April Point Reunion 2007

Nostomania: a strong desire to return to the familiar

Sentimental recollection: a mixed feeling of happiness, sadness and longing when recalling a person, place or event from the past, or the past in general.

"Somewhere, somehow, I always run into someone who has worked for The Petersons at April Point. Inevitably, a happy conversation pursues recollecting people and events that evoke memories of a wonderful, exuberant time together. Then off we go into the void again, leaving me wondering whatever happened to so and so. From this came the idea to have a reunion", said Char Andrews, Event Coordinator for this reunion of past employees for The Petersons at April Point Lodge.

The Peterson Family and April Point Lodge have played a significant role in the history of the Campbell River & Quadra Island regional area. In 1945, Phil and Phyllis Peterson bought the property, then known as Poverty Point, on Quadra Island facing west to Seymour Narrows. In response to boaters looking for moorage and visitors needing a place to stay, they took 7 dilapidated fishing cabins that were built on a native midden, built cottages and a dock, and over the span of 52 years developed the property into the first 5 star Fishing Resort in the area.

Philip Peterson invited and introduced many of Hollywood's well-known movie stars of the time (John Wayne, Bob Hope, Bing Crosby and Mery Griffm to name just a few) to the area for guided fishing trips a tradition that carried on for 50 years with the likes of Julie Andrews, Blake Edwards, Angela Lansbury, Steve Bochco, Goldie Hawn and many more becoming regular guests.

Mrs. P became well-known for her fruit pies, "sticky buns", warm hospitality and iron hand in the kitchen, while Phil and son Thor started the first water taxi service in the area. In 1955, they landed the contract to ferry the workers, housed in Campbell River, to and from Maude Island in their 36; landing craft the "David Lee", during the two year tunnelling project that resulted in the Ripple Rock explosion in 1958. When Phil Peterson passed away in 1978, his widower, Mrs P. as she was affectionately known, and their grown children, Warren and Eric, continued the operations of the Lodge.

April Point hosted many national and international guests and events over the years. The most outstanding was the G8 Summit meeting of Japan, Germany, TJ:1e USA and Canada. As the Hotelier, Eric Peterson offered unique hospitality, enhancing April Point's world\-renowned reputation of exceptional guest service. It was at the G8 Summit that Eric introduced First Nations rituals and potlatch regalia to non-native guests outside of the private Longhouse ceremonies. He was also a generous philanthropist who encouraged artists in the fields of music, art and cultural pursuits. Many native masks and the works of local artists decorated the dining room and accommodations areas, providing them with outstanding venues to expose their artworks to an international audience.

The eldest son, Warren Peterson, coowner and manager of the fishing operations at April Point, was a long standing active member of the BC Sport Fishing Advisory Board, and served on the Federal Minister's Advisory Council and the Pacific Salmon Commission. He also initiated many salmonid conservation projects before conservation was a catch word. Donations, grants and the labour of the April Point guide staff resulted in the net\-pen rearing of over 5 million Chinook smolts released into the waters at the April Point Marina over a period of 22 years. Warren still continues this tradition today. There is so much more to this outstanding Gem of the Discovery Isles than can be told here...

After providing 50+ years of service to the Tourism and Hospitality Industry, April Point Lodge & Marina was sold to the Oak Bay Marine Group in 1998. So, you are cordially invited... The April Point era, as we knew and loved it, ended in 1997. Ten years later, we cordially invite you, as a past employee of the Peterson Family, to come celebrate and remember what you loved about your years at The Point. Join us for a cocktail reception and bring your memories to The Reunion at April Point Resort on Quadra Island on Saturday, September 1,2007 from 6pm to lam and/or a BBQ at Rebecca Spit on Sunday, September 2 from Noon until 4pm. Dear Ms. Chong,

It was with interest that I read the letter issued by your Ministry July 13, 2007 on the subject of restructuring of the Comox-Strathcona Regional District. I am writing from Quadra Island in Area J of the current CSRD to say that it has been apparent over a number of years that the Regional District has been out of step with the needs and visions of the Quadra Island and wider Area J community. In fact there has been considerable discussion notably in the aftermath of a particularly contentious zoning bylaw review in 2003 about possible alternatives to the existing local government model that Area J is a part of. The results have seen some innovative and inclusive attempts to augment our representation and communication with the CSRD but as it stands today our community is still struggling with finding an ideal system to meet our growing and changing community's needs.

Therefore the direction issued by your Ministry to restructure the CSRD is certain to be seen by many, not only in Area J but throughout the Regional District, as a golden opportunity to develop a much more effective and responsive local government model. While the devil as they say will be in the details I for one applaud any change and encourage your Ministry and the Comox-Strathcona Regional District to undertake a comprehensive dialogue with the communities concerned to ensure that this opportunity is not squandered and indeed does result in a new structure that will improve the representation and implementation of local services.

While I have your ear, and this is far from unrelated, I would like to express my interest in seeing the Province of British Columbia develop a pilot 'Green Community' project. As you are and your government and indeed much of the globe are aware urgent action is needed to develop more sustainable living practices. The challenges and expense of executing many of the changes needed at a provincial and federal level are enormous but it is my belief that the best way to start is through a series of small scale pilot projects. Quadra Island and Area J is possibly one of the best communities in British Columbia to consider for such a project. There are abundant natural resources, renewable energy sources, a small but growing population eager to develop a model community and the list goes on.

Columbia commit the funds to investigate the feasibility and subsequently develop the infrastructure and social engineering to make Quadra Island a truly sustainable community in everything from energy to food supply. The information gained from such a project would be invaluable in extending true sustainability across the North Island, British Columbia, Canada and ultimately could make BC a world leader in sustainability bringing all manner of economic return in emerging technologies. Taking a 'pilot-project' approach makes good, conservative financial sense in the quest to find what technologies and practices are successful.

With the restructuring of the CSRD on the horizon I believe there is no better time for such a project to be considered within the new Regional District. Both Quadra Island and Campbell River are unique in consideration for a sustainable community pilot because they are both at the doorstep of potentially explosive growth and now would be the time to engage in such a project before that growth outpaces the opportunity.

Thank you for your consideration of my ideas and again I stress my support for the restructuring of the CSRD.

BC Hydro and Alcan reach long-term energy agreement

VANCOUVER - BC Hydro and Alcan today announced a new long-term Electricity Purchase Agreement (EPA) that provides BC Hydro with an affordable, long-term supply of clean energy to help meet the growing demand for electricity in B.C.

"This agreement provides us with access to clean, affordable energy which will benefit our customers and help achieve the province's goal of electricity selfsufficiency by 2016," said Bob Elton, President and CEO of BC Hydro. "Our EPA with Alcan establishes a long-term contract, a fair price for the energy, and increases our storage capacity which gives us a greater ability to use non-firm, clean resources such as wind and run-of-river hydro."

In December 2006, the BC Utilities Commission (BCUC) rejected the previous agreement between BC Hydro and Alcan. Since then, the provincial government has released its new Energy Plan which established the goal of achieving electricity self-sufficiency, and ensuring that clean or renewable electricity continue to account for at least 90 per cent of total generation.

The 2007 agreement with Alcan includes a longer-term contract, lower contracted prices, extra capacity, and enhanced scheduling rights which allows more flexibility to schedule energy into highervalue peak-use periods.

The 2007 Electricity Purchase Agreement with Alcan is subject to the review and approval of the BC Utilities Commission. An application to the BCUC will be submitted in the next month.

Habitat for Humanity's First Campbell River Home Closer to Reality

Campbell River, BC - The City of Campbell River officially turns over a duplex lot to Habitat for Humanity Vancouver Island North today. A special property transfer ceremony took place this afternoon at 901 9th Street, the future building site for a duplex dwelling.

Mayor Roger McDonell was joined by representatives from Habitat for Humanity Vancouver Island North as well as Councillors Laird Ruehlen and Roy Grant.

"The City of Campbell River created an extraordinary opportunity for an additional residential property at this location by closing Maple Street. This is a one-time donation, and we're pleased to present it to Habitat for Humanity as a declaration of our support for their worthy efforts," says Mayor McDonell. The property is valued at approximately \$60,000.

Habitat spokesman Greg Phelps says support in Campbell River has been overwhelming since the idea was launched earlier this year. "Councillor Morgan Ostler attended a house blessing ceremony in the Comox Valley and quickly invited us to include Campbell River in Habitat's future plans, which we have done," he says. "Everywhere we go to talk about Habitat, the response is positive." Phelps adds that if their fund raising efforts continue at their current pace, they should be able to start building their first duplex in Campbell River in the spring.

Habitat for Humanity is a non-profit, faith-based housing program dedicated to the elimination of poverty by building homes in partnership with families in need. Habitat houses are sold to partner

families at no profit and are financed with affordable, no interest mortgages. Habitat for Humanity is NOT a give-away program. In addition to mortgage payments, the homeowner invests hundreds of hours of their own labour, called "sweat equity", into building their own home and the houses of others.

Habitat for Humanity also operates the ReStore on Willow Street in Campbellton, which is used to raise funds for house building projects. The ReStore sells used building supplies and household items, all of which are donated.


September 7th at the Old **School House Gallery**







Garden Club Presents Luis Richardson

September is perhaps the most serene time of year in the garden. Plants are gradually showing the first signs of the dormant season that will arrive in a few months. As perennials become less prevalent and the layers of evergreens and deciduous shrubs stand out, the 'Bones' of our gardens appear. By using local indigenous plants, you can develop a healthy, strong structure in your garden. Native flora are often the toughest, most drought tolerant and deer resistant choices, adding a richness to our landscapes.

The Garden Club's guest speaker for September is Luis Richardson (Msc), the Environmental Educator for Comox Strathcona Regional District, previously worked for the Greenways Land Trust. She will discuss the use of native plants in our landscape, especially for rock and sand habitat. As a naturalist and conservationist, Luis will explain how "native plants have adapted to our ecological area, the Georgia Depression Ecoprovince, over thousands of years and evolved under

similar conditions over millions of years. They are the ones who understand what it means to enjoy nine months of rain and three months of sunny drought. Each is suited to flourish in a specific habitat. Deep shade, sunny meadow or rocky outcrop."

On Monday September 10th 7pm at the Community Centre Luis' "workshop will introduce some of the growing conditions (sun, moisture, soil quality) available and suggest native plant combinations that could flourish in these conditions. With an enriched understanding of the ecology of the Georgia Depression, you will enrich your sense of place and harmony with local conditions. The right plant in the right location will also reduce the need for watering and pesticides in the long run, though the need to weed will not go awav!"

The Club meets at the Community Centre at 7pm, first Mondays of the month (with exceptions) from September to April. We share plants, magazines, and garden knowledge. Bring something beautiful, practical or curiously interesting for the show and tell table. Annual membership is \$10 which gives a discount at many local nurseries. Drop Ins \$2.



Global, on the whole, delivers the goods in the most entertaining and engaging manner...as compared to CNN's breathless take on everyday events, FOX's unwatchable drivel... or the three sister's (ABC, NBC, CBS) cloned version of the news, delivered by clones (or drones...take your pick) in a format that is almost indistinguishable individually. Of course, we also have the CBC, our official government mouthpiece that happens to do a pretty darned good job at what they do...but only under the restraints forced on them by their inescapable governmental ownership. Not that I'm knocking CBC's integrity, professionalism or lack of bias...they get top marks in all respects...but they simply don't have the charisma and conviviality presented on our local cable Channel 8 News at

None of the competition can hold a candle to Tony Parsons, Squire Barnes and their crew for providing a good solid look at daily life in Lotusland on a consistently entertaining basis particularly from 6PM to 7PM every night of the week, which, according to media statistics and backed up solidly by advertising airtime costs is the hottest block of time on the plain, TV wise, and Global BC owns it. So much so that the home team (broadcasting from my old stomping grounds in Burnaby) are the national face of Global News. The rest of the country, a good deal of which watch Global, get their nightly news from BC, which is a huge switch from when I was being inculcated into the world of television. Way back then, the real news came from Toronto - center of the Canadian universe in those days - or from Montreal on CBC, in which case it was incomprehensible to me and most of my cohort of the day. French – mandatory curriculum up to Grade 10 in the 70's - held little interest for me, so as a rule I watched the news on Channel 6 or Channel 8...CHAN and CHEK as they were known respectively at the time. Through the various maturations over the last 3 decades they have developed the single best news hour in Canada, and I congratulate them for it. I rely on Global as a news authority, which includes its commentators.

Global Morning News features a regular commentary by Dr. Art Hister, who delivers a layman's version of the world of news in medicine about 3 mornings a week. Today, he virtually certified my early demise by cardiac arrest because I am married. I'm not kidding... Dr. Art told us that people married to partners who bring home their work problems and share them with their partner actually accelerate the odds of the passive receptor having coronary problems by a factor of 3 times normal. The concept is sensible, and according to Dr. Art it is established fact.

Then, to add insult to injury, Dr. Art informs us that should your spouse (he used the word wife, but I'll go with a more generic label) be of the type that does NOT retain anger - in other words, they blow like Vesuvius at the moment of the incident - they, according to the scientists, will be 4 times LESS likely to have coronary problems. Makes absolute sense to me...I've always appreciated the fact that my spouse doesn't harbour grudges – with her, you takes your licking right up front, no BS tolerated. After it's done, we kiss and move on. Absolutely healthy, and I recommend it to anyone. However, I don't practise what I preach, though I am getting better at it. My mother often tells me about how her and my father would go for weeks without speaking because he was P.O.'d over some imagined slight, and it was hell for the family as a whole. Eventually, as the old

saying goes, it would blow over, and life would return to normal. My dad died when he was 73 years old, and I'll bet anything a good deal of the credit for his early demise can be attributed to his internalization of stress. At the rate I'm going, according to Dr. Art, I'll be lucky to see 60. Hence the title of this piece (with thanks to Jenn for the suggestion).

All kidding aside (I love you, dear...you know that) my wife will probably ADD years to my life, because she is a master at getting me off my not-so-fat behind and out to work on our dream home. During the week of August 13th we used some holiday time to work at home and fence our property, with the objective of keeping the dogs in and the deer out. Our project involved pounding in 137 or so fence posts and hanging somewhere in the neighbourhood of 1,100 feet of very heavy fencing wire. Let me tell you, I was never so glad to return to work the following week to relax. But we completed our project, and even worked well together, which is an achievement when you place two dominant personalities together and expect them to cooperatively complete a task. And that, my friends, is when I do my own "Green Mile" bit, and I puke up all the bad stuff – scatter it along with the drops of blood and sweat I contribute to our projects. Busting my butt is how I vent off my frustrations, though I have to admit that after 3 marriages I'm much more confident in standing up for myself, and I too will quickly vent my anger now...and dammit, it's a far sight better than going to bed angry at your partner. Hats off to Dr. Art and Global TV for covering the important stuff, and dispensing advise that is truly applicable, appropriate and useful. I know I can rely on CNN for up to minute (if somewhat biased) coverage, CBC for good solid news, but I'll always turn to Global BC and their team for an entertaining and useful source of information about us and our world. And if you don't tune in 6:50PM every Friday night for Squire's "Satellite Debris" submissions...man, your just not living life to the max.

Not Finishing Job Adds To Overload Problems

Overloads at all four ferry terminals have been a daily occurrence for most of the summer. About the only compensation has been the generally cooler weather: most days cars haven't turned into ovens on wheels while we wait and wait some more.

Quathiaski Cove has been especially problematic. After widening the road on the hill last winter to create another lane, BC Ferries failed to paint lines and put up signs to guide traffic into the additional lane and reduce the frequency of traffic backing up all the way around the corner by the Q. Cove shopping centre.

At the Ferry Advisory Committee meeting on Cortes in May, FAC members stressed the need for signage so there could be two useful holding lanes on the hill.

Instead, BC Ferries' managers talked about having a second lot attendant to manage vehicles on the hill. Unfortunately, they didn't hire a second attendant to work the busiest times of the days in July and August. They opted to call in a second person after the traffic had already become unmanageable for one person.

There is a new terminal manager for our area, Kim Macaulay, who says she is talking to the planning, operations and maintenance departments about solving these problems.

Ms. Macaulay emailed me that she has contacted "the Terminal Maintenance department outlining some of the issues and some simple solutions that need to be addressed.

"We are pursing line painting to define the holding lanes on the hill, in addition to obtaining better signage at the top of the hill for motor vehicle traffic," she said.

May it come to pass before next summer...

Assured Loading, Cortes-Style

At Whaletown, the Cortes ferry has often returned at the end of the day to find a full load of vehicles already parked in the lineup for the first sailing the next morning. This is the Cortes method of assured loading.

Many of these vehicles arrive before the last sailing of the day leaves Whaletown,

fooling unsuspecting visitors into thinking they won't get off the island that day. Lining up after the 5:50 boat has loaded would show more consideration for fellow travelers.

Last winter the FAC investigated the possibility of a reservation system for Cortes, but BC Ferries was only willing to plug Cortes into the existing program for reserving travel on the mainland-Vancouver Island routes.

This would have given commercial traffic assured loading without paying anything extra while passenger vehicles would have been charged \$15 more than the fare to go from Whaletown to Heriot Bay. Commercial traffic on the big ferries has to guarantee fare payment with a credit card or on a BC Ferries account when making a reservation but is only charged a \$25 penalty if they don't show up.

Negative feedback on Cortes led to the FAC dropping the idea. Instead, many Cortesians are making two roundtrips from home to Whaletown with a second vehicle to put one in the lineup the night before and get themselves back to the terminal the next morning.

Most of the Cortes population lives at the south end--about 20 kms from the terminal. So a second vehicle is driven 80 kms to achieve the same result as a reservation. Not only does this take the time of two drivers, it is also a fuel expense and added contribution to carbon dioxide in the atmosphere, albeit a minor one compared to the 120+ million litres of fuel BC Ferries burns every year.

The Ferries & GHG

At our May FAC meeting, there was a detailed presentation by a Cortes Islander expressing concern about carbon emissions from the ferries contributing to global warming and climate change.

Along with allowing fuel surcharges, the Ferry Commissioner required BC Ferries to find ways of reducing fuel consumption by 1% a year over the last two years. Engine refits, hull resurfacing, fuel monitors and better operating practices have accomplished that. But that effort is being driven by economics, not environmental concerns. They are just looming on the horizon for BC Ferries.

Premier Gordon Campbell has said the provincial government is committed to a 33% reduction in greenhouse gas (GHG)

emissions over the next 12 years. Whether BC Ferries, in its privatized reincarnation from a Crown corporation in 2003, is subject to Campbell's mandate is not clear yet.

For example, the Cortes ferry burns, on average, 216 litres of fuel per roundtrip.

For the year ending March 31, 2006, it made 2,155 roundtrips and carried 62,182 vehicles, averaging 14-15 vehicles per one-way trip, which amounts to 48% of deck capacity. The distance from Whaletown to Heriot Bay is 6.2 nautical miles or 11.5 km. (A nautical mile is 1,852 meters.)

Assuming 2,155 roundtrips @ 216 liters per roundtrip consumed 465,480 liters of diesel and that 62,182 vehicles moving 11.5 kms is the equivalent of driving one vehicle 715,093 kms, then the ferry was burning one litre of fuel to move each vehicle 1.53 kms.
