Dear Editor

When I think of Ray, Noel and Judy (the gang of three) tar and feathers come to mind! They have worked behind people's backs for an island-destroying national park, while paying lip service to cooperation and local forestry. Their "we're not against logging" carries little weight when you consider what a national park on most of northern Quadra Island would mean, to quote Wayne Anderson "a park on the north end, and a parking lot on the south".

The forest resources are dwindling on this coast largely because of increased population, and busybodies such as Mr. Grigg who not only wish to "save" old growth, but all the second growth forest also. He lied openly to the Quadra Island loggers, while deceitfully playing his game behind our backs.

Nothing destroys a community like the creation of a national park. Eco-tourism is considered by many the largest threat to wilderness environments - witness the fees and bookings for the West Coast Trail and the closure of some heavily travelled trails to large trees on Vancouver Islands west coast.

A tree farm licence, such as TFL 47 in which Timber West operates, on Quadra Island is the best form of maintaining a semblance of wilderness, so that the area is in the state which the preservationists are

misguidedly trying to "save" today.

These preservationists have played an important role in building public awareness of natural resources and bad logging practices, but consider - it is these same logging practices that have resulted in what they are attempting to "save" for a national park today.

I'm sure Campbell River would love Quadra Island National Park, but any semblance of normal life on the island would be destroyed. It is yet another example of what extremists have always maintained - the end justifies the means!

Reggio Emilia - Exciting Developments for Young Children

The city of Reggio Emilia in Northern Italy, has developed over the last fifty years an early childhood program that Newsweek Magazine called the best in the world. I was fortunate to be a member of the first Canadian delegation in 1993 to visit some of the thirty schools in Reggio Emilia and study their methods. I came back inspired and determined to try out what I had learned from my observations in Reggio Emilia in my work in the field of early childhood in Canada.

Quadra Island is a community with many of the same to offer. The Preschool and Daycare are in many ways similar to the schools in Reggio. They have a high level of parent involvement, a strong base in the community, an aesthetically pleasing environment and a rich and stimulating program for children. Although they are already implementing many aspects of the Reggio Emilia approach, I would like to collaborate with the parents, teachers, staff and children to further develop some of the ideas such as emergent curriculum, documentation and the development of an art atelier in the classroom. Let us know if there is an artist in the community who

would be interested in setting up a studio in the classroom. At the same time I would like to record the process and write the story of our experiences in adapting the approach either as a text book or in a series of articles for publication. Collaboration with all concerned is a key principle so we would start slowly and follow the children's lead as we further develop the ideas that we as a group identify as feasible for this particular group of children.

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



Museum at Campbell River

The Museum at Campbell River offers an all-day historic tour of Quadra Island with resident historian Jeanette Taylor on Saturday, June 21st.



Using a lively storytelling format, and drawing upon over twenty years of research, Jeanette brings to life the characters and events which have shaped the island community.

This tour is ideal for local residents who want to learn more about the colourful history and magnificent scenery of the region, and will also appeal to visitors hoping to gain a deeper understanding of their host community.

The emphasis is placed upon heritage sites which are not readily accessible and might otherwise be missed. However, Jeanette does point out the easy-to-find places, such as the Kwagiulth Museum, to encourage participants to return on their own.

Attention all Legion Members. The Legion will be holding a large initiation on



Money Matters

orking in a financial institution, the question most commonly encountered is "Why are interest rates so low??". Obviously, we receive this question from depositing customers, as borrowing clients are not generally likely to query their good fortunes in the present low rate environment,

Well, I'm afraid there is no easy answer to this question? Banking, while not a monopoly, is somewhat analogous to trading in a commodity, in this case being money. Similar to commodities such as foodstuff and metals, prices are not set by the local marketplace, but rather the global marketplace. The rates paid or charged by a financial institution are not set by the local demand for the product, but are established at a variety of levels, ranging from the rates being paid for

Canadian long-term debt in the global markets, to the present mood at the Bank of Canada, whose interest rate policies are generally dictated by two primary goals.

Firstly, the Federal Government has been operating for several years under a general principle of repatriating Canadian debt held by overseas investors, primarily Japanese and European corporate bodies. The present low rate environment does not make Canadian debt particularly attractive, allowing our Treasury department to repurchase millions, if not billions of dollars of foreign held debt.

Secondly, the Bank of Canada's weekly setting of the Bank Rate (the rate paid by the Bank for statutory, or required deposits, by major Canadian financial institutions) is strongly influenced by the Government's inflation policy. In a nutshell, a low rate of inflation is being

maintained by careful management of the economy, the most important component of which is interest rates. For several years, inflation has been kept at a low level (presently around 2%) by the Bank's policy of keeping rates low a pleasant by-product of the previously mentioned repatriation policy.

So if you are concerned about low rates on your savings and term deposits. remember the trade off. If rates rise again to a level at which you as a depositor are happy, it is a safe bet that inflation will, be rising right along behind, likely negating any net benefit you may have. Of course, you can place your savings into other

To Hold A While: A New Book by Ron Atkinson **by Tanya Storr**

Ron Atkinson, who was minister of Ouadra Island United Church in the 1970's and early 1980's, is just coming out with his second book, entitled To Hold A While. Ron and his wife Donna now live in Oualicum Beach, but Quadra is frequently in their thoughts and they visit the island often. Memories of the time they spent living in Cape Mudge Village fill many pages in To Hold A While, and Ron will hold the official launch of his new book at Quadra Island United Church on Saturday June 28 at 7:30 pm. I met with Ron in Campbell River on June 4 to talk about his new book.


After going over To Hold A While with great thought, master printer Jim Bennett at Morris Printing said to Ron, "This is a very positive book." The comment pleased Ron greatly, he said. "I try to ask myself what may I affirm and celebrate, despite the tragic sense of life that I think we all have." Ron describes To Hold A While as a book of prose poems that find "the uncommon in the commonplace" and explore "island as metaphor for this brief, bounded life."

When Ron handed me his manuscript. at that point just a few days away from printing, I was immediately drawn into the image on the front cover. A mixed-media on silver print by Ron's friend Ken Flett, it is entitled 'Dancing in the Shadows', and depicts someone's room, empty of the person who inhabited it yet still filled with memories.

"I chose that image for the cover because it captures the empty shell of a person's life after they're gone, the feeling of a presence that has lived, died, and is still lingering. The theme of To Hold A While is the same—we're not here long, but we may take the face of a loved one in our hands to hold a while. It's about the fragility and swiftness of life. The moments become very precious because of that sense of mortality-we're on the edge of dying so therefore full of living."

Ron's first book, a cycle of lyrical essays entitled A Fire in the Rain, covers a period from October to October. This latest book follows a life from birth to death, and a sense of the author's aging runs through the writing, reinforced by a series of pen and ink self-portraits of Ron, who is now 64, at different stages of his life. However, he points out that <u>To Hold A While</u> is also about other people and other things.

Ron is self-publishing To Hold A While under his newly-formed company. Limen Books. 'Limen', he explained, is an Italian

word meaning 'threshold'. More than one prose poem in the book recalls a moment that took place at twilight, "a limenal time of day." Ron's piece, 'A Twilight Faith', reveals his faith in evenings: "Treasuring the quieter energies of evensong, I fear morning meditations may presume too much. By evening the striving ego permits a more tender resilience. Hopefully, by the end of the day a darker wisdom is possible."

A Fire in the Rain was published by Oolichan Books in 1991 and has been through a second printing. "A Native friend taught me how to make a fire in the rain. The title also comes from the Book of Acts, when Paul is shipwrecked and welcomed by the Natives, who made a fire although it was raining." The launch for \underline{A} Fire in the Rain was held at Quadra Island United Church on September 14, 1991.

Ron explained that some publishers also expressed an interest in To Hold A While, but it sat there and the years

went by while they waited for funding. He decided recently to set up his own publishing company and publish the book himself. "Hopefully I will be able to publish other things too," he said. Ron is now working on his third book, a collection of poems "to do with the freedom to transcend family, society, and religion by being completely personal and radically open to others."

One of the people Ron writes about in his beautifully crafted prose poems in To Hold A While is the late Sandy Billy, a man Ron described as "truly an elder of the village." He said of Sandy, "He was a fisherman, with a wonderful genial quality. He had a great respect for everyone and was highly respected by all. He was a singer and very devout-he understood both nature and man. The faith of the church and his Native heritage were one for him."

In 'A Carol at Midnight', Ron writes about Sandy's gift of song: "... Sound and silence meet well in him. Especially when his silence becomes song. On Christmas Eve, just before midnight, Sandy sings Silent Night in Kwakwala. He stands as still as a cedar tree, waiting for the fullness of the moment, gathering us in the meetingpoint of sound and silence. When the song is over, he remains rooted in the hush, then seals his lips and nods his head by way of confirmation. When he suddenly grins like a proud boy it is surely Christmas morning."

Ron speaks highly of the friendships he made at Cape Mudge. "Native friends have a hold on my heart. Even when I see a stranger to me who is Native, I feel I

should introduce myself because I believe I belong in that gift they gave me." One piece in To Hold A While delves into the author's thoughts while visiting the museum at Cape Mudge; others speak of past conversations and memories of life in the village.

Ron explained that his writing arises out of a communal energy and that a great many people have inspired him. "When I'm with people, I feel their energy coming towards me. In other words, I'm still in an oral tradition and then I record it later. I can't leave Quadra in my writing it seemsour years on the island seem to have been the formative years for me."

Ron. Donna, and their two sons moved to Quadra in the early 1970's when the boys were young. "I was working as a consultant to the United Church of Canada as a whole, and I said I would consider a congregation if it was small and on the sea. The next thing I knew I had a telegram from the United Church on Quadra Island asking, 'Will you be our minister?' I didn't answer right away, as we had to decide if it was the right thing to do for our young boys. Then another one came: 'Are you coming or not?' We said yes, and it was the best thing we ever did."

The Atkinsons lived in Toronto previously, and Ron designed and headed up an event called Day Spring, a festival of ecology and the arts, for the United Church just before coming to B.C. Ron's first career was teaching music, and he has also been the director of the International Student Centre at the University of Toronto and a teacher at a theological college. He became a minister in 1956. "On the whole I don't think of myself as having a need to express any professional status, but when pressed I say I was a bellhop at Emerald Lake Chalet for four years and I think of myself as a very gifted bellhop."

The move to Quadra Island seemed like the fulfilment of a dream for Ron, a dream that began when he took a book out of the library as a child. "It was called Tall White Sails, and it was about a family from Ontario going to live with Kwakiutl Indians. I got it out again a few years ago—it must have filled my unconscious. I think we do tend to do what we wish to do, following our intuition."

Ron spent five years as minister of the United Church, during which time the Atkinsons lived in the village. Later, Ron was called back in July of 1979 as minister of the church for another three years. Upon his return, the church was renamed Ouadra Island United Church from Walker Memorial United Church.

"My wife and I felt Quadra was home and we were assured it was. We never thought we'd leave, but it wasn't feasible to stay-the boys needed a different experience. We always think we might move back and we visit quite often. I'm grateful not only to the community of Cape Mudge, but to the whole of Quadra Island. To coin a Greek phrase, I'm a Quadraphiliac. In the ruggedness of the Discovery Islands, there is a certain energy of the wild."

Throughout To Hold A While, Ron employs the image of an island as a metaphor for life. "It's a limenal thing, meaning on the threshold, because islands are always near the edge. All persons are islands-we live within islands that are within islands." In 'Finding A Home for Ourselves', Ron writes: "Nourished by the outermost and the innermost, the potential of self emerges like an island in the sea, our personal island bounded by the shores of our mortality."

Natural imagery is prevalent in the book, many pieces bringing to mind scenes of Quadra. The Spit and the beach in front of the village are recurring images, and many of the island's wild creatures grace the pages. "I think we can only be human animals if we are part of all the other animals," said Ron. In 'Hunter Envy', he writes about the kingfisher: "I envy the proud, so very blue and blazing Kingfisher. I have glimpsed that keen eye, heard the confident cry and admired the accurate arc of that dazzling dive. How beautiful is the clarity of the swift and sure! No kingfisher begs for the beyond or confuses error with mystery . . ."

Ron makes a conscious effort to use language that is accessible and open to as many people as possible. "I'm trying to find an alternative to religious language for those who don't want to speak of God, but still hunger to speak of the sacred and the holy." He defines the soul as "the unity of body, mind, and imagination" and said "there are no souls not in a body-when the body passes on, the soul becomes part of the body of great belonging."

Since retiring as a minister seven years ago, Ron has been writing, teaching music history, and acting. In November '96, Ron acted in a play called "My Father, My Son" that he co-wrote with Ken Flett. "He played himself and I played his friend in his 70's. It went over very well-we were amazed because it was a very daring presentation." The other Atkinson family members also work in the arts: Donna teaches music, one of their sons is a writer, and the other is a musician.

Recently, Ron has been spending some time travelling to Greece and Mexico. "Greece has become pivotal to my understanding of everything. I'm going back to Greece with Donna for our fortieth wedding anniversary next May. One thing I hope to do with my publishing company is find a way of making available modern Greek poets, who are very good and very neglected."

Ron said he is really looking forward to the launch of To Hold A While at the Quadra Island United Church. At the launch, Ron will speak, read from the book, and sign copies. To Hold A While costs \$12.95 and will be on sale at the launch, or you can order it by writing to Limen Books, Box 21, Qualicum Beach, B.C., V9K 1S7. 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
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

Parents and Tots

Quadra Island's Parents and Tots are about to wrap up another successful season, and when I visited a session on Thursday June 5, I immediately understood why the group is known for having fun. Bigger tots zoomed around in toy cars and smaller tots played with toy instruments, while parents looked on and conversed together. The tots made colourful crafts out of egg cartons, and some danced to background music. At snack time, the children ate finger food and their parents drank coffee or tea. In short, everyone seemed to be having an excellent time.

"Parents and Tots is very social," said Sheri Benner, who has been the Parents and Tots coordinator on and off for three years. "We talk a lot about parental issues and give each other advice. Lots of new parents come with their babies for the social aspect, even though their babies are too young to take part in some of the activities. It's a bunch of parents and kids coming together."

Community Recreation coordinator Sandy Spearing said Parents and Tots has been meeting for over 12 years now, since around the time QCC was built. "It's neat to see kids as toddlers and know that on grade 12 graduation night a lot of the same kids and parents are going to be sitting together. Many times Parents and Tots is the first introduction to the community for parents and kids—a lot of parents feel very isolated. It's also great for newcomers to the island because it provides good access to the community."

Benner explained that Parents and Tots takes place on Thursdays from 10 until noon on a drop-in basis. The fee is \$3 per family, which includes a snack, craft, tea, and coffee. "There's no big commitment—people can come if they want to. Our numbers vary from month to month. In winter we do really well, but the numbers dwindle in spring when everybody gets busy in their gardens. We usually run throughout the school year, and we're winding down now. In the summer if people want to stay connected we meet at the Spit on Thursdays at the same time."

Sometimes it can be a challenge to keep funding levels up, Benner said, so Parents and Tots does some fund-raising. "We've sold stuff at the Connections Fair, done the concession at a Quadra Singers concert, and had a garage sale and bake sale. We received two grants from the

regional district, and the preschool has been very generous in giving us donations too. We really need the support of parents and tots on the island to keep us going. Parent participation is very important."

Parents and Tots has a three person steering committee, and this year's committee is made up of Sheri Benner, Nancy Barker, and Joanna Annett. "I definitely get a lot of help from the other people on the committee," Benner said. As her son Nicholas will be going to kindergarten this September, she will no longer be involved next season. "A new steering committee will be formed for next September. Parents, this could be your chance to get involved!"

Benner added that Parents and Tots is really looking forward to the community centre addition. "I've started a research library for parents in the community centre, but right now it's in the ticket booth. It'll be nice when we have more space."

Parent Sue Graham said she started going to Parents and Tots three-and-ahalf years ago, when her son Reid was two years old and her daughter Allie two weeks old. Although she doesn't go as often now that her kids are older, she said they still really enjoy going. "The kids have a lot of fun, and I like going and having a cup of coffee and meeting new people. It's so nice to have a place to go in the winter. Sheri's done some fun crafts with the kids, and they have playdough and a snack. I think it's a really important program to have on the island for parents to get out and socialize. I know I really appreciated it when the kids were younger.'

Maritza Jacobs was at Parents and Tots with her 15 month old girl, Wanita, the day I visited. She said Parents and Tots has helped her overcome her shyness about meeting others. "I like it a lot—it's great. Wanita likes meeting new kids and I like meeting new people. Before I was shy and afraid to meet new people, but now I've got Wanita I'm not afraid anymore because I've got someone to go with. Parents and Tots helped a lot—it's great for both of us."

Parents and Tots won first prize for their Peter Pan float at May Day this year, and Benner said the prize money will be spent on an end-of-season party on June 19, to be held at the Spit weather permitting.
