





## Notice of Public Hearing

Pursuant to Section 892 of the Local Government Act, Notice is hereby given that a Public Hearing of the proposed bylaw:

BYLAW NO. 2777: "Quadra Island Zoning Bylaw, 1990, Amendment Bylaw No. 75"

WILL BE HELD AT: Quadra Community Centre, 970 West Road, Quadra Island

ON: TUESDAY, JUNE 28, 2005


COMMENCING AT: 7:00 p.m.

The intent and purpose of proposed Bylaw No. 2777 is to rezone a 0.28 hectare (0.69 acre) area on the surface of the water in Quathiaski Cove (legally described as District Lot 1535, Sayward District) from Marine Industrial One (MI-1) to Aquatic Shellfish Hatchery One (ASH-1) to permit a shellfish hatchery that produces geoduck seed. If adopted, the bylaw will also amend the ASH-1 zone to permit staff accommodation as an accessory use.

A copy of the proposed Bylaw and related information may be inspected at the Regional District offices, 600 Comox Road, Courtenay, BC between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, from June 10 to June 28, 2005. At the public hearing, all persons who deem their interest in property affected by the

proposed bylaw will be afforded an opportunity to be heard on matters contained therein. *Please* note that legal considerations prevent the Regional District from considering any representations made after the close of the public hearing. 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

## PUBLIC VIEWING OF THE 10-YEAR WOODLOT LICENSE PLAN

The draft 10-year Woodlot License Plan for Woodlot W1610 is available for public review for a period of 30 days ending July 11, 2005.

Copies of the plan can be viewed the Quadra Island Library, and at the Ministry of Forests, Campbell River Forest District Office (370 South Dogwood Street). The plan is also available for viewing at the Licensees residences - please call 285 3570 or 285 2841 to make arrangements for viewing there. An electronic copy of the plan can be requested by email addressed to mail@econ.ca. There will also be an open house held at the Quadra Community Centre, Room #1, on June 20, 2005 from 16:00 to 20:00 where the plan can be viewed and where the licensees will be available to answer questions.

Woodlot W1610 consists of 2 blocks of crown forest land located north of Gowlland Harbour and between September Creek and the SW side of Village Bay. A third block of private land is located at the north end of Hyacinthe Bay. The 10-year Woodlot License Plan describes applicable forestry standards and shows the general locations where forestry activities may be undertaken within the license area.

#### The Haig-Brown Institute is offering a summer camp to children ages 6 to

12 years old. The camp is based at the Haig-Brown House and its historic gardens and surrounding woods, streams and trails.

The Haig-Brown Camp offers crafts, games and nature activities that promote adventure, friendship and self growth. Sessions begin with games that are geared towards cooperation and group building. Throughout the week campers learn to appreciate the natural world and understand basic outdoor living skills. Offsite recreation includes fishing at Discovery Pier and swimming at Centennial Pool. #### LIOTA, WANDERING MINSTREL, GOES OVER THE WALLAND RETURNS

In days of old, perhaps a wandering minstrel would suddenly appear in your town, perform a tale or recount a legend to some irresistible tune, then disappear by morning. Enraptured onlookers would often venerate these restless spirits with a devotion that is more frequently associated with a divine encounter.

Norman Liota is a modern day troubadour whose music can have the same effect on the ear and the heart of his audience. Indeed the terrain of his musical imagination is as vast as the landscapes in which he tours. Through his hands, hypnotic and harmonic pleasure mixes with an interior experience of transcendence. He opens the hearer to the discipline of discovery, a rare encounter in these days of outer turmoil. He kindles in the mind the figure of the absent beloved, root of many great mystical poetic




traditions. He portrays a Presence, even in absence, far more real to the heart than the many commands of the waking world.

Liota will dip into his skills as a classical guitarist and offer up a perfect rendering of the most delicate and stunning Renaissance or Baroque repertoire. ## Island Report

#### **Quadra Community Centre Celebrates 20 Years**

"We have the will / We found the way / We built this centre for us all / So raise your voice / It's been 20 years today . . . " sang Diana McKerracher at the Quadra Community Centre's 20th anniversary celebration.

QCC was overflowing with well wishers, food, laughter, music, and memories, as more than 150 people gathered for a commemorative potluck supper on June 18.

In the crowd were members of the original building committee, who took on the monumental task of planning and constructing the centre in the early 1980s. The first event at QCC was a Valentine's Dance in February 1985.

Almost 10 years later, committees were again struck to plan and fund raise for the Community Centre Addition Project (CCAP). The original structure worked well for large events, but there was a clear need for smaller meeting rooms. Eight years of hard work ensued, and today QCC boasts three additional, wellused rental spaces.

Quadra Recreation coordinator Sandy Spearing welcomed everyone to the celebration. A board member during QCC's early days, Sandy recalled the first few phone calls she made soliciting donations to keep the centre afloat.

"In those days I was not the sort of person who was comfortable calling people up to ask them to donate time or money, but I learned quickly!" she said with a laugh.

Sandy was hired as QCC coordinator on a permanent part time basis in 1987. At that time, the centre was receiving gaming funds. In 1991 the community voted to help finance the centre's operation through regional district



taxation.

Sandy expressed appreciation to regional district director Jim Abram for being a big supporter of QCC over the years, and to the many Quadra Recreation board members who have dedicated countless hours of time and energy to the centre. "I counted the number of board members we've had, and it turns out that I've had one job for 18 years with 75 bosses," she grinned.

Sandy remembered some of the key people who worked hard on planning QCC and CCAP. She described the late John Fell as a "great inspiration for building this place" and the late Bob Griswold as a "really big inspiration" for the addition project.

After Diana McKerracher and some Quadra School students sung grace, Sandy played QCC trivia with those waiting their turn for food.

"Who wrote the first grant application for the community centre?" (Carol Harling-Bleeks), "Which neighbourhood on Quadra has produced the highest number

of Quadra Rec board members?" (Quadra Loop), and "Who instigated the building of the Quadra Skateboard Park?" (Sharon Brereton and Lois Taylor) were some of the questions.

After dinner a slideshow depicting 20 years of Quadra Recreation events brought back memories. In every image, whether of dedicated volunteers building the original structure in the pouring rain or kids hamming it up at May Day, smiles abounded. The overwhelming message was that Quadra is a fun place to live.

Other communities in BC admire the quality of recreation on Quadra, Jeanette Taylor discovered when researching the community centre's history.

"Sandy is often approached by other recreation leaders from around the province, asking 'How do you do that? We want to do that too." Jeanette recounted.

One of the main reasons for OCC's success, Jeanette maintained, is its userdriven management philosophy.

"Sandy and the Quadra Rec board believe that this facility belongs to everybody. User groups are given the key and entrusted to look after the place. That fosters a sense of responsibility and ownership in all of us."

Rob McKerracher paid tribute to Sandy Spearing and presented her with a card and bouquet on behalf of the community.

"We are here to celebrate 20 years of dances, weddings, May Days, memorial services, and several big political foofaraws. Running a place that has diversity at its heart can be a difficult and maybe even impossible task," said Rob.

"Sandy has provided consistent, honest, and dedicated leadership for 18 years, and in doing so has guided us from a 'hall' to a 'centre'."

Accepting her bouquet with a big smile, Sandy thanked everyone and said her job has taught her a great deal about human beings.

"I'm so glad you've all chosen this reality so we can all work together and live our dream."

Steve Moore introduced the winners of the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary writing contest. Entrants were asked to submit a piece describing their most memorable time spent at the Quadra Community Centre.

Third prize winner Robert Taylor read about his good friends' Steve and Danielle's wedding reception, a joyous occasion graced by the piano music of Mary-Ellen Wilkins.

"The whole thing came off in great style and left us with many wonderful memories," Robert reminisced.

Rena Patrick took second prize for her

poem 'Unknown Spice', recounting her first experience with sushi at the launch of the book 'Shorelines'. Rena recalled popping a green ball into her mouth, which she assumed to be avocado, just before being called onstage to read aloud her poems. The green ball turned out to be a large helping of wasabi, leaving poor Rena gasping for air as she gave her reading.

First prize winner Hilary Stewart remembered her first cultural event at QCC, a quartet performance she attended with her friend Joy Inglis shortly after moving to the island. Hilary recalled being most impressed with the two female and two male performers, who were dressed in formal attire and demonstrated great talent.

She turned to Joy to enquire whether the group had come up from Seattle, or perhaps Vancouver. Joy replied, "Oh no, they haven't come from anywhere. They're *ours*!"

The group was Smooth Edge, one of Quadra's finely tuned musical acts. Also honoured during the celebration were Quadra Players and the Quadra Cultural Committee, for bringing many excellent performances to the QCC stage over the years.

Quadra's young salsa dancers wowed the audience with an energetic show, and the skateboarders put on an exhilarating demonstration at the skatepark to close the festivities.

Looking back on the past 20 years, original building committee member Rod Clark said in many ways QCC is the gathering place for the island.

"No one attends everything here, but I'd like to think the centre offers something for everyone."



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
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#### Show at the Grasshopper **Gallery**

#### **Quadra Island Property Taxes**

~ only \$2,258 per day ~

Quadra Island (or more correctly Area J) property taxpayers have tax requisitions imposed for 2005 by various local government agencies totaling \$824,017, per the attached schedule. The good news for this year compared to all the bad news of prior years, is that the overall per day increase is only \$2.00. Presumably good news with a good reason, as it has been widely whispered by many a local government politician; this year is an election year for them.

However, it gets interesting when you look at the budget requisition details. While the Regional District's increase in this year of touted, zero increase was only 2.82%, looking with the District's budgets reveals some interesting variations. Ten-year totals tell their own story.

General Government Services was up by 13.65% and Protective Services was up by 29.12%, while Environmental Developmental Services (i.e. planning) was pared down to only a half percent increase, 0.52%. To achieve the overall net increase of 2.82%, the Regional District plugged a one time accumulated surplus refund of \$13,280 as our portion from their Regional Solid Waste Plan budget, covering their "money making" garbage dump and land fill site back into local revenues for the benefit of taxpayers. Truly amazing that budgets can be fudged so, indicating lots of "fat" with which to "juggle".

However, the South Quadra Fire Protection District tax levy is another interesting review. The Fire Protection District Trustees 2.82% increase this year tacked on to their 11.37% increase last year, brought their ten year total tax take to \$1,721,083, for a service provided by undoubtedly hard working but nevertheless unpaid volunteers for the most part, (the 2004 wage cost was \$35,253). With all capital expenditures fully funded, it makes one wonder why they need to accumulate, by their own "back of the envelope" figuring, an unexplained unallocated reserve fund capital surplus of \$293,463 over the next five years.

Commenting on a truck acquisition this year, South Quadra Fire Protection District Trustee Chairman, Jim Evans in his 2004 Trustees Reports that the "Trustees are pleased to accomplish this without borrowing, and with a declining mill rate 4 years in a row"..... Duh? A declining mill rate after two consecutive tax increases of 11.37% and 2.82%? While his statement might be technically true for trusting folk, it is the underlying stupidity of such comments that render that thinking worthy of only a "Village Idiot".

Property owners should take more interest in such affairs, but then the phrase fits, "Tax me, I'm Canadian".

Last Sunday was Father's Day, but unfortunately the date coincided poorly with the DI's publication date. My father passed away 6 years ago, but I still think of him often and Father's Day always brings memories of Dad. I'm one of the lucky guys who really liked my father; an altogether different thing than loving him, though love him I did. By the time I was in my mid-30's Dad and I were good friends; we both respected each other's accomplishments and opinions and most importantly we thoroughly enjoyed each other's company. Dad was the kind of guy who could get along with just about anybody, a trait I like to think I inherited. He was curious and always fascinated with new things - locked in the past was a label he never wore, and he kept up with new technology quite avidly. It's too bad the Internet was still in relative infancy at the point where he would have become interested, but he never got the chance to enjoy surfing the net, which is a shame cause he'd of loved it. And I know he would have liked what follows.

I rarely recommend webblogs within this column, though I share them freely with other blog readers within my circle of friends. One that I am comfortable recommending is hosted by Jerome Doolittle and bears the deceiving moniker of Bad Attitudes (sub headed Jerome Doolittle on politics, culture, whatever). His bio as posted on his site - Doolittle is a former reporter, columnist, and editor for the Washington Daily News and the Washington Post. He left journalism to join the United States Information Agency in Casablanca and in Laos, where he was the embassy spokesman during the secret war waged in that country by the CIA and the U.S. Air Force.

Upon resigning, Doolittle covered the war in Vietnam and Cambodia for various magazines and newspapers. He returned to the United States before the communist takeover of Indochina, going to work in Jimmy Carter's press office during the 1976 Presidential campaign. For the first two years of the Carter administration he was a White House speechwriter; for the last two he was chief of public affairs for the Federal Aviation Administration. He has taught at Harvard,

and has published two books in Time-Life's American Wilderness series, as well as The Bombing Officer, a novel about the secret air war in Laos. Body Scissors was his first Tom Bethany mystery. The others are Strangle Hold, Bear Hug, Head Lock, Half Nelson, and Kill Story. Bethany is a onetime political operative, Air America pilot, and college wrestler who lives in Cambridge.

A variety of writers contribute to the blog, but Doolittle creates most of the content. He is a very avid follower of current affairs and his commentary is often witty and always stimulatingly well written. Stuff like the narrative that follows, authored by one Bill Doolittle, whose relationship to Jerome is unknown, is quite representative of what you might encounter at the blog. Those who have lived through a parent's final days will appreciate the beauty of the sentiments.

Father's Day

My father was too old to put on his socks before bed, so I did it for him. His fingers could no longer manage his pajama buttons, so I fastened them. He couldn't reach down for his blankets, so I pulled them up.

My father liked them snugged up around his neck and tucked under his bony shoulders, just so. He put his fading ski hat on by himself, and settled back for a dream-filled sleep he'd tell about next morning.

A formal and undemonstrative man, he would simply say, "Thanks, Bill, you know you don't have to do all this. I can do it myself." We both knew he could not but at least he could protest that he could, saving a sliver of his dignity.

Order in human relations was important to him. So this reversal, where his son was taking care of him, made him uncomfortable. Me too, I thought, as I checked the thermostat at the door. I wondered about our new roles. It was awkward, troubling and wonderful. I was glad to have the chance, yet the imposition on me and my family was sometimes trying.

Tears brimmed in my eyes as I walked down the hall away from him for the night.

I wondered, would he try to stumble into the bathroom in the dark? He'd done it before.

Would he fall? That had happened. Did he belong here now, or in a nursing home? He'd hate that.

Would we find my father alive in the morning? Better here than anywhere else, I reasoned. We lived like this for four years. The rituals at night fell increasing on whomever was putting him to bed as he slowly declined and stubbornly tried to assert his independence. That's why there were more falls and less mobility.

At 94, his dreams clung to him like velcro for his first waking hours. I'd ask how he was doing. "Oh, OK, I guess." he'd say. Then, "Not so good, really." And he would sob.

I could tell he was sorting out a bad dream as he shakily tried to sip his coffee, trying to struggle back to us from the fog of nightmare. It would be a tough day for Suzanne Everitt, who came every weekday to take care of him for four years and learned to love him, and he her.

He said about very old age, "One thing. If something goes wrong with you, you can be sure it will never get better. It's nature's way of shutting you down step by step." The last step for my father arrived, to his relief, on February 17 of last year, after a long and fruitful life. He was 97.

Now sometimes when I work in the yard, I glance over at his favorite chair to check on him. There he is with his cane and moth-eaten hat, sleeping in the midday sun. For a moment there I struggle to separate my vision from reality.

My father spent the final weeks of his life in the hospice at Royal Jubilee Hospital, which spared my mother and sister's from having to cope with the worst effects as his body shut down. When I visited with him it was clear that if he couldn't be at home he knew there was no better place to be than hospice, though the early days of a shared room weren't always pleasant. The hospice staff (and the numerous volunteers) are attuned to the dying process and it's impact on survivors, and their attitudes and the overall ambience are of comfort to all. Dad's final night was passed with my Mom and sister's present, listening to music (it might have been Diana Krall - he worshipped her playing and singing) and peacefully falling into a sleep from which he never awoke. Fortunately I was only minutes away and my brother-in-law Carlo and I were soon there for a family farewell in the room. It is as pleasant a memory as one could hope to have of such an event.

So belated Happy Father's Day to all of you out there without a father around to salute - I hope you remember yours as fondly as I do mine.
