

# REGIONAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Area C

appy Thanksgiving, everyone! We have so much to be thankful for. The sunny weather for one and the starry nights for another. I just might actually get my fall / winter prep. done in time for winter, for once! Maybe!

I will try to pick up where I left off last report. It has been a very eventful two weeks and has flown by!

#### **Smart Meters**

In my last report I spoke of the failed motion at our Board table regarding opposition to Smart Meters. Unfortunately our SRD board did not see fit to fight it, but that does not mean that there is no hope. Other groups around the Province are still opposing them. For all things related to BC Hydro, please contact the head Community Relations manager, Ted Olnyk, ((250) 755-7180; (250) 618-6267 (cell)).

#### Q. Cove Sewer "issues"

I am going to repeat part of my last report just to let you know what is happening with the sewer issues.

I met with our planners about the issues that are still outstanding regarding the sewer service in the Cove. What I can tell you right now is, the water study for the entire Cove area has been started and will be done by a consultant with grant funding (not on your taxes!). The outfall is being repaired on October 7th and 8th. The

anchors need to be replaced. And last of all is that a report will be coming forward to the October committee meeting outlining all options for dealing with the expansion of the service (which will lower the annual operating cost to all users of the service).

Since that time, I met with about a dozen of the people within the sewer area that are still displeased with the sewer rates to try and answer any questions that I could. They will be meeting with the senior staff to have everything clarified and then making decisions on what they might do. I agree that the rates are way too high and as I have said numerous times, we need more properties on the sewer to be able to pay into it and make it more affordable for all.

To this end, staff was directed (as I mentioned in my last report) to come back to our meeting this Wednesday (the 10th) with a complete set of options and possibilities for fixing this unacceptable situation that we inherited when we took on the sewer. There are many steps that will need to be taken in order to make this all work. I hope to be able to report to you after our meetings that we will be proceeding with a solution.

#### **Outer Islands**

As I mentioned in my last report, I will be bringing the two top officials from the Ministry of Highways along with the manager of Emcon services over to Read on Oct. 12th to discuss the needs for their roads on the island. We will also be meeting that same day at the Surge Narrows road end to discuss improvements for that part of the road, which leads to our wharf at Hoskyn Landing. That day is approaching and all arrangements have been made with staff and with outer islanders. We are really hoping for some positive outcomes. The officials whom we are meeting with are very reasonable and easy to communicate with. That is a good thing! In my experience we don't always get such good people to deal with in ministries, etc.

#### **Advisory group**

I have a number of people in mind for this group to help represent various points of view and will be talking with them shortly to form this group. I will keep you informed and announce their names when I know more.

# Last, but by far, not least.. UBCM!

This was the most intense and productive five days of meetings that I have attended in a long time (seven with travel!). The days started at 5:30am and ended at about 10pm, with back to back meetings or sessions with Ministers, MLA's and senior officials each day and networking events each evening.

On Monday, our group of 14 chairs of all of the Regional Districts and the Islands

Trust met with the Ferry Commissioner about all of our issues and about the impending "consultations" that are supposed to take place regarding service changes. It was quite a shock to hear that he would go ahead and make recommendations to the government by his deadline of Sept. 30th, when he did not have all of the information he needed to make an informed decision with the service issues factored in. He was not happy about that either, but did it anyway, as you may have heard with a 12% increase over the next three years. UBCM has passed a resolution saying that UBCM must "lobby the provincial government to recognize our coastal ferry services as essential extensions of our provincial public highway system...". As a group we agreed, and I delivered the following recommendation to the Commissioner: "It is the

strong recommendation of the Coastal RD Chairs group that the provincial government should immediately stop any ferry fare increases until the promised public consultation process is completed and there is a long term vision for the ferry system". The Islands Trust Chair also delivered the following: (there is)"... growing acknowledgment that the coastal ferries are the marine highway within the larger provincial highway system." Keep in mind that the 12% price cap does not have to be implemented if the government were to step in and follow our recommendations. This group that I am part of represents 70% of the population of BC (yes, you read that right, seventy percent!). So let's see what comes out of this as we approach an election!

Our group also met for an hour and a half before and after the meeting with the commissioner to discuss our strategy into the future and for our upcoming meeting with the Premier and the Minister or Transport on Wednesday the 26th. More on that to follow. Those meetings took up the entire day.

Tuesday started with our annual session of all of the Electoral Area Directors to talk about shared issues and to hear from government what updates they could give us on many of the issues that have carried on for far too long. This was a good opportunity to discuss issues of mutual concern and ensure that UBCM knows how rural areas feel about them.

I met with the Area Manager of Telus for an update on our promised cell and internet provision and upgrades. We are still in the "build" plan for our upgrades to our cell service which will be 4G - LTE service and should cover most of the Island and some outlying areas. This will provide superior cell service and internet by cell and is now planned to happen in the first part of 2013, rather than the last part of 2012.

We are also in their fiber optic expansion program which should be in place by the end of 2013, but he said he will still need confirmation concerning the timing and will have that in the next couple of months. He still seems very optimistic about the provision of services.

Since I returned home I had to deal with him regarding the poor quality "service" to Granite Bay, which is supplied by 50 year old buried cable that has been cut and repaired more times than anyone can remember. After a few failed attempts by CR technicians to fix it, I had a personal conversation with the Area Manager and he took it very seriously. Hopefully the line will be above ground on the new hydro poles as soon as possible.

Right after meeting with the Area Manager at UBCM I had to run to the Legislature where I was joined by our CAO, Brian Reardon, to meet with Minister Ben Stewart, Responsible for Connectivity, along with his Deputy Minister, Assistant Deputy Minister and the Executive Lead of Network BC (Office of the Chief Information Officer). It was an incredible meeting, having all of these people in the same place to give them our pitch for high speed internet and "applying" some pressure on Telus to make this happen sooner rather than later. They were very receptive. So, here's hoping! I will be following up with them soon.

The opening reception took place on Tuesday night and was a fantastic opportunity to meet face to face with numerous Ministers and MLA's (from both Government and the Opposition). In many ways these personal meetings were more valuable than the formal meetings. At any rate, the lobbying was hot and heavy for Area C!

On Wednesday our Coastal Chairs group were scheduled to meet with the Premier and the new Minister of Transportation at 9am in the Legislature. Unfortunately, at the last minute, the Premier cancelled, giving no reason. We were still able to meet with the new Minister, Mary Polak, (mary. polak.mla@leg.bc.ca) (just in case you want to add your voice to the debate over ferries issues). She listened to our points that we had discussed in our strategy meeting on Monday and we delivered the same message: Treat us the same as terrestrial highways; drastically reduce our fares; do not mess with our services!



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### Quadra Island Seniors -BR. 91-B.C.O.A.P.O.

What lovely weather.' It is great for working in the yard, or going for a drive.

Ruth Amiabel was a Delegate to the Council of Senior Citizens Conference ("The Joys & Tears of Living longer), which was held in Richmond B.C. There were 400 delegates representing Seniors from all over. There were many Workshops discussing Income, Pharmacy issues on drugs, Seniors living longer and are "NOT" putting the country into debt,or making it very difficult for the upcoming seniors. Seniors are an asset not a liability.

Other workshops were "Seniors Abuse & Neglect, "Seniors right to Medical Care". The speakers at the Conference, were very educated Doctors ie--Dr. Victor Marshall (Dept of Sociology, U.N.C. Institute on Aging, University of Calgary, Dr. Martha Donnelly Director of the Division of Community Geriatrics Van Gen. Hosp., Professor Alan Cassels,in Pharmacare, who stated 30 Billion is spent per year on drugs, and grows by 2 Billion per year, and that many Seniors are over drugged.

It has been proven by experts that in Age friendly communities Excercise & Walking, (self paced group walks & stretching excercises, have been found to reduce pain, & increase balance. Proper Diet & Cycling if possible is an absolute asset to keeping fit. The main objective

is to keep Seniors in their own homes, with Homecare & Community care, which has been cut back in recent years, warehousing Seniors is definitely not the answer. # **Emergency Radio Project**

Amateur (Ham) radio is a new focus of attention for disaster planning agencies. The communications breakdowns during 9/11, Katrina and lesser events have led to an increased interest in ham radio due to its inherent reliability.

Ham operators registered with the Provincial Emergency Program are teaming up with other volunteers in Search & Rescue and Emergency Support Services to ensure emergency communications when normal means are overloaded or knocked out by earthquake, wildfire, flood or man-made disasters.

Amateur radio has kept up with new digital technology with many avenues to explore. Offshore sailors use High Frequency (HF) radio to link to email anywhere in the world. Pairing ham radio with GPS gives real-time position plotting of mobile stations on a computer screen or digital read out; a tool used in the extensive wildfires in the Okanagan.

During a search for a missing motorist in north Vancouver Island it was found that the chain of amateur radio repeaters which runs the length of the island could enable mobile units to communicate in areas which were out of range of cell phones or direct radio links.

The Strathcona Regional District Emergency Program,

in which the Quadra
Emergency Program is lively
partner is working with
local hams to develop an
emergency communication
network, which it is hoped will
eventually reach out to stations
in remote communities.

More ham operators are needed, both to operate from their homes and to help staff the Emergency Operation Centre(s). An amateur radio license is good for life but requires training in radio theory and operation since qualified hams have widespread privileges in terms of the power and frequencies they may use. Morse code is no longer required.

A course for the Basic License will start on Quadra Island on Monday Oct. 22 and run for five Monday evenings, 7:00 pm to 9:00 pm, resuming on Monday January 7 for a further eight weeks. The fee is \$55 for the complete course; including a manual and a subscription to hamtestonline.com for homework.

The course is split into two sessions because there is not enough time in Spring to cover all the material. The session before Christmas will focus on technical theory so that if any cannot attend all the Spring sessions they have the background to study with hamtestonline.com when it is convenient for them.

# RCMP Safety Tips Transporting Firewood

Heading out to collect some firewood for the winter this weekend? Fall is always a good time to watch for pickup trucks with pyramids of firewood in the back on our roads. When checked they are often illegal and unsafe, in three ways: unsecured load, overweight and a danger to vehicle occupants if the pickup was involved in a collision.

There is a lot of sweat invested in a pickup load of split firewood. Why would you hazard the loss of some of that hard work by not thoroughly tying or tarping it down? Imagine the consequences if a piece of it fell off the back of truck at 90 km/h. It would strike another vehicle with the force of a small bomb.

When a pickup found filled like this is weighed, it is often overweight on the rear axle. This means that your options are to call someone to bring their pickup and transfer part of the load, or leave some of the load behind on the ground and hope that it would still be there when you returned after emptying what you were allowed to carry home.

How strong do you think that rear glass is in the cab of your pickup? Chances are excellent that in a collision part of that load of firewood is going to come through the back of the cab like the glass wasn't even there. This would definitely not be good news for the back of your head!

No other contemporary filmmaker manages to blend deadpan, ironic humour with social commentary in quite the same manner as Finnish master Aki Kaurismäki.

In Le Havre, the moody, retro ambiance of the film's titular Norman port city enhances a tidy plot that blends film noir elements with gentle humanism. Atmospheric, quiet and completely assured, Kaurismäki employs these diverse elements to tell a highly contemporary story about illegal refugees, a subject of profound relevance in today's Europe.

The film circles around Marcel Marx, a warm, aging bohemian artist who has retreated to the French port city of Le Havre and taken up work as a shoeshine man. His profession has a limited future, as everyone seems to be wearing running shoes. He is married to a woman with a heart of gold and, despite their poverty and limited means, he finds joy in their local neighbours, all of whom seem as if they have been transported from a 1930s movie.



Ah, the end of summer and we have to come indoors again, but it won't be difficult with some great entertainment coming your way from the 2012/13 season of Quadra's Cultural Committee. The first concert will see vibrant youth and exceptional musicality in the form of piano four-hands with the talented Fung-Chiu Duo. These two soloists, Janelle Fung and Philip Chiu, have become one of Canada's première piano duos to challenge the traditional boundaries of their genre. Hear their lively performance on Sunday, October 14th at 2:30 PM at the Quadra Community Centre.



Formed in 2007, under the auspices of Jeunesses Musicales Canada, the Fung-Chiu Duo has toured the country to many Canadian cities and given gala performances at such venues as the Casino de Montréal and the Orford Arts Centre. "They fairly romped through the program, showing considerable flair for the virtuosic side of piano playing...Many moments in their playing, especially in the Debussy and the Ravel, showed the poetic side of their musicality." Philip Chiu was born in Hong Kong and raised in Canada. He received his Piano Performance Diploma from The Glenn Gould School in Montréal. Winning The Glenn Gould School Concert Competition, Philip went on to solo throughout Canada, playing his orchestral debut in 2005 with Maestra Tania Miller of the Victoria Symphony. One of Canada's most sought-after collaborative pianists, he has performed with such artists as Stefan Dohr, principal horn of the Berlin Philharmonic, Larry Combs and Craig Morris (clarinet and trumpet) of the Chicago Symphony.

The Fung-Chiu Duo has committed themselves to expanding the repertoire for piano four-hands by writing original transcriptions of such pieces as Stravinsky's Firebird, Bernstein's Westside Story, and Berlioz' Symphonie Fantastique.

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### New ferry fare hikes: Beyond the tipping point

Representatives of coastal ferry users say new ferry fare hikes announced Monday raise questions about the effectiveness of government response to the ferry affordability gap.

The Ferry Advisory Committee Chairs (FACC) are concerned that fare hikes are double the inflation rate. "Fares will continue to grow much faster than people's incomes unless government faces the causes of the affordability crisis," says Tony Law of Hornby-Denman FAC.

In January, a BC Ferry Commission study found that ferry fares were then at the tipping point of affordability, and causing hardship in coastal communities. Since then:

- · Current fares are at the tipping point + 4.15 percent;
- · Next year those fares will have another 4.1 percent increase;
- · The following two years will see two more increases, 4.0 and 3.9 percent;
- · Existing fuel surcharges continue on top of that, and will change with future fuel prices.

The ferry commission calculates fare increases based on numbers from BC Ferries and government. Key numbers come from government's response to the commission affordability report:

- · \$33 million in new government contribution to BC Ferries over the next three years;
- · \$74 million in cuts over the next three years - \$30 million in service cuts, \$15 million in new BC Ferries efficiencies, and \$29 million remaining of previously agreedupon efficiencies of \$9.8 million per year.

The new money aims to help BC Ferries maintain a good bond rating and reduce upward pressure on fares. Without it, fare hikes would have been a few percentage points higher.

The effect of the cuts on future fares and traffic is harder to assess. The FACC are concerned that service cuts - unless they're done very carefully and with ideas from communities - could aggravate the downward spiral in traffic and upward spiral in fares.

"Both spirals are the kiss of death to dozens of coastal communities," says Brian Hollingshead of Southern Gulf Islands FAC. "More than anything, we need a public policy approach that aims to sustain our communities, stem the damage from high fares, and grow our potential."

The heart of such policy is sound public infrastructure, recognizing that ferry service is part of BC's core infrastructure. The FACC believes this requires government to bear a greater share of the escalating costs that are causing escalating fares:

- · fuel prices;
- · revenue shortfalls from falling traffic;
- · overdue and urgent need to replace very old ships and docks.

Public infrastructure costs money, and ferries are public infrastructure. They're public access to the whole coast, serving dozens of communities, hundreds of kilometres of coastline, close to 9 million vehicles and more than 20 million passengers a year, from all over BC and beyond.

Consider all that, and compare it to the costs of other public projects, which increasingly approach or exceed billions of dollars. It quickly becomes clear that ferry service, as essential public infrastructure, is a bargain at the current cost, around \$150 million a year.

And it's still a bargain if government shoulders more of the costs to make it affordable.



# Regional Director's Report in Victoria was to inform me that he had followed up on be

We gave it our best shot and emphasized how important this essential service is to the existence of our coastal communities and how everyone will be watching in the upcoming months. (without mentioning the word "election").

That evening another opportunity was offered to mingle with Ministers, MLA's and senior officials along with all of our local government colleagues. I cannot stress enough how valuable these networking events can be. Issues are discussed, business cards are exchanged and contacts are made. Follow up then becomes so much easier and calls and emails are replied to faster.

On Thursday, in addition to all of the sessions and meetings, I had the pleasure of having coffee with Mary Griffin of CHEK - TV, whom I have dealt with for many,many years but have never met. We were able to discuss many of our issues and as a result I had a TV interview regarding ferry fare increases on Monday, right after I got home. Then they wanted me to do another interview on Federal cuts to DFO. So, that was a valuable cup of coffee!

On Friday, I met with Minister Pat Bell(Jobs, Tourism and Innovation), informally, and he was able to share some information about the conflict that has been going on with some of our larger kayak tourism outfits and Timber-West over logging in their immediate view shed. I had previously met with him in CR on this and other issues and convinced him to come to Quadra at a later date to discuss it further with the operators and myself. He did come to Quadra and made some commitments at that meeting and my meeting

in Victoria was to inform me that he had followed up on both of his commitments and was sending written confirmation to the operators. So hopefully what he puts in writing will be satisfactory to resolve the dispute for our eco-tourism industry.

Also on Friday I met with Leader of the Opposition, Adrian Dix, and most of the NDP caucus at a 6:45 am to 8 am breakfast meeting. I had the opportunity to reinforce our pitch about ferries: put them into highways; reduce the fares; leave the service alone. Our MLA, Claire Trevena, was there and is also very supportive of this position and will make sure that her caucus is well aware of that support.

Later that morning, I met with Minister Margaret MacDiarmid, Minister of Health, to discuss issues of concern to us as islanders: seniors care, keeping our seniors on the island in their later years, etc. It was a very good meeting and she is a very personable woman to deal with. I have met with her before so we have a very good relationship. Now we will see if she can find funding to help us out when we get going on our Q. Cove plan with regard to seniors care. More to follow.





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
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
