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

Area C Regional Director's Report



January 30, 2009

This will possibly be a longish article but please take the time to read it. There are so many things going on right now that you need to know about and in some cases, participate in. So I will just dive in and get started.

Snow removal

The issue of snow removal has been on the top of the list for the past month. It has been an incredible year for having back to back snow storms!

I would like to say thanks to our dedicated crew at Emcon for all of their hard work and long hours during the holiday season and acknowledge the sacrifices they made regarding being "home for the holidays". They had their challenges and faced them the best that they could. Equipment breakdowns at the worst possible times set them back considerably and made it very hard to begin to catch up. But they valiantly tried. I know that there are complaints out there by a number of people. Overall, our crew gave us great service and they should be congratulated for that.

In future snow events, I would encourage you to call the Emcon office directly at 285-3524 and leave a message of what your need is. Hugh will get back to you. If you call and cannot get through and there is a need for a specific service in a specific area, please call direct to the dispatch office at 1-866-353-3136. You will get an operator who can directly contact the crew by radio and deal with your concern. This is the very best method of dealing with a crisis, so please use it.

House numbers

As many of you may know, I was out removing snow for people with my tractor. I noted in many places that I worked that house numbers were either non-existent or were obscured or very hard to see. In my case, this was an inconvenience. In the case of an emergency it could be devastating to the resident. I supply, through the Regional District and the 911 Corporation, map books for all of our emergency service providers. They can find the area of your home. But let's not make them work at it to find specific houses. Identifying your driveway clearly, is for your own benefit. Please have a look at your house numbers and see if they need a bit of sprucing up.

Bute Inlet private power projects

This is the most important thing that you could possibly do this year. Please read on.

The terms of reference have been released by the Environmental Assessment Office (EAO) and are at: http://a100.gov.bc.ca/appsdata/epic/ html/deploy/epic_project_home_316.html

After many days of making phone calls and writing letters (right up to the Premier's office), a small group of us managed to get them to agree to hold a public meeting and open house in Campbell River. The only ones they had scheduled were on the Sunshine Coast, even though all of the project area is within Area C (the area that I represent) and the nearest centre is Campbell River. The meeting will be on Monday, February 2, 2009, from 4 to 8 pm at the Quinsam Hall which is up at Quinsam Crossing (Willis Rd. and the Inland Island Highway).

It is so very crucial for people to attend this meeting. This could be our one chance to express our views and concerns about a project that will see 17 run of the river facilities, a huge substation near the mouth of the Southgate River, miles and miles of associated access roads and associated works, along with 443 km's of high-voltage transmission lines running all over Bute Inlet. This project is massive to say the least. Many of my constituents have spent many years promoting and developing eco-tourism and recreation businesses in this area and are likely to be heavily impacted by this proposal. Your voice needs to be heard and your written comments need to be received. If the input warrants it, there could be a Federal Review Panel required which will be far more detailed and comprehensive with more public input. Your input at this stage will help to determine that need, so please make an effort to attend and to write comments. You can send comments directly to the Federal Canadian Environmental Assessment Agency, attention Marie-France Therrien at bute.review@ceaa-acee.gc.ca and to the Provincial Environmental Assessment Office, attention Kathy Eichenberger, at eaoinfo@gov.bc.ca Please do send your comments to both.

I hope to see the hall packed with people from our area. We live here because of the natural beauty and Bute Inlet is a large contributor to the sustainability of our natural ecosystems and to the wild nature of where we live. Please attend. Regional District Task Force

The Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM) (I was president 2000/2001) has struck a task force with the provincial government to look at what changes need to be made to RD's in the next few years. I have been asked to contribute through the members of the task force and I have been doing that by email and phone. They have an ambitious timeline and hope to have a report ready for local government review prior to our annual convention in September. I am doing my best to make suggestions that will make our rural governance system be as good as it can get.

Granite Bay wharf update

We are continuing to meet with the RD and with Marine Harvest, to finalize our plans to upgrade the floats at Granite Bay, using the model that I developed in past pursuits of local government, community and industry coming together to make things work for the community at little or no cost to the taxpayer. We had a very good meeting a couple of weeks ago and all have our "tasks" to perform. We will meet again on Feb. 3rd with final plans and tasks and then the work of assembling. shipping and installing will commence. A great deal of the material and services are being donated, the engineering drawings are done and now all that we need is to firm up the volunteer list. So, if you are willing to work on this very exciting addition to Granite Bay Park, please contact me as soon as possible. We will need some folks to work on assembly in CR and some to work on installation at Granite Bay. Don't be shy!

Village project update

I am not going to say much about this at this point. We are discussing the issue at the January board meeting on the 28th to deal with some issues. After we have done that I will be able to fill you in on where we are at on this exciting project for Quathiaski Cove. This is still at the top of the list.

Strathcona Regional District (SRD) organization

Well, we are getting settled in at the SRD. We now have a permanent Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) and a great receptionist / secretary, that does everything right. I just had a two hour meeting with the CAO to discuss where we are going with the SRD. We are planning to have a facilitated strategic planning session and a number of goal setting sessions in the next two months. We are also getting some training, offered by the UBCM, so that we all know our roles, duties and procedures. We have a number of new people on the board that are a delight to work with.

My main focus in the organization of the SRD will be to make it small, focused and efficient. I will not accept a clone of the huge bureaucracy that had developed in the Comox Strathcona RD. We will hire those that we cannot do without and work it out from there. Our costs will go down and we will become an effective team that will be able to deal with our local issues and effectively lobby the provincial and federal governments concerning those issues that we do not control. I am optimistic and look forward to working with this new team in the coming year. We have many projects ongoing on Quadra Island and in the outer islands and I look forward to the support of our new organization.

Seniors' housing

It has come to my attention that the seniors' housing project in the Cove that has been underway for many years just hit a speed bump. All of the regulatory issues have been dealt with through the RD and I have ensured that the zoning and all siting permits, etc. went through smoothly in the past. It was brought to my attention recently that the development permit that the RD issued a number of years ago had an expiry date on it. So, a new one was required and the cost would be \$3,800.00. I was approached by Ken Duncan of the seniors' housing group and a grant in aid was requested. I have put www.discovervislander.ca

that through to the SRD board and the cheque should be in the mail very soon. I hope this is the last bureaucratic hurdle that the group has to jump so that they can get on with construction.

Duck crossing clarification

I have saved the best for last. A few issues back I explained my involvement in getting the "duck crossing" sign across from the gas station in front of the school garden and pond. I did request the sign from the Ministry of Highways and they did agree to put one up. What I did not know was that at the very same time Sierra Quadra had suggested to a teacher (Bridget Walshe) that the students make a sign to warn traffic of ducks crossing the road. As she was the sponsor teacher for the Naturalist club she asked Savannah Pare (grade 5) to design a sign. She drew the design and the naturalist club raised money to pay for the sign to be made by Sarah at Quadra building supply. Emcon Services then erected the sign. I guess that the Ministry of Highways still owes us a duck crossing sign! So there you go! My report can actually end on a happy note that demonstrates how community involvement can get things done.

There are many more things that I am working on and that are in progress but I think that is enough for this issue. I don't want to try your patience any more than I already have! Friday Flicks Tonight Brick Lane

At 17, Nazneen enters an arranged marriage with Chanu and is flown from Bangladesh to London to live with her husband in Brick Lane, an East End immigrant community. Schooled in silent endurance, Nazneen accepts being sent from her home to a much older husband, but she considers marriage as a petty tyranny and longs for more in life. When she starts her own sewing business, Nazneen awakens to a sense of autonomy. Her husband begins to painfully recognize his own limitations.

The 9/11 terrorist attacks send the drama into political territory. As the rapidly changing racial politics of England take shape around her dingy housing estate, Nazneen tries to accept her fate. When she meets a young convert to radical Islam, her world is completely shaken.

BRICK LANE "achieves that rarest quality: nobility" (Baltimore Sun). It evokes Bangladeshi tradition and modernism colliding in the streets of London, and demands its characters carry the weight of this difficult balance, an act that "lies at the heart of every great migrant journey of the soul" (Village Voice).



Next At Friday Flicks My Brother Is An Only Child

February 13th

Same place, same time, same price.

The period is the sixties and the place is Italy. MY BROTHER IS AN ONLY CHILD examines the intimate canvas of family, specifically the relationship between brothers. Sometimes, under a torrent of social pressures, water runs faster, if not thicker, than blood.



As the film opens in a small town outside Rome, Accio, the feisty youngest son, is busy exploring his first "ism" - Catholicism. His vigorous dedication to seminary school soon falls prey to puberty and the wiles of hormones. Back at home, the boy grows up and looks for ways to distinguish himself from his brother, the charismatic Manrico. A Casanova and a budding radical, Manrico employs his certainty and his charisma to unite the workers of the world.

The script plumbs the vulnerable emotions that lie behind ideological convictions; the human psychology hidden in the seams of any political uniform. As Accio's character develops, he eventually stumbles toward the final "ism" - humanism. With his ideological blinkers removed, Accio can see not only the frailties of others, but also his own.

The film beautifully evokes the existential loneliness of brothers locked in solitudes, each one an only child who dearly needs the other. Actor, Elio Germano's Accio electrifies the film with his hyper-reactive character. He flickers between brash, bashful, playful, and awkward. "A Swiss Army knife performance that's diverse and yet totally unified" (The Village Voice).



Dinner specials at many Quadra restaurants will be offered to festival attendees, (look for specifics at the fair). So treat yourself to a whole day off!



A History of the Women of the Discovery Islands

Women were in the extreme minority among the first Euro-Canadian settlers on the Discovery Islands. Their isolation imposed hardships not experienced by their urban counterparts, but it also opened new opportunities for selfdetermination. Jeanette Taylor will give a digital slide presentation about the women of the islands at Quadra Community Center at 7:00 p.m. on February 16.



Taylor's talk is based upon her new book, Tidal Passages, a History of the Discovery Islands. Following in the same vein as the book, she'll present cameo profiles of a dozen individuals to describe island life from ancient times among the First Nations people to World War II. Among them are women who conformed to the norm, says Taylor, running homesteads and raising children. But there noteworthy exceptions whose circumstances thrust them into unconventional roles or forced them to break the strict Victorian code of conduct. Among the latter are Gilean Douglas of Cortes Island, who insisted two of her four husbands take her last name, and Lilly Joy Ward who refused to marry because of the dictates of her Theosophist faith.

Taylor says there are many tales of endurance and hardihood among these women. Annie Hill, the daughter of a high-ranking Klahoose chief, chose to remain on an isolated reserve with her children after her husband was jailed for murder. Neither Florence Walker of Bute Inlet nor Alice Robertson of Cortes were raised on farms. While Alice embraced her new life, living off the land, Florence and her family left their fertile land in Bute Inlet within seven years, leaving behind the graves of three daughters.

Tidal Passages, released in hardcover by Harbour Publishing in November, includes all of the Discovery Islands save Quadra, which is the subject of a second volume to be released this fall. The hardcover edition of Tidal Passages sold out within weeks at Christmas. The paperback edition will be available at Taylor's talk, through Robin King of Book Bonanza. There will also be a coffee bar, with proceeds going to a young mother in Campbell River. Admission is by donation, as a benefit to the Community Center's playground project.

He has published 21 books, most recently his selected poems, "Return to Open Water", and his cultural history of B.C., "The Wolves at Evelyn: Journeys through a Dark Century," which won the 2007 George Ryga Prize for Social Responsibility in Literature. Joanne Arnott is Metis, an aboriginal love poet, mother to six, all born at home, and an arts/community organizer. Her poetry, essays and vignettes appear in anthologies and journals, and in her six books and single chapbook. In print: Steepy Mountain love poetry (Kegedonce Press), Mother Time: poems new & selected (Ronsdale Press), Longing: four poems on diverse matters (Rubicon Press).

The Nathaniel Dett Chorale

February is Black History Month in Canada, and what better way to celebrate than with the twenty-one voices of the Nathaniel Dett Chorale, Canada's first professional choral group dedicated to Afrocentric music of all styles. Founded and conducted by Brainerd Blyden-Taylor, and sponsored by the Quadra Cultural Committee, these fine young, Toronto-based singers will be on show twice at the Quadra Community Centre on Sunday, February 15: they will be working with Island Voices Chamber Choir in a master class from 1-3PM, to which audience/observers are welcome for admission of \$5; and they will be performing a full concert at 7 PM.

Although the name Nathaniel Dett may be unfamiliar to many Canadians, the internationally-renowned African-Canadian composer, R. Nathaniel Dett, was born in 1882 in Drummondville, Ontario (presently a part of Niagara Falls.) Composer, conductor, pianist, poet and teacher, Dett dedicated his life to the cause of Black music until his death in 1943. Among his many accomplishments, he performed at Carnegie Hall and won the Bowdoin and Frances Boott prizes in 1920 for his essay, "The Emancipation of Negro Music."

Brainerd Blyden-Taylor, conductor, clinician, adjudicator and music consultant, came to Canada from his native Trinidad in 1973. He joined the Orpheus Choir as assistant conductor in 1978, and became its musical director nine years later. When Blyden-Taylor founded the Dett Chorale in 1998, it was in response to what he considered a "musical void" in Canada. He wanted to start a professional choral group where persons of African heritage could see themselves represented in the majority and also draw attention to Nathaniel Dett's legacy and the wealth of Afrocentric choral music of the past, present and future. Says Blyden-Taylor: "It's important for humanity to honour its heroes and share its culture. The chorale is seeking not only to honour Dett but to draw Canada's attention to the accomplishments of one of its native sons."

In memory of their namesake, the Dett Chorale released its first recording of the choral works of R. Nathaniel Dett in 2002 entitled: "Listen to the Lambs." In 2003, they went on to win a Gemini Award for their CD and accompanying documentary film, "Carry Me Home: the Story and Music of the Nathaniel Dett Chorale."

To critical acclaim, the Nathaniel Dett Chorale has performed throughout Canada and the United States. They have accepted invitations to world choral symposiums in France (2004) and Japan (2005); and have shared the stage with internationally recognized artists, world leaders and personalities like jazz pianist Joe Sealy, opera star Kathleen Battle, Nelson Mandela, Archbishop Desmond Tutu, Muhammad Ali and Oscar Peterson.

The vision of the Dett Chorale is to build bridges of understanding, appreciation and acceptance between communities of people through the medium of music. This vision. combined with dynamic musical talent and a program of classical, spiritual, jazz, folk, blues and popular music will empower every listener. Master class admission is \$5 at the door. Advance tickets for the concert are \$17 for adults. Youth 16 and under listen for free when accompanied by an adult. 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From our School Board Trustee

he worries, pressures, and easy entertainments of modern life can engender blindness to the wonder of what is right before us. Not seeing, not noticing the daily, weekly, and yearly efforts of those in our midst can be a side-effect of living too-busy lives. In the spirit of honouring the work of everyone involved in education in School District 72, I invite you to sit down, draw breath, and consider the work of those around us.

Let's begin with the children, of whom there are approximately 5,700 in 20 schools and e-blend homeschooling programs. Expressed simply, their daily work is to attend school and learn. These easy words, however, mask a complexity of thoughts, feelings, actions, and decisions that each student must address every day, at some level. They must take care of themselves, interact with other children and adults on a social, emotional, and intellectual level, listen, discuss, sing, read, write, play, think, and do. Engaged, active children end a school day that has hummed with energy and activity, feeling tired and hungry, needing down time and suitable nurturing from the adults who care for them. Depending on age and circumstance, some children return home to parents, some to after hours daycare, some to empty homes of working parents or guardians, and some continue the day with friends, employment, volunteer activities or team practices. Think about it.

Parents and caregivers provide the support to help children do their best. In SD 72, 84% of families are dual parent, and 16% are single parent: there are approximately 10,900 adults providing homes for school age youngsters. Not counted in this are grandparents, extended family, and friends. These are the folks who earn a living and keep the household organized so that kids are on time, fed, clean, and rested when they arrive for their workday. They are the ones who ask, "how was your day?", or "what was the most important thing that happened today?" and then take time to listen to the answer. They too are their children's teachers, laying the foundation for their children's futures in a thousand different ways. Some do a better job than others. Think about it.

We all know the power of an excellent teacher. Mrs. Oswald, my son's Grade 2 teacher, taught him, among other things, to love Math. I remember acknowledging her with the words, "I never thought I'd say this, but I could get down and kiss your feet". Teachers, too, live complex daily work lives, thinking, planning, teaching, assessing, troubleshooting, acting, reacting, and interacting, making literally hundreds of decisions every day. Their work days continue after the children leave, with organizing and marking, in-service, parent and staff meetings, and a myriad of other professional duties. They are schooled in human development, learning styles, curriculum, assessment, and broad knowledge which must be thoughtfully woven together in both short and long term activities and goals to help their students develop and grow, whether in Kindergarten or Grade 12. They are ethically bound, based on the BC College of Teachers standards, to do their best. Think about it.

Other adults fulfill many other roles in SD72. From the Educational Assistant who helps a child adjust socially to the bus driver who learns the children's names and drives them safely there; the teacher of the hearing or visually impaired to the counsellor who listens and supports; the psychologist and learning assistance teacher who identifies learning problems and seeks solutions; the secretary, janitor, groundskeeper, painter, carpenter, electrician: all provide services which in the end, have as their goal, the education and safety of our children.

Perhaps the least understood or acknowledged role is that of administrators: principals and vice-principals who provide leadership and take overall responsibility for schools and the people who inhabit them every day; district administration who oversee it all: achievement, policy, strategic planning, employment issues, government directives, facilities, and budget. Although often invisible, their work is crucial to the vitality and forward thrust of education; anyone who doubts this might consult with a district which has experienced the mayhem that poor leadership causes.

And finally, there is the Board of Education, an elected body whose job is the governance of SD72: working with the support of all to keep its collective finger on the pulse of the district, managing a sometimes less than enviable task of being the interface between the Ministry of Education and the school district, walking the tightrope between reduced resources and increasing demands. And yet, there is that wonderful satisfaction of believing that with thoughtful decisions one can make a difference. Ultimately, isn't that what it's all about, for the some 12,000 parents, teachers, support workers, administrators, and trustees ? Helping 6,000 young people make good lives for themselves and a better world for others. Think about it.

Bute Inlet Wilderness Threatened

mega-energy project is proposed for Bute Inlet by Plutonic Power and General Electric. It includes 17 river diversions and related hydroelectric facilities, many other structures, 85 km of penstock, 267 km of permanent roads and 443 km of high-voltage transmission lines through some of BC's most remote and beautiful coastal wilderness between Bute Inlet and Earl's Cove. A map is at http://tinyurl. com/9ewa7w.

The massive scale and longterm environmental impacts of this development proposal warrant the most thorough and transparent public and scientific scrutiny. The short-term and long term social and economic effects must also be carefully considered.

Related to this project are several highly important BC public policy issues that need to be revealed and discussed. These include the 2002 energy plan that prohibited BC Hydro from developing public power production facilities; 2006 provincial legislation (Bill C-30) which silenced communities' right to say "no" to development proposals; and the major question of whether there will be private profits or public benefits from BC's energy resources.

BC's Liberal government has designed the environmental assessment process to favour industry. Without high levels of public interest and involvement, this huge project will almost certainly go ahead as presented - also setting a precedent for further developments.

This is one of very few public opportunities to influence what will happen to a significant part of BC's wilderness coast! A good turnout is vital to showing the government that we care, we want a fair process, and we want to be included. The level of public interest will dictate the possibility for expanding the public process. Local voices are especially potent, so come if you possibly can -- and bring some friends!

The 30-day period for written comments to the Draft Terms of Reference, and requests for public involvement ends February 18. Right now the most (and almost only) thing we can do is demand a more considered, more comprehensive, and truly fair process.

just prior to its conclusion. It had been a long speech, one widely anticipated to surpass in brilliance that which he delivered some 50 months earlier in Boston. Finally the words came that set this man apart from every predecessor to the office - "This is the meaning of our liberty and creed, why men and women and children of every race and every faith can join in celebration across this magnificent mall. And why a man, whose father - less than 60 years ago - might not have been served at a local restaurant, can now stand

before you to take a most sacred oath." And the crowd went wild, as goes the old adage. As did I, since I had been predicting this event, for this man, since that speech to the 2004 Democratic National Convention, and am thrilled to see it happen 4 years earlier than my wildest hopes back in '04. Roll on, Obama.

Barack Obama's accession to President has been swift and impressive, and the fact that he is actually in office is the realization of a dream to so many, particularly those who have grown up conditioned to lower expectations. Obama is fortunate in that he was born at a time (1961) when racial inequality was being challenged on all fronts, and that his early upbringing in Indonesia and Hawaii (with a loving and intelligent mother and caring progressive grandparents) allowed him to develop hopes and ambitions that might have been crushed out of him had he been born a generation earlier. I've yet to read either of his books. but my impressions of Barack Obama include patience, quiet strength, wide intelligence and calm confidence. When I think of a US President sitting down to talk turkey with Vladimir Putin, I'm much happier McCain lost. Similarly, when I think of whom I would want talking the inevitable reconciliation with Cuba, I'm relieved it will be Obama. And now, as President, he has an opportunity to cement the inspiration he is providing to literally billions of people around the planet, of every colour.

Obama only entered federal politics in 2004, and has no dynasty, politically or otherwise, behind him. Like his predecessor Obama is a Harvard graduate, but there is no doubt he wasn't invited to join the Skull and Bones. Any political tainting he may bear will likely have been encountered over the last 4 years in his

he words came late in the speech... quest for the presidency, or possibly during the He couldn't help notice that black people were preceding 7 years as an Illinois State Senator. Apparently no one found any significant skeletons in his closet during the election run-up - as thorough a vetting as he'll ever undergo - so presumably he's clean. The cynic in me tells me he has to be beholden to someone; no one reaches the White House without making some promises to the Washington powers that be. But the hope is strong that he is indeed different, and will do his supporters proud with his achievements.

> > Right after Obama secured the election I clipped an article from The Washington Post titled "A Butler Well Served by This Election" by Wil Haygood (Nov. 7/08). Eugene "Gene" Allen started working in the White House as a "pantry man" in 1952 at 33 years old, just as Truman was handing over the keys to Eisenhower. Gene (as nicknamed by "Ike") served most Presidents as a butler, and retired in 1986 as Maitre d' to President Reagan. His wife, Helene, shared some of the wonder of the White House, often being invited to holiday parties. "Shook the hands of all the presidents I ever worked for," recalled the now 89-year old Gene. "President Ford's birthday and my birthday were on the same day. He'd have a birthday party at the White House. Everybody would be there. And Mrs. Ford would say, "It's Gene's birthday, too." And so they would sing a little ditty to the butler. And the butler, who wore a tuxedo to work every day, would blush."

> > When the White House hired him, Gene Allen, like Barack Obama's father, could not use most public restrooms in his native Virginia. He was serving at the White House during the 1957 Little Rock bus crisis and the March on Washington in 1963. He was there during the Watts riots in 1965, and he was also present to see subsequent positive change in the White House. "The butler remembers seeing Mr. [Colin] Powell and Dr. [Condoleeza] Rice in the Oval Office. He was serving refreshments.

moving closer to the centre of power, closer than he could ever have dreamed. He would tell Helene how proud it made him feel." For most of his career at the White House, the people wearing nice clothes were almost uniformly white. "The history is not so uneven at the lower level, in the kitchen," says Ted Sorenson, who served as counselor to President Kennedy. "In the kitchen, the folks have always been black. Even the folks at the door - black."

The Post interviewer met with Gene and

Helene the week before the November '08 election, and they speculated about what it would mean if Obama were elected. "It'd really be something", said Mr. Allen. "We're pretty much past the going out stage," his 86 year-old wife said, "but you never know. If he gets in there, it'd sure be nice to go over there again." During

the interview they discussed their Election Day plans, and how they would pray to help Barack Obama get to the White House. They would vote together before sitting down to one of Helene's special dinners in celebration of the occasion. On Monday November 3rd, Helene had a doctor's appointment scheduled. "Mr. Allen woke and nudged her once, then again. He shuffled around to her side of the bed. He nudged his wife again. He was all alone. "I woke up and my wife didn't," he said later." His wife of 65 years was buried on November 7th. "The butler cast his vote for Obama on Tuesday. He so missed telling his Helene about the black man bound for the Oval Office."

I don't know whether Gene Allen was able to attend the inauguration, but I do hope that one of Obama's eagle eyed staffers picked up the Post article and extended an invitation to the White House for some time soon. Nothing could be more fitting or emblematic of the tremendous change that has come to that house. As Obama said on January 20th - "We remain a young nation, but in the words of scripture, the time has come to set aside childish things. The time has come to reaffirm our enduring spirit; to choose our better history; to carry forward that precious gift, that noble idea, passed on from generation to generation: the God-given promise that all are equal, all are free, and all deserve a chance to measure their full measure of happiness." Amen to that.

Thoughts on Sherman Barker's Letter to Mr John Duncan MP

We have a very bad situation in the Middle East - the Israeli/Palestinian conflict. How can this be solved?

A basic question needs to be answered. Do the Jewish people of the 21st century have a right to a nation state in at least part of Palestine? "Yes" or "No". (In a November 1947 vote the U.N. said it did.)

If the answer in "No", then the world is faced with the task of causing a member of the U.N. to cease to exist. how do nations go about this in a peaceful way? What if the nation resists this effort with all its heart, with all its soul, with all its mind and with all its might? This leaves the option of using violence. A coalition of nations could take it upon themselves to do just that, saying the state of Israel is an illegal entity and must be eliminated to satisfy justice.

If the answer is "yes", then how does the world deal with entities like Hamas, Hezbollah and Iran who are committed to destroying Israel? If a coaltion of nations overruns Israle should the U.N. authorize a coalition of countries to drive out the invaders similar to what was done in the first Gulf War in 1991.

Question: How does firing rockets into southern Israel solve any of the real problems of the Palestinians? Can Hamas be told there are better methods to solve the problems?

Question: What one 21st century nation is in the same geographical location, has the same name, the same language and the same religion as it had 3000 years ago?
