




Sustainable Development Proposal

"a conservation strategy plan" By Dan Bowen

The owners of the 158-acre waterfront property in south Gowlland Harbour will be inviting the public to the second community consultation meeting on October 24 Saturday at the Quadra Island Community Center from 1:00-3:00pm.

At the last meeting there were lots of questions and answers and since the last meeting there have been several people express interest to do a tour of the property to better understand their specific concerns.

Our vision as we have said is to create a sustainable development that will be an example of good planning as well as contribute to the community values that are noted in the Quadra OCP. We are focusing on a country residential development node that will be complementary to the nearby Quathiaski Cove residential area with additional community amenities.



Scheme of sustainable development: at the confluence of three constituent parts is the balance.

Our plan is to work with the residents by having community consultation meetings and the Regional District on implementing several sustainable concepts. We want to create a country residential extension to Quathiaski Cove area that will be compatible with Quadra Island lifestyle and values.

We invite you to get acquainted with the property and with our presentation, to better understand the sustainable development features proposed.

We plan two, 15- acre waterfront parks containing sensitive ecosystems, riparian zones and old growth forest to be dedicated to the Regional District. Over 50% greenspace of our property will be protected by Conservation covenant covering most of the waterfront, the eagle trees and several old growth eagle roost trees. We also plan to provide over 4000 feet of hiking trails that link the Ocean and the community.

We need community consultation, input and support to create a unique sustainable development that will dedicate and preserve green space now and for future generations!

'Sustainable' Development Proposal Goes Public

I will not address if high density development, which is contrary to the Official Community Plan (OCP) is to be allowed at that site, or what is sustainable about it, or what is rural about it. I comment on what is offered, what "bargain" is on offer, and the pitfalls of securing that "bargain".

I do not know all the details, but the property on Denman Island that was swapped for this property (with the involvement of the Provincial Government) was about 1.8 million dollars (1990s value). This property on Ouadra (DL 208) was listed for sale about the same time by David Smith of Discovery Island Realty on behalf of Timber West for \$2,700.000 and was later, basically, exchanged for the Denman Island property (that subsequently became a park). Subsequently substantial part of DL 208 timber was logged by the logging company owned by Mr Schellinck, leaving a fringe of trees that kept the viewscape from Gowlland Harbour, and apart from windfalls in Goose Bay the clear-cut behind that fringe of trees is not seen; some areas of forest, riparian areas and the site of a midden / archaeological sites were also uncut. If the proposal for 49 houses were allowed, say at \$500,000 for each plot, the value would be 24 and a half million dollars (less developmental costs).

So what is Mr. Schellinck is offering? To preserve the appearance of the peninsula from the surrounding waters, (Gowlland Harbour and Goose Bay), two 15 acre areas as parks and public trails. On Saltspring Island the Salt Spring Island Land Use Bylaw 355, {Page 79} suggests that "The applicant for subdivision provides funds in an amount satisfactory to the Salt Spring Island Local Trust Committee, to be held in trust by the Capital Regional District for the construction and maintenance of a community recreational facility on land on Salt Spring Island held by the Capital Regional District. The value of the funds is to be at least 75 per cent of the financial benefit that accrues to the applicant for subdivision as a result of the reduction in the minimum average area of lots. The financial benefit is to be based on an appraisal of the value of additional lots created, less related development costs, dated no more than 30 days before final registration of the subdivision" The details of the offer to Quadra to be made by Mr Schellinck are not costed yet, but I do not think it comes near to a fair cut for our Island.

The riparian reserves around the fish bearing creeks and the archaeological reserve may well be untouchable and protected already, and the shore below the high tide mark belongs not to Mr. Schellinck but to the Crown, - God Save the Queen! So that Mr. Schellinck offering is rather meagre I think.

There is also problem with the preservation of the fringe of trees, the preservation of Mr Schellinck most important "gift" of viewscape. If you were to crowd 37 houses behind the fringe of trees, and 37 bolshy owners insist to have clear views out of their houses (as they would) and they all cut trees to clear the view they want, Mr. Schellinck most important "gift" would be null, void, clear-cut.

I await with interest the details on offer, the devil is in the detail, but the present plan is unattractive.

I have old pre-logged aerial photos of the area, more details that would be too much to publish in the Discovery Islander but would love if someone could help to create a webpage/face book site on which it could be made available for those interested. I am too old to learn how to do it, but it would be good thing to have for our island. Any volunteers? (bara_notes@yahoo.com). 

sit against the background of vast mountainous landscape.

As much as it is about the quest for a miraculous being, **Unmistaken Child** is about Mr. Zopa's painful adjustment to the loss of his master he had served since the age 7. His search is a crucial initiation ritual that restores meaning and purpose to his life. His tender, playful interactions with the boy reveal him as someone of enormous sensitivity, gentleness and spiritual grace.

Seldom has a film presented such a richly ambiguous juxtaposition of modernity, ancient mindset and miraculousness. "Unmistaken Child" inevitably leads you to consider the material world and to contemplate the balance in your own life between physical gratification and spirituality.

For those who believe in reincarnation, Tenzin's mission ends in miraculous success. For those who do not, it could be seen as a haunting, even troubling journey of a lonely man yearning for his lost father. In either case, the film is enthralling.



Catalyst Paper requested the review of "unfair property taxation" earlier this year and paid the City only a portion of property taxes owed. The payment was based on Catalyst's assessment of services received. Catalyst challenged the bylaws in all four mill communities in an attempt to change the existing assessment-based taxation model to their proposed consumption-based model.

"Campbell River and the other communities where Catalyst operates consistently rejected the proposal to revise property taxation according to this model," the Mayor adds. "We made it clear we would defend our property tax bylaw and that we expect all taxpayers to pay their bill."



The Quadra Story So Far...

One of the perks of running the DI is that every now and then gifts arrive in the mail. Last week saw a gem land in my post office box in the form of Jeanette Taylor's latest work 'The Quadra Story', kindly sent this way by Jeanette's publishers, BC's own Harbour Publishing.

Having finished work for the day I was en route to Granite Bay to see if I could persuade



a chum or two to return home with me. What a perfect scene was set as I drifted around Granite Point and across Okisollo Channel with Jeanette's skilful narrative spiriting the clock back to bygone days.

Immediately the opening pages grab the

reader and I knew right away that this was going to be *the* book I had been waiting to read about our Quadra Island home.

Taylor unravels an engaging thread as she leads us from a present day commuter run on the Powell River Queen back to the arrival of Captain Vancouver off Cape Mudge. What follows is a wonderful journey through the tumultuous and fascinating story of the Salish and Kwakwaka'wakw people. Fact and legend blur in a way that offers a near tangible perspective across cultures.

It is the past century as European and Asian settlers began to populate the island that takes the bulk of the story. Colourful characters, surprising tales and the nuts and bolts of

who was who, who married who and where they lived fill every turnable page.

Perhaps to do the work justice we can turn to a quote from Walter Joyce, at an island gathering to launch a new boat in 1906: "My heart swells with pride to realize the changes that have taken place

Thanks to Jeanette Taylor the lives of Quadra Island's First Nations ancestors and those of the Eurasian pioneers will endure, and their tales remain much more vivid than memories alone.


Drive by the senior housing lot on O'Connor Drive and see the tremendous improvement resulting from work by generous volunteers.





<u> Halliday's Viewpoint</u>

Ostracizing Iggy

n my relatively short life time, Canada has had 10 Prime Ministers or an average of about 1 every 5 years. Obviously it is not such a simple average, as the tenures vary from short such as John Turner's 78 days or Kim Campbell's 4 months, 16 days as our National Leader: to lengthy as in Pierre Elliot Trudeau's split-term government leadership totaling 14 years. We've had entertaining PM's such as Trudeau and John Diefenbaker (strange, but entertaining nevertheless) to yawners such as Joe Clark and the aforementioned John Turner. We've had Nobel Laureates (Lester Pearson), street scrappers (Jean Chretien), clowns (Diefenbaker, again) and crooks (arguably, Mulroney qualifies).

Sometime in the near future we will be asked to return to the polls to select a new national leader. The contest will again be between Stephen Harper, seeking his third win since 2006 and Michael Ignatieff, who is hungry for a first term. Remarkably, Ignatieff faces stiff competition in spite of Harper's widespread unpopularity, and the Liberal's poll position has been in steady decline since the summer of 2009 after gaining ground for over a year prior. There is no evidence either offer Canadians a hope of a political miracle maker, which is disappointing to those of us seeking a refreshing new regime in Ottawa, such as what was promised America in last November's presidential upset. To those of us seeking a new Trudeau, the slate of prime ministerial candidates for a potential 2010 Federal election offer no such promise.

I deem Harper's challenge to Ignatieff as stiff because of Ignatieff's seeming inability to connect with Canada and Canadians nor capitalize on Harper's shortcomings. Everyone already knows about Ignatieff's long absence from the Canadian scene, helped along by the nasty ads produced by the Conservatives only a few months ago. But no rational person can fault Ignatieff for pursuing accelerated success overseas - if it were such a crime then we would be shunning half of the stars of the music and entertainment world who similarly seek their fortunes beyond Canada's borders. His desire to return to Canada and seek high office is driven mainly by his enormous ego, but anyone taking the time to study his past can readily see his potential as a capable national leader, capable of matching wits with any counterpart, particularly the Mensa level IQ possessed by

America's current president. Personally, I they feel that, then all I can say is — I wouldn't believe having an egghead in office has been successful in the past, in evidence of which I submit Lester Pearson and Pierre Trudeau as shining examples. But Ignatieff lacks the charm of Pearson and the charisma of Trudeau, and comes across as cold and insensitive... hence, his low standing in the polls.

Rex Murphy (Globe and Mail – 25/09/09) puts it well with his usual direct style. "So, in sum, what have we here? A fresh, intelligent leader, untainted by association with the Liberal Party's more egregious sins - the wreckage of sponsorship, lingering factionalism from the Martin-Chrétien duel - with a record of high career achievement in the competitive worlds of U.S. and British journalism and academia. This man should be rocketing upward in every poll, and the party he leads, a vote-vacuuming miracle for the better part of a century, should be randy with confidence over the next election, whenever it comes. But he's not, not at all. And his party is lamely trailing, in the midst of a recession, the dour, somewhat accident-prone, unexciting Harper Conservatives".

For a possible answer to Rex's query as to what we have here, Vancouver's Terry Glavin penned the following for the Georgia Straight in August 2006 - "His charmed career as a leftwing intellectual has taken in everything from seven honorary doctoral degrees to his picture on the cover of GO magazine. And Ignatieff's initial support for the Anglo-American invasion of Iraq was the gravest possible transgression from liberal-left orthodoxy, especially in Canada. If you are a person whose idea of Canada reads like the script of a Michael Moore documentary, it is enough to make you want to open a vein". In this same article, Ignatieff answers the questions as to why some people seem to dislike him so much in his typically glib manner - "I'm sure it has something to do with me and my obnoxious personal characteristics. I'm sure."

In the same vein, during an interview with the Globe and Mail's Michael Volpy (12/12/08) Ignatieff said of himself, "I think there are people who would say I've been very ruthless in my life. I am someone who has worried greatly about the price my ruthlessness has inflicted on others. I have worried about that. I do worry about that. I don't want to litter the slopes with bodies. There may be people who I've left behind who feel that I was ruthless, and if

apologize - all I could say is, I don't want to hurt people." Later, on the same subject - "The point about ruthlessness that's important is that I am prepared to pay the price of my own life. You can pay your own bill, but inflicting the cost on other people is very hard — and you do get up in the night and think of that." So, in a nutshell, Mr. Ignatieff is a self admitted ruthless man with obnoxious personal characteristics, which sounds more like a description of George W. Bush rather than a candidate for our highest national office.

Rex Murphy's recent comment included this take, which as usual is spot on. "What has he to say to Canadians? Why did he come home? How is a Canada with Michael Ignatieff as its leader a better, different Canada than one without him? What's special, distinct and intrinsic to his personality and style that adds something to the country he proposes to lead? Mr. Ignatieff has not only not answered these most basic questions. He signals by style and statement that he hasn't worked out the answers for himself, not to speak of his fellow citizens. What we have so far from him is a credentials candidate, a list of qualifications, all neatly typed on very fine quality paper. On the page, he's great. He'd make the perfect university president. But where is the touch of style and manner, the evidence of real passion infusing new ideas, that connects him to, or makes him a vessel for, the shared aspirations of an entire people? Where's the leader quality?"

Certainly when the time comes for us to trudge to the polls again we will be offered a menu of candidates little different from that presented us in October 2008, and the chance of us gaining a leader with gravitas, charisma, charm and intelligence is rapidly becoming remote. It may be debatable whether all leadership candidates equally share the quality of intelligence, but it is clear that none of them possess much, if any, of the former three attributes. Ignatieff holds promise, but has failed to communicate his potential qualities to Canadians and might best be employed learning the ropes in the House for a few more years before reaching for the gold ring. He has never held public office before, after all. Who knows, by the time new Liberal MP Justin Trudeau makes his run for the PM's job, Ignatieff might have figured out how to connect to Canadians. Somehow, I doubt he will, which might just be the best thing for Canada.

Climate Action - A few issues ago, I announced both the formation of the Cortes Climate Action Group and my prioritization of putting climate action on the regional agenda. The Cortes group has now completed a Cortes Green House Gas (GHG) Inventory available on line at www.cortescommunityplan.ca on the 'climate action' page. The group will soon be conducting a community consultation process and will be making GHG reduction recommendations for Cortes. Their efforts will be key in helping us design GHG reduction targets as part of our new Official Community Plan (OCP).

At the regional level, much is in the works. At our Strathcona Regional District strategic planning session in August, sustainability and climate action was identified as one of our key priorities. At the Union of BC Municipalities Convention in Vancouver in late September, I convened a meeting for SRD board members and staff with municipal climate action leaders and nonprofit groups who support local governments' climate work. From that, we have one scheduled board training on climate change and another one or two in the works. Next is to ensure that the SRD 2010 budget oriented thoughts with me, please do! prioritizes climate action work. Lorraine, your OCP Education Coordinator, and I are also working to bring a few provincial climate action leaders to Cortes.

Official Community Plan (OCP) update - The OCP steering committee has been busy helping design the process for the 2010 review work. I expect that we will be issuing a Request for Proposals in November for professional coordination of the review and we are discussing how to make that entire process as Cortes-generated as possible. We have just launched the OCP website www.cortescommunityplan.ca so check in regularly as it will frequently have new content. It will also become more interactive as we go.

I am very pleased to announce that Brenda Hanson, Sandra Wood and Sarah O'Shannessy are your Seniors/Elders Official Community Plan (OCP) Coordinators now through May. They will be learning from seniors about the previous OCP review processes so as to inform the design of the upcoming review. 
