GUNNERED DOWN

Rezoning for Grieg Seafood's Massive Gunner Point Fish Farm and Island Scallops' Rebecca Spit Scallop Farm Were Both on the Table at the Strathcona Regional District Board Meeting Tuesday, March 23rd. Both Were Denied.

"What started out as a well-intentioned attempt by the Electoral Area directors to precipitate major changes in how the finfish farm industry operated has proven to be unobtainable at this time due to a host of circumstances.

The regulatory framework has changed dramatically. It is unknown if any of the conditions that we had negotiated with the applicant could be carried out under the new jurisdictional changes that are anticipated for 2011. That is too far off in the future with no guarantees of what anything will look like at that time. Due to these extenuating circumstances, staff, legal advice and the directors all feel that this process can not be left hanging any longer". - Jim Abram Area C Director

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

Salmon and Oil

What a great presentation by Ian McAllister of Pacific Wild. Friday, I came up from Victoria to Quadra Island for the weekend to spend time with relatives and take in a slide show and talk by Ian on March 13th. I was drawn to make the trip to hear about the Great Bear Rainforest. I am fascinated by the Spirit Bear, Kermode, who pop out every so often from unsuspecting black bear mothers and are neither albino nor a separate subspecies. How wonderful that we have on our BC mid-coast these unique creatures of the forest and coast. They feed on WILD salmon!

So do a group of coastal wolves – they can actually swim underwater to fish for salmon. These wolves are likely a subspecies, unique in colouring and habits. Salmon are hugely important to these creatures who have graced those coastal inlets for millennia.

Salmon, like a spoke in the web of life, feed indigenous peoples, coastal communities, wildlife, and marine mammals – they are all interrelated. Salmon are threatened on many fronts by man's activity: over-fishing, fish farm practices,

rising water temperature, pollution, and change in pH balance. And now the looming threat of oil tanker traffic and potential oil spills on our coast. A pipeline across BC to Kitimat to carry Alberta Tar Sands oil and ship it to the Orient will involve huge tankers navigating around coastal islands and into long inlets. How short are our memories to not recall the devastation of the Exxon Valdez oil spill, an impact that is still felt today, and the oil company never paid, as if money could ever compensate for the destruction. Can we sit idly by while the same mistakes are made in our waters on our coast?

Like so many of us, I've had my head down, working hard, raising a family and thought the government was looking after things for the next generation. In any spare time, I was enjoying being entertained - movies, tv, games and sports -distracted, like many Canadians. When I looked out of my cocoon, I realized the values I thought we stood for as Canadians had eroded. I was believing in the myth that we are a nature-loving population. When pay-back time hits, I hope the next generation won't judge us as harshly as our actions, and inaction deserves.

REGIONAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT Area B

=____ by Noba Anderson =

Last year's rezoning application by Grieg Seafood for a proposed fish farm site at Gunner Point near Sayward has now been finally denied.

There will be no fish farm at that site - closed containment or otherwise. At third reading last spring, the Strathcona Regional District (SRD) board gave conditional approval to the rezoning application with many conditions including a letter of undertaking requiring Grieg to move that site to closed containment as soon as commercially available. Although our tools were quite limited, our motivations were clear. This was our attempt to move the industry into closed containment operations as soon as possible. Nine months later, the conditions at 3rd reading had not been met and it did not seem that our efforts would be successful. The rezoning application was therefore unanimously denied by the SRD board at our March 23rd meeting - the first available opportunity to move forward on this issue after having received a long awaited letter from the Ministry of Community and Rural Development.

In January, the BC Supreme Court in Morton v. British Columbia upheld its previous ruling that determined the regulation of finfish aquaculture is a federal responsibility. The judgment extended the regulatory transfer deadline for this industry to December of this year and ordered a suspension on approvals o f new marine finfish licenses in BC. In January, the Province placed a moratorium on new finfish aquaculture licenses and tenures. The result of these rulings is that the whole regulatory regime for finfish aquaculture in BC is shifting. We do not know what the new regime will look like, how it will impact the industry or what

the impacts may be on land use decisions. For all the above reasons it would not have been prudent for the SRD to proceed with the application. The board will not be receiving any further finfish rezoning applications until after the new federal regulatory regime has been established. At that time, I would very much welcome an application for a zone that supported a closed containment system. I am very relieved to have this issue behind us, and am truly hopeful that we are at a real turning toward closed containment in salmon farming.

Quathiaski Cove Ferry Terminal Closure and Alternative Service for Quadra and Cortes Islands

Tuesday, April 6 - Saturday, April 10, 2010

BC Ferries' dock at Quathiaski Cove on Quadra Island will be temporarily closed for five days while a new berthing structure is installed. Alternate service will be provided for both Quadra and Cortes Islands during the dock closure from April 6 through 10, 2010.

BC Ferries is making this \$5.3 million investment at Quathiaski Cove to ensure continued safe, reliable service for years to come. Components will be pre-fabricated off-site to minimize the necessary dock closure period.

During the closure, the MV Tachek will operate three round trips per day between Campbell River and Heriot Bay on Quadra Island, transporting commercial and essential vehicle traffic only. Beginning March 15, all customers will be required to reserve their required sailing by calling 1-888-BC FERRY (1-888-223-3779).

The MV Tenaka will operate three round trips per day between Campbell River and Whaletown on Cortes Island. All vehicular and foot traffic are welcome and will be loaded on a first-come-first-serve basis.

In addition, a water taxi service will be available to transport foot passengers between the Campbell River and Quathiaski Cove terminals. This service will operate approximately every 20 minutes, from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. There will be no direct ferry service between Heriot Bay and Whaletown during the five-day period.

REGIONAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT Area C

This will be my last report before going on holidays. I wanted to make sure the you were given as much information as possible regarding the many contentious issues that are going on right now prior to my departure.

So, I am going to dive right in.

Scallop farm public hearing rezoning results

The public hearing was held on Wednesday, March 17th at the Community Centre and was a packed room. More than 200 people attended.

This has been a very highly charged issue since its inception and that was obvious at the hearing. After the hearing, the directors were charged with reading two three inch thick binders of presentations prior to being able to make a decision at the SRD Board meeting on Tuesday, March 23rd.

This was a very difficult decision to make in that the applicants are our neighbours and were asking to establish a use that might improve economic development opportunities for their people. The choice of the siting of that use was probably the most contentious part of the application and certainly the part that was spoken about the most often. The other point that was mentioned as often was the fact that the application is contrary to our Official Community Plan. The plan was recently updated in 2007 $\dot{/}$ 08 and had language added to it that would specifically address marine based industrial activities in settlement areas. This was the direct result of applications by the provincial government to establish geoduck farms in the same vicinity and in Open Bay. There was resounding opposition to that proposal and after it was defeated, the language was added to the OCP to insure that it would not happen again.

After a great deal of consideration by the Electoral Area Directors, the decision was to deny the rezoning application for this use in this area. From the input received at and before the public hearing, I believe any person would have been compelled to do the same. This is not in any way a show of opposition to aquaculture nor First Nations economic development, but more a show of support for the OCP and an acknowledgment that this site is not the right site, according to the community.

The OCP was developed in full consultation with the community as a whole and included full and meaningful First Nations consultation. This holds true for previous iterations of the OCP and certainly for the development of the 1990 Shoreline Zoning Bylaw. All First Nations in this area were consulted, in addition to the Hamatla Treaty Society.

I made a subsequent motion to start discussions

with the Cape Mudge Band to find a site that is both suitable and acceptable to the community.

After many, many months of very heated debate, hundreds of submissions and two well attended public hearings, the SRD has denied final adoption of this bylaw.

What started out as a well-intentioned attempt by the Electoral Area directors to precipitate major changes in how the fin-fish farm industry operated has proven to be unobtainable at this time due to a host of circumstances.

The regulatory framework that we were operating under at the time this application came forward has changed dramatically. It is unknown if any of the conditions that we had negotiated with the applicant could be carried out under the new jurisdictional changes that are anticipated for 2011. That is too far off in the future with no guarantees of what anything will look like at that time. Due to these extenuating circumstances, staff, legal advice and the directors all feel that this process can not be left hanging any longer.

It will now be up to the applicant to consider their options after the new legislative regime is in place in 2011. By that time, I hope that closed containment will be the industry standard as we were trying to support / promote in this application.

I am glad that we as elected leaders at the local level did what we did in trying to leverage better practices within the industry to help keep the industry alive at the same time that we were enhancing the protection of the environment and the wild fishery.

Quathiaski Cove Village planning process

The third public meeting took place on Sunday, March 21st at the Community Centre after two and a half very intense days of "charrette" (design workshop) process. I attended all of the sessions and I can assure you that every possible option was considered and reconsidered. It was exhausting at the same time as being very exciting. David Rousseau (the consultant) and five members of the various "teams" of working group members presented the results to a crowd of about 60 people at the Centre and explained how we got to where we did. It was a very well laid out power point presentation and the audience seemed to enjoy it. I fielded questions from the audience at the end and all in all I feel it was a very successful evening.

Now David and his team will pull together all of the details and work with the planners at the SRD and come back to the public in mid-May and give another public presentation. Please watch all of our local media for meeting time and date. I look forward to seeing you there.

Rebecca Spit road work

I have reported earlier that we are going to get improvements on the road at the Spit. The road work has commenced and will hopefully be finished by the end of the month, which isn't too far off. Doug Peters has done some work trying to get rid of the water and break up some of the potholes and then the grader will be brought in to smooth everything out and then material will be added (crushed rock) and graded once again. So we are getting there.

Evans Bay wharf divestiture

I cannot even remember how many years I have been working on getting this wharf divested to the community through the regional district. Let's just say, it has been a very long process! I have been in negotiations with Transport Canada, along with the regional district staff during the last year of this process and it has proven to be a very successful (though slow) process. We have finally gotten the final documents, which we have had to keep confidential since they are dealing with negotiations, and we can now report out to the public on this newly acquired piece of much needed marine infrastructure for the outer islands. I am very pleased to be able to say that we have finally achieved this goal and would like to thank all of the people from Read Island, especially Richard Gilmore, for helping to make it happen. I would also like to thank our Chief Administrative Officer, Brian Reardon, for putting up with my ongoing hounding to get this issue completed! We could write a book about this ongoing saga, but I will let it go at, "We finally did it!"

Taking a break

In spite of having surgery in October and taking a few weeks to recover, this has been the craziest, busiest year of my entire local government career! A number of the issues have been drawing to a close this past week, or at least to a break in work load. It is time for Wendy and I to take a break and get some rest and relaxation. LETTUCE - HISTORY & ORIGIN



Did you know that lettuce is a member of the sunflower family? Lettuce was discovered as a weed growing around the Mediterranean. Egyptians have been eating lettuce for more than 4500 years as seen in Egyptian tomb paintings. Greek scholars discovered many of the varieties of lettuce. It was Christopher Columbus who introduced lettuce to the Americas. One of many popular varieties, Romaine lettuce was named by the Romans who believed it had healthful properties. In fact, the Emperor Caesar Augustus put up a statue praising lettuce because he believed it cured him from an illness!

LETTUCE - NUTRITION

The nutritional value of lettuce varies with the variety. In general, lettuce provides small amounts of dietary fiber, some carbohydrates, a little protein and a trace of fat.

Iceberg is a head lettuce that is very low in nutritional value and flavor. Dark green lettuce leaves always indicate higher fiber, flavor and nutritional value. The most important nutrients in lettuce are vitamin A and potassium. Lettuces, except iceberg, are also a moderately good source of vitamin C, calcium, iron and copper.

LETTUCE - TIPS

Look for salad greens that are darker green in color. Iceberg lettuce has little nutritional value. If possible, do not cut or slice lettuce leaves in advance. Damaged, cut lettuce leaves release an ascorbic acid oxidase, which destroys vitamin C and causes the cut edges to discolor.


Volunteers have made great progress, and your board of directors has worked hard to meet all requirements for public rental housing for our seniors.

Rudder Road Closure

Safety concerns for pedestrians, the condition of Rudder Rd. and the vehicular parking along it, has long been an issue with many Quadra residents and has been discussed extensively at the Quadra Safety Committee meetings for the last 3 years. The Dept of Highways have advised even ordinary maintenance can not be done on Rudder Rd because of the daily volume of traffic and parking alongside road itself.

For the last 2 years, recommendations by the Quadra Safety Committee members from Strathcona RD, local RCMP, Fire and EHS, and by EMCON and Dep't of Highways staff, along with many concerned Quadra residents, have been that Rudder Road be decommissioned, closed to vehicular traffic and parking, and used as foot and bike path only. This would put all vehicular access to the ferry and parking lot through Quathiaski Cove Rd. Pedestrians including children could use Rudder Rd more safely.

The Dep't of Highways and EMCON staff have agreed to proceed with these recommendations and **Rudder Rd will be closed to** vehicular traffic using No post Barriers at both ends of road, by the end of March 2010.

Many residents prefer parking outside of Harbour Authority parking lot for assorted reasons. Closure of Rudder Rd will adversely affect some of these residents who presently park along this road, but it is felt that this is offset by the improved safety for pedestrians using Rudder and Green Roads.

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Feral Cat Group Marks One-Year Anniversary

100 Surgeries for Unwanted Felines

The Quadra Feral Cat Group marked its first anniversary of trapping and fixing the island's abandoned cats this month, and its efforts have prevented the birth of hundreds of unwanted kittens.

The number of cats and kittens taken to the vet in the last 12 months is about to reach 100, and the volunteers continue to trap and spay/neuter cats at known feral colonies. The Quadra Feral Cat Group also continues to receive calls about stray cats.

With spring, the group is expecting to see an increase in the numbers of kittens born to stray and feral cats, particularly troubling because no foster homes are currently available to ready these potential family pets for adoption.

To date, the Quadra Feral Cat Group has found adoptive homes for 25 previously unwanted felines. Two cats are currently available for adoption.

The Quadra Feral Cat Group encourages anyone with a cat about to give birth to ensure the kittens go to responsible homes and are spayed/neutered so they won't add to the abandoned cat problem. The group also urges pet owners to have cats spayed or neutered to help slow the island's cat population growth as much as possible.

The Quadra Feral Cat Group is low on resources, and welcomes any donations: time, energy, money, cat food and supplies.

Community support has been remarkable, and the group also congratulates winners of its raffle prize fundraiser: wood carving donated by Coburn won by Paulette McLean; gemstone necklace and earrings set won by Pat C; and the garnet pendant won by Debbie Casavant.

The group's first anniversary was also marked by the departure of its coordinator Lara Fraser, who has left Quadra Island. The group extends a heartfelt thanks to Fraser for her legacy of compassion and caring for the island's unwanted cats and aims to carry on the project she launched a year ago.

LEGACY OR EPITAPH?

arch 23, 2010 saw a major historic milestone pass in America when President Obama signed into law the bill enacting universal health care as federal policy, making it the last industrialized country in the world to do so.

It is hardly a resounding victory, with its passage gaining notoriety as the only major legislation in US history to pass without a single Republican "aye" vote. Remarkably, early knee-jerk coverage of the bill's passage as presidential triumph were making comparisons to Roosevelt's acclaim for the passage of the Social Security Act in 1935, presumably thereby endowing Obama with similar political stature as FDR. Well, let's take a look at the numbers. Sunday's vote in the House of Representatives was incredibly narrow, with 220 for and 215 against...and again, not a single Republican voted in favour. Contrast this with the results of Roosevelt's victory in 1935, when proposal H.R. 7260 passed the house by a margin of 372 to 33. Of course, Roosevelt's Democrats held firm control of the both the House and Senate, with 322 Dems versus 103 GOP's - compare that with Obama's 233 to 202 and one see's immediately his may prove to be a very hollow victory indeed, and certainly not one comparable to Roosevelt's.

It is difficult to understand the schism in the States over what is considered to be a fundamental right in most of the rest of the world, particularly after the exposure of decade's worth of media coverage depicting the health care nightmare encountered by the many millions of Americans that are in the unfortunate position of being poor, uninsurable and sick. The richest country in the world is ranked 43rd in infant mortality rates - this ranks well behind countries such as Canada, Cuba and Slovenia. American life expectancy is ranked at number 47 globally. To obtain these results, US healthcare spending exceeded \$2 trillion in 2005 or about \$7,129 per capita, representing two and one half times the average per capita spending of other OECD nations, according to the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development. Yet all 202 House Republicans - and according to popular polls millions of Americans - believe that "socialized" medicine is akin to Fascism, Communism and heralds the coming of Armageddon at least, and is downright un-American at most. Go figure.

Here in Canada, we have a health care system that is far from perfect but is certainly functional. Our 2007 expenditure on healthcare was \$3,173 per capita, and placed us in 12th place globally for highest life expectancy, while our infant mortality rate comes in at 23rd place. Family health care premiums vary from province to province, but the average is well under \$1,000 per year, while our cousins to the south who presently are lucky enough to have coverage pay an average of over \$4,000, and many have a \$1,000 deductible on their private (employer sponsored) plans, according to a September 2009 USA Today study. However, the current estimated number of Americans with no health coverage (until today, that is) is around 30 million souls. The comparative number for Canada is zero.

Many a night have I been dumbfounded by what I see and hear "ordinary" Americans have to say when it comes to public healthcare, particularly as they are in the clear minority according to most polling. I visited a website offering anti-health care bumper stickers...here are a few of them... "ObamaCare – You can't cure stupid"..."Ram

it down our throats in 2009 and we'll ram it up your butts in 2010" (referring to the upcoming November congressional midterm elections)... ObamaCare is not about medicine, ObamaCare is about control"..."If you think healthcare is expensive now, just wait until it's free"...and so on, ad nauseum. I had a report of a recent trip to the melanoma capital of the world, Palm Desert, California. My source spends quite a bit of time there every year, and often finds himself surrounded by a solidly upper middle class crowd of mostly Republican retirees with plenty of opinions to offer about just about everything. When it came to the healthcare debates, I'm informed that this particular crowd was pretty much universal in their negative views on the subject, with the most cited reason for such a position being that they didn't want to fund, with their tax dollars, Medicare for the "illegals", by which I presume they mean the millions of illegal immigrants that perform the dirty work that most Americans won't. Now by no means do I want to imply that this attitude is endemic, but it is illustrative of the level of ignorance regarding the contents of the legislation, and is certainly reflective of a FOX News perspective on the subject.

Government funded healthcare made its debut in Canada in 1945 when Saskatchewan introduced its hospital insurance program, which was adopted in one form or another by all Canadian provinces by 1961. The availability of medical treatment in Canada is something that most people scarcely give a second thought and is regarded as an inherent right of citizenship, though not one that is codified within our Charter of Rights and Freedoms. The concept of universal accessibility is also an expectation, and any talk of "two-tier" medicine is sure to get your average opinionated Canadian a little hot under the collar. In the aforementioned bumper sticker site I also uncovered one that read -"What's Canada think of their universal health care? It sucks, EH!" - which is clearly untrue and certainly unattributable. Canadians cherish their healthcare system, warts and all, and it is folly to say otherwise. Sure we whine about the delivery of our health care, but we're Canadians and we whine about everything, particularly the weather.

It needs to be clearly understood that the hollow victory achieved by Obama has come at a tremendous cost, and it has given the Republicans a lightning rod with which to galvanize their faithful in the November 2010 midterm elections. It could conceivably cost Obama and the Democrats control of the Senate, rendering Obama a complete lame duck halfway through his first term. 36 seats of 100 will be up for grabs come November 7th, and these seats are presently split at 18 per party. Right now the general expectation is that the Republicans have a firm hold on at least 10 "safe" seats, where there is little risk of an upset, while the Democrats hold only 5 safe seats, so an upset is certainly possible. As noted earlier, today the media pundits are referring to the Obama healthcare victory as his presidential legacy, as Social Security was Roosevelt's. Liberals everywhere now hope, for America's sake, that the Republican spin machine is not able to succeed - as they fully intend to try - in making ObamaCare his political epitaph instead.

The CTO project included development of a comprehensive online Media Kit; the development of Quadra Island Tourism, a packaging workshop with packages submitted from the community categorized under the Escape ~ Discover ~ Connect theme, completed the Website Enhancement; the Collateral Production initiative included the development of a lure brochure and rack card including production; the last segment, Project Management brought the program to life through a strategically targeted advertising campaign with the new website as the call to action.


