

More My Cup of Tea

he risk of speaking out publicly, whether with good or bad intentions, is that inevitably someone will speak back. I am of the mindset that if you don't say anything, then no one will hear you. However, it is easy to be misunderstood, and it is here that I must backtrack somewhat on my last article.

My previous article was about how compostable takeaway cups aren't the dreamy answer we think they are - my greater point being that ultimately we need to move away from our habits of flippant disposal. But, by accident, I singled out our lovely local business, Stonehouse Teas, and for that I need to provide some clarification.

In regular times, it's possible for us to work on good habits, such as bringing our own containers to cafes and restaurants, and ultimately quit the disposable habit. In these irregular times, small businesses are doing what they must to stay afloat, and I don't judge them for that. It may not be ideal, but it is what it is. In my whole point about the plastic cup, I focused only on its life after use. The owner of Stonehouse Teas, Christine, contacted me with some pertinent information about why she chose the Greenware cups, including some facts about their production:

- 1. They are made from corn, which is a renewable and sustainable resource
- 2. They do not contain toxins
- 3. Production of PLA plastics create 68% less greenhouse gas emissions than conventional plastic production

- 4. It takes 65% less energy to produce PLA plastics
- 5. There is no risk of explosion during production (as there is with using petroleum) Christine also pointed out that even though they end up in the landfill, PLA plastics don't leach toxins, and they break down up to ten times faster (still looking at around a century, but better than the petroleum-based alternative).

While the issue of disposal still exists, these facts about PLA production somewhat negate that issue. I am thankful that we have considerate local business owners who are willing to research better options and adopt them, even at higher personal cost. I thank Stonehouse Teas, and all businesses, who make this sacrifice to their bottom line for the greater good.

I think it is important to indulge in the things we love in moderation, especially locally, and especially in these disturbing times. With the pandemic, our hands are tied for indulging responsibly, but keeping our local businesses afloat is worth it - hence why, for the first time in years, I broke my personal code and bought something in a disposable cup!

One of the privileges of being a human is being able to consider different perspectives - I thank Christine for offering me hers and giving me points to consider as I move forward with my intentions to help people reduce their eco-footprints. It's easy to want to curl up in a ball and never open my mouth again when something like this happens, but then nobody would ever hear me.

Times are strange; if we can't work directly on reducing our waste right now, at least we can be thinking about how we can emerge from this pandemic as more mindful consumers. I know I will be headed straight for Stonehouse Teas with my metal straw and a jar the moment I am able.

Thanks for listening.

REGIONAL DIRECTORS REPORT

It is summer, but the season we are experiencing doesn't seem to understand! Maybe next week.

So it has ben an incredibly long time since I have submitted a report due to my fall and broken back. Sitting at a keyboard is not my fave position right now, but I am getting better. I have been able to accomplish quite a bit lying on my back with a smartphone in hand using voice, text and email. Amazing little devices!

So, where to begin...

My last report was between hospital stays. I spent three weeks in CR General and then four weeks "recovering" at home. Turned out that was not what was needed. A second CT scan revealed a much more serious injury that then required emergency surgery at Victoria General Hospital on June 8 th. Wendy and I travelled to Victoria on the 6th and she stayed in a hotel for ten nights while I had my surgery. Then a long trip home and recovery at home ever since. No need for any details, just setting the scene. I will say that I would not have made it this far without the love, kindness and caring of my wife, Wendy. She is with me 24 hours a day making sure I don't do anything else stupid and tending to my every need.

So, on to the business of being your Director! I have been making notes to myself for weeks to try and keep up with all the issues. I will try and touch on most of them but am sure I will miss some also.

Public Hearings

I guess I will start off with the issue of public hearings, since I mentioned them first and foremost in my May 11th Report. There were three applications that were before us at the time that would have, during normal "non - COVID times", have been in the line up for a Public Hearing.

Since we could not have the hearing in a town hall style meeting the SRD passed a motion to postpone the actual hearings until sometime after Sept. 7th, hoping that would give us plenty of time to get through this pandemic crisis. The applications were for a Cannabis operation, a Fire Hall and a Ferry berth. This did not mean that work would stop on those files but only that they would need to wait until Sept. for a Public Hearing so that ALL of the public would have access to the proceedings. It was felt that a "virtual meeting" on such important issues would not suffice.

I have always believed in "local control of local issues and maximum public involvement" with regard to land use decisions. A virtual meeting could not in anyway provide this level of involvement. Should this pandemic continue unabated, we may need to look at other options in the future, but not just yet. There were some nonsense rumours going around that the SRD postponed the Hearings so that Directors could go on summer holidays. I wish! There was a comment AT THE Board about holidays during the summer but it was related to the SRD office being short staffed due to scheduled holidays for staff and the occasional time off for a Director as being contributing factors. However the reason was all about COVID restrictions and the inability to hold an in-person hearing for optimum public participation. Period!

In the mean time I have been working with all three applicants and their agents to try and figure out a way to expedite their applications. I had incredible success with the Fire Hall

I had incredible success with the Fire Hall issue yesterday through negotiation with a

senior member of the Fire Trustees. Some of the issues that they were being held up by were all dealt with through a number of phone calls with many people in a number of departments. In the end, the status quo of waiting until after Sept. 7th for the Hearing was determined to work just fine for them. One down and two to go.!

I also had a few really productive conversations with the owner of the Industrial property that is proposed to be used for the cannabis operation, the agent for the application and our senior staff at the SRD. We are now going to have a conference call of all the parties at once and will hopefully come to a speedy resolution for this long delayed proposal. I am very pleased about this. I felt that since it was a brand new use for Quadra (well, sort of!), it needed a full public airing and it will now hopefully get that at the soonest possible time.

The third issue was new Ferry berth for our second ferry being applied for in Q. Cove. I worked with senior management at BC Ferries to insure that the Sept. date would not hold them up in any way. They still have an incredible amount of work to do to satisfy the application process and they felt the timing was just fine. So, once again, a success story for hearing number three.

I think that the work that was just done collaboratively by all parties should eliminate some of the angst that was being generated by some of the rumours in the community. People need proper information to be able to discuss and deal with issues in the community. There have been other times when I have needed to be away for long meetings or other reasons that similar rumour-driven misinformation has caused dissension in the community. It is common in most communities. I am just glad I got back in time to clear things up!

REGIONAL DIRECTORS REPORT

Hoskyn Channel Landing (Surge Narrows)

Our dock at Hoskyn has been the victim of some siltation caused by the heavy rains of the past two years. We did some work last year to keep the silt from the creek from building up under the dock and this year took the float right out and had it cleaned out by excavator (on July 4th). This will keep the float from grounding and doing damage to itself and to anything tied to it. Our Parks department contracted the work locally and community of Surge Narrows lent a helping hand as always.

Granite Bay Park boat ramp

We also did a resurface of the boat ramp at Granite Bay to allow for access at pretty much the lowest tides of the year. Once again we contracted the work out locally providing work to locals with your tax dollars. I would remind users that the ramp requires an honour system payment of \$5.00 for launch of ANY craft. Trailers are limited in size to single axle due to weight restrictions on the ramp. Four wheel drive is advised and angle parking is just above the ramp.

I would like to commend the SRD for publishing a summary of Covid crisis events on a weekly basis on the SRD website. It is full of useful information for anyone who is interested in knowing where we are at in this pandemic. I would like you to read a quote from Prime Minister Justin Trudeau from May 9th Toronto Sun:

"Prime Minister Justin Trudeau warned Saturday that if provinces move too quickly to reopen their economies, a second wave of the coronavirus pandemic could end Canada 'back into confinement this summer'. Although health officials have pointed to a flattening rate of daily cases in many provinces, Trudeau said Canada was 'not in the recovery phase yet'. 'We are still in the emergency phase . . . The vast majority of Canadians continue to need to be very careful'".

This quotation encapsulates how I feel, in my opinion, Canadians should be viewing the Covid crisis. It is not over. We must be on guard. We must obey directives that are aimed at the safety of the world's population. This statement is not about all of the lesser issues that are being discussed in the media. It is about the continuation of the good work that has been done and must continue if we are to reach a solution to this problem.

Over the past week there has been quite the discussion over visitors from the States coming to Canada and possibly infecting people in BC. As you are all aware, the States have had alarming numbers of new cases of COVID on a daily basis. So when people started noticing license plates from the States they became increasingly concerned that the hard work they had put into stopping the virus might have been for naught. FaceBook lit up and the media jumped in. I was approached by three media outlets at the same time that the Premier was being questioned repeatedly

SRD Community Broadband Plans Now Online

The Strathcona Regional District (SRD) hosted Community Broadband Planning forums in June of 2019 where seven communities within the regional district were visited throughout a two-week block.

The Community Broadband Plans (CBP) project methodology was founded on design principles set-out by Connected Communities BC, weaving together a combination of diverse skill-sets; technical network engineers with community facilitators. Presentations from guest speakers and videos showcasing possibilities for a digital future while gathering ideas from the community about their current state of use as well as plans for housing, economic, environmental and social developments took place at the Let's Connect CBP forums last June.

An open discussion followed the presentations and participants provided a great deal of information about the current state of connectivity in their community as well as how improved broadband might be utilized to address community challenges and opportunities.

The information gathered from last years Community Broadband Planning forums has created a unique snapshot of the community's digital readiness and aspirations. This snapshot will now be provided to lastmile broadband infrastructure solution designers to develop a plan based on the community snapshot along with analysis of the community's topography, climate, housing density, location of key institutions. In this way, the infrastructure is informed by the community aspirations amongst other important technical considerations.

"Improved broadband connectivity for rural and remote communities has been a strategic priority of the SRD for several years," says SRD Board Chair Michele Babchuk. "There is a significant gap between broadband service levels and affordability in urban areas versus rural areas in British Columbia. In fact, many communities within the SRD do not meet basic service levels, if they have any service at all."

The Watering Hole

She never wanted to get sucked in to the vortex of the watering hole. In many ways she didn't, in many ways she did.

The same underground hangerson and labour workers filled the space daily. The bar, always darkly-lit; only offering the light of day to those drunks and loners renting their stools early enough.

Night after night the patrons came and went. she visited often enough and yet seldom compared to the regulars. She went for drinking, for fun and for conversations that skimmed the surface at best, often telling others, and herself, she was there for "social intercourse." Sometimes that desire went unrequited other times it was anticlimactic.

She still went.

The bar was electric with a vast cornucopia of drunks, prostitutes, labourers, artistic types, half-assed businessmen and women who believed that they could find love among the carpeted cave they patronized. She had once believed that herself.

She'd sit on her perch and watch other women in their various stages of acquaintance with the tattooed, asshole drummer or the dirty, overenthusiastic construction worker with grimy hands and filthier intentions. She wanted these women to be realistic. Sometimes she would tell them that love among the bar stools was a dead-end street.....that it was an

aborted feat; a colossal waste of energy. Her well-meant wisdom fell on deaf ears...time and again it fell on hers as well.

Everyone played the part. The only difference being is that she thought she knew how the game was dealt - even when left with a bad hand.


She had many lovers- carpenters, railroaders, artists, and waiters and some were stuck "in between jobs" as they'd like to call it.
