


Community News and Events from Quadra, Cortes and the Outer Islands



Area J Regional Director's Report

Hopefully today's cloud, thunder and showers are not the beginning of the end of summer. It seems to have gone quickly! So, there are a number of things that I will be reporting on and I hope that you don't get terribly bored. It has been an incredibly busy summer with no let up whatsoever in numbers of meetings nor important issues that needed immediate attention. Even though provincial and other agencies schedule their holidays for the summer and things slow down at their levels, we at the local level are still expected to get the job done no matter what. I will only list the more important issues that I have been dealing with. I won't bore you with the day to day.

RECYCLING BINS

As I have reported previously, the issue of relocating the recycling bins has been resolved and they will be in their new location within the next few weeks. The Ministry of Transportation and Highways has been very generous in donating the space and very cooperative in providing the necessary permits. Murray Johnson has done a great job of managing the project and we will all benefit from a first class depot when it is finished. I would also like to thank the Regional District (RD) staff and the board for their help in making this happen at no cost to taxpayers. It is all funded through the Solid Waste function Education Program which gets its funds through user fees, not property taxes.

GOLF COURSE

The applicants for the golf course have been working diligently throughout the past months to try and address all of the conditions that were assigned to their project by the RD, at the request of the community, at third reading of the bylaw. They were told to go off and complete a long list of conditions before they could come back for final adoption. At this stage they have done all of the items on the list and have presented their engineers' report to the planners. This mainly deals with the issues around water and the report looks very positive. The RD is having it peer reviewed by another engineering firm this next week with the intention of bringing the bylaw to the September board meeting for final adoption if the report meets all of the RD requirements. I would like to commend the members of the group for the hard work they have put into what I am sure has been a very frustrating process.

HOSKYN CHANNEL LANDING (Surge Narrows Road end)

The finishing touches have been put on the road to the new community dock at the road end, which was put there with RD, community and business cooperation. We will be erecting a beautiful sign, that the RD commissioned one of our Quadra woodworkers to construct, around the middle of September. Everyone will be welcome to attend. Time and date to follow.

GRANITE BAY/KANISH BAY ROAD AND MORE

As I have stated in earlier articles, I have been spending a lot of my time trying to get the short piece of road from the Granite Bay road into the Kanish Bay estates made into public road so that it can be maintained to Highways standards. I could liken the efforts to pulling teeth, but that would be too simple. It is far more like moving mountains! (and they are not fully moved yet!). We are getting close to a solution and I am meeting with Timber-West next week to discuss their part in this ever increasingly complex saga.

At the same time, I have been working with the residents of Kanish Bay to get Telus phone service to their area. It is already in Granite Bay area and this should be doable!

And right along with the phone service, residents are asking that Hydro service be extended to their area. I will be spending lots of time in September lobbying to make this happen and will be meeting with residents as soon as we can set up a meeting on all of these issues.

HARBOUR AUTHORITY BUILDING

This is one that I would not have even commented on except for the fact that the Harbour Master wrote a letter for publication in an earlier issue telling the RD that the Harbour Authority did not need to rezone their property to fit the use. This is NOT for me to decide. It is an administrative and planning issue and those departments feel very strongly that there is a definite requirement to rezone and to have a public hearing. I do not want to see anyone inconvenienced by the bureaucratic necessities, but the RD is trying to be consistent and fair to all residents. This issue will be before the RD board on Monday for direction. I will let you know what comes of it.

EVAS BAY

I am still in negotiations with Transport Canada, Highways, Crown Lands, the upland owner and the community of Read Island over the disposition of the public wharf at Evans Bay on the east side of Read Island. This has been a very complex issue and is coming to a conclusion. I will be meeting, along with our senior staff, with the senior staff at Highways and at Lands, on Sept. 20th. If we get everything confirmed that we need to have confirmed at that meeting, we will be very close to a transfer of the wharf to the community. The only hurdle remaining will be Transport Canada and they have been very cooperative to date. More to follow.

STUART ISLAND COMMUNITY ISSUES

Another set of issues have arisen in the Stuart Island community. I have attended meetings there regarding the Visual Quality Objectives that are being proposed by the Forest Service in the area surrounding the Stuart Island area. This area is very dependant on its tourism base and attracts a great deal of wealth to the area annually. The objectives of the Forest Service and the community are not compatible at this time and it is going to take a lot more work to come to agreement on how the area should be managed. I will continue to attend meetings and represent the needs of that community.

Secondly, they too, are having issues with their wharf, which was divested from the Federal gov't. The community has done a remarkable job of rebuilding the wharf and expanding the uses. They are now in the process of trying to obtain the upland property and I have been assisting them in trying to get the property from the current owner, which is School District #72 (Campbell River). So, we will see how that goes. I will also be assisting them with trying to find funding for their continuing improvements to the community facilities, like their community hall.

OK, that should probably give you enough of an idea of what is happening at this time. I will continue to do my best to resolve issues and act on your behalf.





Tools of the Trade

The Art of Glassblowing

The art of making glass first appeared about 5,000 years ago in Mesopotamia. Small earthen furnaces shaped like beehives heated the raw material and simple tools were used to extract it. The molten glass was then wrapped around a frame moulded into the shape of the desired vessel.

The technique remained virtually unchanged until the first century BC, when the Romans

began to use a hollow pipe to extract the hot glass. By blowing through the pipe, the artisan could quickly produce a variety of intricate shapes out of the 'gather' of molten glass at the other end.

Here on Quadra Island, Cherie Hemmingsen of "i blew it" studio continues to practice this ancient art. Cherie begins by heating the raw material in a special furnace at temperatures upwards of 2,050 F. She then uses a hollow stainless steel pipe to gather the molten glass from the furnace. The handle end is tapered to create a mouthpiece into which Cherie blows a slow, steady stream of air.

After blowing the initial bubble, Cherie proceeds to shape the glass using a variety of implements. They consist of a 'jack', which looks like a giant pair of tweezers; a block, which resembles a large wooden spoon; and a paddle-like tool called a pastorale. Cherie also uses a pad of folded wet newspaper and a flat, heat-absorbing surface called a marver.

Cherie explained that since the glass begins to cool and become less malleable during shaping, heat management is extremely important. To bring the glass back to a softened state for continued shaping it is placed into the 'glory hole', a propane-fired oven heated to 2,300 F. If she is creating a large piece, Cherie may 'gather' molten glass three or four times and make several trips to the glory hole.

Deep in the heart of America, right in the thick of so-called "Red State" country (so known because of their strong conservative political orientation) lies the city of Madison, Wisconsin.

This city of 6 million people has long been known to buck the trend, and has been described by The Insiders Guide (www.insiders.com) thusly - "Just 80 miles west of Milwaukee and 142 miles northwest of Chicago, Madison, Wisconsin, is a veritable hotbed for free speech and free thought. Its history of grassroots activism and political progressivism, its citizens' belief in the benefits of hard work, the availability and access to educational resources and the careful stewardship of the land all have cast a favorable spotlight on this Midwestern mecca". Madison is home to an excellent daily newspaper called the Capital Times, which has been unstinting in its criticism of the Bush Administration and their mis-adventures in Iraq.

In an editorial dated August 28, 2005 entitled "Why They Hate Us", it's editor comments on the furor caused by Pat Robertson's (infamous neoconservative Christian broadcaster) statements on his television network's (Christian Broadcasting Network) program "The 700 Club", where he called explicitly for the assassination of Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez - "We don't need another \$200 billion war to get rid of one, you know, strong arm dictator"..."We have the ability to take him out, and I think the time has come to exercise that ability". The Capital Times editorial concludes "Robertson has a right to his warped opinions - even when he tries to gloss them over with the disingenuous suggestion that he wasn't really talking assassination, but rather some other strategy to "take out" Chavez. But the fact that he is a key player on the same team that produced President Bush has done more than merely make one more right-wing television personality look like a fool. It has produced another reminder to the great majority of Latin Americans that when a leader stands up on their behalf, powerful players in America want him dead. No message could possibly do more damage to the reputation of the United States".

So who is Hugo Chavez? He's no dictator, but rather the popularly elected leader of the country that is America's 5th largest oil supplier, and he is an outspoken and committed socialist. Put the words "oil" and "socialism" in the same sentence and you'll cause heart

attacks in Washington, DC, and Chavez has been constantly defending himself from American meddling since first elected in 1998; he is also not shy about firing back at every opportunity. Recent polls in Venezuela peg his approval rating at 70%, and it widely expected he will win a landslide re-election in 2006.

One of the main reasons for his popularity is that immediately upon his election he increased taxes and royalties on oil production (which had been well below normal for the preceding 20-plus years under former rulers) and has directed 50% of revenues to improving the lot of Venezuela's poor, who on average live on about \$200 per month, well below South American living standards. By the way, the 10% or so of the population who benefited under previous regimes, the wealthy elite, positively detest Chavez and have previously engineered a failed coup and a backfiring referendum to remove Chavez from power. They only entrenched his rule.

Chavez greatly admires Fidel Castro of Cuba (Venezuela is providing Cuba cheap oil in exchange for several thousand Cuban doctors who are deployed to remote settlements), which also grates on certain nerves in the US. He has recently started going after the multi-national oil companies for back taxes amounting to some \$3 billion dollars, another thorn in Washington's side, but considering Shell Oil paid up their share of \$130 million immediately the claims seem legitimate. Further, a recent Bloomberg article confirmed that the major oil players have no intention of departing Venezuela. They know which way the tide is flowing for Venezuela's 26 million people.

Were Mr. Chavez to suffer any harm, it is unlikely it would come from his countrymen. This is one reason why Pat Robertson's comments were so unwelcome, as they only reinforced the popular South American opinion regarding the USA, an opinion formed after observing US policies carried out in Latin America over the last 100 years. If the USA doesn't like the country's policies or its leadership, they initiate or assist in the removal of that leadership - numerous examples abound. Venezuelan's have a right to be sensitive, and wary. Consider the comments by their Ambassador to the USA, Alfredo Toro Hardy: "As everybody knows, the Christian right is the muscle behind the Republican party and the current Bush administration. Pat Robertson is, in turn, the undoubted patriarch of the Christian right. The fact that Robertson is openly calling for the assassination of President Chavez, invoking... the supposed rights of the US over its Latin American backyard, is extremely serious and worrisome" (The Guardian-August 24/05).

American policies as developed and executed

by the Bush Administration seem intent upon alienating the USA from the rest of the world, save as trading partners in unilaterally beneficial trade. It is beyond question that the world's view of America since Bush's questionable election and re-election has grown more negative; much more so since the misguided invasion of Iraq. Here, in Canada, we have a very major bone to pick with his administration, and on that subject they just recently gave us another kick in the pants.

On August 10, 2005, a NAFTA panel ruled the US had once again failed to adequately demonstrate how US producers were hurt by Canadian export policy, and ordered some \$5 billion in unjust duties collected by the US be returned to Canadian producers. The US response? The administration states they have no intention of lifting the duties or returning the money, and will appeal - again. Canada, meanwhile, has gone to the WTO - again - to receive their blessing to impose retaliatory tariffs to collect that \$5 billion. It is expected that PM Martin will "call" Mr. Bush to complain - again. But don't expect to see any retaliatory tariffs soon - Ottawa hasn't the stomach for such a move

The *Toronto Star* published a column by Mel Clark and David Orchard entitled "A simple solution to US bullying" (August 23/05) that calls a spade...a spade. They say that NAFTA has been a remarkably successful trade agreement...for the USA. They point out that under the previous GATT treaty (now know as the WTO) trade relations were excellent for almost 40 years. "In all that time, the United States was never able to levy a countervailing or anti-dumping duty on our exports of lumber. During those four decades Canada traded profitably, our standard of living rose, Canada won almost all of its trade disputes with the US – and Washington abided by the rulings."

Their suggestion to resolving our current trade dispute? "There is a simple way out, without bluster or insults. Canada does not have to give up ownership of its forest, its industries and its institutions. With a simple letter to the US, under FTA Article 2106, NAFTA Article 2005, Canada can, with six months notice, withdraw from these agreements without penalty and without conditions. Our trading relations would then revert automatically back to GATT/WTO framework of international law".

Notwithstanding the current state of affairs, both Canada and Venezuela are long-standing trade partners with USA, and it would behove those in Washington, DC to start mending the fences so grievously damaged in the last 5 years, before it is too late. And I'll bet you dollars to donuts they feel the same way in Madison, Wisconsin.



The classical North Indian Kathak

Dance and Music ensemble *Vandhana* will be performing. Vandhana means invocation. This refers to the first movement of the dance in which the Sacred Presence at the heart of the divine dance, and the guru,s who have created and sustained this tradition over millennia, are remembered, honoured, and adored. Kathak literally means to speak or to tell, alluding to the ancient and lyrical story-telling part of this dance form.

The other part of the dance form is the rhythm-play, in which the dancer and musicians perform both composed and improvised rhythmic phrases and compositions, with a complexity and intensity similar to flamenco.

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
NEWS FROM THE PRESCHOOL

OUR THERMAL IMAGING CAMERA IS HERE!

The Fire Department has just taken delivery of our first Thermal Imaging Camera and it is now in service. This is a huge leap forward for us in terms of modern rescue and firefighting technology as we join the ranks of a growing number of departments who use this fantastic tool. Every penny of the almost \$10,000 it took to buy this (including \$609 in PST, if you can believe it...) was raised by the volunteers of the Department through various fundraisers, or was donated to us by individuals or companies who appreciated our efforts over the past couple of years. Thanks so much to all of you who helped in this effort! Your potential safety in emergencies, as well as that of our firefighters, just improved dramatically. A thermal imaging camera allows us to see through thick smoke or darkness to view images which give off heat – as much heat as a hot fire or as little as a footprint. This will allow us to much more quickly pinpoint the heart of a fire, to locate an unconscious person trapped in smoke, to find an accident victim in the darkness, to detect overheating electrical equipment, to find hot spots while mopping up a forest fire, and much more. Once we have completed some training in its use, we will try to find an opportunity to offer you a demonstration to show all you burger-eaters, garage-sale patrons, and just plain generous people what you have helped us buy...

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Dualling reviews

The Corporation a film by Abbott and Achbar

The Corporation is a 245 minute shockumentary whose basic premise is that corporations act like psychopaths. While I have no problem with the film's premise, I found it difficult to sit through over two hours of brain washing. What makes it worse is that the film makers use the same techniques they castigate the corporations for using. It seems to me that if your points are valid you don't need to use Frankenstein and shark images to back you up. The "Evil Empire" rhetoric used throughout the film makes even a believer like me a little suspicious. In a film that begs for corporations to act in a more fair and democratic fashion, why do all the right wing opinions come from right wing straw men. Where did they get that moron from the Fraser Institute anyway? Did they sneak in late at night and take him out of his cryogenic chamber just for this film? There's lots of intelligent people out there that believe in capitalism. I would have like to have heard from them.

Don't get me wrong — The Corporation is a good one hour film and I think everyone should see it, but practice what you preach. I grant them their point that corporations are sociopaths, but I'm not sure making things more democratic is the answer. Hitler was elected. Bush was elected. Thatcher was elected and I can't see the world being in better hands with them than with the drug companies. The point the film didn't make except accidentally near the end is that the problem is not that corporations are evil but that, in general, people are irresponsible, greedy and stupid. What the corporations are doing now isn't new, they have merely usurped the position formerly held by religion. The only reason the harm is greater now is simply because technology makes it easier and faster to do harm.

In the end, the success of the movie is judged not by whether people like me, who are onside before the movie starts, liked the film but by how much it changed the thinking of those people to whom the movie's claim was a revelation. My guess is that the film is preaching almost exclusively to the converted on either side of the political spectrum and those few people who are so poorly informed that they thought corporations were benign tumors will not be having preventative surgery in the near future. The movie's excruciating length and its heavy handedness don't help its cause. If you lean to the left and want some of your views validated you can probably watch it till the end. If you lean to the right then the first five minutes is probably all you need to see. If you're somewhere in the middle then you should probably watch the thing in half hour doses over the week and remember to keep your thinking cap on.

The Corporation - The Must-see Documentary

Living in the backwoods of Quadra island does bring many of us some peace and privacy but even in this lovelyrural setting we are not saved from the influence of the real world. we still need gas to fill our cars, electricity to heat and light our houses and supplies from large corporate stores such as the Super-store to stock our cupboards. to remind us that we are but one small bit of a very large picture in this world I highly recommend viewing "The



Corporation", a film based on the book with the same name but the added subtitle "The pathological Pursuit of profit and Power" by Joel Bakan.

The film reminds us that corporations are undeniably intertwined in our lives. If we haven't already thought about how corporations influence us, Mark Achbar, the film's producer and The Corporation's team, aims to show us. the premise of this documenatry is to present us with the idea that the corporation can be compared to a psychopathic personality. Using detailed analysis through an extensive array of interviews from an impressive list of sources, clips from pop-culture, historical film, advertising, TV news and corporate propaganda the film addresses thequestion "What character traits are there in the personality of a corporation.

The film starts with the historical background of how corporations came into being. Originally, corporations were a gift to the people to serve the public good. We are informed of how the corporate mindset developed, and how corporations came to have the equal rights as individual. The film puts the corporation of the shrink's couch and scrutinizes it as a personality. Interviews of over 40 professionals include corporate insiders, intellectuals such as Noam Chomsky, Naomi Klein, Elaine Bernard, a Nobel prize-winning economist Milton Friedman and CEO's from several large multi-nationals such as tom Kline from Pfizer. Interviews, film clips and examples of newscasts build up the corporate personality profile. Bakan is well-informed and Achbar's skill make clever metaphor. It doesn't take long for the viewer to feel the overpowering sensation that the picture painted here is not very comfortable.

A personality checklist is developed and many aspects of corporate influence are discussed and offer the viewer with an enlightened but desparate understanding of the state of the world as we have created it. Ignorance in our case is not bliss. The film serves to inform us of what has gone so terribly wrong in the world. Corporate mind-set and greed may be responsible for the plight of the world. Many of us may feel overwhelmed by the world's problems: global warming, environmental destruction, species extincition, resource depletion, famine, over-population - you name it, at some point corporations (and us) contributed to this list. The film reminds us about the ails of the world but still leaves us with and impression that it is up to us as individuals to fight for real democracy.

Despite the powerful infra structure of corporations individuals are making their voices heard. In Bolivia, for instance, the people have won their fight against huge multi-national corporations working with their government trying to take over their water rights. In India the basmati rice patent was overturned, again by individuals who questioned and retaliated against government and RiseTek, a multi-national. People are seeking to take back their power. This film leaves the viewer with the impression that there is hope for democracy through networking, retaliation and fighting for the rights of what is right and moral. the Corporation leaves one with the sense that there is hope in awareness. Let's not sit back and ignore these problems. The Corporation is available at Quadra Video. Mignon Smienk

Homestay Program Makes Cultural Connections

Families from Quadra and Campbell River participated in a unique homestay program in August, hosting guests from Japan for 9 days. The English immersion program, organized by Quadra resident Pat Lowes of Island ESL Vacations and Japan-based English teacher Mike Lyon, brought three generations of Japanese students to BC.

"It was an exciting and unusual program, and provided a great opportunity for us to share our culture with very young and older Japanese students," reflected Pat.

Ten students, ranging in age from 7 to 69 years, arrived at the Campbell River Airport on August 12. Pat reported that they were tired from the journey but excited about their stay in Canada.

The group members, all students of Mike Lyon's English School in Gifu Prefecture, Japan, consisted of two mothers with preschool sons, two grandmothers with three granddaughters, and one friend of a granddaughter.

The mothers with preschool sons stayed with families in Campbell River, while the grandmothers and granddaughters were hosted by families on Quadra. The four

girls, ages 7 - 11, stayed separately from their grandmothers. They were matched with families who have children around the same age.

"The main objective was for the children to learn English and have fun," said Pat.

To this end, the four girls took part in the Quadra Children's Centre day camp program. They went horseback riding and swimming, and enjoyed activities at the Centre. The preschool boys attended the Christian Life Daycare in Campbell River.

One of the grandmothers, Miyoko Matsuoka, took daily English lessons with Pat. All the guests were encouraged to participate in activities with their homestay families.

I visited with some of the Japanese guests and their homestay families during a potluck dinner at Cheryl and Ed Jordan's house partway through their stay. Although each family had to work through language barriers and, in some cases, homesickness, finding common ground was a recurring theme in the conversation that night.

Inger Crighton, whose family hosted 11year-old Anna Matsuoka, said Anna was getting along very well with her kids.

"The kids bridge the cultural gap even more than the adults. Every night has been like a sleepover party at our house, with Anna and our kids giggling and having fun. The girls have also attended two Quadra kids' birthday parties while they've been here."

Inger and Bill's older daughter, Brianna, who is 12, went to Japan this year with the Young Ambassadors Program.

"Brianna stayed with a Japanese family for about the same amount of time and loved it," said Inger.

Travelling across the Pacific at a young age to stay with a family that doesn't speak your language requires both fortitude and a sense of adventure.

"Anna just turned 11 and we can't get over how outgoing and brave she is," Inger noted.

"She understands a lot of what we are saying to her. If not, she just shakes her head." Anna's grandmother, Miyoko Matsuoka, stayed with Karen Dunn. With the help of Quadra resident Masumi Umemura as translator, I asked Miyoko how she was enjoying her stay on Quadra Island.

"I am very happy because Anna and I are staying by ourselves with English-speaking families, so our English has improved," Miyoko replied. "Anna's host family are taking excellent care of her and I am enjoying staying with Karen very much."

Miyoko, who is 69, told me that she retired from her job as a kindergarten principal when she was 54. She now works on her organic rice and vegetable farm, takes care of her grandchildren, and attends English lessons in her spare time.

Karen and Miyoko discovered they share a keen interest in gardening. For Karen, whose son took Japanese language classes in grade 11, hosting Miyoko was a mind-expanding experience.

"I've been referring to my son's Japanese textbooks and Miyoko has an electronic dictionary. We're both learning lots," Karen said.

Cheryl Jordan, whose family hosted 11year-old Yuuka Inoue, said there was a great deal of two-way learning taking place at their house too.

"One night we were eating dinner on the deck and our kids asked Yuuka how to say 'wasp' in Japanese. We drew a picture of a wasp and she taught us the word."

Before Yuuka arrived, Cheryl's family had been e-mailing her in simple English to find out a bit about her.

"The exposure is great for our kids. Ed and I went to Japan to teach English for three months during the winter of 1994. That experience taught us what it would be like for Japanese guests to come here," Cheryl told me.

The Jordans took Yuuka to the climbing wall at the Quadra Community Centre and to see the shoreline carvings in Campbell River, as well as out on their boat to pull prawn traps.

After a farewell potluck at the home of Ron and Lynn Gamache in Campbell River on August 21, the homestay students flew www.discoveryislands.ca/news to Vancouver. They spent two nights there, doing some sightseeing and shopping, before returning to Japan.

Looking back on the Japanese homestay program, Pat said from her point of view it was a great success.

"We have an excellent group of homestay families. I feel good about placing guests with them. The families and the students connected very well and became quite attached, crossing over cultural barriers," she said.

Pat went on to say that the program is intense and during the short nine days, many good friendships were made. The children's English improved noticeably, and they became more confident with each passing day. "Some of the hosts have said that during this intense time, their own families tended to be together much more than usual, and that was an unexpected but positive by-product. The daycare programs also went very well." Pat said the organizers hope to hold the Japanese homestay program on an annual basis.

"I've only had very positive feedback from the students as well as the homestay families. There are some administrative details that I will improve on for next time, but other than that, I think this is a very successful formula."

My daughter, who is a vegetarian, looked disdainfully at my lunch. "Your hamburger and fries do not make a balanced meal," she said. "You have to find an alternative."

After lunch we went to the farmer's market. As we neared Dan Bingham's stall, I had an idea. Who better to ask about that alternative lunch than Dan. He is Quadra's resident raw food guru. Dan, who can always be depended on to be at the market, would come to my rescue with an answer. Lo and behold, he was selling what looked like a hamburger and fries. As we stood there among the other customers I looked over his display of books, drinks and food. When at last we were the only ones there Dan said with his usual friendly smile, "Hello my friends."

"Dan, you have a burger and fries," I said happily.

"Not just any burger and fries," he explained. "The bun is a Portobello mushroom, the patty is a raw food mixture." He showed me the book he got the recipe from. The fries are made from "jacima" cut with a French fry cutter and sprinkled with paprika and other spices to give them a red and color and flavour.

I bought one and shared it with a friend. Even half was very filling. Dan explained the benefits of a raw food diet. He showed us all his books on the subject. If you ever consider a raw food diet or if you want an alternative to hamburger and fries, see Dan.

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Digital Dharma

"Summer's lease hath all too short a date," the man wrote. As soon as the rains come, it will be time to sit down at the buzz box and try to organize those digital memories. Now where on my hard drive did I park those pictures of the water fight at the Spit? Or maybe I should make up a slide show on a CD of my cute pet gerbil and send it to Aunt Lucy. Or email or print a few to hang up.

These days, every graphics gizmo you get seems to come with some kind of graphics software. If you have a printer, scanner and camera, you're likely to have three different sets of programs that are supposed to save and organize your images. Kodak, Canon, Nikon, Fuji, Epson: each wants to load software to handle images. When you install them, they each will probably try to become the one program that loads when you click on a picture file, and they will often replace handling pictures from the one you have been using until then. Things get confusing pretty quickly, so it would be nice to have one program that catalogued, displayed thumbnails of each picture, and then allowed you to archive, email, print, make collages, slide shows.

For those who want to do advanced photo editing (e.g. delete former spouses from old wedding photos, put your head on someone else's fine body). I would suggest you look into something like Adobe Photo Shop or even its less pricey sibling, Adobe Elements (about \$125). These both reward study and practice to get the most from their powerful photo editing features. But for the rest of us who need an all in one, easy to use, but powerful image organizer and editing program, I am impressed by what you can do with the free software from Google called Picasa2. At a little over 3MB to download, it's in the realm of the possible even for folks with slower dial up Internet. (Unfortunately, it's not yet available for Mac, but then Windows has been more graphically challenged than Mac and the Macaholics can probably do all this stuff anyway).

Go to http://www.google.com/downloads, save the Picasa2 file to the desktop, click on it to install, and after the usual whirring and clicking is over, allow it to search your drive for all pictures and display them as thumbnail images arranged in folders. Plug in your camera and import the pictures on it directly to the program and then when your pictures are cataloged, you can rename them, add captions or even rate your favorites.

The most useful feature of this program, though, is the variety of photo editing tools included: remove red eye, adjust lighting, change the colour balance, turn the picture from colour to black and white or to sepia. And if you don't like what you've done, reverse the changes. Select the Print button below to choose the output size in Print Layout and then click Printer Setup to make your final adjustments before sending your work to the printer.

You can also share your photos several ways: email through your local client (Outlook Express or Thunderbird, e.g.) or send them by way of Google's web based service or via Google's Gmail. Want to send Aunt Lucy those pictures of your cute pet rodent? Make a Gift CD (CD burner required); Picasa will burn your pictures to a disk which Aunt Lucy can display as a slide show.

If your hard drive crashes, you can probably reconstruct that lost resume, but your pictures will only be sad memories unless you back them up. Click on the Back Up button, select the folders you want to archive onto CD, put a blank into your CD burner and in a couple of minutes you can put a feather in your cap for having done a good thing.

The breadth of Picasa's features may at first seem a bit intimidating, but after you work with it for a short while you will see how easy the program is to use; and all this in one package, too.
