
Vaccine passes will be required by Public Health to enter as well as mandatory mask wearing for everyone 5 years and up. Due to COVID, Santa is not available in person this year.



Banff Mountain Film Festival World Tour Returns

It's been a long two year wait but in yet another sign that things may be turning a corner, the Banff Mountain Film Festival World Tour is returning, with live shows, to Campbell River and Quadra Island.

This year's festival in Banff Alberta took place over nine days earlier this month and preparations are underway to launch the World Tour in a few weeks.

Amongst this year's award winning films is Grand Prize winner: The Rescue, by renowned filmmaker Jimmy Chin - tells the edge-of-the-seat story of the survival of thirteen young soccer players from entrapment deep in a Thai cave.

Going far beyond the newscasters' view from the sidelines The Rescue follows the courageous group of cave divers into the inky black waters as they struggle first to locate the missing boys in a dark labyrinth and then hatch a high-stakes plan to bring them back to the surface.

Among the very first shows to be held will be here on the west coast, Thursday, December 2 at the Tidemark Theatre and on Saturday, December 4 at the Quadra Island Community Centre. Tickets for both shows are available from the Tidemark Theatre box office 12-4pm 250-287-7465 or www.tidemarktheatre.com. Tickets are \$25 for adults and \$20 for youth, students and seniors (\$45 and \$35 respectively for both shows).

So the Live Lightly team created a poster to help us move beyond throwing stuff in the garbage or putting it in recycling.



Quadra Philippines Connection News

Here is the latest update from Zeah Mae Paclay, one of the two students whose education Quadra Islanders are supporting in the northern Philippines through IAT (International Association for Transformation). This letter was written at the end of September but a more recent update follows Zeah Mae's letter written by IAT's social worker, Odessa Ngawoy.

Dear Sponsors at Quadra Island Community,

Hello! A wonderful greeting to you! How are you my beloved sponsors? How is your weather too? My family circle and I hope and pray that you are always fine.

Here in our Barangay of Lacnog due to unexpected happenings our Integrated School had to close due to many positive cases of Covid-19. Almost all of our teachers were admitted and quarantined at Agbannawag Megia Kim Hospital including our Barangay chairman. The worst of it was that three of them died and that is why our elected officials declared a lockdown that began August 19th until this month of September. We are praying that this virus will now stop with the help of our Creator.

You know my dear sponsors that all of our family members have had illnesses in the past days. We took medicines and additional herbal medicine from our backyard garden. My mother is still suffering head ache and body pains because of seasonal flu and that is why I am the one who does everything lately like washing clothes, dishes, cleaning inside and outside our house and watering the plants. In our province of Kalinga many people have been suffering cough and head-ache over the past while. They do not go

to the hospital since you are required to have a Covid swab test which is very expensive. If you have a positive result you will be isolated in the public hospital which is not affordable for many. That is why we have been giving my mother herbal medicines for her flu. My siblings and I collected some leaves and boiled them for a few minutes. We then brought them to my mother, covered her with a blanket and steamed her. I have seen the importance of being available to help in the past while and see that "helping" plays a big role right now. That is why I hope you also feel my massive gratitude for your existence in my life!

Regarding my studies, our teachers started

distributing our modules as of September 13th and I am so happy since I answered the first of them easily. I'm hoping that the next one will be the same. I am so excited about entering grade 8 and am expecting it will be more difficult compared to when I was in grade 7, especially since I have no gadgets to do my research. I sometimes ask my parents but they don't always know the answers so for now I will try to do the best in all of my activities. I know I always need to work as much as I can to be purposeful and helpful to everyone since the blessings that I receive are not from my personal hard work and gain. So I must return the benefits that others give to me such as you. I hope I will also make you proud along the way my dear sponsors. Thank you so much for everything and more blessings to you! Zeah Mae Paclay

From Odessa Ngawoy written November 4th:

We are already experiencing the cold winds here brought by this nearing Christmas season. Thus, hot temperatures have reduced compared to past months.

Regarding the community of Lacnog, home of your sponsored students, Analiza and Zeah Mae, restrictions have finally been loosened after battling with the massive increase in their Covid 19 cases. Those who were financially able went to the hospital for testing but the majority of people suffered flu and treated themselves through traditional and herbal ways. The recent rapid change of weather in the Philippines in the last months of August and September has been widely recognized by many as the main reason for the increase in cases of flu in the country. Many are certain that this was due to global warming and climate change. But at present, things are now going better for the community. Unfortunately, illnesses and financial difficulties are a common hurdle that we have lived our whole life overcoming. Each of our scholars and their families have had their fair share of battles but as Filipinos, we thrive in the hard times and go through it victoriously smiling in the name of love, of hope and of our family.

Thank-you so much and praying that you are healthy and that your heart is always overflowing with joy, love and compassion!

Fish and Watersheds in Crisis

One of the very few salmon bearing streams on Quadra Island, Hyacinthe Creek, has experienced only a few salmon coming up its waters in recent days. Their arrival has not been easy an easy journey!

Life for all adult salmon, for millennia, has been a series of survival challenges. Depending upon the species (6) life cycles range from 2 years (Pinks) to 7 years (Chinook). For new born salmon referred to as smolts or fry, making it from their Interior BC birth streams to salt water can be a month of learning to eat, to being flushed over waterfalls to then crash through whirlpools for a few kilometres downstream.

In the north Pacific hungry orca whales, dolphins, sea lions and various birds feed on their share of growing salmon. At this point, reports suggest perhaps 1 smolt per thousand reaches adult life.

In the past 120 years an unnatural cause of salmon deaths has been fleets of commercial boats, harvesting salmon by licenced fishers and the unregulated catch volumes by pirate fishers: all to feed billions of urban humans and their pets. Dr. Daryl Pauly in his book Vanishing Point, concludes that around the late 1990's the world reached the tipping point in fish harvesting! In the past 25 plus years, making it past the Discovery Islands to Port Hardy smolts have been running the gauntlet of 35 plus Atlantic Fish Farms. With each farms' hungry stock of fish are clouds of sea lice. The sea lice, being parasites, suck the life out of many of the 10 cm. long wild smolts in the few weeks it takes to pass the farms. Added into with the sea lice are the 4 plus diseases breeding in the farmed fish and released into the wild coastal waters. Making it to the Pacific waters in the first months of life has been against most odds.

Showing up, in north Pacific waters around 2010, has been the "Blob" being a huge, multihundred square kilometers of warm waters with growing volumes of Algae. The decaying algae has reduced the oxygen for all aquatic life, leading to countless deaths of salmon and bottom fish. Warming waters have killed off more numbers of fish. (Salmonbusiness.com).

In 2021, coastal creeks have come thru 7 months of unprecedented declining water flow. Spring thru summer, Coho and Chinook smolts, need grow-up time in the creeks and lakes. Many Coho Fry, swimming in what were streams and pools in May, died from warm water and / or NO water by mid-summer.

12 communities, coastal to interior based are rallying to address the wild fish and water crisis. More communities are rallying to address the crisis!

What ALL communities have experienced is 40 years of the government's permitted clear cut harvesting and over cutting of the forests by major forest companies. The Forest Practices Board, independent of any environmental groups, has more than a few reports outlining the impacts of clear cut logging on watersheds: not meeting standards required in road building, ditching, stream setbacks the insufficient installation of a recommended number of culverts. When combined, the resulting effects include downstream landslides, high levels of stream siltation have killed salmon and other aquatic life, not to forget extensive flooding of villages and farmland.

Fifteen years of Professional Reliance on Industry, by the public and government has shown itself to be too easily manipulated by corporate greed and profit maximization.

Individuals, families, businesses are coming to realize that only through coming together as a united community, can we implement programs to rebuild and save the remaining natural resources: those of the feather, fur, forest and fin, relying on abundant, clean waters!

To Burn Or Not to Burn

There appears to be much confusion on our island about whether it is acceptable to burn yard waste from day to day. I am writing to provide links and phone numbers as well as some basic information about this subject.

Step 1: Check the local Quadra Island burning bylaws and check for burning bans (keep in mind we have a year round beach fire ban). Fire hazard level is on the sign in the Cove shopping complex. There are signs about bans on the local fire station halls. Or you can check the Quadra Fire Department website, Facebook page, or simply call them at 250-285-3262.

Step 2: Assuming there is no fire ban, am I then allowed to burn today? Check the Venting Index. The map (including map legend and additional info) can be found on their website at:

https://tinyurl.com/jkfda6bc
If you zoom into Quadra Island on
the map and it's coloured in red,
the map legend will tell you no
burning is permitted.

If you zoom in and Quadra is in the green, you may burn that day for one day.

Simple!

Step 3: Assuming no fire ban and the ventilation index is ideal, is your burn pile an appropriate size and are the materials you intend to burn permitted? Everything you need to know about burn pile size etc can be found here:

Remember-burning trash is
never allowed and burning
demolition material is never
allowed. No stumps, no vegetation
measuring more than 50 cm in
diameter, within 500m from other
homes, 1000m from schools and
community care facilities, among
other things. Check your smoke
and don't add any material if you
see it headed into your neighbour's
house. Obviously this is common
sense.

Category 3 fires (3 or more piles, piles larger than 2m high and 3m wide) require a permit, continuous

monitoring, and a fuel break.

You can call the RAPP (Report All Polluters and Poachers) for illegal open burning including trash burning at 1-877-952-RAPP or call the local fire department.

Fines are \$1150 and if a fire escapes and starts a wildfire fines are between \$100,000 and \$1 million and up to 1 year in jail.

Curious about what you are breathing while you're working in the yard and your neighbour is burning? Benzene and formaldehyde are two components. These also enter your home while refuelling your wood stove, if you have one.

he wind and rain and power outages and tornadoes and water spouts and colder mornings, seem to be the order of the day. Wish they'd give me a break! I still have firewood to get in and a bumper crop of maple leaves to be raked for next year's garden! Not to mention a hundred other jobs that still need doing outdoors. I'm still recovering and just not up to some of it. It will come.

Regional District business never stops and I am thankful for Zoom type meetings so that I don't need to add all that travel time and ferry waits to my days. But I am tired of this pandemic and wish we could turn the corner on that one. I have mentioned getting vaccinations many times in my reports and on Facebook and can only encourage all of you to get with the program. I'm going for my third dose next week. I hope all of you will do the same when you are notified that it is your turn. We can beat this monster if we all do our parts. It is abundantly clear to me that being unvaccinated is just not on.

Fire Brigade for the outer islands

Some good news to start. The Surge Narrows Community Association (SNCA) has been having discussions with all and sundry ever since the fire of a number of months ago in the Owen Bay area on Sonora Island. Quick community response, later joined by BC Wildfire Service managed to put it out after a few days of back breaking work. SNCA has since asked that the SRD provide information on what it would take to put together a service that would deal with this type of situation in a remote area. Seemed like a simple ask, for information and a report back. It turned into a multi day number of emails and phone calls mostly due to the request going to the wrong department of the SRD. After realizing that I was not going to be able to move mountains and get it where it belonged in the bureaucracy, I dealt with it at the actual Board meeting and succeeded in having it passed so that staff can start working on it asap rather than wait until January which was the way the process would have gone otherwise. So by January we should have some informed discussion of this issue with facts to back it up.

Remembrance Day Ceremony

This year's service is going to be altered significantly due to the COVID situation. There will be a limited indoor service with limited attendance, and a small luncheon. Vaccination cards will be required. Due to the health considerations of COVID, I will not

be attending but have arranged for the SRD to provide a nice wreath and it will be placed, on my behalf, by Sally Bradshaw. My sincere thanks to Sally for doing this for me. I am sure that the organizers will do their best to make it a wonderful celebration of those who gave their lives for our freedom and of all of those who serve us to this day. I sincerely regret not being able to attend. This is the first time I can remember that Wendy and I have not attended

Local Doctor changes

Due to the relocation of one of our doctors at Harbourside Medical, I have been working with the remaining doctor and his staff to convince Island Health of the need to help fill this vacancy. As you may recall, I was heavily involved in the Medical Clinic possible closure a few years ago and had to work with their group of volunteers to convince the Ministry and Island Health to provide assistance and in the end we won. A Society was formed to deal with the details, a doctor was recruited and many other good things came to be.

I am positive that we can make this happen for Harbourside Medical. We cannot afford to lose any doctors on this island. They not only take care of Quadra but also have patients from the outer islands and Cortes. There are no doctors taking patients in Campbell River and very limited walk in availability. The alternative is the Emergency room of the CR Hospital and that is already over stressed due to COVID and all of the other daily

emergency needs. We will be meeting agin this week with all the brass of Island Health. They have been very understanding and are trying to help us out of this crisis.

Financial Planing time of year

Seems like we just finished one year's plan and we are on to the next. It is a five year Financial Plan but gets a complete update every year. We usually start in September and must be completed by March 31st. Lots of extra meetings and lots of presentations of various topics that are necessary to keep the SRD running and the work in our areas getting done. We have a number of meetings per month and the public can view the process on line as it happens.

Preliminary numbers indicate (from the word of staff) that our taxes will not go up this year. I always hate to say that because there are so many variables in the process. Some go up, some go down, some remain the same. We have no control over the Provincial contribution or the roads or policing or the Fire Department (which is a separate governing body and set their own rates). Things like the Library and 911 Corp. are also set by other boards. Just a reminder to keep things in perspective when you get your tax notice. I do my best to keep ours at a minimum but at times must give in to increases proposed by staff since the need is there to provide the service. The results are seven months away so don't panic yet!

Connected Coast Initiative

The official opening took place last week in Campbell River and the cable laying ship was also tied up there ready to get to work. I was unable to attend due to the COVID situation. The news release is posted here and you can read about it at your leisure: https://www.civicinfo.bc.ca/news?newsid=8467

So we are on our way to truly spectacular internet service all along the coast. I am very proud of this finally happening after 25 years of lobbying for it and 5 years of working with the SRD as a "Strategic Priority" to finally make it happen. I am being told we are only months away.

Recycling update

As many of you know, we have been working tirelessly with the Comox Valley Waste Management Service (CVWMS) and with our local group, ICAN, to rework our recycling service to provide the best service possible so that most items can be deposited here on Quadra without expensive trips to CR. We were supposed to have two in person meetings here on Quadra in the past month but both were cancelled with concerns around COVID. The CVWMS agreed with my request then keep the survey on the website and the survey open for a longer period to get as much input as possible without the public meetings. I regretted losing the public meetings, but it was really required with the COVID situation the way it is. So far, the only negative feedback I have heard is the shortening of the hours of operation, a feeling that I share. I am in conversation with the Service at this time to see if we can stretch those hours to ones that meet our needs. This is one of the main reasons I have objected to the program all along. So wish me luck and submit that comment if you agree. We are only being given 20 hours at this time but I am trying for quite a bit more.

Community Docks

I have been working with staff for a number of years now and the fire at Owen Bay has given some energy to the discussion. We need a salt water fire pump at each of our community wharves and that is what we are doing. It will be in the budget (mentioned earlier). Surge Narrows, Owen Bay and Port Neville are docks that were divested to us from Transport Canada a number of years ago after years of negotiations. So those three docks will get pumps provided by the funds that were part of that negotiated deal and the money that came with them. The other dock at Evans Bay will have one installed from the Parks function since we had to put it into the Parks function for various long winded reasons. We have already installed one at the Granite Bay dock a number of years ago paid for out of the Parks function. All of these pumps are top of the line recommended by locals with expertise and with supplier contacts. Once again, COVID has slowed things down due to supply across the country and also the horrible fire season we have just been through. But we are back on track.

Grant money opportunity

We were just notified that we could apply for the next round of Green Infrastructure funding from senior Government. There were two obvious areas with projects that needed doing. This went through the Board last week. Area D (south of CR) will be applying for funds to install water meters in the north of their area. This is a much needed project and has missed out on past opportunities. And Area C (that's us, folks!) has two projects that meet the criteria for the funding. So, since we are only allowed one project per area, we had to choose between a new sewage plant for Q. Cove and the proposed water system for Q. Cove. The first is about four million dollars and the latter is a minimum estimate of around fifteen million dollars (an estimate only). Since there is only so much money in the pot, the Board and staff recommended that we go for the lesser of the two since we would be more likely to get it. So, we did! We are now applying for a new plant before the old one packs it in and puts the entire Cove at risk of serious harm and expense. Fingers crossed! The water system will need to wait for the next program and hopefully we will be ready to apply at that time.

Conclusion

I always think I can get away with a short report and then I look at the issues of the last two weeks and find it is impossible. This does not take into account all of the emails calls, Zoom meetings and Provincial and Federal and First Nation committees that I am on and attend about once a week.

I do hope that everyone is hunkered down and warm and safe and also I hope that all of you have been able to get your second (and third, where appropriate) vaccination against this plague that is disrupting our lives so incredibly. Get vaccinated, get your passports and let's move on, OK!

October in Real Estate

The monthly statistics for the month of October just came out and I'd like to share some quotes from them with my favourite Discovery Islander readers.

I understand some people don't like how these reports are written, based on feedback I have received, because it's dry facts and numbers. I think there's some room for that kind of information here because numbers typically don't lie. Quite honestly I'm a little bored of them myself because we are being told for years now that inventory is historically low and the supply needs to come up. It seems like this is an issue all across the country, not just in our province.

Here are some quotes from the reports published by the real estate boards:

Campbell River

The predominant theme running through the housing market in the Vancouver Island Real Estate Board (VIREB) area is one of "different month, same issues."

Buyers continue to face frustrating hurdles caused by historically low inventory, with little relief in sight. Active listings of single-family homes were 46 per cent lower last month than in October 2020 and dropped by 18 per cent from September- as per VIREB Report.

In Campbell River, the benchmark price of a single-family home hit \$663,000 in October, up by 29 per cent from the previous year.

Quadra Island

Quadra Island saw 1 listing sold (pending completion) and 2 new listings.

Cortes Island

Cortes Island also saw only 1 listing sold (pending completion) in October.

Calgary

Calgary Real Estate Board recorded 2,186 sales in October, a record high for the month and over 35 per cent higher than longer-term averages. Year-to-date sales are on pace to hit new record highs and are currently 61 per cent

higher than average activity recorded over the past five years and 42 per cent higher than 10-year averages.

"Moving into the fourth quarter, the pace of housing demand continues to exceed expectations in the city," said CREB® chief economist Ann-Marie Lurie.

Thanks to gains in most districts, detached home sales improved by 17 per cent compared to last year. The strongest sales growth this month occurred in the North East and East districts, which are the most affordable districts in the city.

In October, the detached price reached \$540,900, up nearly one per cent compared with last month and over 10 per cent higher than levels reported last October.

The semi-detached benchmark price rose to \$427,800 this month, nearly nine per cent higher than last year's levels.

Vancouver

Home sale activity in Metro Vancouver* remained above historical averages in October while the overall supply of homes for sale dipped to levels not seen in three years. "Home sale activity continues to outpace what's typical for this time of year and the pool of homes available for sale is in decline. This dynamic between supply and demand is causing home prices to continue to edge up across the region," Keith Stewart, REBGV economist said.

The benchmark price for a detached home is \$1,850,500. This represents a 20.5 per cent increase from October 2020.

The benchmark price of an apartment home is \$746,400. This represents a 9.5 per cent increase from October 2020.

The benchmark price of an attached home is \$975,000. This represents an 18.5 per cent increase from October 2020.

Toronto

Home sales in the Greater Toronto Area (GTA) reached the second-highest level on record for the month of October. However, the inventory of homes for sale did not keep up with demand. The number of new listings was down by approximately one-third compared to October 2020. Market conditions tightened across all major home types compared to last year, and the annual rate of average price growth remained in the double digits, including for the resurgent condominium apartment segment.

The average price for a detached home in area (416) is \$1,784,979.

The average price of a semi-detached home (416) is \$1,322,229.

The average price of a townhouse (416) is \$1,025,257.

The average price of a condo (416) is \$739,647, as reported by the Toronto Regional Real Estate Board (TREBB)

Hyper-Normalization

dam Curtis, writing in an undated edition of Adbusters, raises an issue that we should all consider. "'Hypernormalization' is a word that was coined by a brilliant Russian historian who was writing about what it was like to live in the last years of the Soviet Union. What he said, which I thought was absolutely fascinating, was that in the 80s everyone from the top to the bottom of Soviet society knew that it wasn't working, knew that it was corrupt, knew that the bosses were looting the system, knew that the politicians had no alternative vision. And they knew that the bosses knew that they knew that. Everyone knew it was fake, but because no one had any alternative vision for a different kind of society, they just accepted this sense of total fakeness as normal. And this historian, Alexei Yurchak, coined the phrase 'hyper-normalization' to describe that feeling." The environmental mess we are making of our planet has uncomfortable parallels to the "hyper-normalization" that Alexei Yurchak identified in the Soviet Union in the 1980s. Some people who recognized the similarity had hoped that the constraints imposed to contain the Covid-19 pandemic would initiate a careful assessment of the wisdom of returning to the old dysfunctional "normal". But, alas, this isn't happening and the social, economic and political habits that are traumatizing Earth's ecological structure are being mistakenly defined as "recovery".

"Recovery" is a return to the conditions that are environmentally, socially, economically and politically suicidal—a word that might seem extreme until we remember history's lesson that all cultures, despite their sense of confidence, are actually quite precariously balanced on the edge of disorder, and may well be stressed to collapse by unpredictable



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events. Our globally integrated civilization of the 21st century is certainly not wanting for lurking, actual or unfolding surprises: the onslaught of extreme weather anomalies, a nuclear holocaust, food shortages, massive refugee migrations, psychological stresses, political discord, wealth inequality, incessantly rising sea levels, acidifying oceans, species extinctions, and others for which we may be wholly unprepared—such as Covid-19. But, if we are honest, we actually know that we are in a condition of hyper-normalization. We consume too much. We pollute too much. We travel too much. We waste too much. We eat too much. Our economic system has no sense of proportion or limits. Our materialistic demands, both innate and cultivated, have become a compulsive neurosis that is dismantling the very security we are trying to keep. The warnings are screaming from countless alarms. Even the ultra-wealthy, who are too myopic and narcissistic to notice, are beginning to feel a hollow and desperate searching that empties their indulgences of satisfaction. What can they do with more money than they can spend? What can they change with more power than they know how to use? What can they improve when they themselves are the problem?

So they continue searching for more of the oil, coal and gas that is incinerating both themselves and everything else. Or they throng to the top of Mount Everest to get in line to reach the summit. Or they celebrate their affluence with a ten minute trip on Blue Origin to the edge of space to experience zero gravity, for a regular fee of a few hundred thousand dollars and a personal contribution to the high atmosphere of 50 to 70 tonnes of carbon dioxide. Meanwhile, arranged below them—now spatially as well as socially and economically—is the wreckage of the

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struggling poor and the labouring middle class who try to pay their taxes to make society function for the betterment of everyone.

Hyper-normalization is aware of these anomalies but fails do anything about them. In the case of the Soviet Union, perhaps no one was able to think of an option. But this is not the case in our sophisticated and technological Western cultures. We know exactly what to do, and we even know how to do it. We just lack the resolve and the imagination to recognize the course we need to be setting. What we do today will determine what happens to us, to our children and to their children in the tomorrows that will keep coming. More than at any other time in human history we are in control of the future of ourselves and our descendents. So we have to ask ourselves if this is the future that they

For the moment, we are rich beyond riches. Our supermarkets and our superstores are crammed with treasures that were unimaginable a mere century ago. Our medical sciences are not even comparable to the butchery of the past. Our technologies stagger even the imagination. Our instantaneous communication links us into a single human family that we struggle to make whole and harmonious. Our massive quantities of information connect us to the integrity of nature at the very moment that we are ripping it apart by our profligacy. If we are so sophisticated and accomplished, why do we continue on this doomsday trajectory?

Are we the challenge that is too difficult for us to overcome? Possibly so, if we don't shed the illusions that keep us from confronting the reality of ourselves and our situation. This is the question that the COP 26 meeting in Glasgow is trying to answer. The soaring oratory is memorable, but nature doesn't understand talk and intentions.

An existential lie stirs in the interior of hypernormalization, a tragic denial that refuses to recognize and acknowledge the actual unfolding of events. The prognosis for this condition is not good. Looming threats that are not addressed become inevitabilities. Too late yields the same tragic results as indifference. And this is a time in human history when we are running out of time.

Campbell River School District Will Not Mandate COVID-19 **Vaccination for Staff**

CAMPBELL RIVER, BC -After careful consideration and discussion at a special in-camera meeting on November 8, the Campbell River School District Board of Education will not mandate COVID-19 vaccines for staff.

"Throughout the pandemic, our board has been committed to following the guidance and expertise of our health professionals and our decision today is based on the most current information provided by these experts," says John Kerr, Campbell River School District board chair.

Information provided by the North Island Medical Health Officer showed that communities served by the school district have high vaccination rates that continue to rise daily, with over 88% of those eligible already having received one dose and 83% being fully vaccinated. And while a vaccine mandate for K-12 staff is one of many interventions available, health officials advised it would have a limited impact on transmission rates because of the already high community vaccination rate, adherence to public health measures, and the fact that schools are not a primary source

of COVID-19 cases within the community.

The board also considered how a vaccine mandate could impact the delivery of education and education programs and reviewed the K-12 Sector Guidelines for Vaccination Policies developed by the Ministry of Education, BC Public School Employers' Association and the provincial advisory

"We have a responsibility to keep schools open while providing a safe learning environment. Public health has assured us that our schools continue to be low-risk settings and we do not need 100% vaccination rates for safe operation; as evidenced by the fact that since March 2020, the district has had COVID exposure notices but no known cases of in-school transmission.

While we are not mandating staff vaccination at this time, our board continues to encourage all who are eligible to get vaccinated and supports Island Health's vaccination efforts."
