




editation. Who would have guessed that sometimes in order to move forward one has to learn how to stand still? Meditation. This has not been an easy one for me to grasp! I suspect I am not alone either. Sitting still has to be the hardest thing I have ever had to do and to do **NO-THING**? Absolutely unheard of!

Our society seems to think that the more you do, the more successful you are. I bought into that for many years. Kind of like the "Martha Stewart" syndrome I talked about many articles ago. It's not enough just to collect the eggs; first we have to weave the basket. I equated down time with wasted time. I spent more time running in circles feeling like I was accomplishing great things, when in reality I was just – running in circles! One has to stop every now and then and ask – "What exactly am I running from?" The answer generally runs along the lines of – "Myself"?

So I decided it was high time to stop running and see where that would lead. My first step was to enrol in Carol Foort's weekly integral yoga class. Yoga was a part of my life in high school but I found that 25 years of absence has quite a negative effect on flexibility! Even though yoga is about so much more than just the ability to become a human pretzel, I was feeling just a tad inadequate...

It was in fact, quite excruciating for me just to be there. Carol, who emanates patience and peace, would be guiding us through relaxation and meditation and my mind would wander to what kind of soup to make for dinner! I would no sooner get to class and I would be watching the clock, counting the minutes until I could leave the class. All the time thinking that I wish she could just pick up the pace, you know, really get things moving! "Be still", my little voice would whisper. "Hang in there", it encouraged. "Give me a break I would scream back! Despite my inner conflict, I managed to continue.

I would leave each class with resolve that I would practice every day and I would arrive back to class the following week promising myself that this was the week I would really do it! I am persistent if nothing else. That was two years ago. But like everything else, all changes begin with an awareness. You have to plant the seed before you reap the benefits.

I am pleased to report that my persistence has paid off. Recently I noticed that I am actually enjoying being there! I can make it through the whole class without thinking about soup and I even quit wearing my watch. But the real accomplishment is that Carol no sooner starts guiding us through deep relaxation and then it is time to come out of it. Where did that 15 minutes go? No inner dialogue, no conflict of emotions, no battle of wills, no nagging thoughts.... I was just – *there*! Present and absent at the same time. Amazing.

Meditation is a wonderful tool for reaching deep into ourselves and connecting with life at a cellular level. Finding this peaceful state of just "being" has been a journey into myself. I am just beginning this voyage as I have only taken a few baby steps but the clarity and deep sense of well being that come with it are intriguing. In that perfect moment of quiet solitude the world looks different, smells different and sounds different. Life, like yoga isn't about how much we do well, but how much awareness we bring to what we are doing. How present are you in the moment? How mindful are you of your actions?

We have finished class now and will resume in the New Year. In closing, Carol thanked us and gave a wonderful pep talk. "Remember to keep practicing over the holidays." She said. "Or if you don't practice, at least remember to *-breathe*!" I am happy to report that I can now breathe and practice at the same time! Thank you Carol for all that you do...Namaste.



Golf Course Information Meeting: Quadra Links Responds

hank you to all of the approximately 100 people who attended the December 2 information meeting. We were pleased to have all the presentations from Ted Locke (golf course architect and land planner) and Dr. Brian Holl (Professor Emeritus, Agricultural Sciences UBC) that reflect our approach to golf course design and turf maintenance. We were also happy to have Bruce Ingimundson (senior hydrologist with Timber Engineering) discuss local hydrology. These men are experts in their fields. They have been and will continue to assist us in developing a course that practices solid principles of environmental stewardship.

The point was made that Quadra Links Ltd has become a member of 'Audubon International'. This organization has developed strategies for constructing and managing golf courses in an environmentally responsible manner. We agree with their principles and intend to follow their guidelines. A handout which outlined their approach was available to everyone at the meeting.

A commitment was made to answer written questions submitted at the meeting. We received six requests. They are printed below in an abbreviated form, along with our responses.

1) Can the proponents of the project form a committee that will work to resolve outstanding issues?-Rory Annett. The answer is yes and work has begun.

2) Is this project financially viable? If residents are impacted and the course fails, is there any recourse to correct the damage?unsigned. The proponents believe that a course can be designed for this property that will provide a great golf experience. There are business risks to any undertaking; however, if managed properly, the golf course will be successful. There wil be no damage to residents if the course succeeds and there will be no damage to residents in the unlikely event of failure.

3) I am for the course but I am concerened that shallow test wells will reduce the water to our shallow wells. When my neighbour dug a shallow well, ours started to run dry at the end of the summer when it had not done so before-hand. What happens if shallow wells are compromised? If we have to take you to court who will pay the bills?-unsigned. We cannot comment on whether or not your neighbours well will affect yours. This past summer, for example, virtually every dug well on quadra had problems. we will not develop shallow wells as a water source for the golf course because they are not dependable during the summer months when we need water. In addition, we have made the commitment to design the golf course in a manner that does not disrupt the current flow of water leaving the property. The golf course will not compromise shallow wells. In the unfortunate situation that we end up in court, the court will decide who pays.

4) The water flowing from bogs that run along the 'back road' in a northerly direction is working its way toward the property of Nigel and Bay Phillips. Standing water has been observed on both sides of Animal Farm Road. The water flows north through the Oldroyd property and on towards the Annett property. Our concern is that any disruption or diversion of this water flow could significantly impact on the health of the downstream water systems both natural in the form of forest wetlands and bogs and man made in the form of ponds and surface wells. Our question is: Have you considered as part of your development plan a way of ensuring that this water flow will continue naturally without interuption?-Dave Oldroyd and Rory Annett. The answer to the previous question applies to this case as well. In addition, it should be noted that Dave and Rory accompanied Brian Wilson, Doug Edwards and Bill Pirie on a hike that followed the drainage described. We understand the importance of this issue to our neighbours and we will insure the current flow leaving the proposed golf course property is not disrupted. It also should be noted that this water flow is seasonal and during wet months, the best thing for the golf course is to allow the surface water to move off the property in a natural fashion.

5) Not long ago we had the owner/director of a golf course on Salt Spring Island give us a talk/slide show about their all organic course. Is it cheaper to operate this way tha n to use chemicals?-unsigned. The owner of the Salt Spring Island course does not have information that compares her operating costs with other courses. It is important to note that the management practice for the Quadra course, as outlined with Audubon International, emphasizes preventive management and prescribes the use of chemicals as a last resort. We are confident that if the use of chemicals is required, it can be done in a safe, responsible manner.

6) I believe that you will only go ahead with this project as long as it doesn't hurt others, and I fully support your endeavour.- Kami Robb. We appreciate the support.

The rezoning process is intended to determine appropriate land use. The committee members of Quadra Links Ltd. (Doug Edwards, Sharon Fisher, Lawrence Lewis, Bill Pirie, Keith Remfert and Brian Wilson) have put in countless hour of research and planning in an effort to develop a golf course plan that will be an asset to Quadra Island. Compared to other development alternatives available for this site, we strongly believe that a golf course and the green space it provides will be the most beneficial for our community.

Quadra Couple Prepare to Volunteer in Vietnam

n interest in international development work has led to an exciting opportunity for a Quadra couple. In a few short weeks Sehleeah and John Schevers are setting off for Vietnam, where they will volunteer for two years with the Canadian Centre for International Studies and Cooperation/Centre Canadien d'étude et de Coopération Internationale (CECI).

"John and I have always talked about doing international development work and being immersed in another culture. This summer when cruising the Internet one day I saw the job with CECI and applied," Sehleeah told me, as we talked in her office located a short distance from their house.

The online application took a mere ten minutes to fill out and Sehleeah didn't expect anything to come of it. She was very surprised when she received a phone call from CECI some weeks later, letting her know they were considering her for a position in Vietnam.

"I ran outside calling, 'John! John! I just got a phone call about that volunteer job in Vietnam!" Schleeah remembered.

Following a formal phone interview, a weekend of training/selection in Montreal, and a more detailed written application process, Sehleeah was thrilled to learn that she had landed the position.



A self-employed consultant in forestry for the past five years, Sehleeah, who is 30, has a degree in biology and a certificate in community economic development. She will be the technical assistant for the Capacity-building for Adaptation to Climate Change (CACC) Project in Hue, a city on the coast of central Vietnam.

The project's mandate is to reduce economic hardships as well as the number of lives lost due to natural disasters that periodically affect the region. Floods and typhoons leave local communities destitute every year. In 1999 more than 700 people died as a result of flooding.

"The biggest problems the project addresses are flooding and soil erosion. As technical assistant, I'll help the team leader and project partners to identify and plan projects such as land-use plans and relocation of vulnerable populations," Sehleeah explained.

CECI was interested to hear about Sehleeah's background in working with First Nations organizations on forestry issues, as the project in Hue partners with local groups.

"It's a community-based project

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on the needs of the Vietnamese people. They invited CECI to come and work with them on disaster preparedness and risk mitigation. It's very bottom up as opposed to top down," Sehleeah noted.

She went on to say that she is looking forward to learning more about climate change during the project, and bringing new skills back to BC to address similar issues here.

"A lot of the things that are happening in Vietnam will happen here, including flooding, warmer ocean temperatures, higher ocean levels, more severe storms, droughts, and longer rainy seasons," Sehleeah stated.

John, who is 39 and comes from Holland, is a self-employed artist, builder, painter, and landscaper with a degree in graphic design. In Vietnam he will volunteer on small local projects and immerse himself in indigenous art production.

"Vietnam is really unexploited in terms of local handicrafts. I'm looking forward to learning some new techniques like bronze casting and lacquer work," he said.

CECI pays for the couple's airfare and rent in Vietnam, as well as providing a stipend for living expenses. Sehleeah and John will spend the first six weeks in Hanoi doing intensive Vietnamese language training and learning about the culture.

"It's going to be great to learn the language. It's the only way to become part of the culture," John enthused.

From there they will go to Hue, their posting for the two-year contract. Sehleeah and John will live like their Vietnamese neighbours in a house with only basic amenities.

"It rains a lot there, so we'll feel right at home!" laughed Sehleeah.

Hue is Vietnam's most well known ancient capital, with an intact monarchic complex consisting of old stone walls, palaces, and royal tombs. Despite damage from flooding and wars, the city is considered a national treasure.

One of the requirements of volunteering for CECI is to go through a week of predeparture training in Montreal, where the organization is based. CECI flew Sehleeah and John there in October, where they took part in interactive group exercises designed to prepare them for some of the issues and challenges they will face abroad.

"We discussed all the players in international development and their roles, intercultural communication, human rights, and gender and development. Sehleeah said.

While there, John and Sehleeah met with an ex-volunteer who was posted in Northern Vietnam and a Vietnamese immigrant to Canada.

"He told us how Vietnamese families work--the father is the leader of the household and the mother is what he called 'Minister of the Interior'," Sehleeah recounted.

CECI gave the trainees water filters and first aid kits to take with them, and they learned useful tips on how to take care of their health overseas.

The organization is largely funded by the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA), with the \$9 million CACC project in Hue also receiving funding from the Canadian Centre for Climate Change.

Sehleeah and John are doing some fund raising for the project before they leave. CECI volunteers are encouraged to raise funds for their own projects, but it isn't required. They sold bracelets from Guatemala by donation at the QCC Christmas Craft Fair and the Upper Realm, and are sending letters to friends and family describing the project and inviting donations.

"CECI is a pretty neat organization with divisions in Asia, Latin America, and Africa. It's decentralized, with head offices in each division and just a small administrative office in Canada. That keeps costs down, so that more of the donor's dollar goes directly to the projects," Sehleeah observed.

John and Sehleeah are busy completing a major renovation project on their home, as well as visiting family, before they leave. Once their work visas are secured, they anticipate leaving for Vietnam in mid to late January.

"We're looking forward to it very much. It's an excellent opportunity and we'll really appreciate what we have here when we come back, after seeing the challenges others face trying to meet their basic needs," said Sehleeah.
