Ferry Protest

Over the past few years BC ferries has been increasing our ferry fares at an alarming rate. As a result, some island residents have moved away or are considering it, others are changing jobs, some have bought a second vehicle to be left at Campbell River, and most of us have reduced our ferry use as much as possible. On August 1rst I found myself shocked and outraged at the amount of the latest fare/fuel increase: more than 21 %. I also know that the increases will keep on coming regularly and painfully with our island lifestyle becoming the main casualty.

With the latest increase, BC ferries has provided walk-on ferry commuters with a protest action that a group of us started on August 8th. The ferry fares are now so high that we can commute at a lower cost with the Discovery Launch Taxi service (located in the same marina as the ferry) for \$5.00 each. We have two scheduled runs from Campbell River to Quathiaski Cove Monday through Friday at 04:30 p.m and at 05:25 p.m. except holidays (bicycles are always welcome). To make this protest action successful we required an average of 10 commuters per run and I must happily note that we have been exceeding our goals every day so far with up to 30 commuters per day. The water taxi is very comfortable, gets you home earlier and will shuttle and leave no person behind if the scheduled run is full.

This protest action might not cause BC ferries much pause or concern although revenue seems to be the big issue for them so far. I'm simply thrilled to be giving my commuting fare to a very supportive local taxi company instead of to the large heartless corporation/government. I'm hoping that our protest action will help to show the corporation/government that enough is enough.

If a large number of us decide to support the alternate use of the water taxi service we could expand the schedule and possibly choose departure times at our convenience.

I would like to thank Discovery Launch water taxi service for their tremendous support with this endevour.

Obituary -James Raymond Westhaver

Quadra Island lost one of its long-term residents with the passing of Jim Westhaver on June 2nd. Jim, who was forty-six at the time of his death, was born in London, Ontario and raised through his school years in Halifax, Nova Scotia.

Jim had been a resident of Quadra Island for at least twenty years and was known locally as "Jimmy Walker" as he was often seen walking the roads of the Island to and from his home, the post office, or the stores. He was known as "Jimbo" to the many friends he would regularly meet at Café Aroma to share a coffee and a cigarette while discussing local gossip and other affairs of state.

Unhappily, Jim had misfortunes in his life especially in the past few years when medical problems would often weigh heavily on him with different medications relieving one symptom but creating side effects for which other medications were taken. Despite his poor health, Jim was not a complainer - he soldiered on and made the best of his circumstances. Jim was a friendly fellow and always had a smile and a good word for everyone he met as well as much appreciation for small kindnesses which people showed him.

Jim was a regular reader of the Good Book and was known to pray for his own sins and for the sins of others. If he had a fault it was that he was too accepting of people and, as a consequence, was from time-to-time, taken advantage of despite his poor circumstances and meagre resources.

He regularly attended the community lunches at the Quadra Community Centre and, in early April, was feted on the occasion of his birthday, an event that left him with a smile from ear to ear. During the past year or so he had reestablished contact with his mother in Halifax, Nova Scotia and he was proud and happy to have done so, remarking often how much it meant to him to have a telephone call or a card or note from her.

Jim is survived by his mother, Veronica Wagner, of Halifax, Nova Scotia, his brothers Bruce of Fernie, BC, and Michael of Calgary, Alberta, his sisters Tammie Hart of Halifax, Belinda McMullin of Halifax, Sabrina McMullin of Dartmouth, Nova Scotia, and Brenda Westhaver of Calgary and by numerous nephews and nieces. He was pre-deceased by his father, Raymond, and by an older brother, Kim.

Jim was cremated at Sutton's Funeral Home in Campbell River and his ashes were sent to his family in Halifax where a memorial service was held. While the exact cause of death has not been determined, the Quadra RCMP report that the Coroner has ruled his death to be from natural causes.

Jim's many Quadra friends have raised close to \$500 in donations for a memorial bench and plaque. A beautiful bench of natural woods has been fabricated by Tom Bremer with the assistance of Art Saull and is now in place at Café Aroma where Jim spent many a happy hour. A commemorative plaque of black granite has been fabricated by Richard Di Benedetto of Heriot Bay. It is expected that a short service will be held for Jim in the near future at Café Aroma, by his friends, with date and time to be announced by poster at the Café.



Bylaw No. 3

The purpose of this bylaw is to rezone the island legally described as "Lot 956, Walkem Island (Formerly Pender Island), Range 1, Coast District containing 43.3 hectares (107.0 acres), more or less" from Rural Three (RU-3) to Rural Two (RU-2) for a proposed 18 to 21 lot strata subdivision; and to rezone the foreshore area legally described as "Unsurveyed foreshore of the Johnston Strait, Sayward District containing 3.0 hectares (7.4 acres), more or less" [Expired ILMB lease tenure File No. 1043024] from Access Two (AC-2) to Access One (AC-1) to allow for a dock and moorage facility, as shown on the map below.

Bylaw No. 8

This bylaw, if adopted, would allow a temporary industrial use permit (TIUP) for log dumping and storage at nine specific sites within the Discovery Islands – Mainland Inlets (Electoral Area 'J') for portions of the areas legally described as part of District Lots 303 and 1798, and Unsurveyed Crown Foreshore or Land Covered by Water being the Bed of Cooper Reach, Range 1, Coast District and which are shown on the map below.



A copy of the proposed bylaw and related information may be viewed at the regional district office, 600 Comox Road, Courtenay, BC between 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, excluding holidays from Monday, August 25, 2008 until Tuesday, September 9, 2008 or at <u>www.strathconard.ca</u>. Anyone who believes the proposed bylaw will affect their interests will be given an opportunity to speak at the public hearing.

Legally, the SRD cannot consider any representations made after the close of the public bearing. If you cannot attend the public hearing, all written submissions, mailed or electronic, <u>must be received</u> by this office no later than 4:30 p.m., Tuesday, September 9, 2008.

Prose Poems: Quadra Island 1923-1937


Barbara Greene is a 85 year old former resident of Quadra Island from 1923-1937. She's coming to Quadra Island to read her own prose poems about growing up on Quadra. This is a once in a lifetime event that will make Quadra Island history come alive.

Barbara grew up on Quadra, was born in 1923 in a Mission Hospital at Rock Bay, the site of a logging camp and lived in Quathiaski Cove at the top of the old Store hill, opposite the Wiseman's, who lived in the former jail house. When her parson father became the Superintendent of the Columbia Coast Mission in 1937, the family moved to Vancouver. There she attended high school and university, leaving in 1945 for Post Graduate studies in Social Work at the University of Toronto.

After 10 years as a group and community worker in Toronto and Vancouver, she took off for Europe where she lived for 15 years in Spain and England, eventually becoming a freelance broadcaster in radio and television. In 1970, she returned to Canada, working as a documentary film director at the C.B.C. and the National Film Board.

Finally, in the 80's, she moved back to the coast and made her home on Lasqueti Island. Upon her return to the coast, she wrote a series of prose poems based on her childhood on Quadra.

Now, at the age of 85, she would like to share some of these memories with the people of Quadra, the island that gave her such a marvellous beginning for her long and eventful life. Come hear Barbara will be reading her prose poems on Saturday, September 20 at the Aroma Cafe from 7:30 p.m. to 9: 30 p.m. So even if you're an "old-timer" on Quadra, Barbara's prose poems will take you back even further into the mysteries of our collective communal history. The Ubiquitous Bag

The 500 billion plus plastic bags made and discarded every year have been spotted as far south as the Falkland Islands and as far north as Spitsbergen, Norway – a place so deep within the Arctic Circle that it is the site of a doomsday seed vault.

Several African nations have banned the bags because they foster mosquito breeding. In India they have caused deadly floods by clogging storm drains. Cows in that country commonly die from eating them. Veterinarians in Bhuj removed 4000 bags weighing 45 kilograms from the stomach of one.

This is the first in a series of articles by the Island Climate Action

Network (I-CAN) and Sierra Quadra to examine the problems caused by plastic bags and to explore solutions.

The bags are becoming so ubiquitous that David Barnes, a British scientist who studies the impact of marine debris, predicts "they'll be washing up in the Antarctica within a decade." And since they can take up to a thousand years to break down, that impact is especially devastating.

A Japanese study found that small plastic particles soak up toxic chemicals like PCB's and DDE (a breakdown product of DDT) a million fold more than seawater. When marine animals eat them, they can die from the toxins or from blocked intestines. Sea turtles are particularly susceptible because they mistake the bags for jellyfish.

Whether lining trash cans or holding pet droppings, plastic bags have made our lives easier. Recycled, they can be used in building materials. But in a time of dwindling resources, we need to weigh that against their total cost. They are petroleum-based products that require toxic chemicals and often natural gas to come into being. And they give off greenhouse gases.

More and more cities and countries around the globe are awakening to the problem. Even China, not known as an environmental leader, has banned the bag. Ireland imposed a 20-cent (CDN) tax per bag in 2002. Within a year, the tax caused a 90 percent reduction in use and raised \$18 million for the nation's recycling program. Many stores sell reusable cloth bags.

Addressing this predicament is a bottoms up process that we can all easily and quickly be part of.

Discovery Islanders are resourceful and resilient. We can solve this in no time. Stay tuned.



few weeks ago I received a call from a reader named Susan, who asked that I write a column about the current economic environment, specifically from an investment perspective. Like most of us, Susan is concerned about making investments at a time when most of the fundamental indicators are flashing "caution" at best, while at the same time the global geo-political situation is tremendously unstable. I would first confess that I am in the same boat as everyone else, and my present investment strategy could best be described as "duck and cover". I am definitely on the sidelines when it comes to new investment activity, but that being said, I - like Susan - need to do something as my return on uninvested capital is barely keeping up with inflation, presently on the rise. Hopefully a conclusion of use to all of us will be the result of the following analysis.

One of the most authoritative sources of information on macroeconomics is Stephen S. Roach, Chairman of investment giant Morgan Stanley's Asian operations and former Chief Economist of the same firm. Roach has had an excellent track record in predicting major shifts affecting global and regional economies; in the past 6 years he has been "bearish" in his outlook and today is even more so. He recently authored a paper for his employer titled "Pitfalls in a Post-Bubble World", in which he concludes that we are only in the early stages of a significant shakeout resulting from the "irrational exuberance" of the past decade. He points the blame for the mess squarely at the USA, where greed, government myopia and consumers on a credit binge have run up a huge bill that is coming due. "America went to excess and the rest of an export-dependant world was more than happy to go along for the ride. Policy makers and regulators...looked the other way and allowed the system to veer out of control. Investors, businesspeople, financial institutions and consumers were all active participants in the Era of Excess".

Sharing the blame is China, the largest beneficiary of America's addiction to new stuff, and whose government policies have put that nation's economy at serious risk when Americans ultimately stop buying. Roach believes we are in the early stages of a financial crisis that may take 10 years to work itself out, and that only if some fundamental rethinking occurs as regards consumption, taxation and globalization, particularly in the USA. "The global economy is facing a multi-year rebalancing as it now reins in its appetite for unsustainable growth". While Japan and India are both equally over-dependant of exports to the USA, China is especially vulnerable to the decline in US consumption Roach sees coming, if indeed it hasn't already started... "The responses to a major weakening in US demand by Asia's export-led economies are now triggering powerful repercussions across markets and economies in an interdependent world". He is forecasting a 20-30% drop in global GDP growth going forward, and that the business cycle has already turned.

In terms of the impact of Roach's predicted slowdown, it is clear he sees no sector that will remain untouched. The meltdown in financial markets due to the "sub-prime" crisis is far from over in his view, and the eventual cost has not cycled through the markets yet. The good news though, is that he sees this phase - with its attendant credit crisis - as almost complete, but its impact on the markets is not over. A secondary element - the withdrawal of the overextended US consumer as a factor in new growth (Roach predicts a 50% decline in US consumer spending) - has only just begun, so the impact on manufacturers is not yet evident. Roach believes we are only 20% of the way through this adjustment. And finally, the impact on the global economy of post-bubble consumer retraction has barely even started.

Roach is predicting the following impacts on the financial markets. Equity markets are not, as some analyst's write, near the end of a short-term decline. The recent declines are due largely to the sub-prime disasters impact on financial stocks, and he sees further declines in the markets as the contagion of lower growth and earnings shifts from financial to non-financial stocks. Therefore new equity investments should be made with supreme caution. Bonds are another area that he views with some trepidation, given rising inflation pressures and the potential for higher interest rates down the road. The currency markets will continue to gyrate with the US dollar, which Roach believes to be significantly overvalued; in spite of recent gains he sees it re-entering a downward spiral by early 2009, which is not good news for most.

Finally, commodities, which have been the subject of much investor interest recently. Here's Roach's view – "A year from now, I believe that economically sensitive commodity prices – oil, base metals and other industrial materials – will be a good deal lower than they are today." Interestingly though, he continues, "Soft

commodities – mainly agricultural products – as well as precious metals could well be the exception to that outcome." This belief is based upon two events; the first being a restoration in supply/demand imbalances as global growth [demand] slows for commodities, but more importantly by a pull-back in commodity speculation by large institutional buyers, who have been following a herd mentality in the recent past, and whose activities have artificially driven up prices. Those days, say Roach, are over, but as he cautions "I would be the first to concede that my own record in calling the end of the commodity bubble has been nothing short of terrible over the past 3 years".

Unfortunately, Roach concludes that major authorities, particularly the US and Chinese governments, are not facing up to their mounting economic problems, nor taking the hard steps in reversing a problem that has been decades in the making. "The body politics in both nations is clinging steadfastly to its core values - that rapid economic growth is the antidote to any and all problems. Concerns regarding the sustainability of that growth are being deferred to that proverbial "another day"." This ultimately means the problems for both nations, and therefore a huge chuck of the global economy, will become a lot worse before meaningful governmental actions can have any effect. Right now the USA is busy bailing out its financial and automobile industries, something they can ill afford with a current account deficit of some \$800 billion and external debt of \$13 trillion. And China is facing wage inflation of 15% while prices for its manufactured exports are dropping, as will volume, according to Roach.

What is one to conclude from all of this? A loose interpretation may be that some financial stocks are now as beaten up as they will get, and hence a bargain. If that is so, why then did the US Congress just authorize unlimited resources to bail them out? Apparently, consumers will be a lot more careful with their spending, so certain sectors will gain while a great deal more will lose - sorting one from the other will be an investors research challenge. Roach seems to feel precious metals may evade coming commodity price declines, but are they already overvalued with little room to move upward? Will inflation cause interest rates to rise, and housing prices to fall? The only thing I can conclude is that investing today is not for the faint of heart, and sticking within one's comfort zone is a must. Mother Mother Band Returns to Quadra _{вута}

uadra-raised siblings Ryan and Molly Guldemond are bringing their Vancouver-based band, Mother Mother, home for two early September concerts at Quadra Community Centre.

On September 4 the five-member modern pop band will play an all-ages concert opened by Courtenay-rooted vocalist Jasmin Parkin. September 5 is the date for Mother Mother's 19 + licensed dance, with local band Bonafide reuniting to open.

Both concerts promise to be different from anything Quadra audiences have heard in the past, featuring brand new songs from the band's soon-to-be released second CD, 'O My Heart'. The CD's release date is September 16, but you can hear three tracks now by visiting www.mothermothersite.com

When I reached him in Vancouver by phone, Ryan was catching his breath between completing the songwriting and recording of their new CD, shooting a video for the title track, and preparing for their upcoming Canadian and US tours.

Since the Discovery Islander last profiled Mother Mother in 2006, much has happened to garner the band an established following. At that time the band's name was 'Mother', since changed to 'Mother Mother' to avoid legal hassles from other bands with the single maternal moniker.

"The past two years? Oh, we haven't done much of anything," laughed Ryan, who is refreshingly modest for a musician who has achieved so much at the age of 25.

"It has been a steady climb. We're still very much a formative band, but we're definitely not 'nowhere'. It's such a fickle industry—you never know what's going to catch fire and when."



If the comments from appreciative fans on the band's MySpace page (reached via the Mother Mother website) are any indication, 'O My Heart' is going to be very popular with audiences.

"Love what I have heard of the new stuff," wrote one listener. Another wrote: "AHHH it's still forever until the album comes out. Seriously, I can't wait... Anyways, thank you for being part of the soundtrack to my life."

Fans from various points in North America and as far away as Holland have requested that Mother Mother visit their part of the world. Mother Mother has been nominated for an XM Satellite Radio, Channel 52 'The Verge' contest in two categories: Band of the Year and CD of the Year. The awards are worth \$25,000 each and the winners will be determined by popular vote at www. indiecan.com

"It seems like a long shot, but it's nice to be nominated," Ryan said.

'O My Heart' is Mother Mother's second album under the Last Gang label ('Touch Up', their first album, was recorded independently in 2005 and re-released by Last Gang in 2007). Howard Redekopp has produced both albums.

'O My Heart' was recorded in Vancouver at Mushroom Studios (drum and bass) and a smattering of smaller studios (vocals and dubs), then mixed at Brian Adams' Warehouse Studio in Gastown.

"We put in really long hours, working under pretty harsh time constraints. We had a decent budget—a little bit more money than for our first album-so there were definitely some upgrades of the process. At the same time it still felt pretty guerilla," Ryan said.

The result is much more cohesive than their first CD, Ryan noted. "It really sounds like a band effort-it's lusher, with a bigger sound. The whole thing has matured a couple of notches."

Band members Ryan, Molly, Debra-Jean Creelman, Jeremy Page, and Ali Siadat have enjoyed adding new sounds to their repertoire. Molly is now playing keyboards in addition to her role as one of the vocalists, Jeremy is a talented horn player (sax and clarinet), and Ali samples and "rips" sounds off the album.

A string quartet, trumpets, and horns add an orchestral side to some of the songs on the CD, Ryan added. Thematically, the CD's subjects vary, but on the whole are "less cheeky and playful" than those on 'Touch Up'.

"There are a couple of love songs, but they're not your classic love songs as they refer to being dead and in love. There are some anatomical thematics as well," Ryan noted. "A song called 'Body of Years' talks about vour body through the lifetime-things you pick up along the way and things you hide at the end."

Ryan describes 'Wisdom' as "an adolescent expression of ignorance" and the closing track, 'Sleep Awake', sung by Molly, as being "about paranoia."

Writing the follow up to their successful first album wasn't easy, Ryan acknowledged. "With any craft you mature and just get better at it. Emotionally, I went through some turmoil when writing this catalogue just trying to deal with the pressure of following up our first recorded effort that was favourably received."

Despite the challenges, Ryan feels he came out of the experience in a better place than where he started and a better songwriter for it.

"I'm back to the place where things are coming naturally again. You get back to that thing you like to do."

Ryan said it is nice to have "apt people" on board, including an agent who books their tours and a manager to oversee everything. "Now we just need to find people to rehearse for us," he joked.

Ryan pointed out that bands need to be multifarious to make money these days. He commented that touring is a key part of making a living with music today, because the way music is sold has changed.

"People don't line up at record stores anymore. Now that songs are linked to the Internet, they download an album overnight and listen to it on their I-pod in the morning."

He went on to say that musicians have to be entrepreneurs. At the same time, he appreciates that Mother Mother is in control of their image and their business.

"We're all going through business boot camp. I'm definitely the defacto leader, but we're very collaborative on every level. Molly designs every stitch of the art for our merchandise, CD designs, and online promotion. It's nice working with a record label that is happy with the band's aesthetic contribution. This way we discover our image over time, as opposed to it being this thing suddenly thrust upon us.'

Ready to "throw the new album out to the world, stand behind it, and let it do what it does," Ryan plans to continue having fun and working hard with friends and family.

He and Molly are looking forward to their upcoming gigs at home on Quadra. "The local support is very precious to us and why we'd like to keep coming back. We're going to put on two great shows."
