
Public Hearing Notice

BYLAW NO. 29

"Quadra Island Zoning Bylaw, 1990, Amendment No. 95" Wednesday, May 27, 2009 • Starting at 7:00 p.m.

Sayward Heritage Community Hall • 1257 Sayward Road, Sayward, BC Bylaw No. 29

This bylaw, if adopted, would establish a new Aquaculture Four (AQ-4) zone and then rezone two proposed ILMB tenures (File No. 1411142 – Gunner Point and File No. 1411169 – Yorke Island) from Access Two (AC-2) to Aquaculture Four (AQ-4) in order to establish two new finfish farms in the Sunderland Channel. The property referred to as Gunner Point, is legally described as Unsurveyed foreshore or Crown land covered by water being part of the bed of the Sunderland Channel, Range 1, Coast District. The property referred to as Yorke Island, is legally described as Unsurveyed foreshore or Crown land covered by water being part of the bed of the Sunderland Channel, Range 1, Coast District. The subject sites are shown on the map below.



A copy of the proposed bylaw and related information may be viewed at the regional district office, 301-990 Cedar Street, Campbell River, BC between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, excluding holidays from Tuesday, May 12, 2009 until Wednesday, May 27, 2009 or at www.strathconard.ca.

Anyone who believes the proposed bylaw will affect their interests will be given an opportunity to speak at the public hearing.

Legally, the SRD cannot consider any representations made after the close of the public hearing. If you cannot attend the public hearing, all written submissions, mailed or electronic, must be received by this office no later than 4:30 p.m., Wednesday, May 27, 2009.





Cortes Regional Director Report

I am learning to balance intricate details while holding a regional perspective. Local politics ranges all over the map, literally and figuratively. Of all the issues that fill my head these days (and nights), what I most want to share with you is the unfolding of our Cortes OCP review.

Official Community Plan (OCP) Review

I have been acting as the liaison between Strathcona Regional District staff and my OCP review committee to design a review process that is Cortes generated, cross-generational, and welcoming, and I am very pleased with the direction we are headed.

Our OCP is Cortes' statement of our longterm vision for our future. It guides planning, land use management and decision-making for our island. Our current OCP, finalized in 1995, will form the foundation for our revised plan. However, much has changed in the last 15 years that needs to be considered in today's planning. How are we are going to prepare ourselves to be resilient and adaptable in quickly changing world?

1. Vision Cortes! 'Blue-Sky' Session lune 13th

Saturday, June 13th, 1-7 pm, Manson's Hall. Free child care provided.

We are kicking off the OCP review with a facilitated community 'Blue-Sky' visioning session where the 'sky' is the limit. This is the place to share your big picture vision for Cortes' future. Everything goes! Everyone welcome!

2. Community Education and Data Collection - Summer / Fall 2009

Education - This is a chance to educate ourselves on community planning. We will be bringing in guest presenters to share stories from other communities and delivering basic 'Civics 101' education. An Education Coordinator will be hired to help with this work. If you want more information or want to apply, contact Kristen Scholfield-Sweet at 935-6464.

Data Collection - We will identify a few places where specific base-line data information, once collected, will help us make better planning decisions. To this end, we have engaged the Cortes Housing Initiative to develop a housing needs survey and to report back on their findings. We will be identifying a couple other key areas for further information gathering.

3. The Actual OCP Document Review -Winter 2009 & Spring 2010

This is where we form working groups and

Dear Islanders,

Another election down and safe to say that the Discovery Islands and surrounding region played a significant role in various parts of the debate: as neighbour to one of the hot button run of river projects, home to two local candidates and other high profile personalities extensively quoted throughout the campaign.

Now the count is in, the public swallows the result and gets back to their lives which won't be disrupted until the first of the 'new' government's initiatives comes our way. Here, among other issues, the Bute run of river development will rear back up. The proponent buoyed from the province-wide result will wade back into what has been clearly stamped out as opposition territory. A busy fall it promises to be.

But until then a general lull will ensue leaving the politicos to analyse and debate what the results mean and where to go from here? High on the list of topics is certain to be the long term fate and strategies of both the BC Greens and BC NDP. For the most part they each held ground but neither party can really claim success with the NDP failing for a third time to unseat the Liberal government and the Greens failing flat out to elect a single MLA.

Each party holds the key to the others success and if ever there was an occasion to recite the adage united we stand it would be now. Too late for election 2009 but not too late to develop a meaningful relationship for 2013.

The fact is that the pressing issues of our time, which are largely being ignored by a complacent public and compliant governments the world over, peak-oil, climate change and population growth are going to require unprecedented amounts of, not just provincial but, global co-operation to address.

There is hardly space here to do the matter justice but I am firmly convinced that BC's role in this lies in an alliance between the Greens and NDP. Let's call it the BC Climate Action Coalition. Concessions will be needed but reality will have to win the day if BC is going to prosper post peak oil.

Space is gone, so for now it's food for thought. To close I offer my congratulations to Claire Trevena on her re-election and good wishes for the new term. Thanks to all who supported and participated in the local campaigns.

Boating Safety Open House

Boating is a way of life for some, a recreational escape for others. Recreational fishers, commercial fishermen, tour operators, kayakers, jet-skiers and cruisers: if you are a boater, the Boating Safety Open House on Sunday May 24th is the place to be. The open house is taking place on the dock and grounds of the Heriot Bay Inn on Quadra Island from 10 am to 4 pm.

With representatives from the Coast Guard, Transport Canada Marine Safety Division, Ripple Rock Power Squadron and the RCMP, all your boating safety questions will be answered. Learn what kind of lifejackets should you have onboard and what other safety equipment your boat needs to meet the regulations. See presentations and demonstrations, ask questions and get answers from the variety of officials onsite.

Listen and learn at the workshop on cold water survival, presented by Transport Canada at one pm. Transport Canada will also be on hand all day, to explain all the new regulations and answer your questions about safety equipment, licensing and permits.

Did you know that as of September 15, 2009 all boaters must have a Pleasure Craft Operator's Card (PCOC) to legally operate a vessel of any size? Ripple Rock Power Squadron will be examining boaters who want to challenge the PCOC exam, and answering questions you may have about the card or the process.

Be sure your boat meets the safety standards: courtesy boat checks will be available throughout the day, provided by the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary. A courtesy boat check examines your boat for its on-board safety features, and provides a list of any items which are needed to meet the safety regulations.

The RCMP vessel Nadon will be on the dock, as will the Coast Guard cutter Point Race. Campbell River Search and Rescue will be talking about fresh water safety and planning. Get a checklist for safe trip planning (regardless of your preferred style of marine travel), and check out approved PFD's and lifejackets, along with other safety equipment, on display and available for purchase thanks to Ocean Pacific Marine.

Stay safe on the water this summer. Be at the Boating Safety Open House on the grounds and dock of the Heriot Bay Inn Sunday May 24, 10 am - 4 pm.



What We Don't Know About Child Care

Local Early Childhood Educators who Communities of Innovation grant project discuss what the lay person may not know about childcare. To see the full interview go to www.crfamilynetwork.ca

Dee Conely, Director Quadra Children's Centre

O: What might the ordinary parent not understand about our child care system?

Dee: Well, for one thing - there is no "system." There's just a loose collection of different child care options that range from superior to risky.

O: What do you mean there is no "system?"

Dee: One of my ECE (early childhood educator) colleagues explained it this way: when you use the Community Centre, you tend to just notice the services that are offered. iceberg." What you don't see, what

is submerged, is the system: the massive infrastructure of funding and coordination that supports those services. When the average lay person thinks about child care, what they don't know is that this "service" is all there is. There is no system just below view. Child care centres in today's world are just like pieces of loose ice floating around randomly in the sea. And it is to this "non-system" that we entrust our youngest children during their most impressionable years.

O: That makes me wonder if anyone should send a child to child care?

Dee: That's not today's reality. A 2006 Campbell River Kindergarten survey found 67% of our local families use child care. Across BC, 70% of mothers with children ages of 3-5 are working.


Q: What do Early Childhood Educators (ECEs) want voters and governments to know about child care?

Sharlene: If we just added one percent to were selected to become "leaders" for the the GST, that would fund child care for all of Canada.

O: Many other good causes might also be helped by this one percent, why invest in child care?

Sharlene: I think many Canadians would be embarrassed to know that in Canada we spend less of our Gross Domestic Product (GDP) on child care than any other developed OECD country - even the US.

How would the lay person know what quality child care is? What are the signs?

Jamie: Quality child care centers are not only licensed, they also employ licensed staff. This staff has taken specialized college training, they adhere to a code of ethics, and they each have an individual license to practice in the province of BC.

Q: Are there any other signs of quality care?

Jamie: I tell parents to sit and watch a child care centre in action. Is the staff squatting down at the children's level -engaging the children face to face? Are the children playing with each other? Quality child care offers rich opportunities for children to learn social skills. There should be an air of calm, productive, contentment in the room.

Q: We've talked very broadly about child care, but to wrap up, what's the next step?

Dee: We are blessed on Quadra to have quality

child care. What if all parents could afford this kind of quality care? Imagine. What might schools be like if every child entered school with a love of learning, a sense of security and the ability to get along with others? Ouality child care can go a long way toward making this happen.

Quadra Group to Hold "Catheret" Fundraiser

With 20 cats fixed in just over two months, the Ouadra Feral Cat Group is now doing double duty: trapping and transporting cats to local vets for spaying and neutering, and gearing up to stage a major fundraiser. "There are many, many more unwanted cats on Quadra that have been left to fend for themselves, and we're holding a 'Catheret' to raise funds so we can continue to manage and reduce their numbers," explains Lara Fraser, Quadra Feral Cat Group coordinator.

Catheret, an evening of adult fun and satire, will be held May 29 at the Quadra Community Centre. The event will include door prizes and feature Quadra poets, comedy acts and musical entertainment in a production coordinated by the group's fundraising lead, Chris Thompson. The Quadra Feral Cat Group also hosts a table at the Saturday market, collects change in cans on local store counters and accepts donations through an account at the Quadra Credit Union.

"People and businesses have been so generous, with money, cat food, traps, supplies, time and items for our online garage sale," Fraser says. "Beverage container returns to the Heriot Bay TruValue Foods donated to our cause in April raised \$150. The Strathcona Regional District has provided a funding boost, and we were thriled to receive a donation to cover the surgery for 10 cats. The support is timely because we've fixed most of the cats around the gas station, and once that's done, the next colony on our list has about 30 cats."

The Quadra Feral Cat Group has a growing donors list posted on its website (www. quadracats.com). Fraser says along with funds, the group welcomes new members, needs help with cat transport to and from the vet's office and is urgently looking for foster homes. "This is a huge undertaking, and we gratefully accept support in big ways and small," she says. The group's first rehabilitated stray cat is ready for adoption, and two others await foster homes.

"And, of course, the Quadra Feral Cat Group urges everyone who has a cat or kitten to please get it spayed or neutered so we don't end up with more unwanted strays," she adds. "Following a proven and humane plan, our efforts to date have prevented the birth of up to 10,000 unwanted kittens on this island over the next three years," she says. "Having seen the suffering stray and feral cats experience, I can only say how glad I am that this group has formed to improve the quality of life for these abandoned animals that would otherwise be someone's pet."



uto Renaissance?

bankruptcy protection by Chrysler and imminence of the same for General Motors, the age of ignorance for American automakers has reached a welcome end. I've written previously on the subject, damning the board members and executives at the Big 3 for ignoring reality after it bit them in the butt in 1974, unlike the Japanese and Korean automakers who correctly responded to the oil crisis with smaller, fuel efficient vehicles, not to mention more reliable and dependable. Though Ford has yet to reach its time of reckoning, it is by no means certain they will escape a similar fate.

ith the recent filing for plan implemented 3 years ago, and at their recent annual meeting their CEO confirmed that the company is on track to turn a profit in 2011, a remarkable turnaround from last year's loss of \$14.8 billion. The company has announced a 1st quarter 2009 loss of \$1.4 billion and that the new agreement with their UAW employees will cut \$1 billion in expenses going forward. Remarkably, the markets have indicated continuing faith in Ford, as they recently raised almost \$2 billion in a new share offering. Meanwhile, GM shares are trading at their lowest price since 1933. Ford is not out of the woods by a long stretch, but they are doing significantly better than their peers.

producer of electric vehicles, and is offering incentives to domestic consumers to buy electric hybrids. This is brilliant, as China faces a crisis as their car population explodes, exacerbating the already terrible environmental concerns they face; dominating the upcoming global electric vehicle market is a natural and wise objective upon which the Chinese will capitalize...if you'll pardon the pun. Canada presently offers no incentive to our domestic "alternative" vehicle manufacturers, and I've written previously of Transport Canada's footdragging on the issue of our EV industry's road worthiness certification, which is forcing this nascent domestic industry to move elsewhere -

It is certainly unfortunate for the employees affected by the plant closures, as well as the e m ployees of the 1,900 dealerships that

GM/Chrysler plan to shutter within 16 months, but again, the vast majority of the blame for their dilemma was inflicted by management. Certainly the present recession contributes to their woes, as evidenced by perennially successful Toyota's recently announced \$4.5 billion operating loss, concrete proof of the global slowdown in auto sales.

GM was quick to announce their new management brainwave to save the ailing giant - import cars from China under the GM nameplate. Wow, how imaginative... and you can easily guess how well the UAW reacted, particularly with the company asking its workers to hand back about 30% of their wage packets to keep what jobs will remain in the USA and Canada. Toyota, on the other hand, is replacing 50% of their senior management (including the CEO), and will be completely revising their strategic direction as a consequence of the new economic reality the current recession has presaged. This is in addition to immediately cutting production by 28% globally - Toyota is already predicting a larger (\$6.8 billion) loss for the year ending March 2010. Clearly Toyota has successfully predicted future consumer behavior in the past, and I'm fairly confident their management knows what they are doing...unlike GM or Chrysler's top dogs.

Over at Ford, meanwhile, they have already cut their dealer network by some 700 in a

When my wife was recruited by a local domestic car dealer to take over the controllership, I was mortified. Fortunately, the job was at his Honda dealership, and being a big fan of Honda (I'm also a Honda shareholder) I was completely mollified by that news. We happily own 3 Honda products, and they are uniformly reliable machines. Honda is feeling the economic pinch as well; the company, which employs 21,000 people in Canada, is planning to reduce its Canadian (and US) production and has offered employees incentives to retire early, while cutting shifts at its Aliston, Ontario facilities from two to one per day. This company also announced a loss for 2009, but anticipates a small profit in 2010. In the meantime, their newly introduced hybrid, the Insight, achieved the #1 sales spot in Japan this past month - the first Insight arrived in Campbell River only a few weeks ago. Given Toyota's success with the Prius it is likely the Insight should do very well in Canada - Honda will definitely be around for the long term.

I wrote some time ago about China's auto industry's eventual debut into North America, which has been slowed by the downturn affecting global auto sales, and it now appears that the country's manufacturing sector is planning to shift to hybrid production, capitalizing on US automakers typical inability to respond quickly with production changes. The Chinese government has announced a plan to make China the world's leading

China, in at least one case. I've no doubt whatsoever the Chinese will succeed. and within the next decade Canadians will have the option of driving a BYD, Chery or Geely

electric vehicle instead of a GM, Chrysler or Ford, none of which brands are pioneering the field, notwithstanding GM's experiment with the electric car two decades ago (see "Who killed the Electric Car?" for more on this debacle).

Do these competitive realities spell the end for the Big Three? Chrysler is the diciest of the three, and will likely be bought out by Fiat or some other manufacturer. GM is about to go through what Chrysler did in the 1980's, with plenty of government assistance to ease the way. Ford is a tougher one to figure out, as they have been full of surprises lately. I doubt many insiders to the industry would have predicted Ford's refusal of proffered government aid. Given the strong dominance of Ford in the truck market and the fact they were taking proactive steps over three years ago to "lean up" the company, they stand a better chance than most of surviving this downturn relatively whole, which as a satisfied Ford truck owner pleases me no end. The old joke about Ford being short for "fix or repair daily" hasn't held truth for decades, and the only truck I would consider against my Ford today would be a Toyota...Honda's Ridgeliner just isn't a truck to me. So I'd be happy to see Ford stick around for a while longer, certainly for at least as long as GM is able to stagger along, after which time I'll likely be looking at a 20XX Geely as a likely alternative to the old Ford.
