

Preparing for British Columbia's Biodiesel Requirements

As You may be aware last December the Government of British Columbia mandated that diesel sold in British Columbia after January 1, 2010 must contain an annual average of 5% renewable content (such as biodiesel This letter is to advise you that we began delivering up to 5 % biodiesel commencing January 1 2010.

All diesel handlers should ensure their equipment is suitable for diesel containing 5 % biodiesel It is your responsibility as the equipment owner to take any corrective, measures necessary to ensure your tankmaterials and filtering equipment are compatible with biodiesel.

Biodiesel has a heavy solvency effect and can cause water pick up. If the debris of water from tanks were to be picked up it can cause premature filter plugging, corrosion, and vehicle damage Therefore, it is imperative all tanks be clean and dry Since biodiesel may pick up residues and may also contain low levels of insolubles from plant matter it should be considered mandatory to use dispenser filtration. Filters used or conventional diesel are typically inadequate for biodiesel blends containing 5 % biodiesel.

An afternoon breeze blows through an open doorway under the opening titles of Kiyoshi Kurosawa < http:// www.villagevoice.com/related/to/ Kiyoshi + Kurosawa > 's Tokyo Sonata. It portends a coming storm and violent winds of change about to uproot the lives of the movie's characters, just as the economic implosion of Japan anticipated

The film centers on Ryûhei, a 46-yearold middle manager for a Tokyo medical equipment company whose entire department is outsourced to China. Ryûhei guards the news from his wife, Megumi and their two sons, continuing to don his suit and tie for a daily triathlon of dead-end job interviews, soup-kitchen lunches, and afternoons at a public library.

Rhuhei is not the only one adept at deception. Megumi continues to play the part of the obliging homemaker. Youngest son Kenji pockets his lunch money for piano lessons. Eldest son Takashi calmly announces that he's joining the military no matter what anyone says.

Kurosawa here uses the microcosm of family to reflect a changing Japanese society—one that he sees staggering awkwardly into the 21st century, weighed down by faltering notions of tradition and a profound lack of internal communication. Kurusawa's abiding concern has always been the alienation of modern life. Using the domestic milieu, he shows the subtle fissures in society which threaten to short-circuit people.

Kurusawa shows the collective yearning for renewal, then pushes Tokyo Sonata and everyone in it to the brink. It appears the world has been turned on its side. It is here that the considerable beauty of this recession-era tonic grows deeper and more personal, as something oddly like hope arrives in the guise of chaos.

QICSS AGM Feb 23 7:30 pm at QCC

Many newcomers to Quadra are probably wondering what the heck is QICSS. QICSS is short for Quadra Island Conservation and Stewardship Society. It was formed in 1990 to purchase and preserve the only private property fronting on Morte Lake. This 57 acre property has a covenant registered on it stating that it is to remain in its natural state except for the two existing trails. OICSS is responsible for maintaining the property and ensuring that the covenant is followed. We also feel it has the right to monitor and comment on all commercial activities in the Morte Lake watershed. In fact the first purpose listed on the incorporation document is "To preserve, protect and enhance the quality of the human and natural environment of the area".

As a stewardship society QICSS, can hold covenants on other properties. Restrictive covenants are a way to control what happens to a property in the future. They can be simple such as stating "no subdivision" or they can specify specific conditions for multiple areas of the property. We presently are a covenant holder on Linnaea farm on Cortes, and two properties on Quadra. As the covenant holder we are required to do regular inspections of those properties to ensure that the covenants are being followed.

QICSS is looking for two or three new stewards to replace retiring members. The work is easy and the meetings are generally bi-monthly. Supporting our Social Mosaic: A Community Planning Workshop

Our community is actively working on preparing a Social Development Strategy for the City of Campbell River. A Social Development Strategy aims to create a coherent, collaborative and practical approach to addressing local social issues. We are looking for input from the community and inviting interested members of the community to attend a free 11/2 day planning workshop that will be held on Friday, February 19th in the afternoon (2 pm to 5 pm), and Saturday, February 20th (9 am to 4 pm) at North Island College in Campbell River. The goal of the workshop is to identify gaps in our health and social services and prioritize actions to address those gaps.

The agenda for the February 19th afternoon session is based on a panel discussion with local representatives from a range of sectors followed by questions and comments from workshop participants. The agenda for the 20th includes seven separate workshop tables, with each table addressing one of the following social development areas:

- · Social inclusion, accessibility and food security
- · Public safety
- Training, employment and income security
- Housing, shelter and homelessness
- Health and well being
- Children, youth, seniors and families
- Community development

This process will be assisted by local artists who will be creating artwork reflecting the discussion at each workshop table.

The Campbell River Social Planning Committee is comprised of volunteer members representing different service providers who support the importance of social development planning for our community. We have been meeting since May 2003 and participation has been encouraged from as many agencies, groups and interested individuals as possible.

It has been a slow but worthy process. In May of 2009 the Campbell River Social Planning Committee hosted the "Ann Elmore's Legacy: Preparing for Social Change" event with the expert assistance of the Social Planning and Research Council of British Columbia (SPARC BC). With SPARC BC's assistance once again, the upcoming workshop on February 19th and 20th, 2010 is intended to build the consensus, commitment, cohesive collaboration and detailed content needed to create an effective and inclusive Social Development Plan for Campbell River. We welcome anyone who wishes to participate.

Our vision is that Campbell River encourages and provides access to opportunities and resources for all residents to meet their basic needs and realize their full potential.

Our Objectives are:

- 1) To develop a social plan for the community of Campbell River.

How to **Safely Offer Physical** Assistance to the Elderly

Many of us are faced with aging parents or relatives who need a hand to help with the physical activities of life. We all would like to help but some hesitate because unsure of just how to do it properly.

Quadra Circle invites anyone interested in learning how to knowledgeably and safely extend a supportive hand to come to a presentation given by Colleen Swanson. Colleen is a community health worker with years of experience working with the elderly. She has a keen interest in teaching and has many tips to share with us on such things as safely helping someone get out of a chair or into a car, with toileting etc.

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Quadra Island Medical Clinic Update/Changes

Over the past year there have been a few changes at the clinic that we thought we'd share.

These include a few new services and a change to our booking system.

New Services:

1. LABORATORY SERVICES

As many of you are aware, the Campbell River Hospital Lab is now working out of our office on Wednesday mornings from 7am-10am for drop in lab collection.

2. INTEGRATED HEALTH NETWORK

The Integrated Health Network, a team of dietitians, nurses and social workers come once per week for appointments with patients with chronic diseases.

3. PHYSIOTHERAPY

Klari Varallyai, Physicotherapist from Campbell River Physiotherapy is here on Wednesdays seeing patients in the clinic and Vitalis Gym. Appointments are booked through our clinic at the regular phone number.

BOOKING CHANGES:

1. Many of our patients prefer to be seen by the doctor the same day they call for an appointment. We try our hardest to ensure patients who need to be seen the day they call are accommodated. Please indicate if your problem may be urgent when calling.

2. We start booking appointments at 930 am each day and fill the schedule as we get calls.

Our same day bookings are meant for responding to one urgent problem only and they are booked as 5-10 minute appointments.

3. If you are calling for an appointment such as a complete physical, biopsy, consultation PAP smear, review of chronic illness or form completion please book ahead of the day you wish to be seen and ask for a longer appointment. These appointments are 20-30 minutes long. Longer appointments are usually not booked for the same day you call.

4. Changing to this system has proved to be a positive move for most patients. We can accommodate most requests to be seen the day a patient calls however, some days this isn't as easy to do as others. Two days per week we have two doctors working on the same day, giving us more appointment slots on those days. If a Doctor is out of the office to attend a



meeting or when we have holidays or illness, we have less coverage than a normal week and it may be more difficult to get in when you want.

5.How can you help to make sure this system works for you? If you have more than one problem that needs to be discussed, book a longer appointment by planning ahead and booking a few days in advance. Our same day appointments are for one problem and are meant for short appointments. It seems lately there has been some confusion that we do not book appointments. If you are working, live off Quadra Island or find it difficult to call the same day, you can book a longer appointment ahead, but you may need to wait a few days or possibly a week, as we only leave a few long appointment slots per day.

6.We are working hard to make this system work and appreciate your feedback. We have reduced the number of no show appointments significantly by getting patients in the same day rather than having patients forgetting appointments booked in advance. Another positive outcome from same day appointments, is that you can deal with a problem right when it is bothering you instead of coming in with a list of things that may not be as pressing at the time of your appointment.

Regional Hospital District Elects Chair/Vice Chair

The Comox-Strathcona Regional Hospital District (CSRHD) board of directors has again elected Charlie Cornfield as its chair and Paul Ives as its vice chair.

"Health care remains a significant issue for all our residents, no matter where they live in the region," said Cornfield. "The past year has been a demanding one as we grapple with serious and longranging issues, and I am hopeful that we will come to resolution on those issues in the year to come. I know that I am up to the challenge and look forward to working with the vice chair and the board to ensure the best choices are made for our future."

In addition to dealing with the general issues around health care facilities in the region, the board will turning much of its attention to the proposed new hospitals in Campbell River and the Comox Valley.

Charlie Cornfield is the mayor of Campbell River and Paul Ives is the mayor of Comox. Both are also directors on the board of the Comox Strathcona Regional Hospital District.

The CSRHD provides capital funding, cost shared with the provincial government on a 60/40 basis, with the hospital district portion being 40 percent. The facilities that the CSRHD funds are: Campbell River & District General Hospital, St. Josephs Hospital, Cumberland Regional Hospital Laundry Society, Gold River Health Clinic, Zeballos Health Clinic and the health centres on Cortes and in Kyuquot and Tahsis.

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s Our Children Learning?

he other day my wife attended a birthday party for one of our grandchildren, a task she has faithfully carried out for almost every one of the seven birthdays that occur annually...a task from which I have been mostly, and thankfully, excused. This party provided an example of why I am so grateful for my absence from such events, since our birthday boy and his little brother misbehaved terribly by anyone's standards, horrifying their mother and grandmother and putting a real damper on the event. Of course, the boys were disciplined severely enough to warrant second thoughts about their behaviour in future...at least so one would hope. Of course, all of our grandkids are little angels most of the time, just like your kids and grandkids. OK, at least the majority of the time most of them behave... well, some of the time, anyway. However, if my siblings or I had ever misbehaved in the variety of ways I have seen each and every grandchild perform (at least once)....frankly, it's simply unimaginable we would have done so in the first place. In our household, the word "No" was reserved for our parents use alone, and punishment was always delivered as promised. But of course we were raised a lot differently in the 50's and 60's, and our parents were only one generation removed from a world where child labour was socially acceptable.

I was fortunate to have a stay-at-home Mom, back in the days when the nuclear family - six of us, in our case – could comfortably survive on one working parent's (most often the father) full time income. Since then, we have seen the family unit change dramatically, with most households now having to rely on outside child care to allow both parents (if indeed there are two) to work, even with a significant reduction in average family size - 2.5 persons according to the 2006 census. Often the cost of child care consumes well over 50% of the income generated by the now-working parent, creating a frustrating financial treadmill for the family. Arguments about strained finances and necessary divisions of responsibilities are probably the largest source of friction for young couples, and exposing kids to family friction is quite simply a bad thing. Numerous studies have demonstrated the net overall value of providing good quality early childhood care, both to the family unit and to society as a whole, is tremendous. Now that the demand for such care has become an urgent societal need it is time for all levels of government to reexamine their commitment and funding to early childhood development.

No one would ever deny the benefit to society of a population of well adjusted, socially skilled kids that have an interest in (if not a thirst for) learning, and who understand the basic rules and expectations of society. None of these attributes are inherent in our genes - they must be taught to us, and the sooner a child is exposed to an environment charged with teaching them such essentials the better: be it at home from a full-time home caregiver, at a daycare facility or at a preschool. With the odds being very high that today's child is a member of a single parent or a dual income family, the lower the odds of getting adequate teaching at home, making the need for additional, better and cheaper child care immediate and urgent.

A September 2009 report commissioned by the Child Care Resources Sector Council (Workforce Shortages Socio-economic Effects Report - Robert Fairholm) examines the economic value of child care to society, or more specifically the economic stimulus effect of investment in early learning and child care. The study indicates that every dollar invested in child care programs provides \$2.30 in economic output, or put another way, every \$1 million of investment would create 40 direct and indirect jobs. In comparison, a \$1 million investment in construction projects (the biggest present beneficiary under typical government economic stimulus programs) only generates 10 jobs. Clearly an investment in social infrastructure, particularly one with such obvious and varied benefits, is vastly superior to our past reliance on investing in physical infrastructure on a dollar and sense basis alone.

In the same vein, a paper released by the UK-based New Economics Foundation (whose motto is "Economics as if people and the planet mattered") entitled "A Bit Rich: Calculating the real value to society of different professions", indicates a similar cost-benefit scenario. In their report they conclude, "Both for families and for society as a whole, looking after children could not be more important. As well as providing a valuable service for families, childcare workers release earnings potential by allowing parents to continue working. They also unlock social benefits in the shape of the learning opportunities that children gain outside the home. For every £1 they are paid, childcare workers generate between £7 and £9.50 worth of benefits to society."

The same report concluded the following about accountants - "Determining the right amount of tax payable is a specialist skill

and often requires professional support. However, some highly paid tax accountants' sole purpose is to help rich individuals and companies to pay less tax. We found that the positive benefits to society of these activities are negligible. However, every pound that is 'avoided' in tax is a pound that would otherwise have gone to HM Revenue. In our model we looked at how this lost revenue could have been better spent. For a salary of between £75,000 and £200,000 tax accountants destroy £47 of value for every pound in value they generate."

Canada's child care sector is in terrible shape right now, yet the Federal government is exacerbating the problem by cutting funding. The Chair of the Child Care Advocacy Association of Canada, Jody Dallaire, made this observation about the situation. "Canada has, in fact, a triple market failure. We have the lowest child care access rates in the industrialized world, with regulated spaces for fewer than 20% of children. Parent fees are among the highest anywhere, often exceeding the annual cost of university. And quality is constantly undermined by low wages and poor retention rates for early childhood educators." In 2006 there were approximately \$950 million in Federal dollars dedicated to improving child care spaces and services – the program figure for 2009 is \$600 million. In 1999, Ottawa promised such funding to reach \$1.55 billion by the year 2008. Understandably, our child care advocates are worried about the direction in which we are headed, as should be anyone who cares about the future of our kids and grandkids.

Today's kids will face a world that is bound to be far more economically challenging than the world of 2010, particularly in view of our shrinking birthrate and declining educational quality. Children in other nations such as Japan and China are going to have an incredible leg up on their Canadian counterparts due to the importance placed by these countries upon early childhood development. Canada's economic future will depend on our children being able to effectively communicate, compute and compete, yet our present policy is to cut funding at every level of education. We owe it to the kids to do better by them and we owe it to society to ensure our kids are the best we can make them. We have to do better, and early childhood education is a critical first step.
