

decided to have a casual discussion with the reporters accompanying him to the G-8 summit in Evian, France. During that conversation he let slip that the present US administration is doing a poor job of managing their economy, or words to that effect. By way of contrast he pointed out that our own economy (the only G-8 nation not in deficit) is much more sound and sustainable. While no recording was allowed, the journalists of course took notes, and the next day it was headline news around the globe.

As we now know, any time a head of state dares criticise G. W. Bush's administration it becomes headline news, which is happening on a relatively frequent basis. The administration dismissed Chretien's comments by saying that the US economy was suffering because of the expenditures related to the war on terrorism and Iraq. This, of course, is pure hokum. Opposition Leader Stephen Harper was quick to pounce, as he is wont to do, predicting all manner of hell and damnation to be poured on us by the US because of our PM's thoughtless remarks. What a schmuck. There are 2 points that Harper (and Joe Clark, as well) missed. First off, Chretien's comments were accurate, and as he will be moderating the economic discussions at the summit it is not inappropriate to discuss global economics. Secondly, since when has the USA developed such a thin skin? Many previous Canadian leaders have not seen eye to eye with our neighbour, and made plenty of public comments without hesitation. In 3 cases,

it was not a simple matter of disagreeing; they actually loathed each other. Nixon particularly hated Trudeau (you can listen to the tapes), Johnson physically and verbally bullied Pearson, and Kennedy pointedly ignored Diefenbaker. In comparison, Chretien has been a paragon of diplomacy.

In a review of the recently passed US tax bill, the conservative Financial Times of London made this comment – "The lunatics are now in charge of the asylum." Paul Krugman, an economist who writes for the New York Times states "by pushing through another huge tax cut in the face of record deficits, the administration clearly demonstrates that it is completely reckless, or that it actually wants a fiscal crisis. (Or maybe both)." Our Prime Minister, in remarking that the US needs to be getting its deficit under control, was offering a candid (and accurate) assessment of the truth, and he knows of what he speaks.

Having inherited a fiscal surplus, Bush has quickly made a \$600 billion turnaround, creating a \$400 billion deficit. His new tax plan admits that that this deficit will grow to almost \$2 trillion dollars in the coming years. Even more alarming, a report commissioned by the former Treasury Secretary and delivered to his successor (who quickly ordered it to be deeply buried) states that unless changes are made, and fast, the USA could be facing a debt load of \$44 trillion in the future, eight times their present debt. That's \$150,000 for every US citizen. It is numbers like that is prompting the most visible criticism of US economic policy; investors that are dumping US dollars like crazy. Several governments are seriously considering re-denominating their currency reserves from US dollars to Euros. If this happens...well, let's just say it won't be pretty. OPEC may do the same.

Worse, the Bush plan is transparently favourable to the rich. His vaunted elimination of taxes on dividends will only benefit a very

small number of investors, and the reduction of tax rates will do little to ease the pain of low to medium income earners. And how will the tax cuts be funded? By cutting back on services, similar to what has occurred here in BC. So whatever measly savings on taxes are achieved will be sucked up by fees or reductions in other benefits. Getting back to the attribution of the economic problems to the war, the problem existed long before the war started, though it is true that the war is exacerbating the problem. The fact of the matter is that the US economy is on precarious ground, especially during times of economic slowdown, as is the case now.

Present administration policy is ignoring reality while catering to its benefactors, both private and corporate.

The May 30 editorial of the Toronto Star was headlined "Chretien was right to challenge Bush". It rightfully points out that Chretien has a duty to the world to point out signs of economic instability or impending crisis, and that "a US fiscal crisis would have a profoundly negative impact on the entire world economy". Citing Krugman's work in uncovering the economic mess that is reality in America, the Star opines "If Krugman feels no compulsion to sing "Hail to the Chief", our Prime Minister owes no one an apology for daring to tell the truth". I am a firm believer in listening to the voices of experience, no matter how unpalatable the truth. Good friends should point out potential pitfalls to their friends, and Canada and the USA are good friends. Chretien has earned the right to express his very qualified opinions through a lifetime of working in senior government, and nobody is denying that Canada's economic house is in order. But I suspect this has been a tempest in a teapot, as the G-8 will no doubt deliver Bush the same message. In a much louder voice.

Area J Regional Director's Report

ne of the first items I want to mention is the issue of high speed internet for Quadra Island. I have been in discussions with Telus for the past many months as I have reported in previous issues. I can now tell you that the negotiations have gone very well and that we are slated to have ADSL High Speed Internet services in place prior to the end of this year. Telus liked the business plan that I wrote for them and are confident that they will get a fairly positive response from islanders in subscription rate. I am sure that you can imagine how pleased I am with this news. I was just informed on Thurs. that this will take place. The first installation will cover about a 4 km radius from the present telephone office on Heriot Bay Road. If Telus gets a good sign up on the first round they are willing to move to the next stage that would then take in the area out as far as Hyacinth Bay and so on. So I am hoping that those of you that read this will talk to all of your friends in the area and insure that as many people as possible subscribe to this service. I am not promoting any one company over any other, but this opportunity is being brought to us by Telus and if we want it expanded, it requires some support. Please spread the word and feel free to contact me also. It is my understanding that the service will start at around \$25.00 per month and if you want more add ons they would be extra. Prior to the business case that I submitted they were looking at a \$30,000.00 initial contribution and a minimum pre-sign-up of 30%. Having seen the business plan they have decided that the number of homes in the initial area and the strong desire to be connected will allow them to hook us up without any conditions on the service. So, a small success story. Look for more details to

Next on my list was to let you know that the application by Quadra Links Ltd. to rezone for a Golf course has received Third Reading at the Regional District Board. The applicants will now need to satisfy the terms of the recommendation to move forward. This will involve detailed testing of the water supply in the area and any effect their proposal might have on the surrounding neighbours. It will also require a completed covenant and other conditions prior to being able to move to Fourth Reading. The public process has been a successful one although it may have seemed difficult, frustrating and lengthy to all involved. Patience and community cooperation have proven to be invaluable in this situation and will hopefully bring a positive result for all of our island residents. I will keep you informed of the process from the RD end of things as we move forward.

Last but not least, there was a letter to the editor in the last issue entitled "Who's the Pot calling the Kettle black?". There was some very erroneous information in that article and I would hate for the public to read it and believe it to be true. It was stated that the increase to RD taxes this year over last year will be 6.37%. This is absolutely wrong. The Director of Financial Services for the RD has given me the correct figures and the increase for Area J for all services will be 2.52% on the dollar comparison between this year and last year. This means that for every \$100,000.00 dollars of assessed value on your property, your taxes will increase by about \$3.00. So a \$150,000.00 property will go up by \$4.50 over last year. The Provincial taxes are listed separately on the tax bill and have nothing whatsoever to do with the RD. They are set by the Provincial Government and we have no control over them at the RD. So, for the information of the public and the author of the previous letter to the editor, I have managed to keep our tax rate as low as is humanly possible for this year. As your representative, and as a taxpayer myself, I demand this of myself every year throughout the budget process. The other figure that was presented in the letter to the editor is also erroneously more than twice the actual increase over the last seven years. Once again, this information comes to you from the Director of Financial Services of the RD. She doesn't make mistakes with our accounting practices.

So, having said all of that, I hope you are all getting into your spring and early summer rituals and enjoying life to the fullest. I am sure I will see many of you on the Studio Tour this coming weekend.




