### **Granite Bay Park** Wharf grand opening

Saturday, May 30th, turned out to be a gorgeous day in Granite Bay. A bit of north west wind, but sunny and warm. A modest sized crowd attended and enjoyed touring the new facility and also the delicious lunch that was supplied by the Strathcona Regional District. Many of the volunteers that worked on the project were there along with many of the donors that gave so generously to this project. My comments were short (the best kind!) and we did the ceremonial ribbon cutting to officially open the facility. It is finished! And no one could be more pleased than me.

That was a long time coming, let me tell you!. Since including it as a priority in our Official Community Plan in 1995 / 96, through the bureaucratic maze of applying for the lease of the water and land areas and all of the other bits and pieces, then to phase one, the wharf head and the new aluminium ramp, and now phase two, with the best floats ever imagined now in place.. it is finished! Yahoo! I hope that all of you get up there at some point to enjoy it and make use of it. It is there for generations to come. I will be trying to get some minor upgrades to the boat ramp in June. It has been incredibly popular and well used and is a victim of its own success... needs a bit more rock to even it out.

### **Granite Bay** Hydro project

The hydro service to Granite Bay is slowly working its way closer to its final destination. There have

I came across some federal funding after meeting with our MP, John Duncan, two weeks ago, and a Granite Bay resident has done most of the work to get it completed by this week so that I can get it into the process and help "usher" it through to Ottawa. If we get the money, the work will get done sooner than later. A lot of dedicated people have worked long and hard on this project and will be acknowledged in a later report.

### Federation of Canadian **Municipalities (FCM)**

I will be attending the FCM from June 5th to June 8th in Whistler. The meeting is held in different cities across the country annually. This year is BC's turn and most of the local government folks will be there. It is a great opportunity to network with representatives from both urban and rural settings and to learn from their mistakes or follow their examples. There will

be lots of talk around sustainable communities and climate issues. I am looking forward to bringing home some of that information and energy to put to good use in our community.

One of the great things about this forum is that many Federal Ministers will be in attendance and it will give me an opportunity to do some lobbying on your behalf for things like high speed internet service to all areas, affordable housing, seniors' housing and climate action plans.

#### "You can't get there from here?"

I feel fortunate to live in the midst of such raw and majestic beauty. I lived on Cortes island for four years, which was about how long it took to clear the programming and unplug from the matrix of Vancouver. And now I find a similar vibe here in the "wilder-burbs" of Quadra Island, a stone's throw from Rebecca Spit, with a sweet wife and child and good neighbors. That being said, I have one large wish for my lovely little life here, and it is the same one I had on Cortes: that I may walk or jog or bicycle or skate or scoot to the local market/pub/shops without putting my life at risk performing high-wire acts between ditches and motor vehicles. While it is true that the vast majority of vehicle operators are more than gracious in their allowances when passing, my pedestrian concerns remain (not to mention the jeopardy the drivers put both themselves and other drivers into by swinging into oncoming lanes).

My dream for the near future on this special island would include a paved two-lane multiuse pathway, alongside the major roads where feasible, that connected the diverse communities and their various shops and services. I can see a carbon-neutral transportation loop of approximately 22km along the Heriot Bay and West roads and down to the Q-cove ferry terminal. I imagine Saturday mornings walking or riding or skating to the coffee shop for breakfast, perhaps continuing to the big smoke of Campbell River to run some errands and finishing off the day in Drew Harbour. On workdays I could ride my bike to most of the jobsites (ves, another nail-banger) and even have a few beers at the pub without worry of landing on the wrong side of a breathalyser - all of this without interfering with traffic and with no fear of traffic interfering with me.

Of course the practical mind says, "Yes, that is surely a fantasy for the costs would be large, the easements hard-won and the regulatory hoops too high to reach, let alone jump through" -- and maybe for those exact reasons it won't ever happen. But something deep inside me keeps saying, "It is possible" and, "Keep trying," and so I scribble this note to the public in the hopes of finding like minds and ideas.

Do I have any proof that such a thing as multi-use paths could actually happen here (besides the obvious examples in Campbell River, Nanaimo and Victoria)? How about an existing "impossible to believe" scenario here in Canada? Each year our government doles out roughly \$1,400,000,000.00 in tax credits (www. ecojustice.ca), give or take a half a billion, to an industry that has been enjoying record profits for many years. be in the final round. That our elected officials can do such a thing in broad daylight forwards the notion that our little pedestrian/bike pathway would be well within the realm of the possible with only a modest paradigm shift.

In a world not wholly-owned by gross transnational corporations with their pocketed political shills, ideas like this would be common sense. It is my opinion that we can't and shouldn't wait for the system to change in order to turn our hopes into realities. We need to take the hardest step of all --- taking action no matter how great or small.

### On Living With Wolves nternet presence, they basically ignored Whe

Instead of searching the internet for information on wolf attacks on humans, consider switching to 'dog attacks on humans' and then 'humans killed by dogs'. The yearly statistics are appalling. Contrast that with an article on wolves in British Columbia Magazine, Fall 2008, informing us that there are only two recorded attacks on humans in BC [by wolves] in more than 25 years, and no fatalities.

And in over one hundred years of people who are not native living on Quadra, there is not one recorded case of a wolf harming a human being, including children.

However the local RCMP have recorded a great many complaints of dogs threatening, attacking and biting us over the years.

A pack of two or more dogs on the loose can create a truly dangerous situation in terms of human safety - frightening and unpredictable.

Now I love dogs and have a dog companion, but I have also been followed by wolves a number of times and it worried me not at all. These social, intelligent creatures can be very curious about what humans are up to, just as many of us are interested in them. That said I have also been injured in an unprovoked dog attack. I'll choose a wild wolf over such a dog any time!

I question the claim by some that wolves change their behaviour when 'habituated' to humans, and have seen no evidence of it in the 21 years I have lived on Quadra.

Al Luoma has lived in the vicinity of wolves here all his life and I believe he would say the same. And Iam McAllister has spent many years observing and photographing wolves yet once the wolf packs had accepted his presence, they basically ignored him and went about business as usual - no change in behaviour.

So I'd like to see some facts and common sense prevail, rather than unfounded fears and paranoia. Let's give our wolves the respect they deserve. Of course you would not feed them - they do that very well themselves. And not running away, but just walking, is good advice, as is keeping your livestock and dogs safely housed at night.

To keep things in perspective, we are increasingly clearing land and invading their territory, with ecosystem destruction by clearcut logging wiping out much of their historical hunting grounds. In addition to the small Granite Bay pack that Al Luoma writes about so engagingly, the likelihood is high that there are one or more packs in the large land area north of Heriot BAy. Have a look at your map - there are very few roads and a mere sprinkling of people. Add to this picture the probability that a number of hungry wolves may have island hopped, swimming, from the mainland to Quadra since last fall, looking for food.

The salmon largely failed to return to a great many of teh rivers of the Central Coast, thus depriving coastal wolves and bears with their usual fattening-up-for-winter food supply.

When I spoke with ian McAllister at the end of November about this, he said it was "terrible, the worst ever seen". By the way if you haven't read Ian's beautiful big photo essay book "the Last Wild Wolves" you are missing something really special. It comes with a 20 minute DVD of excellent wolf videography and is available from the library or Book Bonanza. Wonderful for gift-giving.



When we choose to live in a rural area surrounded by wilderness, we're choosing mother nature's whole package - lots of green ecosystems full of living critters. All our relations. Related to each other, related to us. We can't pick and choose and say 'I'll take the deer and the raccoons, thank you very much, but not the bears wolves or cougars.' It just doesn't work that way.

If this isn't to your liking, then you might be better suited to living in a city where they only have 2-legged wolves roaming the streets, armed with guns and knives (as Brandi Hedefine recently pointed out). But on Quadra, I feel safe.

First Nations people have long held the wolf in high esteem. Wolf is an important part of their cultures and considered a friend. There is a Heiltsuk belief that wolves do not show themselves unless they are trying to tell us something. I wonder what our Quadra wolves could be telling us?

So I would enjoy seeing a wolf anytime soon. Even better would be the pleasure of hearing a wolfsong concert. And then I think of Thoreau's prophetic words, "In wildness is the preservation of the world".

### **Recycling Plastics**

Recycling plastic seems to be difficult to understand. It need not be. The bin is labeled to indicate which plastics are acceptable.

Only household plastic containers which are embossed with the recycling logo (a triangle with a number between 1 and 7 inside it) are acceptable. This is clearly explained on the yellow label which is prominently situated on the plastics bin. All other plastics are unacceptable for recycling on Quadra.

Plastic containers should be rinsed (particularly milk containers) and crushed as otherwise the plastic bin cannot handle the summer volume.

Plastic bags of any sort (from sandwich bags to grocery bags to garbage bags and everything in between) are not currently recyclable here. Plastic sheeting is not recyclable. Also unacceptable are items such as broken auto taillights, cracked flower pots, old lawn furniture, broken children's toys, old coolers, milk crates, torn tarpaulins, incomplete canister sets, poly rope, hoses, toothbrushes, plastic strapping, CD cases and plastic packaging which seals many, many small and medium sized purchases. If it is not a container and does not have the recycling triangle on it, it is currently not recyclable in our bins and must go in the garbage at home or be taken to an appropriate place in town.

Please remember the depot is intended for the use of homeowners only. Businesses must arrange for their own recycling. Large volumes of material are appearing at the depot which are not recyclable and not from family homes. This is making it impossible for homeowners to access the recycling bins and for trucks to access those same bins.

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# <u>Halliday's Viewpoint</u>

# Beam me up, Operator!

use today's parlance, the landline) has been a fixture in our lives since we first drew breath, though not in the form we now take for granted. During my formative years we had "a" telephone, located between the dining room and kitchen. During the 1960's singular phone access often led to conflict in a household containing 3 teenage girls (being an adolescent boy I was of course exempt from these events) in a household of 6. I remember many long, serious dinner table conversations regarding phone etiquette, particularly in the area of brevity as it related to call length, as the phone bill was a significant household expense...and don't even mention long distance calls.

We did actually have another phone in the house, in the basement, but it was a relic of my grandmother's stay with us. It wasn't hooked up, but even then was fascinating with its ridiculously heavy black Bakelite casing, remarkably stiff dial and inscription on the dial sticker - Hastings 4079 or something similar. She probably brought it over with her from the old country, way back when, but I do know it was functioning the last time I saw it. I think ... but am not sure... that we never did have more than one phone in our household right up until we disbanded as a family unit in the mid 1970's. The one telephone per household practice worked for me right up until about 1990, when I moved into a house with multiple jacks and I learned that the cost didn't vary by phone count, only line count. Cool! I immediately went out and bought a designer bedside phone, much to my later regret... certainly a subject for another time. In any event, multiple phone homes are now the norm, unless they have replaced them with wireless entirely.

I first encountered "wireless" as an object of fantasy from old war movies - huge backpacks with whip antennas that allowed 2-way communications over ranges as much as a mile or two! Unfortunately, the Chinese and Japanese were not yet serious players in the telecom business so the products remained in military hands, at least until the late 1960's. The U.S. Army was then using the PRC 10 and PRC 25 backpack radios until the handheld radio was invented, known then as the (precellular version) "brick". This device, which we now know (quaintly) as the "walkie-talkie" had a line of sight range of less than a few miles depending on terrain, a battery life of much less than 24 hours and weighed as much

or most of us, the home phone (or to as a good sized brick, hence the nickname. Then along came Star Trek in 1966, which introduced us to the Personal Communicator - it resembles the Motorola Razor cell phone, but Captain Kirk's flip-top handheld contained a few features the Razor can't match, such as instant communication with an orbiting spaceship and homing device for the molecular transporter. Today we have orbiting satellites and GPS that makes the Razor almost as cool, and Kirk's communicator never had such awesome features as text messaging, camera and call waiting.

> In the 1970's I was an avid participant in the CB radio craze, and had the whole "10-4 Good Buddy" routine down pat as well as a real federal CB license to make it all legal. All it got me was some interesting nights as I and many other guys parked up on Burnaby Mountain near Simon Fraser University, extended our whip antennas, listened to a lot of verbal garbage and static, and jealously watched the guys with dates make out in the neighbouring cars... my girlfriend only joined me once in this strange ritual and couldn't grasp the significance (or sanity) of the experience. However, I did get to talk to a guy in Hawaii once, which I guess made the whole effort and expense worthwhile at the time.

> In the early 1980's I had the good fortune to work for Finning Tractor (now Finning International) in the Yukon, and my position afforded me a company vehicle. Standard equipment for Finning vehicles included a radio-telephone, for good reason. Most of the sites our customers operated at were a long ways from a phone, and time was money when it came to keeping equipment running. Not to mention that our own fleet often had need of phone assistance when traversing the thousands of kilometres of back road we needed to cover with breakdowns and bog downs being regular events. Again, these were very costly instruments to own and more so to use - \$5 a minute rings a bell, not that it mattered with the company paying. The phones used public airwaves, so were open to anyone capable of listening in to do just so unless you paid extra for "privacy", which masked only one side of the conversation. Most users didn't, and as long as you avoided the infamous "7 dirty words" you were uncensored, something many housewives/ girlfriends learned to their chagrin after long conversations with long absent partners, much to the amusement of those of us tuning in for the entertainment while on long road trips.

In 1993 the cellular revolution was starting to reach the North Island, as had I, even as far as Alert Bay. My new part-time business absolutely had to have the latest in communications technology, or at least I thought so - my full-time employer certainly wouldn't spring for one. Back then you couldn't just wander down to the nearest Telus kiosk ... oh no, I had to drive to Campbell River to one of the few dealers and plunk down almost a thousand dollars for my laughingly labeled "purse phone", which I was assured would let me talk to anyone from almost anywhere. Anywhere, as I later learned, that had a cell tower/repeater in the vicinity...certainly rare sights back then. I gave up that rig after a very few months, lots of frustration and some huge bills for the few successful calls I made. So far wireless technology had not made any significant impact in my life except for me or my employer's expense columns.

In the present day, I've had the aforementioned Motorola Razor among many other cell phones, and a few years ago I first obtained a PCS (a Blackberry) through work. This, my friends, was an epiphany for me. Not only could I communicate easily and almost anywhere, I could send and receive emails... even surf the web! I quickly became addicted to my Blackberry, lending credence to the "crack berry" label that surfaced for the now ubiquitous machines. Now that I am setting up another business the Blackberry was the answer for me, giving me a "virtual office" in a device smaller than a chocolate bar with a range limited only by Telus' capabilities, all at an expense that 10 years ago would have represented the cost of a business line alone. I concurrently receive emails from 2 separate addresses wherever I am, and can immediately check the web for anything I need to know. It takes messages, can call forward, and like the Star Trek Communicator will function as a locater beacon should, God forbid, I need a rescue. And not only will it take photos, I can snap off a pretty decent video if I want.

In the short span of some 50 years we have seen a century's (or more) change in the way we communicate, and the change continues to accelerate. It is truly remarkable that today I use a device that would be the envy of the fictional Captain Kirk in his world some 400 years from now, pure fiction to us back in 1966. I'm still waiting for the molecular transporter, though.

### **QISES Erects a New Fish Counting Fence at Village Creek**

A smany of you are probably aware the Quadra Island Salmon Enhancement Society has built and maintained a "fish counting" fence at the outlet of Village Lake into Village Creek for over 10 years. When activated in late summer (the fence becomes functional by the inflation of a bladder, raising the metal fence out of the stream) the fence operates until mid to late November trapping all fish that enter the lake. By doing so, the Society has been able to accurately count entering fish (salmon being the target of course) and then releasing them to continue on their routes to their various spawning sites in the Village Lakes watershed.

The annual counts, when added to previous Village Creek stream counts that predate the fence (going back to 1947) provide a trend in salmon returns to the watershed that can be useful to compare to various events that happen regionally and beyond. The counts have also used to attempt to measure the success of fry outplants that the Society carried out in during the 1990s.

The fence, though operating well, has had 3 main shortcomings: its operation was limited by the level of the fall water flooding out of the lakes; there was difficulty in dismantling the fence during certain years when water levels were high (also a safety risk); and perhaps most importantly the fence did not allow the Society to count the young salmon smolts that head out to sea each spring.

#### The new fence fits into a bigger picture -

QISES initiated a watershed assessment program for the Village Lakes Watershed in 2007 with the objective of identifying any freshwater habitat production bottlenecks that are present in the system, identifying feasible remedial actions that maybe required (upslope and stream related), and, of course implementing necessary repairs. It should be noted that TimberWest has been a significant financial backer for this program to date. This is a multi-year program that we hope will maximize the natural production of salmon and other associated fish stocks from our island's principal watershed.

s many of you are probably aware the Quadra Island Salmon Enhancement Society has built and maintained a ting" fence at the outlet of Village Tillage Creek for over 10 years. When n late summer (the fence becomes by the inflation of a bladder, raising

> If we are going to attempt to improve habitat conditions within the watershed, we need to be able to measure the results. This we will attempt to do by measuring the productivity of the salmon that are using the system. This is done simply by counting the numbers of adults that enter the system and how many progeny successfully make it out of the system. Hence the principal reason for the new dual purpose fence. It will allow us to accurately count fish in both directions and do so not only in a safe manner for our volunteers but also, in a manner that will have little to no impact on non-targeted fish stocks. The fence will also not impact water levels in the lakes.

> The fence will span the creek where and as the present structure does but will have a trap box on each end so that when the fence is functional we will catch all fish going in both directions. The traps are designed to be fish friendly with limited potential for fish damage. The structure is 4 feet high with a walkway and handrail on the top. In the spring and fall panels are dropped from the walkway down into slots on the upstream side of the fence thus controlling fish access, directing them to the traps. These panels are removed during the balance of the year allowing uninhibited water flow into the creek.

> The project, which has been initiated and being overseen by QISES but is the result of much assistance (project cost will exceed \$22,000). The fence has been designed and fabricated by Grant Erickson, a long time resident of Quadra, who has successfully designed and built similar structures in the Campbell River area for several years. Funding for the project has come from several sources: QISES – from the funds we raise through our activities here on Quadra; the Regional District of Strathcona; the Pacific Salmon Foundation; the Campbell River Salmon Foundation; and Fisheries and Oceans Canada.
