads to schools to wells and latrines. This, Sachs argues, would add another \$50 billion to the annual tab. for a total budget of \$75 billion annually to save the world. An American. Sachs argues that the US has a responsibility to shoulder about half the tab, say \$35 billion. "Set aside, for the moment, the American value of altruism. Speaking strictly from self-interest, we must bear these costs to ensure a peaceful century. And we must consider them an investment that will ultimately save us untold treasures while sparing us untold pain."

335 billion represents about $1/7^{th}$ of the Bush tax cuts, or about $1/12^{th}$ of the US military budget. "In short, we could easily afford this if we'd simply realise that we've gone way overboard in military approaches to our security while neglecting the much cheaper and satisfying route of crisis prevention by spreading prosperity and hope."

Beyond monetary measures, Sachs offers his thoughts on other issues that must be addressed to save the world. With respect to the "war on terror", Sachs believes that the USA must operate in a much smarter manner. He notes that the present administration is inflaming other societies against the US, particularly the Islamic world. This need not be the case. He believes that it is not too late to regain favour – "The vast majority of Islamic world would like nothing more than to live peacefully with the United States with mutually beneficial trade" but that the invasion and blind ignorance has caused that same majority to utterly lose faith in US intentions. Further, he sees the growing US trend towards protectionism as short-sighted. "Will young men in Pakistan or Peru become computer programmers because they can export their services to the US, or will they become bin Laden or Shining Path sympathizers because we have closed off their avenues of economic improvement?" Sachs worries that the growing fundamentalist movement in the USA is causing America to neglect the values of science, illustrated clearly by the conservative dominated administration's tendency to brush off warnings of global warming. "A remarkable 45% of Americans prefer a fundamentalist version of creation. While we might prefer to leave the creationists to their blissful ignorance, we can't really afford that luxury." And further, "We will need global ethics beyond any single religion". He quotes John F. Kennedy..."For in the final analysis, our most common link is that we all inhabit this small planet. We all breathe the same air. We all cherish our children's futures. And we are all mortal."

Sachs clearly sees global warming as a problem, and the present attitude towards fossil fuels as the root cause. He decries the present administration's unwillingness to explore and invest in energy alternatives, while spending hundreds of billions and thousands of human lives in an ill-considered war to secure future oil supplies. He laments the continuing destruction of Earth's resources as a result of the aforementioned poverty and thirst for oil, and implores us to do better. He worries that the present course of the USA dooms it to failure, particularly as countries such as China and India become major players on the world stage. And finally he describes his prescription on how the USA can fund the previously mentioned \$35 billion to help save the world. Tax those making in excess of \$500,000 per year an additional 5% and you get \$35 billion or so.

As he puts it, "How fitting that the world's richest people would share a small percentage of their vast incomes to help save millions of people each year from death in the world's poorest countries."

"Across America, we have to set a new course, without waiting for Washington this time. Since our leaders won't lead, you and I and millions like us will have to take up the cause in their stead." I think it is fair to say that Jeffrey Sachs and the millions of Americans like him can count on significant support from the rest of the planet for such a simple plan.

May Day 2004

Hundreds of people came out to cheer on the May Day parade at Rebecca Spit on May 29. This year's theme, 'Creatures, Characters, and Chronicles of the Deep Blue Sea', inspired great Neptunian creativity.

Maritime Heritage **Centre Grand** Opening

June 5 was a special day for Ole Chickite from Cape Mudge Village, former owner of the BCP 45. It was the day the Maritime Heritage Centre opened in Campbell River, the new home of the boat made famous by the \$5 bill.

The day's events began with a morning prayer ceremony led by Ole to bless the building. "It is customary for us to bless a house before opening it. It's no different than blessing a ship," Ole explained. "This house is now open to people of all nations."

Volunteers were largely responsible for transforming the former Campbell River sewage treatment plant into the beautiful Heritage Centre it is today. Many of the people who worked on the project flocked to the afternoon's opening ceremonies. Several dignitaries, including Area J **Regional District Director Jim** Abram and Campbell River Mayor Lynn Nash, were also in attendance.

The pipers and drummers of the Campbell River Legion Pipe Band led a line of officials into the building's jam packed Daybreak Hall. A lighthouse beacon, one of the many nautical items on display at the Centre, swept across the faces of the crowd.

Daybreak Rotary President Ron Fisher thanked everyone

who worked on the project, which began four years ago. He acknowledged the thousands of volunteer hours spent on the building, and the donations of money and materials totaling more than \$2 million.

Ole spoke next. "This wonderful building has so much history stored in it," he said in a voice filled with emotion. the BCP 45's mast stretching towards the roof behind him.

The BCP 45 has been part of Ole's life for decades. He began working on the boat as a cook when he was 14 years old.

The BCP 45 first achieved notoriety when a photo of the vessel and crew at work taken in 1958 was published in Star Weekly magazine. Crew members Ole, Mel Assu, Andv Dick, Ron Forrest, Fred Seville, and Allen Mearns are shown making a set off Ripple Point. Later, the rights to the photo were purchased by the Canadian Mint, which put the image on the

back of the \$5 bill in 1972.

Ole worked as a tow-off skipper on the vessel in the late 1950s and early 1960s. He bought the BCP 45 when BC Packers offered it to him for \$1 down in 1983.

In 1996, having sold his commercial fishing license, Ole decided to donate the boat to the Vancouver Maritime Museum. After the vessel had been on display for six years at the museum's heritage harbour, Ole brought the BCP 45 back to this area in an historic final voyage in May 2002.

The Campbell River Maritime Heritage Centre was designed and built with the BCP 45 as its showpiece.

Mayor Nash pointed out that the Centre caters to the marine heritage of the people of North Vancouver Island.

"As well as featuring the BCP 45, the Maritime Heritage Centre has an excellent collection of marine artifacts," Nash said.

After the ceremony, people took advantage of the opportunity to look around the facility. The BCP 45, currently undergoing re-ribbing by a crew of skilled volunteers, occupies a place of honour in the middle of the building.

Outside, the 'lighthouse', built against the front wall, features the lantern room and foghorn salvaged from Pine Island Lighthouse on N.E. Vancouver Island. The Maritime Heritage Centre intends to sound the old horn every day at noon as a reminder of our link to the ocean.
