

# Island Forum

To: the Honorable Kevin Falcon Minster of Transportation

### Good Day Mr. Falcon,

I represent the interests of Walcan Seafood Ltd; a fish processing business located on Quadra Island. We are the largest employer on Quadra and a significant employer for the Campbell River region. Over the past 30 years we have grown from a small business working out of one room with seasonal employment for 15 workers into a large facility with docks, two processing plants, fishing and packing boats and over 100 full time positions. We handle a wide variety of commercial and farmed seafood products year round.

The service and cost of using the ferry system has had an impact on our ability to do business over the years, however since the privatization of BC Ferries this has increased dramatically. This is due to three factors; the rising cost of fares, a decrease in service, and the privatization of the Ferries service on the coast.

### Service Issues

Our service has been decreased over the past few years with no compensation or conversation to find alternatives or solutions. Despite injecting the value of a minimum of two trucks and twenty vehicles daily into this route, we have not been treated with any consideration or courtesy by the management group at BC Ferries. Walcan is clearly the single largest user of this route, and our economic impact on this community trickles into further utilization of this ferry, yet BC Ferries has continued to reduce and restrict our transportation access while increasing our direct and indirect costs.

### **Examples of Poor Service:**

The Powell River Queen is only capable of loading commercial truck traffic down the center lane due to structural integrity issues.

We were instructed to reduce our loads to 75% of normal highway load capacity with no discount to off-set our loss of revenue.

We have been denied access to provide loading priority for perishable products.

This route has no discount for off-peak sailing times despite common over-loaded sailings during the day and an under-utilized ferry in the evenings. This type of service is offered to businesses on other routes.

Due to the improper construction of the terminal in

Campbell River we are forced, with little or no warning to have trucks sit on either side of this route for up to 8 hours because the ramp can not accommodate the traffic it receives on a regular basis if the tides are too high or low. Again, no discount or concession is made to our business even though this is BC Ferries problem with their dock.

At no time has anyone from BC Ferries attempted to manage these problems. We are left to absorb the lost revenues we encounter due to poorly maintained or managed equipment and polices; meanwhile businesses on other routes do not share these problems.

### Impact of Fare Increases and **Fuel Surcharges**

The rising cost of Ferry Tickets coupled with fuel surcharges has impacted our company in the following

- · Eating into our ability to provide competitive rates for our customers and affected our ability to bid fairly on contracts.
- · Reduced loads due to the poor maintenance of the fleet means less return on each shipment Walcan
- · Reduced load capacity means we have to use more trucks to transport the same amount of goods we shipped previously.
- · Delays in sailing times affects our costs in labour, ability to turn over loads quickly and longer shifts for
- · Increases in the direct costs of transportation obviously eat into our margins.

There are direct effects on our employees. Nearly 55% of our workforce travels on the ferry every day.

NIEFS and Opportunities in Campbell River have reported that potential employees are not interested in working here due to the expense of riding the ferry.

Workers who use the ferry daily feel a direct impact on their paycheck. It costs them anywhere from 50 cents to \$1.75 PER hour from their paycheck just to ride the ferry

It should not take an accountant or mathematician to figure out that our business is severely impacted by increased fares and diminished service. If the intent of the Ferries Act is to have "sustainable routes" why are the costs being raised so high that the users of the routes are forced to travel less, move, or shut their doors to business? How is this sustainable?

### Points of consideration

I have some comments on points that have been made in the media and in general conversation with other citizens of this Province regarding the Ferries system. The most common I have encountered are: the validity of the "where a citizen 'chooses' to live" argument, the "sustainability of routes" concept, whether or not a ferry route should be considered "a highway" or part of the highway system and the lack of creativity in finding solutions

### Where we "choose" to live

I believe that there is a responsibility within the Ministry of Transportation to maintain all highways and routes of transportation in the province, yet we are seeing an attempt to pass the costs on to specific tax payers in particular regions.

One must wonder why people in the Northern Interior of the province are not required to fund the cost of maintaining transportation routes like the highways they utilize themselves... after all; they chose to live there didn't they? I don't need those roads. Why are my tax dollars going towards their transportation requirements?

It is commonly known that the ferry routes in the interior are free to use. Odd, considering those citizens can drive around these routes. They are not even necessary, unless one considers the saved travel time for those lucky citizens! Why do my tax dollars support their ability to get home quicker? They chose to live there after all!

I am sure every person reading this letter has heard the argument "they chose to live there" regarding citizens living in coastal communities and the Ferries. The fact remains, that the Ministry of Transportation is required to maintain routes of traffic for the entire province, not select areas. It doesn't matter where you live, as long as it is within the borders of British Columbia. The "you choose to live there" argument has no validity, although it is very clear that this argument is an attempt to segregate the tax payers of British Columbia. This is not acceptable.

### **Sustainability**

It is problematic that the word "sustainability" is used to justify passing on more and more of the cost of keeping the transportation routes open in this Province by directly taxing the users. In fact, it is utilized directly in the current Ferries Act as a way to justify raising fares.

It is always fashionable to use the buzz word of the day in an effort to evoke change... or control, and I am concerned that just as words like "suitable" and "stakeholder" are used to forward agendas with

comfortable "PC" sounding words, so too is the word "sustainable" being abused. This word is not being used as it is intended, that is to have something that will not be "diminished or destroyed by being depleted without renewal". Sustainability requires a consideration of the entire system in question. If the ferries become so taxing that no one uses them and businesses like ours shut their doors, how can they be sustainable?

### A Part of Our Highways

The most common remark made by a user of the Ferries is "this is a part of our highway". The reason this comment is repeated so often is quite simple. It is because it is true. Does not the Ministry of Transportation have an obligation to maintain our routes of Transportation? Why has the word "Transportation" been redefined to exclude the Coastal Ferry Routes? We have Ferry Routes in the interior...why are they a part of the highway system? This is not logical.

Quite simply, the Ferries are basically floating bridges used to transport citizens and commerce through out a large portion of this province.

It has been pointed out that the Lyon's Gate Bridge was originally a toll bridge until it paid for itself (by Alan Fryer, a business associate). A creative way to deal with the cost of construction, and once the cost was paid, the toll was removed. We need creative solutions that do not involve an unfair gouging of certain residents of the province.

Otherwise, it would clearly be imperative to reduce all road and transportation costs to a Municipal level, thus equalizing the residents of the province fairly. What I mean is that if we are going to run this province in a manner that is selective, based on where residents live in the province, it should apply to everyone so that tax dollars are utilized fairly. Dismissing the fact that these Ferry Routes are a part of the highway system does not occur because it is logical, or fair. It occurs because it is convenient for budget setters. This does not make it a false statement however.

We are at risk of being driven out of business if this cost is not properly managed by the government as our ability to hire workers, transport goods, bid on contracts and serve our customers properly has been directly affected. We need the Government to do the appropriate job of managing the funding required to keep Ferry routes truly sustainable.

The Ferries are a part of the highways, they are a method of Transportation, and the Government does have an ethical obligation to ensure that these routes are truly sustainable. This means considering the economic impact of fares that rise at three times the rate of inflation. It is clear that this June; the Government needs to ensure that they provide the appropriate funding so that the ridiculous increases we have seen are tempered to the point that families, businesses and the taxpaying citizens of this Province are SUSTAINABLE.

I appreciate your time in reading my letter. Please consider our perspective, and note that there are numerous families, businesses and citizens depending on you!



### Quadra's Water

During our recent land use discussions many people expressed concerns about water. How will future development affect water quantity and quality? How can we protect aquifer recharge areas? Where does our water come from? How can we ensure that development won't exceed the capabilities of the resource to sustain it? Do we need a water study? Should we have more information before we proceed?

To help answer these and other important questions a public presentation will be held Quadra Community Centre Tuesday, June 19th 6:30 – 8:30 pm

Presentations will be made by Sylvia Kenny, Groundwater Protection Officer, Ministry of the Environment, Water Stewardship Division & Gary Anderson, Vancouver Island Health Authority, Land Use/Water Consultant.

Many people have expressed concerns about the quantity of water available and problems with insufficient water. Equally important is the issue of quality. Well and aquifer contamination carry serious consequences. Issues of both quantity and quality will be discussed. This will be a very interesting, informative presentation and everyone is invited to attend.

In addition to this presentation, the Ministry of the Environment runs two groundwater programs, a water monitoring program and an arsenic survey. We have an opportunity to be included in these programs.

The following are excerpts from a draft report completed in April, 2005 entitled 'Feasibility and Recommendations for Implementing an Observation Well on Quadra Island'

"In 1961 an Observation Well Network was established to collect, analyze and interpret ground water hydrographs and water quality data from various developed aquifers in BC. The focus was primarily to place observation wells in areas of high population density, that were easily accessed and where there was a strong level of concern with groundwater resources...With little options for surface water supply on the southern end of Quadra Island,

the majority of the population depends on groundwater as their water supply; however, there is little known about the groundwater of the Island...If the groundwater is not managed properly to allow for a lasting supply, the cost of supplying Quadra Island residents with a water supply would greatly increase as it would have to be transported from the many lakes in the Northern part of the Island. This could also upset the ecology of these smaller lakes."

It's not as important to know the exact quantity of water available to us as it is to know whether or not we are drawing more water from our aquifers than is being replenished. By monitoring wells in specific areas we can learn if we are over drawing, when the overdrawing occurs, how long it takes for the aquifer to recharge, etc. We can see if lack of rainfall in some years, or an over abundance in others has an effect on supply. Based on such information we can adjust our water use and our development plans. On Gabriola Island, which has five monitoring wells and where water has been monitored for ten years, results show that water levels drop during the summer but the aquifers are recharged in the winter. Therefore wells must be drilled deeper if people are to be assured of a constant water supply.

The draft report of 2005 is centred around Quathiaski Cove and Heriot Bay which are on separate aquifers. The report recommends an observation well for each community and even suggests locations for the wells. It would be prudent to establish a third well in the Pine Tree Drive area to monitor the aquifer that supplies the Animal Farm Road and Smiths Road neighbourhoods and the golf course.

Heriot Bay has additional water issues. Heriot Bay residents are considering a community wide water system. The location of the well(s) to supply that system is an important question. The following is from a report dated May 21, 1969, entitled "Note on Groundwater Investigations on Quadra Island" - " ... The extent of these aquifers [at Heriot Bay] offshore is unknown. Contamination of potential aquifers by saltwater intrusion is possible. The position of the saltwater-fresh

water interface is unknown but it depends, in part, upon the hydraulic head in the aquifers. Pumping from an aquifer may lower the hydraulic head sufficiently to cause salt water encroachment...It is felt that a test hole should be drilled to determine if suitable aquifer materials extend far enough inland to provide adequate storage of fresh water and also to determine the feasibility of placing a production well sufficient distance from the sea coast to minimize the danger of salt water intrusion."

That report was completed 38 years ago. Since then more development has occurred and more wells have been drilled. Apparently some wells in the area do go dry. There is no saltwater encroachment yet, but this is a perfect example of why it is important to understand our resource.

All of Quadra's water comes from rainwater. We receive about 58 inches per year in rain and a small amount from snowmelt. There are no underground rivers from the Coast Mountains or the Vancouver Island Range. At least as early and 1968 community water systems were being considered for both Heriot Bay and Quathiaski Cove. Perhaps this is the most beneficial way to manage our water requirements.

The Arsenic Survey is a new provincial program, which starts this month. Arsenic and other elements have shown up in wells especially in the Schooner Road area. Most likely the arsenic found in those wells is from weathering of arsenic bearing minerals and ores. Acceptable maximum levels of arsenic in drinking water have just been reduced. The arsenic survey, which may also survey for other elements, may determine the source of the contamination, and the potential for its infiltrating a larger area.

Do we have water problems on Quadra Island? Yes, we do. Not knowing the extent of our water resources is a problem. Failed, failing and undersized septic systems, well head contamination, increased development in areas where wells produce only 1-2 gpm all are problems which we need to resolve. Please remember the meeting on June 19th.

### Dear Editor,

There have been many letters to this magazine about the L.A.P. meetings and process. Most letters were reactions to incomplete information, wrongly drawn conclusions and misinformation.

This in itself is not a bad thing. But without supporting service providers, this trend will mean the decline of our community's vitality and spirit.

We must encourage opportunities for young families to stay, live and grow.

This means shuffling our personnal agenda's and desires and considering others besides ourselves. Change has been inevitable since the begining of time and nothing we can do will stop it. What we can do is direct the change to something that is livable for the majority of us on the island. This needs to include both affordable housing and available housing. As has been stated in other letters, some people do not want to live in the Cove or in Heriot Bay but on our simulated rural. What we can do is to please most of the people most of the time by thinking of others first and the struggles they will have to endure to survive here. Some people speak of loving and caring for others and the environment however their politics speaks of somewhat the opposite. We must match our politics with our passion and move forward, leaving the playground-type politics behind.

When I first moved to Quadra, there were fewer than 1,000 people on the island. Is the island a better place with almost 2,000 more? Definitely yes! Will it be better with an additional 2,000 more? Only if it contains young families willing to step up and take their place in this community and give back to the community as others have before them. That is what makes this island so precious.

### Dear Fellow Islanders,

Seniors' Housing is moving ahead after ten years of struggle to acquire land, design appropriate apartments and garden, raise funds and meet the increasing costs of building. Recently a generous islander has come forward with the offer of the kind of donation that makes things possible. The sum of \$250,000, and we are deeply grateful for it. What is needed now is a donation toward a goal of \$500,000 which will put us in a position to arrange a loan for a mortgage and launch the building.

Many of us who live here have made good on rising property values and may want to consider giving back to the community in the form of a substantial donation that will permit our seniors t remain on island.

Seniors' Housing will provide independent seniors with apartments built for convenience and security, and at an affordable rent. Eight units will be built in Quathiaski Cove. You won't have to find a place for your mother off-island where she does not want to be; and your grandpa can come out of the basement suite which is not always the best solution for the family. Couples will be able to move in. A senior living alone in a wilderness setting may apply. Our seniors will be able to live out their last years of independent living on this beloved island where the family can conveniently reach them for visits and outings.

This was the vision of long-time islander Dr. Ken Duncan. Some of the Directors who have worked with him on the project have been active since its inception.

The first donation to Seniors Housing came from the O.A.P. (Quadra Island Seniors), followed by a gift of land by Bill O'Connor. Many years of fund-raising followed, cup-cake by cup-cake, while promised government grants fell through and costs rose.

One more substantial donation would permit us to get the first units built and rented. We ask you to consider being the one, or one of many who will match the generous gift recently offered for Seniors' Housing.

### Area J Regional Director's Report

June 8, 2007

o where to start... a friend of mine recently said, "Stay calm. Be brave. Wait for the signs." Probably has been said before, I know, but it is timely. The staying calm part is something that I must always work on as an individual and especially as your Director. The being brave part is something I must always work on as an individual and especially as your Director. The waiting for the signs part is something that I am always watching for as an individual and especially in these times, as your Director. And what are those signs? Back to the beginning of the paragraph. Where to start!.

Quadra Island has been through a lot in the past many years. I have had the privilege and honour to be a part of the evolution of this island since 1985 when I moved here and since 1988 as your Director. We have been through a lot together. Key word: together. Some highlights... It started with the Shoreline Zoning process of 1990.. first of its kind anywhere in B.C. We then did the Rural Land Use by law for the outer islands (Read, Maurelle, Sonora, etc.). Then came the outer reaches of the rest of Area J. All zoned for the purpose of bringing local control to the local people. We did our OCP in 1995, debated over the regulation of the lakes system, created a major Provincial Park, procured all of the Crown Land around our beautiful community centre, were involved in dozens of other major initiatives on the island or in the area (such as the skateboard park, the trails, etc.) and then started a bylaw revision process that took more than 3 years and ended in no resolution. Since then we have created a beautiful dock for the outer islands at Hoskyn Channel (Surge Narrows road end), established a regional park at Granite Bay with a parking lot, boat ramp and wharf and floats for public access purposes, and now are in the process of preserving some of our heritage and culture at the Lucky Jim Mine site.

### All was well...

Ah, but the signs! The signs of things that may not be as good as they might be. The questions. Are we going in the right direction? Is everything as it should be in a healthy community? Is there "growth". Not just numbers, but actual "growth". Are we providing for the young that follow us and for the aging that precede us and for the "us" that are becoming the "aging"!?! Are we making sure that this community will continue beyond our short time here and that it will be as exciting and fulfilling as it was for us during our time?

Hence a new intrusion into your personal time and mine. Planning for the future. Somebody has to do it, right? I am sure that there are those who would say, "why can't we just leave well enough alone?". The "signs", remember the "signs". I would love to be part of the "leave well enough alone" philosophy. However, I think that we all are aware of the fact that change is occurring all around us as we speak (write). Some of it is good and some of it is not so good. I want nothing but the good for Quadra Island and the people that I represent. I want us to be "live" to the pressures of the external world and

to our own island. And I want us to respond in the way that we have responded in the past 20 years: creatively! And I want us to do it respectfully, because everyone deserves respect. We are a diverse group and we have our own opinions about just about everything. That does not make any opinion more, or less valid. They are our opinions and they will be heard.

The recent process for revising our Official Community Plan (OCP) using the Local Area Plan (LAP) process has been problematic. That is obvious from all of the debate in the community via letters to the editor. Debate is a good thing, folks, as long as people remember one thing: respect! Some of what I have seen and some of what I have received has lacked that crucial element. Even a CSRD (Comox Strathcona Regional District) planner violated the rule. He was wrong by becoming personal in the debate. He is gone. We need to move on.

I presented a possible solution to the problems that we have been faced with in this process. I have attended way more meetings than I wanted to, but have listened carefully to what has been said. My proposal is to allow for some change on Quadra Island but to control it carefully. Why? So that we can "grow". We have plateaued. We now need to look at the future and figure out how we will insure that the wonders that we have all enjoyed on this island will continue to be available to future generations. Is that by maintaining the "status quo"? I personally don't think so. We have seniors with needs. We have youth with needs. We have a community with needs. The "signs".

I recall during our many years of Forest Resource Committee meetings, hearing conservationists and foresters both telling us about "mixed age stands" (referring to trees) and how important these were to the health of the the forest and the entire ecosystem. We are a "mixed age stand" as a community and we need to remain as such for the health of our community "ecosystem". We can learn from one another. That is the way it is supposed to be.

I have nattered on long enough. At this point all I want to say is that YOU need to be present at the June 13th meeting at the Community Centre from 7 to 9 pm. We will share with you the minor changes that have been made to the 1996 OCP, by a group of your peers, and we will discuss the proposal that I put forward in the last Discovery Islander. We will also hear from Bob Long, CAO of the CSRD, about the next steps in this process. I hope to see you there. I need to see you there. We need to resolve this issue.

That is about all the energy I have left for this issue! 

### 75th Anniversary of the B.C. OLD Age Pensioner's Organization. – June 6th 1932

### (There are 8 Branches in the North Island)

In 1932, in the prairie provinces, life in many aspects was a disaster. Drought, high unemployment, and absolutely no protection for people, in particular the Seniors. Life became unbearable for many of its citizens. Farmers could not get any help from the banks, to tied them over. If you were sick, you faced financial ruin, if you did not have the money, you were out of luck. Many People lost there homes, and farms, because they could not pay there Mortgages or Healthcare costs. Some people in Quebec and the Prairie Provinces got together and sent a delegation to Europe, (Holland, Germany and France)'to study the Co-op system. They where so impressed that the Credit Union system was established. This still, did not solve the problem of the peoples health. Then elected, C.C.F. Premier Tommy Douglas from the Province of Saskatchewan, took the bull by the horns, and against all odds introduced the first Provincial Healthcare program. The Doctors went on strike. The Businesses were in an uproar. Douglas was called a Bolshevik, and many other names. But the program survived. Several years later when it became apparent that it was good health program, afterall. The Federal Govt under Lester. B. Pearson, introduced Healthcare from Coast to Coast. Thereafter the first Old age Pensions where established followed by Pharmacare. Workmans Compensation. etc. etc. Not that this would be the end of the struggle. Over the years, many attacks by Federal, and Provincial Governments to try and reverse this trend, had to be fought. The Seniors of this country spearheaded many of the battles. Not anything was ever handed over, on a Silver Platter. Seniors built and paid, for much of the infrastructure of what we have and take for granted, our Schools, Hospitals Highways, Bridges, Ferrys and Sport facilities, and many comforts that is enjoyed today. So on this 75th Founding Anniversary, let us embrace our Seniors, and let them know how we appreciate all the hardwork, they have accomplished.

On Quadra Island we our fortunate to have our B.C.O.A.P.O. Branch 91,which was founded 43 years ago, by the charter members Below— The Richards, Macklins, Pipers, Schnaars, Britenbachs, Fieldings, Stierlands, Stills, Johnstons, Graftons, and Stephens. This founding was a most important undertaking, for the people on Quadra Island, and the Province.

Lets us respect them, and honour all the Seniors, by announcing in June Seniors week.

### Canadian Garden Expert Comes To Quadra

- 2. We want feedback regarding preferred accommodation and care in old age. We will ask about needs associated with increasing age/ disability/ ability to drive etc.
- 3. We want to know how many rental units exist on Quadra Island and the number of properties owned by non-
- 4. We are asking what younger people see as affordable housing options so that they can stay on the Island.
- 5. We want to better understand the housing situation for seasonal workers.

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### from Our School Board Trustee

t our last Board meeting, trustees were presented with an impressive paper entitled "Safe Schools – a Continuum of Services: School District 72. I believe the entire opening statement is worth quoting. It states, "Campbell River School District is committed to creating a safe and secure environment for all students and staff within its facilities. In a safe and secure environment, students should be able to participate freely in all school activites without fear of threat to their physical, emotional, or spiritual well being. The creation of safe schools necessitates a focused effort from students, parents, staff, and the community at large. The continuum of services begins with the creation of a positive school climate for all youth in the school system...Should an emergency situation occur that threatens school safety and security, Critical Incident Response Teams are prepared to safeguard the immediate physical safety of students and staff, and to work to restore a positive social climate in the aftermath of disaster".

The paper goes on to discuss prevention of problems (teaching good behaviour, student codes of conduct, charters of student rights and responsibilities), intervention when a problem emerges (community/school counselling services, threat assessment by trained personnel) and ultimately, restoration to a safe environment if a crisis does occur. Restoration involves a seven step protocol including assessment, calling for assistance, communication with the whole community, meeting the long term needs of students and staff and debriefing, including the the questions, "How did we do?" and "How can we improve?".

In my years as a high school counsellor in Campbell River, I experienced directly and indirectly a number of critical incidents, including the deaths by accident or suicide of several students and staff members. Some incidents affect discrete populations - say, the death of a logger in Sayward, or an accident involving a member of a grad class. Some deaths will have schoolwide impact, and reach into other schools as well, because of associations which stretch across the community. There are many variables to consider and the Critical Incident Response Team, which includes district personnel thoroughly trained in this rigorous role, works tirelessly to address all the demands of any given situation until it is satisfied that every need has been met.

I raise this issue as a reassurance to the community that School District 72 has a well thought out plan in place in case of emergency. Every principal of every school knows what the plan involves. Many staff members have received Threat Assessment Training offered by the Canadian Centre for Threat Assessment and Trauma Response and they are able to read the signs of disturbed youth who are exhibiting "worrisome behaviours". These signs will not be ignored in this district. We also have protocols in place in case of natural disasters, and seismic upgrading is an ongoing process across the district. Carihi is in the beginning stages of a 2.2 Million upgrade which will ensure the safety of its students in an earthquake situation.

Fears for the safety of our children are natural and nothing new. What we fear, however, has changed, and I feel confident in the knowledge that the new and different threats we face as a school community are being professionally addressed on an ongoing basis with commitment to the physical, emotional, and spiritual safety of our most precious entrustment, our children. Please feel comfortable working with your school staff or PAC if you have questions or concerns that need discussion.

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

RAS's are established in rural communities where it is too small to operate a Government Liquor Store.

RAS's will be established where there is a suitable business i.e. existing independently-owned full service grocery store.

Only one Rural Agency Store authorization in a community is permitted.

Written comments will be accepted until June 22, 2007.

Your submissions may be used by the LDB in the decision process.

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# <u> Halliday's Viewpoint</u>

# Great First Step

fter enjoying a weekend of beautiful weather, doing yard work and studio touring, Monday brought with it grey skies, chilly winds and the Islander's looming deadline. One might think, that with the plethora of activity that goes on around us everyday, cranking out twelve hundred words or so on demand should be easy. Sometimes it is, sometimes it isn't - today it isn't. The difficulty generally comes in choosing the subject, not writing the piece; topics recently covered, current events, suitability of content and personal mindset are all factors. With this in mind I beg your indulgence as I revisit a topic that just won't go away, and frankly scares the bejeezus out of me - Iran. Or more specifically, the USA and Israel versus Iran.

I developed an interest in Iran during elementary social studies class, as Iran/Persia has a long, fascinating and complex history. It might have been piqued by the pomp, pageantry and power of the reign of the last Shah, Pahlavi, whose zenith and decline I witnessed during the 60's and 70's, and whose arrogance and non-secularity polarized Iran's very secular population. Perhaps it was in the listening to the tales told of Iran by David, a young, multi-lingual and extremely smart Iranian exile I befriended in Victoria during the 80's, whose family lost everything escaping Iran. Whatever the case, it troubles me no end to see what is happening in the region today, and the prospects arising from the growing tension between the US and Iran are worthy of very sober reflection. In spite of the recent and welcome meeting between US and Iranian officials in Baghdad, there appears little hope of rational dialogue or forward progress anytime soon, and many are expressing concern that time is fast running out. "World peace is now at risk because of new crazies who say let's go and bomb Iran" according to Mohammed ElBaradei, head of the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA), as reported by UPI on June 4th. The "crazies" he refers to certainly include Norman Podhoretz, author of a recent commentary entitled "The Case for Bombing Iran", in which he states categorically "As an American and a Jew I hope and pray that President Bush will do it."

Podhoretz is a well-known long-time right wing conservative commentator who has the ear of many in Washington - his son-in-law Elliot Abrams is Deputy National Security Advisor to President George W. Bush, and his son is an editor at the

New York Post. In the same UPI article, penned by Arnaud de Borchgrave and titled "Guns of August?" we learn, "The word among the neocon family is Cheney believes Bush will stick to his pledge not to leave office 16 months hence with Iran's nuclear facilities intact. Either Iran comes clean and stops its nuclear fuel enrichment process under IAEA control, or Tehran faces Bush's military option. Two US carrier groups are now 30 miles off Iran's coastline in the Persian Gulf". While researching this piece I came across an opinion penned by the former chief of strategic planning for our intelligence service, CSIS, a fellow named David Harris. It is titled, coincidentally, "The case for bombing Iran", and was published in the June 4/07 Ottawa Citizen. It opens simply enough - "When the United States strikes Iran - as it will - the result will be a disaster, but a disaster that cannot be avoided." Yikes.

Harris then goes on to point out the following, more or less. Madmen intent on spreading Islamofascism throughout the world rule Iran, Iran will wipe Israel off the map, and Iran will use nuclear blackmail to take over the rest of the world. Yikes again – sound to me like we ought to vaporize them before they vaporize us, right? He makes no bones about it, in exactly the same vein as Podhoretz - kill them before they kill us. He concludes his piece (I'll refrain the temptation of appending an appropriate adjective after "piece" following "of") by stating, "Above all, citizens of the west must be realistic. Retribution inflicted upon us by [Iranian puppet President] Ahmadinejad and other Islamic extremists - including disruptive oil prices - must not cause us to buy enemy propagandists' [my italics] continuing attempts to divide us from the United States and other allies. We must steadfastly recognize that the cost of attacks on Iran is the price we must pay to forestall the advent of a new form of slavery - and many millions of nuclear dead, besides." Wow. This guy should apply as White House Presidential speechwriter - he's got the rhetoric down pat. Enemy propagandist...moi? From him it would be a compliment.

And then along came a little ray of sunshine in the form of an essay published on Yale Global Online, a service of Yale University, called "Exit from Iraq Should be Through Iran". It was written in May of this year by retired US Army Lt. General William Odom, former Director of the US National Security Agency and now a Professor at Yale. While Odom acknowledges the many shortcomings of the

Khamenei regime in Tehran, he goes on to point out the many areas in which the US and Iran share common ground - Iran seeks stability in Iraq and Afghanistan, has repeatedly denounced Al Qeada and the Taliban, and wishes as end to the Israeli-Palestinian issue, though admits involvement in the problem through Iranian sponsored Hezbollah. Odom further points out that Iran has acknowledged that the region as a whole has benefited in the past from the US involvement - "by preventing any of the three [feuding] camps - Israel, Iraq and Saudi Arabia - from overrunning one another, the US provided regional stability". The US's direct intervention into Iraq, however, and its blind, overt support of Israel have dismayed Iranian officials. They are further dismayed by the US's increasingly strident bleatings about nuclear programmes after they basically turned a blind eye to the development or procurement of nuclear weapons by India, Pakistan and of course Israel.

Odom feels it is time for certain political players to get their heads out of the sand (or other places, in some specific cases) and realize that Iran is a key player in the region, will not be deterred from obtaining at least a defensive nuclear capacity, and will not demur in their support for a Palestinian homeland, via Hezbollah. However, if the Iranians do not have to fear nuclear attack from the US or Israel, their belief in the need for such weapons will diminish, and indeed, improved relations with the US will inexorably reduce Iranian hostile policies towards Israel. Iran can be of immense help in reducing the tensions in Iraq, and its assistance would allow a rapid withdrawal of US forces. So the quid pro quo is thus; Iran assists the US (as it has in the past) in achieving Iraqi and regional stability, and the US will back off. As Odom puts it, "the makings of a deal are straightforward. The matter of Israel and Hezbollah can probably be sublimated if Washington drops the nuclear issue, along with its threat to change the regime in Iran". It's so simple it's amazing no one in power thought of...strike that thought - not amazing at all.

So a retired General who was also former head of the biggest US spy agency says things will get better if, in essence, we all just get along, and dialogue is needed. The meeting in Baghdad on Monday, the 1st official meeting between US and Iranian officials in 28 years, is a great first step. To quote Winston Churchill, "to jaw-jaw is always better than to war-war."
