



In Defense of Wild Salmon

"In this tiny interval of the 21st century. we, the human species, will either learn to become a life-enhancing element within the greater Earth Community...or we will not. If we fail, humanity will be reduced to a small number, we will have forsaken our potential as a species and we will have perpetrated the extinction of many thousands of species, perhaps millions...." (Bill Plotkin, Nature and the Humans Soul, page 3-4)

Wild salmon is one of these species we must save. Every species that becomes extinct (bees, salmon, etc.) brings us closer to our own extinction. The Globe & Mail, Thursday, August 13, 2009 had a huge front page article entitled "Salmon Run Disaster: 10.6 Million Sockeye Expected...Only 1.7 Million Came: Where Have all the Salmon Gone?"

Who or what is killing the salmon? Clearly, one of the culprits is fish farms. According to the Globe & Mail, Thursday, August 13, 2009, page S2, "Alexander Morton, who several years ago correctly predicted a collapse of pink salmon runs in the Broughton Archipelago because of sea lice infestations, in March warned the same thing could happen to Fraser sockeye. She said researchers used genetic analyses to show Fraser sockeye smolts were getting infested with sea lice in the Strait of Georgia.

The sea lice were all young lice, which means they got them in the vicinity of where we were sampling, which was near the fish farms in the Discovery Islands." The problem is the same as always. The DFO and the Province of B.C. have allowed fish farms on the Fraser River migration route.

Greig Seafoods, the folks who want to build a huge fish farm on the wild salmon migration route at Gunner Point say the genocide is caused by global warming and "high salt content and the availability of other hosts."

Jim Abram & Noba Anderson have argued that they will try to get closed containment at Gunner Point in the future. Besides being unenforceable, closed containment at Gunner Point doesn't make sense. It's a remote, exposed area without sufficient power sources needed to closed containment. It's much better to try the experiment closer to Campbell River.

The fourth reading will happen possibly as early as Sept. 24, 2009 at the Strathcona Regional District office at 990 Cedar St., Suite 301, in Campbell River. If we raise enough of a fuss, they may move the meeting to the Marine Museum, which has a larger venue. Call the office at 1-877-830-2990 (toll free) to find out more details. Be there, make your presence felt.

P.S. There is an unsolved mystery to this whole thing. Why would Jim and Noba risk their career for a fish farm? Anyway, thank God for unemployment insurance. Noba & Jim may need it after the next election.

Quadra Island's New **Industrial Zone**

The east side of Quadra Island is in danger of becoming our new industrial zone. The We Wai Kai Nation (Cape Mudge Band), has applied to the Integrated Land Management Bureau for a disposition over crown land for the purpose of long-line scallop farming. (More about the ILMB at the end of this article).

An application to rezone foreshore waters to permit the scallop farm adjacent to Rebecca Spit is currently before the Regional District. It is expected that the application will pass 1st and 2nd reading in September and will go to a public hearing on Quadra in early October.

If you've been to the Spit, walked down to Paddy's Lagoon, or been out in a boat in that area you've probably seen the four vellow navigation markers and the handful of white floats that are evidence of the current investigative farm. A two-year Temporary Industrial Use Permit was granted to the We Wai Kai Nation in July 2008 so they could investigate the possibility of raising scallops. Believing that they can grow scallops, the Band has decided to apply for permanent occupation and is seeking provincial and regional district approval. The water would be rezoned to aquaculture - 2, which allows the growing of scallops, geoducks and other molluscs. The current zoning is for various recreational uses.

The investigative farm appears small and benign. It occupies only a small portion of the area of the TIUP and a smaller area yet of the expansion for which they have applied. The expanded farm would be more than a kilometer long and almost a kilometer wide with as many as 180 surface floats. The current farm and area of the TIUP are located directly in front of Paddy's Lagoon, and directly in front of Indian Reserve #9. If the application is approved, the scallop farm will expand south, directly in front of two residential properties, and north into our OCP Marine Reserve Zone.

A few years ago a company applied for the right to grow geoducks in Open Bay and along the east side of the Island. Many Islanders wrote letters in opposition and the plan was defeated. In an attempt to prevent that type of industry and to bolster other similar language, the following was added to our 2007 OCP.

2.2k (iv) " To discourage commercial resource based marine use adjacent to settlement areas"

Approval of this application, especially allowing for expansion, will establish a dangerous precedent. As acknowledged by Regional District planners, we can expect similar applications. One of the arguments for allowing the temporary farm was that it would not be in front of or adjacent to a settlement area. Due to their importance to Islanders and our Island's economy, Rebecca Spit and Paddy's Lagoon, which are adjacent to settlement areas, must be protected. If this application is allowed to proceed, it is very likely that the next area of application, also adjacent to settlement areas will be in the bay in front of Haskin's Farm Trail. If a precedent is established to allow marine based industrial activity adjacent to residential neighbourhoods, our entire foreshore is at risk.

It is important to remember that the property owners who will be immediately affected by this application are long-time, well respected members of our community. They have invested twenty years of their lives to develop their properties and realize their dreams. It is fundamentally unfair that, for the price of an application and a public hearing, a company or group can wreak havoc on their lives.

Whenever a disposition over crown land (or water) is granted, that area becomes private and can be, as the scallop farm will be, off limits to everyone else. The best uses for the waters described in the application are; for the enjoyment of Quadra Islanders and our visitors, to be able to walk along a peaceful beach free of industrial activity and noise, for recreational boating, kayaking, canoeing, and for recreational fishing.

Regional Director's Report, Area C

have a few items to mention in this report. I will keep it brief since I am already late getting it in.

Scallop farm on east side of Quadra

As many of you know, the Cape Mudge Band made application about a year ago for a two year Temporary Industrial Use Permit for the growing of scallops at the southern boundary of Rebecca Spit Provincial park, just off of Indian Reserve #9, which abuts private residential lands to the south of the Reserve. The intent was to experimentally grow scallops to see if it was viable. The band recently came back to the Strathcona Regional District (SRD) to apply for a rezoning of an enlarged area in roughly the same location. The new application does extend in front of properties to the south of the Reserve on its boundary. The original area of the application was approximately 64 hectares and the new application is 85.5 hectares.

This area has three zones in place on the water that must be amended if this proposal is to go ahead. The three zones in our zoning bylaw are: Access Two, Marine Reserve One and Indian Reserve One. All of these zones were instituted by the Comox Strathcona Regional District (CSRD) in our 1990 shoreline zoning by law exercise. The Access Two zone is the general zone, that doesn't allow for much, that covers most of the water area in Area C. The Marine Reserve One zone is basically for marine

fter a brief hiatus, I ecosystem protection and parks. The Indian Reserve One zone was put in place our of respect for First Nations Reserve lands so that no one would apply for other uses in front of their lands. The Reserve lands, under the laws of the day, stop at the foreshore (the highest high tide mark). The water area is provincial in jurisdiction and local governments have the right to zone it accordingly. Hence the decision by the CSRD to create the Indian Reserve One zone. This in no way confers any "Indian Reserve" status to the water. This is a matter strictly for the Federal government to determine, which lands are Reserve and which are not. I am bringing this to your attention because a number of people have asked me about the status of the water area, thinking that the IR-1 designation means that it is actually Indian Reserve. It does not mean any such thing. It was a designation created by the CSRD and placed on that area in front of each Reserve. It has no legal status other than at the local government level. I hope this clears up the confusion.

Esplanade Park in Heriot Bay

Well, after many, many decades of dispute over who has jurisdiction over the Esplanade Park (the area that runs along the shoreline from the west of the Heriot Bay wharf parking lot), an unfortunate fire incident a few weeks ago brought it all to a head and to a probable solution. The fire was attended by concerned neighbours, the fire department and the RCMP, and was dealt with appropriately.

What happened afterwards is where it gets interesting. The jurisdictional issue came up once again while in discussion with the RCMP. I had discussions with our Corporal at the RCMP and with the top man at the Ministry of Highways in Courtenay and with the Regional District Parks department. Verbal agreement was reached to attend to the clean up of the area (by Highways) and the derelict outhouses and the underbrush that was considered a fire hazard. The really surprising part was that after so many decades the Ministry was willing to talk about giving the land to the SRD as dedicated park land!. I requested that it be zoned Park One many years ago as acknowledgment of its current use by the public. That was done, but had no real teeth to it until we had actual jurisdiction over the land. It appears that is about to happen. So, many thanks to the neighbours that helped to make this happen and we shall see what happens in the very near future. We will most likely get some sort of long term lease over the property from the Ministry.

Evans Bay wharf

As I have reported at various times, we have been in negotiations with Transport Canada to get possession of the Evans Bay wharf on Read Island to provide further access to Read, by water. I still cannot divulge the details of the negotiations, but I can say that the issue comes to our Board meeting this week for final resolution. I will let you know the outcome in my next report, since it should be concluded by then.

No Hope, No Agenda, No Apology In B.C. Liberal Throne Speech

VICTORIA - Having lied about the deficit and plans to bring in the HST, the B.C. Liberals' Throne Speech offered no agenda and no apology for deceiving the public during the provincial election, New Democrat leader Carole James said today.

"The B.C. Liberals lied about the deficit and the HST during the election, and now it's clear they have no agenda," said James. "The government's fiscal credibility is in tatters, and the only thing they have to offer is recycled broken promises and a new regressive tax that will punish consumers and small businesses when they can least afford it."

James said that a significant portion of the Throne Speech was devoted to defending the HST. She said that if the government believed it was good for the economy, they should have been upfront with voters in the election about their plans to bring in this punishing tax.

"In tough economic times, British Columbians deserve a government that offers support to families struggling to make ends meet and a plan to grow the economy and help small business," said James. "Instead, the B.C. Liberals are trying to cover up their deception by taking the axe to vital public services like health care and shifting taxes onto the backs of consumers.

"Only three months after the election, the B.C. Liberals are out of ideas and they have no plan to cope with the economic downturn."

James said the premier excused his government in the Throne Speech by arguing that it was the B.C. Liberals who were deceived by the economic downturn.

"The premier wasn't tricked by the economy. He knew the deficit was much bigger than he was telling people and he chose to cover it up," said James.

BC Greens Call For Reducing HST To 10%

Party Supports Combining GST and PST ~ Seeks Debate, Amendment and a Free Vote

VICTORIA – "If BC Greens were in government, we would bring the issue of combining the GST and PST to the Legislature for respectful debate, amendment and a free vote by all MLAs so they could represent the wishes of their constituents" said Green Party Leader, Jane Sterk.

"Greens actually support combining the GST and PST but we also believe fundamental decisions like this ought to be made in the Legislature not by the Premier."

"We believe reducing red tape is a way for government to stimulate the economy and simplifying taxation systems represents a step in the right direction" Ms. Sterk explained. "We are concerned about the reduced tax exemptions that will result from harmonization.

"The current PST exemptions have rewarded people for buying energy efficient products and that has helped the green industry sector grow. The Green Party would like to see the current Liberal government work with the federal government to provide HST exemptions for products and services related to reducing greenhouse gases. As a governing party, we would have demanded that the HST be used to promote greener technologies.

"Greens think the single tax can reduce the cost of collection and the incidence of double taxation. Currently, some things that people buy include a hidden double tax because companies purchase components on which they pay PST and they have to build that 7% into the price of the final good or service. Not only is that 7% passed on to consumers as part of the price but they are also charged PST on the total. Under tax harmonization, businesses can claim back that first round of PST and reduce costs to consumers.

"The Green Party of BC calls on the Liberal government to reduce the combined tax to 10%. This would reduce red tape for business and keep the overall tax burden down," concludes Sterk.

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
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

Over the past 15 years, Quadra Islanders have helped to support 6 daycare/ preschool programs in remote areas of the northern Philippines, giving benefit to 1100 children! Our 5 year term of support to the Nambaran and Bugnay daycares has just come to an end. Having received a jump start through Quadra's assistance, these programs are now being supported by their own local governments. Therefore, the proceeds from this year's giant garage sale will go to two new communities in need of similar assistance Basao-Dilag and Lubo-Hilltop. Dilag is a resettlement community, one of the poorest in the northern area of Tabuk, and consists of 74 families. When first received from the government, the land was unfertile with no resource facilities. Even though the residents are dependent on farming for a living, there was no irrigation and the production from their farms relied solely on rain. IAT is now helping the community to implement

Backyard gardening as another way of supplementing their income. This is a new concept since most agriculture in recent years has been carried on at a great distance in the mountains, slash and burn style. The situation is similar for Lubo-Hilltop community and both villages will benefit greatly from community child care.

Some time in October, we look forward to a presentation on Quadra with IAT's founders, David and Petra Durrance as well as Merliza Dona-al, a law graduate of IAT's sponsorship program in the Philippines who is currently assisting with IAT's work in Victoria. This will be an opportunity to find out more about Quadra's involvement in the Philippines as well as gain insight into IAT's new Ecocommunity and Global Youth Development program in Costa Rica. 

Busting 'The Union'

n August 21, 2009 Mexico law was changed so that possession of small amounts of illicit drugs is decriminalized, meaning that an individual may possess drugs without fear of charges but the production or sale of them remains illegal. Ostensibly the move was made to allow police to focus on the bigger fish such as dealers and producers, but in fact small time users are rarely prosecuted for possession now; in reality (and the government has acknowledged the fact) the police were more likely to shake down someone possessing drugs by threatening jail unless cash payment is made immediately. Surprisingly the change applies to "hard drugs" such as heroin, methamphetamines and cocaine as well as pot, and the possession limits are very small - 5 grams (or 1/5 of an ounce) of pot, for example, or .5 grams of cocaine may be legally in one's possession. The law proposes to require anyone being found in possession on more than 3 occasions to receive addiction treatment, but somehow I think this provision will see little or no application in law.

The US Justice Department is presently silent, but they certainly made it known to Mexican authorities prior to the law's enactment that they were not impressed. Portugal, Italy and Spain beat Mexico in decriminalization some years ago, and have seen no negative impact but plenty of positives, such as lower criminal activity and dropping HIV/AIDS rates. Is decriminalization something we might soon see here in Canada? Personally, I hope not.

I recently viewed a documentary called "The Union - The Business behind Getting High", which educates viewers about BC's estimated \$7 billion (in estimated annual revenues) pot business, and the reasons for its existence and success. With this documentary,

BC born first-time filmmaker Adam Scorgie has done a remarkable job in demystifying and demythifying pot, and thoroughly skewers the political lunacy that has created the monster of drug prohibition. Equally damaging as was the alcohol prohibition of some 75 years, current Canadian and US pot laws create more public problems than does the pot itself. Organized crime was born out of prohibition, and is absolutely thriving in the environment created by the War on Drugs. Remove the profit motive from the equation and the mob (or today, gangs) lose interest very quickly - it happened with booze and it would undoubtedly happen with drugs.

Pot use, like alcohol use, is a social and health issue that need only come to the attention of justice for misuse leading to public harm. Most crime surrounding pot use is the result of its illegality and consequent premium pricing. Marijuana, literally a weed, sells for upwards of \$1,800 pound to the grower and can yield three times that on the street. BC's largest export leaves us as bud and returns in harder drugs and guns, at least in the higher levels of the trade.

In the film, a small time grower somewhere on the lower mainland admits he is yielding \$18-20,000 in cash from his crop...every two months. The film also takes us on a tour of an underground grow-op that consists of some 20 old shipping containers linked together, providing room to grow 1,300 plants at a time, generating millions in cash profit before it was busted. People kill, and get killed for that kind of money. The sooner the profit motive is removed from the equation the sooner you'll see the end of grow-ops.

Scorgie interviews many knowledgeable, credible experts, including former Vancouver mayor/coroner and now Senator Larry Campbell. Campbell, who also served with the RCMP drug squad for many years, has nothing but scorn for Canadian and American drug policy. He calls for nothing short of legalization of marijuana, as decriminalization does not go far enough. By legalizing pot the government can then regulate its production, distribution and most importantly, taxation - this cannot happen under a decriminalization scenario. Another interviewee in the film. Harvard Medical School Professor Emeritus Dr. Lester Grinspoon, cites a book he authored that decried the hysteria surrounding marijuana, confirmed it had caused no medical harm (indeed has tremendous medical benefit in many cases) and should be legalized. His good friend, the noted and now deceased astrochemist Dr. Carl Sagan, was said to comment incredulously of the book, "Do you really believe it will take as long as 10 years for it to be legalized?" Sagan made that comment some 45 years ago. And of course Tommy Chong shows up in the film, making light of the 9 month prison sentence he received for selling bongs while lambasting the reasons behind it. Like Marc Emery of Vancouver, who is facing prison time in the US for selling marijuana seeds (something not illegal in Canada), Chong chose to plead a deal rather than allow others to face jail because of the charges. Persecution rather than prosecution is a more apt description of the US Justice Department and Drug Enforcement Agency tactics in their attacks of these two good old Canadian boys. The DEA certainly has no interest in seeing any changes to marijuana laws...not with 5,500 hundred agents and a \$2.5 billion annual budget at stake.

The other two major forces aligned to keep marijuana illegal are the people employed in the pot industry (which in BC is called The Union, hence the film's name) and the pharmaceutical industry. They both profit from the continuing prohibition against marijuana, and have no interest in change. The drug companies realize the beneficial properties of marijuana, and since they cannot patent a natural plant they are only interested in extracting the benefits of the plant, packaging it and selling it. A drug called Marinol is being marketed as an alternative therapy to marijuana, and is made from the THC contained in natural marijuana. But it won't give you a buzz, thereby making it a socially acceptable narcotic. And of course it costs a bundle. Many States and Provinces have recognized the legitimacy of marijuana in medical therapies, but the laws are confusing, contradictory and vary widely by jurisdiction. And, of course, Federal legislation making pot illegal always trumps local legislation. This is a ridiculous situation and creates nothing but problems for the public, the police and the courts.

Senator Campbell was asked in the film whether he believed he would see legalized marijuana in Canada. He answered in the affirmative, though with the codicil that it wouldn't happen in his lifetime. Sadly, this made me think of the Sagan comment, as Campbell is only 61 years old. But Campbell isn't prescient, and I'm sure he would be happy to be proven wrong...I know he will be proactive on the subject in his capacity as a Senator. The Senate has already made its views on pot known, and its recommendations have been entirely ignored by government. In 1972, the Senate endorsed a Senate Sub-Committee report entitled Cannabis - Our Position for a Canadian Public Policy which contained the following statement... "As far as cannabis is concerned, only behaviour causing demonstrable harm to others should be prohibited: illegal trafficking, selling to minors and impaired driving." The report made specific recommendations surrounding legalization and distribution, medical use, and specifically addressed and confirmed the individual's right to grow limited quantities for their own use. Perhaps Senator Campbell can dust off the library copy, update it and resubmit to Mr. Harper for his consideration. Or perhaps maybe he should wait until Mr. Ignatieff takes office...somehow he seems a more likely advocate for reform than a founder of the Reform party.

So no, I'm not in favour of decriminalization, but legalization seems to make a lot of sense. Anyone who sees "The Union" would be hard pressed to argue otherwise. Even if you don't care one way or the other, this award winning documentary is well worth the time to view.

Nia Comes to Quadra

SouthEnd Farm Vineyards

ore than once this summer, as scorching temperatures pushed the mercury into the high thirties, threatening to surpass the big four-O, the smells and air had a feel of the Mediterranean. Timely then that Quadra Island has a new working vineyard further evoking the image of Tuscan hillsides or the California Napa Valley.

Jill Ogasawara and Ben McGuffie are proud owners of SouthEnd Farm, a budding but already flourishing vineyard located (not surprisingly) at Quadra's southern tip. The young couple returned to McGuffie's family home in 2003 and originally the vineyard was the official plan for retirement. However, as the Woss native Ogasawara explained when Ben had the chance to work at the Elk Falls mill as an engineer, the retirement project was accelerated by thirty some years and they began clearing land and planting grape vines.

Jill was studying landscape architecture at the time and the vineyard was the subject of her Masters' thesis. With Ben's engineering skills to draw on and obviously energy in spades the pair cleared a couple of acres and began researching other vineyards on the big Island and Okanagan. "There are several vineyards of similar size in the Cowichan Valley and on the Saanich Peninsula" McGuffie told me. "The Wine Island Growers Association are a great resource and we could see what was working and what could be improved on from these established farms".

They chose grape varieties suitable for the climate which obviously improves the vield but also reduces maintenance especially spraying. As the goal is to be as close to organic as possible, this was an important factor. The aim is to have five acres of vines including white varieties like: Siegerrebe, Petite Milo, Bacchus and Gerwurztraminer. Reds generally need more heat than the island climate affords but some red grapes that can do well here



include: Marechal Foch, Leon Merlot and Cabernet Foch.

The young vines are growing well and many have set fruit this summer but Jill explained that they are still several years away from a full crop as they wait for the plants to mature. However, the resourceful duo haven't let that slow the production down. By sourcing grapes, raspberries and other fruits from other Quadra Island farms, specifically Tera Nova and Nevermore Farm (formerly Marshwood), SouthEnd has already produced a slate of excellent wines.

Alongside the rows of grapes is the unassuming winery building itself which sparkles inside with stainless steel vats, pumps, smart looking machinery and plumbing. Easy to see why McGuffie as an engineer is at home in this immaculate facility.

"The goal is to be bottling wines made 100% from Quadra Island fruit" McGuffie said "It is a priority for us to be using local fruit and to be accessible to the local market. SouthEnd is a Quadra Island vineyard for Quadra Island".

"It was very important for us to come home" added Jill "so we want our farm and produce to be a part of that. Word is spreading and people are clearly enjoying the wines as we have repeat customers coming again and again to try and buy wine."

Rightfully so, I found the atmosphere at SouthEnd Farm to be very welcoming. The tasting room is simple vet comfortable and Jill and Ben are clearly proud of their work and wares. They enthusiastically poured samples of the Ortega, Siegerrebe and Bara wines from 2008 which were all tasty and refreshing especially on the hot summer afternoon I visited.

They produced a full vintage last year and

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were surprised by the quality and success so soon. A couple of notable local wine reviewers have written glowing appraisals of SouthEnd which is sure to give Ogasawara and McGuffie added confidence with their efforts.

Ben explained that a new winery is very unnerving thing to open up as it's essentially an industry built around review and critique. However, in true island-style they found that an easy going 'hands-off' approach worked well and the feedback has borne that out.

They were surprised by one batch of Siegerrebe that initially seemed off, but as time went by the vintage improved and ended up very palatable. Ben said this was one of the lessons, "not to panic" and let the wine maturation run its course.

However, enough reading about this great addition to Quadra Island. Put down this DI and head on down Sutil Road and taste for yourself. SouthEnd Farm Vineyard is open Friday to Monday from 10 am to 5 pm until the Labour Day weekend and then by appointment until November when they will open for the holiday season. Jill and Ben will welcome you with samples, a tour and some enthusiastic conversation. You're sure to be seduced and come away with a bottle or two or perhaps a case or two to savour the Quadra sun through the winter months ahead.

Also, watch out for the wines at the Heriot Bay Tru-Value liquor store. They're on the shelf alongside wines from around the world.
