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Quadra Credit Union is pleased to announce that we have commenced the construction of our new branch on Cortes Island, pictured above. At 1,850-sq. ft. the new building will be well over three times the size of our existing facility, and will offer members a far more comfortable and spacious banking centre. enhancements will include full service access for people with disabilities, a limited number of secure safety deposit boxes and a fully functional night deposit service. As with our Quadra office a small display case will be provided for local community groups to promote their events.

Located on our newly purchased property at the junction of Bellwood and Sutil Point Road, the building has been designed to provide as much functionality as possible within the smallest possible footprint. Privacy, a comfortable staff room and sufficient storage must be accommodated in the limited amount of space that must also provide a welcoming environment for our growing membership. An open ceiling plan will provide the building with a large amount of natural light, while a full heating, ventilation and air conditioning system will make visiting the Credit Union a more pleasant experience. The building has been designed bearing in mind the rate of growth now being experienced on Cortes, and should continue to be of adequate size and functionality for a number of years to come. The exterior of the building has been designed to remove any "institutional" feel from the building, and we trust the selected design is fitting to the community.





Courtesy Lane - Cortes Ferry Traffic

Campbell River Terminal - BC Ferries provides a courtesy lane at the Campbell River terminal, allowing Cortes-bound vehicles to board prior to Quadra Island traffic. This allows adequate time to cross Quadra Island and connect with the Cortes ferry. The following procedures are in place:

- 1. The allocated Cortes vehicle spaces on board the ship will be equally marked out in the lanes ashore.
- 2. When the courtesy lane is full, or loading has begun, all Cortes-bound traffic will be directed into the general loading lanes.
- 3. New For Fall 2004 / Spring 2005: For the 5:25 p.m. and 6:15 p.m. sailings from Campbell River, coloured tags will be handed out to Cortes vehicles. These tags are intended to assist staff to determine if an overload condition exists for the last sailing to Cortes and help ensure that no vehicle is left behind inappropriately. The coloured tags do not determine the order of loading.

Cortes customers are encouraged to travel directly to Heriot Bay to prepare for loading.

During busy traffic periods when there is the possibility of overloads, the Cortes courtesy lane is cancelled. This allows staff to process traffic as it arrives, and ensures late-arriving vehicles do not displace those customers who have already been ticketed.

BC Ferries staff will do their best to maintain the order of arrival for both destinations.

Cantabile

The Cultural Committee of the Quadra Island Recreation Society is pleased to present an evening with the British singing group Cantabile, on Sunday October 17 th at 7 p.m. This quartet is made up of Richard Bryan (counter-tenor), Mark Fleming (tenor), Robin Green (tenor), and Michael Steffan (baritone).

Therapeutic Touch Workshops

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
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


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Friday Flicks – The Barbarian Invasions

Rémy (Rémy Girard) has always been a bon vivant, a lover of "wine, books, music and women, especially women". Α shamelessly flirtatious History teacher, he spent his life enjoying himself intellectually and physically. Even now that he's in the hospital, mere weeks from passing away, Rémy has kept his sense of humor. So have his old friends, all back in Montréal to say their last goodbyes. The Barbarian Invasions is a follow-up to director Denys Arcand's 1986 international art-house hit, The Decline of the American Empire. Where the earlier movie was about sex and vitality. The Barbarian *Invasions* deals with an equally universal topic: mortality. As his narrative drive to bring the friends back together, Arcand uses the hospitalization and terminal condition of cancerafflicted Remy (Remy Girard), a lecherous fiftysomething divorced academic.

For much of the film, Girard's moribund patient is bursting with life, humor and intellectual spark. As his bedside becomes the crucible for nostalgia, discussion, reflection, argument, tears and laughter. Arcand navigates the movie through pace, rhythm, pathos and wit. In his richly layered screenplay (a Cannes win) there's even room for social comment, satire, intellectual prophecy and emotional catharsis.

it's hard not to be won over by *The Barbarian Invasions*' enormous generosity of spirit and the sense that one of the country's best filmmakers is again firing on most, if not all, cylinders. The chemistry of the entire ensemble sparkles but, above all, Rémy Girard is immensely engaging in the role of Remy, the horny academic



whose failing health even inspires a reconciliation with his unrepentant capitalist son, Sébastien. The ailing relationship of father and son are at the heart of the film

Similar to Arcand's Jesus de Montreal, this picture skillfully balances social satire and intimate drama, each informing the other. a bitingly funny, moving and thought-provoking picture.

But now that everyone is back to the 10-month school/work routine, it's time to put the sensible shoes back on and discuss serious things like how the library can help with your scholarly information needs. One of my favourite reference sources on the VIRL website (www.virl.bc.ca), the Oxford Reference Online, was recently upgraded to the Premier Collection. It now includes many of the renowned and dependable Oxford Companion series, covering everything from Archaeology to Science, History and Literature. In addition, the Oxford Dictionary of Quotations is a great source for those difficult quotes, phrases and maxims you want to recall but can't quite remember...

Another comprehensive VIRL database, Novelist, has also been upgraded, and it now includes over 38,000 fiction titles for children in the K-8 range. Book descriptions, read-alike book lists, and book talks for teachers are a few of the new features on Novelist. This is in addition to the detailed author, title and subject lists for thousands of adult books.

For those on less scholarly quests, check out our selection of Good Reads on the VIRL website by using the Quick Access drop-down menu. It's updated twice amonth, and includes recommended favourites from staff and customers. You can send us your own recommendations via the e-mail address at the bottom of the Good Reads page.

Recently an improved method for circulating DVDs and CDs among VIRL branches has resulted in more of the audio-visual items being available in the small branches, and some customers don't realize that these arean integral part of the library collection. So here's your reminder to go beyond the books and see what we have in the way of other media.

Storytime at the Quadra Island library will be Wednesdays, 11:30-noon, and we encourage parents and caregivers to pre-register their little ones (age 3-5) by coming in to the library or phoning 285-2216. I recently read a lengthy article extolling the benefits of storytelling as a necessary element in the development of early literacy. Listening, after all, is crucial for learning language and developing good communication skills. And stories are the threads that weave through our common experience to enrich our culture and help us find our way in the world.

From fins to flukes: whales, dolphins, and porpoises in BC

Do you know how to tell a porpoise from a dolphin? Or what humpback whales eat? One of the joys of living in this part of the world is the ever present wildlife on land and in the ocean. Few of us take the ferry to Campbell River without casting our eye over the water to see what is there. The odd time we see a pod of killer whales makes for a memorable trip. Then there are the dolphins which we may cast sight of playing in the wake of the boat but what type of dolphin are they? Or is it a porpoise?

Join Nadine Pinnell, a researcher from the Vancouver Aquarium Marine Science Centre, and the Mitlenatch Field Naturalists Society at the Quadra Community Centre at 8.00PM on Friday, October 15 to explore the wonderful world of B.C. cetaceans (whales, dolphins, and porpoises). Find out how to identify common whale species, learn about the threats they face, and discover how you can get involved in their conservation through the B.C. Cetacean Sightings Network.

A joint project of the Vancouver Aquarium and Fisheries and Oceans Canada, the B.C. Cetacean Sightings Network collects sightings of whales, dolphins, and porpoises from mariners and coastal citizens up and down the coast. Researchers, government agencies and NGOs use these sightings to learn more about BC cetaceans. As seven species of whales, dolphins, and porpoises in BC are currently considered at-risk of extinction, this information is needed for effective conservation.

We started classes on July 12th and one retired teacher offered her house for our daycare school. Parents bring their children to the center everyday and sometimes stay with their children. The parents are so happy and thankful that their children will have a foundation before they go to elementary school. Government schools here don't cater to preschool so many are privately owned but are so expensive that most can't afford them.

1st Draft Recommendations for Zoning Bylaw Update

The OCA believes that community involvement is the key to success in local government activities such as the updating of our zoning bylaws. To this end, over the last 7 months we have pursued every available means of collecting community input: general public meetings, open board meetings, the formation of 8 land-use steering committees, the review of over 300 public comment forms submitted to the Regional District regarding the last proposed bylaw revision, questionnaires made available through the Discovery Islander, Gateway cafe, Cafe Aroma, the Farmers Market and on our website (www.quadraisland.ca/ community_association). The QCA feels strongly that no substantial changes be made to our zoning bylaws without an equivalently rigorous public process or a full Official Community Plan (OCP) review.

Here is another opportunity for your participation. Over the next couple of months we will be publishing the first drafts of the OCA's recommendations for bringing our zoning bylaws up-to-date with our OCP, provincial legislation and current community input. Read the output of our first two land-use steering committees below. You can drop your comments off at the Discovery Islander Office (701 Cape Mudge Road) or at Cafe Aroma. Agriculture

It is an objective of our OCP "to encourage agriculture, in particular, local food production". Farming should also be conducted in a responsible manner and conform to provincial standards. To these ends and after consultation with the Regional Agrologist for the Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries, we make the following recommendations:

- Add a definition for "upland". This term is used in the definition of Agricultural Use and in many other bylaw clauses. It should include all areas excluding beach and water.
- Update the definition of "Agricultural Use" by adding "the storage and repair of machinery and implements used in agriculture", by adding "greenhouses and nurseries" and by replacing the term "farm" with "lot".

- "Agricultural use for domestic purposes", which is allowed in all upland zones, should be defined and should allow for the incidental sales of agricultural products produced on the lot, in excess of domestic needs, to local markets.
- Rural Two zoning (minimum 5 acres) should include more agricultural options such as market gardens.
- To address concerns of water quality, setbacks recommended in the Ministry of Agriculture Food and Fisheries "Guide for Bylaw Development in Farming Areas" should be used.
- · All registered farms, whether on Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR) land or not, should be required to conform to the provincial standards set down in the "Farm Practices Protection Act"
- As the provisions of the Agricultural Land Commission Act take precedence over zoning bylaws on ALR land, ALR status should be indicated on our zoning maps.

Aquaculture

Although there is nothing in the Official Community Plan that requires changes to the current Aquaculture zoning, the Steering Committee proposes the following changes in order to bring the zoning in line with: 1) Current, standard aquaculture practices, 2) Changes in provincial legislation bringing existing aquaculture licenses under the Farm Practices Protection Act and, 3) The recommendations of the Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries and Land and Water BC Inc. as expressed in their letter to the Regional District of Comox Strathcona regarding our last proposed bylaw 2538.

- AP-1 (Processing Plants): Increase the maximum height of upland buildings from 10 meters to 11.5 meters.
- AQ-2 (Shellfish Leases): Add staff accommodations to permitted accessory uses and increase the floor area of the storage, sorting and grading building from one square meter to 100 square meters.
- AQ-3 (Finfish Leases): Add staff accommodations to permitted accessory uses and change structure height measurement to be from the float deck rather than from the tidemark.

The next QCA Board Meeting will be 7:30pm, October 26 at Cafe Aroma.

Regional Director's Report - Sept. 26, 2004

It is wonderful to be back on the island after a very intense week in Kelowna at the annual Union of BC Municipalities Convention (UBCM). It was a great opportunity to be able to meet with numerous BC Ministers, MLA's and all of the five Federal Cabinet Ministers for BC along with all of their Special Advisors. It was also a great place to network with local government representatives from all around the province that have similar issues to ours.

I managed to put through an emergency resolution on the fog horn issue and it was unanimously passed by the UBCM, which represents all 184 local governments in BC. Our Regional District Board had a strong showing at the convention and worked together very well for the betterment of our region. It is great to see how much our relationship has improved over the past two years and how willing each municipal and electoral area director is to come to the other's assistance. This is a new era for our Regional District and I am extremely pleased to be a part of it. An recent example of this new level of cooperation was evident in how the Quadra Island garbage issue was handled here on our island with help and funds from all parts of the Regional District.

I would also like to put in another plug for THE BUS!!! The CR Transit bus is meeting the 7: 05 am ferry to take riders to all of the schools and any stops along the way. A lot of effort went into getting the bus so that kids (and adults) that need to get to the schools before the first school bus run starts, would be able to have safe and comfortable transportation to their early

morning school activities. THE SERVICE NEEDS TO BE USED!! ! So far, the ridership has been low, but I am sure that as soon as we turn the clocks back in October and the early ferry is in the dark and the weather deteriorates, we will see an increase in use. In the meantime, PLEASE GET USED TO USING THE BUS SERVICE!!! I have got all of the problems ironed out with the District of CR with the help of the mayor in relation to the fares being charged. The fare is now the standard rate and bus passes (at the reduced rate) are being accepted. So, this is an economical way to get to the schools and it eliminates all of the liability concerns expressed by some parents that are taking numerous kids in their private vehicles to the schools due to the School District not providing appropriate and necessary transportation.

ONCE AGAIN, THE BUS, THE BUS, PLEASE RIDE THE BUS!!!...
This will ensure its continued viability and may even expand into other service for island residents if we can show that there is a need. With ferry prices and fuel prices what they are, this makes a lot of sense when you need to go to CR and cannot get where you need to go on foot.

First the Good News...

Premier Campbell and his band of merry men (particularly with the recent departure of Christy Clark) are trumpeting the fruition of the past 3 years of their fiscal management of BC's finances, the end result being a projected surplus of some \$800 million. Well, whoop-te-do. Rafe Mair, appearing on a CTV interview, said it best.

So what, he says, *every* government in recent memory (and his memory is clear to way back before W.A.C. Bennett) has done the same thing. Liberal, NDP or SoCred, they all stuck it to us in one form or the other during the 1st three years of a term, then miraculously declare a surplus heading into an election year. Sorry, Gordo, we're all wise to the game now, and you're going to have keep pulling more rabbits from the hat to impress us.

Speaking of the economy, a far more credible source than our provincial government recently confirmed that our economy will probably be the bright spot for Canada. Helmut Pastrick, Chief Economist of Credit Union Central of BC, forecasts growth in 2004 Gross Domestic Product of 3.7% and 3.2% in 2005, our best performance since 1999-2000. Employment growth will continue, up from 1.6% in 2002 to 2.5% in 2004 and 2.7% in '05. Unemployment will of course trend down, from 2002's 8.5% to 7.1% in 2005. Most indicators are all in positive territory, and especially heartening is the anticipated 3% growth in exports, the first positive result after three years in negative territory.

Individual segments vary in their projected performance. Forestry is seen as continuing

to strengthen for 2004, then back off a bit in 2005 due to weaker demand in the US. Newsprint demand will continue to grow, but the pressure on prices will likely force them down. Tourism is having a good year in 2004, up 4%, but Pastrick views this as temporary. Overall tourism growth is about 1% in recent years, and it may be that we have peaked for a short period. Growth in competition from other destinations, a weaker US economy and a strong Canadian dollar all contribute to the weak performance. Mining is showing a remarkable comeback after decades of poor performance, with new capital investment expected to increase 15% this year and continue into next. Several new mines are opening now, with more expected, although almost all new production will be coal. Finally, construction spending is expected to taper off from the frenetic 12% pace in 2004 to about 5%in 2005. Job growth in the industry is expected to top 19% this year.

So in a nutshell, things here in Lotusland look pretty bullish. However, as usual there are one or more flies in the ointment, particularly our dependence upon exports as a crucial component of our economic well being. If the economy of one of our customers as an exporter tanks, so goes the prospects of the exporter. When a single customer dominates one's export market, one's expectations of prosperity must be closely aligned with the prosperity of the customer. Unfortunately the expectations for economic health of our largest customer is not so bright. The Economist (September 11, 2004) features an essay on the matter entitled "The risks ahead for the world economy", written by Fred Bergsten, the director of the Institute of International Economics in Washington, DC.

The opening paragraph of the essay is worth quoting in its entirety.

"Five major risks threaten the world economy. Three centre on the United States: renewed sharp increases in the current account deficit leading to a crash of the dollar; a budget profile that is out of control; and an outbreak of trade protectionism. A fourth relates to China, which faces a possible hard landing from it's recent overheating. The fifth is that oil prices could rise to \$60-70 per barrel even without a major political or terrorist disruption, and much higher with one."

That, my friends, is an unvarnished and crystal clear impression of how I see the situation as well. The exposure of our provincial economy to the health of the US economy cannot be understated, and unfortunately all bets are off when it comes to that call. An important line to note in Bergsten's opening is "a budget profile that is out of control". I'm sure such lines have crept into reports of the World Bank and the IMF when describing economies that we rather callously label as "third world".

The Bush Administration has had an almost unprecedented affect on the environment of the planet in a myriad of ways, but none so full of long term implication as their domestic economy. Unfortunately, no matter the result of November's election the problem will remain – the world's single largest debtor nation currently possesses an economy that balances precipitously upon a very small number of variables. A disruption in any one leads to widespread catastrophe, and one can hardly describe the global situation as placid at this moment. A rise in oil prices is

immediate and disastrous in it's effect on the US economy, and oil prices are rising. The US now owes more than any other nation on earth, at any time, and interest rates are rising, and predicted to continue to do so. Only one factor in the global economy appears to be certain today, and that is the uncertainty of the global economy.

In watching the mainstream media, it is apparent that no party wants to align itself with the economy in the USA today. That is understandable, as the situation is such that no promises can be made to fix the problem when the problem is so fluid. The war in Iraq has cost at least \$250 billion so far (my estimate – mainstream says \$200 billion but we know how accurate they are) and will cost at least that much again before a solution will appear on the horizon. The offshoreing of US manufacturing jobs will continue to come home to roost, further cementing the fact that US job growth will not be made up of high paying manufacturing jobs but low-end "McJobs", in spite of a Kerry administration promise to end the practise. The bubble of the US housing market is going to burst, soon, and the result will not be pretty. So in spite of Helmut's positively rosy outlook I remain firmly pessimistic, and will plan accordingly. In spite of the election in November the US economy will remain a candidate for economic shock treatment, for some time, no matter who wins.

As an investor, my strategy remains the same. Stay relatively liquid, go long if you need to, and seek out the niches. Energy is and will remain the most crucial part of the global economy for our lifetime - look for the opportunities. Diversify globally, remembering that the EU is set to become the dominant economy on the planet. Asia beckons, but tread warily. And above all, be careful out there. The waters are definitely treacherous, and the storm is far from past. Things could change dramatically in the next few weeks, but it will take many years for any change to take effect. Plan accordingly.

Quadra's Claire Trevena **Seeks NDP Nomination**

rriving at the Aroma Café on her mountain bike, Heriot Bay resident Claire Trevena greets me with a smile and a cheerful hello. Life has been very busy since she announced her intention to run for the NDP candidacy of the North Island (provincial), she told me.

"I haven't had as much time for exercise as I'd like and I've gone back on coffee," she confessed.

On the plus side, Claire has been attending lots of community events on Quadra and in other North Island riding communities, where she has been hearing about issues of concern to constituents.

"Education is a huge issue for many people. We have grade 10 math classes in Campbell River with 38 kids in them. In Port Hardy important subjects have been cut back at the high school level. It's demoralizing for teachers and parents are really worried," she reported.

A well-educated community is the cornerstone of our society's health, Claire believes.

"If we're not going to invest in our kids, we're not going to invest in our future," she

Education begins with early childcare, Claire pointed out, which has suffered cutbacks under the Liberal government.

"The Quadra Children's Centre spends a lot of time raising funds. It's great to see

their commitment, but they shouldn't have to do that."

Looming skills shortages are also a concern. Claire feels strongly that postsecondary education must be affordable.

"There have been all these newspaper ads lately about the number of post-secondary seats opening in BC by 2010. I ask who is going to be able to afford them?"

Claire feels BC needs to improve its apprenticeship system to ensure we have skilled workers ready to meet the coming demand.

Another important issue for North Island residents is healthcare. Claire has been hearing from seniors who are finding it very difficult to pay for their prescriptions.

"I've talked to a number of seniors who are really struggling due to cutbacks from the Campbell government," she noted.

BC needs to approach healthcare in a new way, Claire asserted.

"We need to look at how we can best deliver healthcare to rural communities," she stated.

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Preventative healthcare should be a priority, she said, as well as focusing more on alternative practices.

Claire is supportive of small businesses and believes they are an integral part of the North Island economy. Together with her husband. Mike, she is running a small communications company.

"I believe the government needs to look at ways to encourage small businesses to stay in operation and to grow. One way to do that is to help them through taxes and by developing community initiatives that develop and build their strengths."

When it comes to forestry, Claire feels strongly that BC shouldn't be shipping out raw logs.

"Every time we ship out a raw log, we're shipping out jobs. We should promote value-added companies. We have people who need work and have skills, and others who can build their skills." she said.

Claire is a big supporter of woodlots because they are

managed by people who live in the community.

When asked why she decided to run for the NDP nomination, Claire said she has always been political and she wants to work with people to make things better.

"We've got great health care, great education, and a civil society where we make sure people don't fall through the cracks. The Campbell government is destroying that, in my opinion. We need to defend what we have and start rebuilding it."

Claire originally hails from England, where she worked as a journalist for the BBC and Independent Television News. She came to Canada in the early 1990s as a correspondent for the BBC in Toronto.

As well as working as a journalist, Claire has done international development work and was awarded the Canadian Civilian Peacekeeping Medal for her work with the UN in Kosovo. She has also spent time as a trade unionist, volunteer, and activist.

Since moving to Quadra in 2001, Claire has been actively involved in the Community Kitchen and was elected to the board of the Quadra Community Association. She also has a seat in the Area 'J' planning committee.

"I feel it's time I got into the political structure where decisions are made. I think my diverse background makes me well suited to politics, and I'm a good listener and advocate for people."

A former member of the Green Party, Claire said she has now returned to her democratic socialist roots.

"I left the Green Party because it was too fiscally conservative for me. I strongly believe we should be investing in our services and our social welfare system. In bad times the province has a responsibility to invest in the economy, and in good times money will be flowing."

Claire has the support of former MLA Colin Gabelmann. Area 'J' director Jim Abram, writer/historian Jeanette Taylor, and well-known local resident Sandy Spearing.

"It's an honour that people believe I could represent them well on the North Island." Claire said.

At this time Claire is busy signing up supporters to become members of the NDP. North Island NDP members will decide on the successful candidate by vote at a nomination meeting sometime this winter. Members can vote by mail if they are unable to attend the meeting. Voters must be party members for at least 90 days prior to the nomination meeting.

The North Island riding encompasses the area from Oyster River in the south to the north end of Vancouver Island, and includes the Discovery Islands. The next provincial election is slated to take place in the spring of 2005.

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
