

Chair, Comox Strathcona Regional District Board Dear Madam,

I read with interest a quote by the Comox Strathcona Regional District Chief Administrative Officer, Bob Long, in the "Island Report" by Tanya Storr, Discovery Islander #398, 2007 June 22nd, page 21, which read (quote) Bob Long, who is in charge of the planning process and budgeting, mentioned that "we are at the end of our planning budget for Quadra" (unquote).

As there is a "planning budget for Quadra" as confirmed by Mr. Long's statement, then it follows logically that your expenditures of funds are then presumably properly costed and allocated to functions and projects as would be required for effective financial budgeting for planning, at least in this circumstance for Quadra Island within Area J. In this connection, would you kindly instruct District staff to provide (via your web site to minimize staff time and costs) copies in digital PDF format of the these planning budgets, for Quadra and/or Area I covering the years 1996 through 2007 inclusive, with reference and comparison to the tax requisitions for Environmental Development Services, Planning 500 function for those years, which sums to \$1,125,938.

Additionally, please make available Statements of Remuneration as published in accordance with the Financial Information Act [RSBC 1996] Chapter 140 sec 2(1) inclusive for those years.

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# Liberal favouritism could put small rural liquor stores out of business - MLA

North Island – North Island MLA, Claire Trevena, is hearing from local small business owners saying that recent changes to wholesale liquor prices could put their rural agency liquor stores out of business.

As the result of heavy lobbying from big box liquor store owners, the government significantly lowered the wholesale cost of liquor to large stores, leaving small rural stores struggling to compete.

"General store owners tell me that it is getting to the point that the liquor agency portion of their business is not profitable at all," said Trevena. "And now to make it even tougher this government is willing to give an even deeper discount to large retailers.

"Rural areas have seen a consistent pattern with this government; a pattern that makes it harder and harder for small communities to survive."

Trevena and other members of the Opposition's Rural Caucus are calling on the Minister for Public Safety and Solicitor General to review the situation.

"Small local liquor outlets are going to become a thing of the past if something doesn't change," Trevena said. "And losing the rural agency liquor license could also mean the end of the General Stores that provide gas, grocery and other services to rural residents."

### Library changes to meet customers' needs

You might have noticed a few changes in some of the Vancouver Island Regional Library branches! VIRL recently concluded a successful customer holds pickup pilot project. The project, launched in the Cowichan, Qualicum Beach and Parksville Library branches allowed customers to pick up their own library hold material – books, CDs and DVDs. The project which ran from April 2 until May 13th, 2007 was popular among customers with nearly 80% offering positive feedback. Library staff are examining the results of the pilot project with an eye to extending the service permanently to VIRL library branches.

Customers who offered feedback on the service had the following to say: "Efficient, Fast. Well done! Someone is thinking ahead to save time and work of librarians and easier for patrons!" and "Have used this system for many years prior to moving here and it works very well for me!" Library systems such as Greater Victoria and Vancouver have allowed customers to pick up their own hold material for the past few years. Of course, you can't please everyone; one customer added this feedback: "You should serve tea, coffee and tarts in the afternoon."

This is one of many ways that VIRL is better meeting the needs of busy customers. In 2006, VIRL introduced self checkout machines and there are now 12 machines in the system all have proven to be popular among customers. The library system also instigated an email notification system in 2006. Users who sign up for this system receive an email when a requested item is ready for pickup in the branches and also when they have an item due. An email will be sent a few days before an item is due, warning the customer and then another email when the item is overdue. 27,833 customers have signed up for this service.

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### **Comox Strathcona Regional District** receives letter on structure changes

from the Ministry of **Community Services** 

The Comox Strathcona Regional District (CSRD) has received a letter from the Ministry of Community Services that outlines a new direction for the CSRD, including a review of its current governance structure.

The letter from Ida Chong, Minister of Community Services, was addressed to CSRD chair Starr Winchester and members of the CSRD board.

One of the key projects of the review, as outlined in the letter, is the division of the CSRD into two separate regional districts: one that is focused on the Comox Valley area and another that would be focused on the Strathcona-Campbell River area.

The Ministry has appointed Dale Wall, the Assistant Deputy Minister, Local Government Department, to act as the key contact for the province.

"We are looking forward to hearing more from Mr. Wall during his attendance at the special board meeting that I have called for tomorrow," said chair Winchester.

Debra Oakman, general manager of corporate services and acting CAO for the CSRD says, "This direction for change comes from the province and involves changes to Letters Patent, so there will be many things for the board to consider. At the staff level it will be business as usual. Our goal remains to provide services and programs to residents in the Comox Strathcona Regional District with as little disruption as possible."

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
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### MLA Report: July 2007

Canada Day has come and gone and it's been six weeks since the Legislature in Victoria ended its session, in a highly undemocratic way.

After four months in which the Official Opposition raised concerns on everything from environment to corruption to childcare, the government shut down debate and closed the doors.

Just 24 hours before MLAs were supposed to rise for the end of the spring session, the BC Liberals said that by the end of the next day, three bills would be voted on -- whether debate had been completed or not.

In our system there is usually the opportunity to debate bills. There is the opportunity to then go through them clause by clause in committee stage before voting. That is to allow a reasoned and measured approach to legislation. It is supposed to allow the voice and questions of constituents and stakeholders to be addressed in the committee stage. At times it allows for amendments to be brought in to improve or alter legislation.

We know that the government will win when it comes to a vote because we are a two party system and the government has a substantial majority.

However that does not lessen the need for debate and the need for questions. In fact when there is a majority it is even more important to have concerns raised. In a parliamentary democracy the government should allow debate without fear. Questions and opposition are a healthy; an essential, part of our democracy.

Sadly, the BC Liberals have bred an atmosphere of arrogance. Arrogance about forcing through legislation unnecessarily fast. Arrogance about the Supreme Court decision on union rights. An atmosphere which seeps through our whole province: our ferry fares can be raised with an arrogant nod to those of us who live and work on the islands; our hospital can be regionalized with an arrogant nod to those who do not live within the socalled Golden Hour for emergency care; our logs can be exported and we see jobs and communities disappear with our forests.

Through the summer and into the fall, I will continue to work on issues of ensuring good healthcare close to our communities; on the absurdity of our marine highway being operating on a cost recovery basis; on the serious issues confronting our forest sector; on issues impacting our environment; and on maintaining our democratic rights and freedom of speech.

MLAs should be returning to Victoria in the fall, but last year the government cancelled the fall session saying there was no work to do. I am concerned they will cancel again this year having seen their arrogant approach through the last months. It does make the job of opposition that much harder but I will continue to stand up for the North Island, and with my colleagues in the Opposition will continue to challenge the government on all aspects of their arrogant activities.

# **Food For Thought**

A man walked into my store two years ago; he picked up the walnut crumbs and read that they were from China. He'd be back, he said, when I wasn't buying from China. Eventually, I bought walnut crumbs from California, not because of the man, but because of the better quality

I hadn't given much thought to Chinese food exports until six months ago, when I received a case of organic pumpkin seeds with CHINA stamped on the side. My first reaction was to think, "How odd!" My knowledge of China comes from books dealing with the politics and the history of the country. Most of my life, China and Russia were the boogeymen countries of the world. I envisioned China teeming with people, crammed in poverty, with no room to swing a bat. When China began emerging as an industrial giant, I added toxic air to my vision. It never occurred to me that there was an area unpolluted enough for organic farming. My curiosity was so piqued that I went to the Internet to gather information.

Organic farming takes place in the Great Northern Wilderness where soil is believed to be free of fertilizers and pesticides. It is a new industry encouraged by the Chinese government. Although only 1% of the Chinese population is interested in organic foods, the rapidly growing market in North America and Europe is what is fueling the growth of organic farming in China.

The question of food safety has become a strong focus of interest lately. CBC radio dedicated an hour long show to the topic of foreign food imports to Canada and after interviewing a customs officer on how carefully food shipments are inspected, the interviewer got to the question he most wanted to ask. How safe is the food coming from China? The New York Times ran an article entitled, "In Food Safety Crackdown, China Closes 180 Plants." So much controversy surrounds Chinese non-organic food, but how safe is Chinese organic food? According to an article I found on the Canadian government website, organic crops destined for export are certified according to the organic standards of the foreign country doing the purchasing. In China, The Organic Food Development Centre (OFDC) operates under the direction of the State Environment Protection Administration. The responsibilities of OFDC include controlling agro-environmental pollution caused by synthetic pesticides and fertilizers; promoting the organic food for consumers. Most importantly, the OFDC is officially accredited by the International Federation of Organic Agricultural Movements, which enables its certified products to be exported to markets in Japan, the United States, Canada and Europe.

In the end, I'm as confident in the certification procedures of China as I am of any other country's. I sell few organic products and of those, three come from China. My distributors offer me no alternative, so I'll be buying my organic pumpkin seeds from China.

### OPEN BURNING BAN **NOW IN EFFECT**

As of noon on July 09, there is an Open Burning Ban in effect. Please do not ignite any fires other than legal campfires, and take great care when you do light a campfire! We consider a legal campfire to be less than 3 feet across, less than 3 feet high, used for cooking, warmth, or ceremonial purposes, located in a safe area away from combustibles, lit in conditions that are safe and will continue to be safe, and having in attendance at all times a responsible person with the means of putting out the fire. Campfires must be fully extinguished before you leave the area. Thank you for your safe use of fire!

### **ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING**

The Annual General Meeting of the South Quadra Fire Protection District was held on 2007 April 30 at the #1 Fire Hall. The usual AGM business was conducted, including the presentation of audited financial statements, capital plan, Fire Chief's annual report, and Trustee's annual report. ### TAXES AND THE FIRE **DEPARTMENT**

I recall reading something somewhere recently that seemed to take a swipe at the taxes collected by the South Quadra Fire Protection District for the operation of your fire department.

Just for interest, I looked up the taxes collected by the SQFPD over the past 10 years. From 1997 to 2007, annual taxes increased a grand total of 10.4%; an average increase of 1% per year. National inflation over this time period was about 20% (Stats Canada). The residential mill rate for fire protection over the same period dropped from 0.91 in 1997 to 0.52 in 2007. During this time period, the Fire Department has managed to build a great new fire hall, put a new engine into service, completely re-equip with turnout gear and breathing apparatus, improve fixed water supplies, meet everhigher training standards, and make dozens of other improvements...

I just mention all of this to reassure you that your Trustees are doing a good job of managing your tax dollars and that we as a fire department are continuing to provide high value to you. If any landowner in the SQFPD ever needs accurate figures on the taxation practices of the SQFPD, including the current year's budget, our current capital plan, tax history, or whatever, feel free to contact me - I have the real numbers.


Success stories like Xaviers' all have their humble beginnings. What's special about this one is that it started here in the Comox Valley.

As we have been informed, that Dr. Ian Marsh is moving his medical practice to Quinsam Medical in Campbell River, August 1st,2007, on 2nd Ave. The Quinsam Medical Centre is moving to the new Save-on Shopping Centre between Aug.—Sept/07. (which will be better for walkers).

We the Amiabel's are quite concerned about the change. For when you have established a good relationship with your physician it is very difficult, to make another move, particularly when you are a senior. With the constant increases, in the ferry rates, and gas prices, our trips to Campbell River become more costly.

I found that we do not have to change physicians. We can use the T.A.P. form, which is for people who live in areas where you must use a ferry, plane, or bus, to get medical services, and specialists referrals.

When you have an appointment to see Dr. Ian Marsh at Quinsam Medical, and when your visit is over, ask the receptionist for a T.A.P. form, before you leave the clinic, use the available phone, and call the 1-800, number on the pink, T.A.P. form, which is on the right top corner of the form. Have your Medical Service Plan number available, which you will need, and which the person in Victoria, will want, when they ask you a few questions, which is normally done, including, if you need an escort, or someone to drive for you. You will then be given a confirmation number to print at the left bottom corner of your form, in the space provided. You then sign your signature on the bottom, and make sure you have checked the box, which states, escort.

When arriving at the ferry booth just hand the T.A.P. form in, instead of your ferry ticket. We hope we have been of some assistance to you, with this one break for people which still exists.

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# Province Won't Help Reduce Ferry Fare Increases

The Provincial Government won't allocate any more money for BC Ferries' minor routes over the next four years. Residents of and visitors to communities served by those18 ferries, including Quadra and Cortes, will have to pay the increased costs of fuel, labour and capital improvements.

In spite of months of efforts by representatives, residents and business owners from ferry-dependent communities, Transportation Minister Kevin Falcon was not convinced that fare hikes are threatening the sustainability of island and coastal economies.

A week before the government's decision, Vancouver Sun columnist Vaughn Palmer asked Transportation Minister Kevin Falcon if he would increase the provincial service fee "as a way of heading off another round of fare increases." He said, "I'm not in that frame of mind."

He also wasn't inclined to announce the decision himself, leaving it to Ferry Commissioner Martin Crilly to post the news on his web site (www. bcferrycommission.com) as a way of making it public. Click on "What's New" to read Crilly's summary and the amended contract between the Province and BC Ferries for 2008-2012, also know as Performance Term Two (PT2).

Crilly now has until September 30 to determine the final price caps for annual increases in PT2. His preliminary figures at the end of March suggested that minor route fares, including Quadra and Cortes, will be going up at least 6.7% annually. That's the best case scenario, assuming that the Consumer Price Index remains at 2% annually and fuel prices don't continue to go up.

Last week BC Finance Minister Carole Taylor announced that the Province had a budget surplus of \$4.1 billion in the last fiscal year and said it had allowed the Province to invest \$3.4 billion in "building and upgrading schools, universities, colleges, hospitals, roads and bridges."

"We are upgrading transportation networks to keep our economy moving," she said.

In fact, BC Ferries is getting some of that money. In the wake of the sinking of the Queen of the North, the Province is putting up nearly \$168 million during PT2 to pay for new vessels, terminal improvements and operational funds for services between Prince Rupert and the Queen Charlotte Islands and between Prince Rupert and Vancouver Island

Responding to letters and emails from concerned minor route users, the Transportation Minister frequently cited the increased annual total of \$130 million in "taxpayers' dollars" which he says "guarantee service levels for the minor, northern and Sunshine Coast routes."

"No other small communities in B.C. benefit from this degree of sustained transportation funding," Falcon writes.

The fact is that the minor route group is going to get about the same annual service fee (\$74.3 million) it was allocated from 2003 to 2007. The enorthern routes will get \$25 million in 2008-9 and \$47 million a year for the three years after that.

The major routes between Vancouver Island and the Mainland are already covering their operating costs, but they will also see annual increases in PT2 to cover the financing of new ships and terminal improvements.

On the minor routes, there will be a 4.4% increase November 1 under the existing contract for Performance Term 1. PT2 starts April 1, 2008 with the current fuel surcharges rolled into the base price and a new set of price caps.

The caps are a limit on across-the-board fares for the whole route group so they allow BC Ferries to raise some fares more than others. This includes raising ticket book prices more than the cash fare, eroding the "discount" that frequent users get. This occurred during PT1.

### Scheduling "Flexibility"

The amended contract also specifies the number of roundtrips on each route that BC Ferries is to provide in each year. The totals for Quadra and Cortes remain unchanged, but BC Ferries now can reduce the service on any route by one roundtrip per day and add sailings at busier times to make up the total.

This is scheduling flexibility in an effort to improve what BC Ferries calls "capacity utilization."

Quadra Senior Capt. Wayne Maxted told the Ferry Advisory Committee in May that if any winter sailings were cut from the Quadra-Campbell River schedule, it would be almost impossible to make them up within the current 16-hour day at the busiest times of the year.

The Cortes ferry, which currently operates 12 hours a day year-round, could theoretically have a reduced winter schedule and more summer sailings, but whether ferry users and the union would support that change is certainly debatable.

When the FAC has asked about added summer service between Quadra and Cortes, management has repeatedly expressed concern about finding qualified crew for an additional shift for only a few months of the year.



### WHAT THE HECK IS ESS?

ESS stands for Emergency Social Services, and is a volunteer organisation whose mandate is to provide essential services to people affected by emergencies such as fires, floods, or earthquakes. If the disaster affects a large number of people, a team of ESS volunteers provide the services. If only one or two families are affected, on-site assistance is provided by Level One ESS responders. Short-term aid with food clothing and shelter may be provided (usually up to 72 hours) to give you time to plan your next step. This aid is provided through the Provincial Emergency Program (PEP), who also provide training for the volunteers. ESS is here to help, but we need you to help us. Volunteers are needed now. Please call Sue at 285-3795 or Anne at 285-3415.

### 26 WEEKS TO FAMILY EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS – Week 1:

Get a large portable container with a lid to use as an emergency kit. A plastic storage bin or garbage can works well, particularly one with wheels. Choose an accessible location for the container near an exit and label the container. Make sure all family members know what it will be used for and where it is. (You may also want to pack items into individual wheeled carts, carry-alls or packs to make them easier to carry by individual family members.)



# Halliday's Viewpoint

# As Time Runs Out

recent column (A Great First Step - DI #397) prompted a reader to write me with some specific questions that arose from the points made in the piece. The writer (as he wrote me directly I'll preserve the anonymity for my reply) asked six questions, which I think I can safely distil down to two: Given Iran's publicly stated intention to remove Israel from the map; that Iran actively seeks nuclear weapon capability, and they actively seek to spread radical fundamentalist Islamic rule around the globe, is it not reasonable for Israel (and by extension, its sponsor the USA) to take pre-emptive action to remove such a threat? And second, doesn't Iran represent an emerging threat, similar to Nazi Germany, and that the time to deal with it is now, while they are "weaker and could be defeated with less destruction and death" than was the case with Hitler? In other words, has the time for Churchillian "jaw-jawing" passed? In my opinion, the answer to both questions is no – at least not at this point in time. I turned to two leading authorities on military and geo-political affairs, Gwynne Dyer and Patrick Lang.

Dyer, whose name frequently appears in this space, is a Newfoundland born naval officer/military historian who now lives in London. Dyer has published several best-selling books on global affairs and is a syndicated columnist (his website is www. gwynnedyer.net).

Patrick Lang retired from the US Army as a Colonel, specializing in intelligence. He served with the Defence Intelligence Agency as a Middle Eastern expert, and was the first Arab language lecturer at West Point. He is now a consultant and frequent media commentator, and runs an excellent blog called Sic Semper Tyrannis ("thus ever it be with tyrants") at www.turcopolier.typepad.com.

Both men have spent their lives observing events unfold in the Middle East, and while they may differ in many of their views neither feel Iran represents much of a threat today, either to Israel, the region or the globe, provided the USA and it's proxy Israel cease being a threat to Iran.

Dyer predicts the US invasion of Iraq will fail; indeed, he wrote so in August 2004, in Future: Tense (McClelland & Stewart – 2004) and even opens the book with "The United States needs to lose the war in Iraq as soon as possible. Even more urgently, the whole world needs the [US] to lose the war in Iraq. It would be nice if Iraq didn't have to lose too, but that is a lesser consideration. What

is at stake now is the way we run the world for the next generation or more, and really bad things will happen if we get it wrong". And here is what he sees happening as at June 22, 2007 - "Beyond forecasts of civil war in Iraq, however, there has been little effort to discern what the Middle East will actually look like after the US troops go home. There is already a civil war in Iraq, and it might even get worse for a time after American troops leave, but these things always sputter out in the end. There will still be an Iraqi state, plus or minus Kurdistan, and regardless of whether or not the central government in Baghdad exercises real control over the Sunni-majority areas between Baghdad, Mosul and the Syrian border. With a Shia-dominated government in Baghdad, post-occupation Iraq will have close ties with Iran, but there will be no Iranian troops there. Nobody in Tehran is crazy enough to volunteer Iranian troops for counter-insurgency duty in Sunni Arab parts of Iraq, and Iran lacks the military capability for adventures in the further reaches of the Arab world even if it had the desire".

And as to the question of Israel itself, here is Dyer's opinion, from the same article – "For Israel, however, the situation has changed fundamentally. For the first twenty years of its existence, Israel was a state under siege. For the past forty years, since the conquests of 1967, it has had the luxury of debating with itself how much of those conquered lands it should return to the Arabs in return for a permanent peace settlement. (The answer was always "all of them," but that was not an answer many Israelis would hear.) Now the window is closing. Before long, some of the Arab states that Israel needs to make peace with are likely to fall to Islamist regimes that have an ideological commitment to its destruction. (Hamas's capture of the Gaza Strip is a foretaste of what is to come.) Israelis trying to evade hard choices have long complained that they had "nobody to negotiate with." It is about to become true".

Patrick Lang is much more hawkish in his views of Iranian intentions, but shares Dyer's view that they offer little in the way of a realistic threat at the moment, and that the present status of Iranian authority is very fluid – reacting to Mahmoud Ahmadinejad's vapid ranting would be immensely stupid. Lang, writing in The National Interest (Spring 2006 edition), considers US/Israeli action against Iran as extremely dangerous: "In the end, it may become necessary to confront Iran militarily over its emergent nuclear status, but the costs would

be so high that all diplomatic resources should be exhausted before such measures are adopted". And if Dyer's forecast regarding Iraq is correct, coupled with a nuclear-armed Iran, what does Lang see happening? From the same article – "With nuclear weapons in hand, Iran will become the dominant local power in the Persian Gulf. They will have no pressing need to use these weapons, because their mere possession will ensure that everyone in the region, including Israel, will have to deal with them as a major power. We, too, would probably have to learn to deal with them on this basis".

Both Dyer and Lang agree that Middle Eastern dilemmas are only going to be solved with a multilateral approach. Dyer argues that were the UN to exist and function as it was intended, the situation might be controlled, as the organization often did in it's heyday of the 1950's and early 60's. But as he writes in Future: Tense, the course undertaken by the present US administration, guided by the principles espoused by several present and former administration appointees and enunciated in The Project for A New American Century, appears nothing less than entrenching a global hegemony in order to protect its present dominant global position, militarily and economically. The UN stands in it's way, and is considered an irrelevant dinosaur by the neo-conservative cabal which includes Dick Cheney, Donald Rumsfeld, Paul Wolfowitz, Richard Perle and oh yes, Scooter Libby amongst its members. Perhaps even Bush, Jr. himself shares this ideology, though this is doubtful, as higher thought clearly escapes him. Dyer is more convinced now than he was in 2004 that the US administration has embarked on a course that will be irrevocably damaging to the world's safety, and even more so to that of the US itself.

It is high time that the American public re-examine the ideology and methodology being espoused as the "American way" by recent administrations, most particularly that of the present. The reputation of the country, hard earned over the centuries, is now tarnished to the point that a majority of global citizens named the USA as the greatest threat to world peace and stability, in a recent poll. The USA's blind support of Israel, and their more covert support of unpopular governments in Saudi Arabia, Pakistan and other Gulf States must cease if they ever hope to achieve any form of rapprochement with the other fundamentalist Arab states, and more importantly, would de-escalate what is becoming a crisis of global proportions in the Middle East.

# Sidelines on the Boardwalk

sk Debbie Manery or Linda Dorsett why they enjoy operating Sidelines on the Boardwalk, and they will both tell you it's "great fun." The two owners of the combination seafood and gift store in Quathiaski Cove obviously love what they do.

"That's the idea behind it all. Going to gift shows, showcasing the work of local artists, selling seafood, and working at the dock right in the Cove—it doesn't get much better," affirmed Linda.

Sidelines, meaning "on the side", opened on July 1, 2006. The concept for Sidelines is all in the name. Linda was interested in a venue to sell her seafood, Dorsett Sea Products. As well, the owners felt that tourists arriving or leaving the island would appreciate the opportunity to shop for local art.

"We offer gifts on the side and seafood on the side. We're in a prime location—people need something to do while they're waiting for the ferry," said Linda.

Promoting local artists is important to Linda and Debbie. "We're honoured to have the work of local craftspeople and artists in here. We would have more if we had the space. There is so much talent here," said Debbie.

Linda observed that talented artists aren't always good at marketing themselves.

"It's important to have outlets for artists who want to get their work out there. We like to keep our consignment mark-up as low as we can, so everyone can make a little money."

Linda, Debbie, and Sherry Hayward were the original business owners in Sidelines. Sherry has since left and opened her own shop in Willow Point.

On June 1, 2007, Debbie and Linda relocated Sidelines from one side of the Harbour Authority building to a larger space on the ferry side. The bigger space and increased exposure has been good for business.

"I feel like we're ambassadors for the island," said Debbie. "We always welcome visitors, enquire about their vacation, and bid them goodbye. People from many different walks of life come in and are happy to chat. It's so much fun."

The outside of the store has a colourful, cheerful feel with wind spinners hanging from the eaves and stained glass pieces accenting the windows and walls. Deb, an avid gardener, has filled a planter made by her husband, Pat, with vibrant annuals. Marie from On Root Greenhouse donated a bench seat. It's a popular spot to sit and watch the world go by.

"We get lots of compliments. I love setting up stores. It's the ambiance you're creating," said Deb.

Inside, there is much more to see. Artwork from Quadra, Cortes, Read, Powell River, and Vancouver Island locations fills the store. If you're looking for a unique gift in wood, glass, shell, silver, stone, textiles, beads, moose hide, or even dried kelp—chances are you will find it at Sidelines.

"We've made every effort not to carry what other local gift shops are carrying. There are a lot of ideas out there, a lot of talented people," Debbie stated.

One of the most rewarding aspects of the business is interacting with local artists, she went on to say. They come in often, bringing new pieces and ideas. On Canada Day, Quadra artist Perri Sparks set up her easel at the store and drew portraits for people.

Debbie and Linda also bring in giftware and home décor items from further afield.

"We attend gift shows and choose stuff that's appropriate for our store. We have cast iron garden ornaments, oversized candle holders built for the outdoors, decorative tiles—we like to stock bigger items for wedding gifts and that kind of thing. A lot of our imports are from islanders' travels abroad."

Edible items include Linda's delicious "frozen at sea" prawn tails, halibut fillets, albacore tuna loins, ling cod fillets, and coho fillets. Swimming scallops, smoked salmon, canned smoked scallops, and honey—all from local suppliers—are also available.


Sidelines is open seven days a week during the "hot season." The store is also open at Christmas. Deb said Sidelines sees the majority of its male customers during the festive season.
