Quadra Fire Department's Tanker Pumper T-10

his year, Quadra Fire has a long awaited, brand new Tanker Pumper Fire Truck, (T-12) added to its fleet of vehicles. Purchase of a new truck, which cost \$280,000.00 was anticipated several years ago, and budgeted for, by the FD planning staff and trustees, and thus no monies needed to be borrowed. Current Insurance regulations require Fire Truck Pumpers to be replaced after 25 years, regardless of condition, or insurance costs go up considerably – both liability for fire department and homeowner insurance rates for residents in the fire district.

Currently Quadra Fire Department has two Tankers to carry water to a fire (Engine 12 and Engine 22) one Pumper to move water onto the fire (Engine 11), a foam application pumper (Engine 21) and a 4x4 with 2 inch hoses and foam pumping capabilities. The new Pumper Tanker (T 10) will greatly enhance fire-fighting capabilities with a second pumper and more water on scene. This addition to the fleet, will also allow QI fire department to apply for hydrant equivalency for some of the local water supplies, and if accepted, will reduce the cost of some homeowner insurance locally.

This new pumper tanker (T-10) is 31 feet long, 8.5 feet wide, packs 1500 gals of water, and requires an air brake ticket to drive. In comparison, the present pumper Engine 11 carries 800 gallons and the Tanker (Engine 22) carries 2000 gallons of water.

Long range planning is to replace the existing pumpers and tankers as necessary, to maintain necessary fire fighting standards. As Tanker 12 is both a tanker and a pumper, it is planned to be used as tanker only, after it is 25 years old.



Dear Editor

On August 14, the Friends of Strathcona Park (FOSP) started building a trail up the Bedwell Valley in an effort to stop the government from granting a park use permit to a resort which wants to run a high impact commercial horse operation in the park. After a battle which has lasted close to 6 years, the government appears to be preparing to grant the permit, despite the fact that the overwhelming majority of people who attended public consultation meetings was against it.

high impact, hugely expensive and intrusive operations by commercial concerns are not necessary in Strathcona, and not wanted by the thousands of people who love the park and truly appreciate it for what

The first segment of the Bedwell to Buttle Trail, which is part of the FOSP "Take Back the Park" campaign was built in 5 days, by 24 hard working volunteers. The project was a resounding success. A major part of the trail has been completed, and it was an extremely



The Master Plan was created by the public in 1993, and has worked extremely well since then, until the government decided to change it last year to allow the application by the resort. In a Freedom of Information excerpt from Parks communications, which was blanked out in the original FOI package received by FOSP, Nancy Wilkin, Assistant Deputy Minister of Parks at the time, wrote "I read the letter against this and it was really against "rich" versus "poor"!! Please work with Clayoquot resort to make this happen."

This excerpt, dated August 2006, implies strongly what the government position was, before they decided to ask for public input, (which they then ignored) and it also seems to strongly suggest that Wilkin had little understanding of the real question, which had absolutely nothing to do with "rich" or "poor", but everything to do with the government opening the way for highly intrusive commercial activities in Strathcona Park.

The Strathcona Park Master Plan stresses minimal human impact, and a commercial horse operation is most definitely not minimal human impact by any definition, and particularly not in a Pacific coast rain forest valley.

By building a low impact trail, the Friends hope to show that

rewarding and fun experience for all. Next year should see the trail ready for use. It will cost the taxpayer absolutely nothing.

If the resort gets its permit, (which will almost certainly be soon) it will probably be for something like 30 years. It will definitely harm the park. Once the permit is granted, the government will have legally locked itself in, and if a future government (or even the present government) wants to change it, they will likely face a lawsuit. The best time to stop it is now, before the permit is granted.

Moral and legal exemption for all!

REGIONAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT

There was a time in my life as a director when we actually could count on meetings not being as frequent during the summer months since many people took summer holidays and were not available. Gone are those days, unfortunately! It seems that we have more meetings and functions to attend this year than any previous year. The business of the SRD has increased significantly partly due to the fact that we had the restructuring taking place over the past year and as it happened we were not up to full staffing until late spring / summer. So to make a long and boring story short, I have been extremely busy and have not even had the time to write a report. I will now attempt to bring you up to speed on at least a few of the things that are going on.

Quathiaski Cove sewer property taxation

This was a topic that was not well advertised and caused some angst among some of the property owners within the sewer service area. It is unfortunate that public notices did not go out when they should have to all of the effected parties. During the past year there was a major breakdown of the sewer plant in the Cove. Repairs were made and since the budget did not include funds for that year to pay for the repairs, the funds had to be collected in this taxation year. This is required under the Local Government Act. I was not in favour of any property tax being added to the users of the service since they already pay an annual user fee for the service. It was explained to me by staff that they had no other option in order to collect the money in this fiscal year and that it must go ahead. I asked for a public meeting to be held and it was already too late to organize that. So I asked for a personal letter to go to each property owner to explain the

rationale for the increase. This was done, but once again it was after the fact. The tax notices had already gone out. Staff held a meeting with some of the concerned citizens to give a full explanation and I am told from staff that there seems to be general acceptance for the rationale.

I have told staff that I want to see the property tax portion eliminated in the next budget year. We will see how things transpire.

And while I have your attention on the sewer...

On the SRD board agenda for this Thursday, there is another item that proposes to raise the annual user fee for a residential customer by \$39.00 per year. I have expressed my opposition to this proposal due to the fact that it basically proposes to allocate \$5,000.00 for staff time to manage the contract that looks after the maintenance of the sewer plant and another \$5,000.00 for reserve. Both of these items seem reasonable on the one hand, but premature on the other. I will be voting against this increase on behalf of the present users of the service. I have done my best to deal with eliminating the need for this increase but staff have compelling reasons from their perspective to make the change. I still do not agree with it, with all due respect to staff. I cannot support the increase. Please read on to find out more about why!

More on sewer!

The expansion to the sewer area is finally on its way! It went through the committee and will go through the board on Thursday. There will be properties on the west and east boundaries that are being proposed to be added to the sewer area. This is for a number of reasons. Some have

requested to be brought in, some need to be brought in due to environmental concerns and some of the others, it just makes sense. So, with relation to the previous section on the user fees, I am confident that with the addition of the new properties and the additional user fees from those users, there will be enough to run the system and contribute to a reserve fund without raising the current user fees. Staff tell me that this will not happen soon enough. I respectfully disagree. I think the staff oversight of the contract and the contribution to reserve can wait another year at which time the present user fee rate will cover those costs. And if you are still with me.. Read on! There is more!

Gowlland Harbour Views (Shellinck) Development proposal

The Gowlland Harbour Views proposal has come to the committee and will proceed to the board this month for first and second readings. This is a large development out near April Point and has been in the planning stages for a couple of years. It has about 50 lots proposed (to be phased in) and significant (roughly 50% protected areas or parkland included) green space for the public along with other amenities. There have been two public meetings on Quadra put on by the proponent and many changes have been incorporated due to the public input. The reason I bring this up at this point in the report is, you guessed it, the Q. Cove sewer. There is the possibility of this development having its own on-site sewage treatment. However there is also the possibility of it joining up to the Q. Cove system and injecting significant funds into that system and also adding 50 users over time, thus reducing the cost of running the plant to the rest of the users. I realize that this is all getting very complex. Just try and imagine being on my end of this! It is like a juggler trying to keep 6 balls in the air at once.. no, make that flaming swords!

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
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And then!....

Now we come to the final part of this puzzle. There has been a study in the works for the past three years to look at putting in a sewer system in the Heriot Bay area. There have been two public meetings on this topic, consultants hired using provincial grants to pay for the studies and most recently engineers hired to actually cost it out and look at all feasible options. And guess what option they are favouring? The most recent study has the sewer being brought from Heriot Bay to the Quathiaski Cove plant, rather than a stand alone sewer plant in Heriot Bay with its own outfall beyond Rebecca Spit.

So the SRD is expending considerable effort to try and bring all of the initiatives that have been on the table for years to the forefront at this time. And I commend them for that. I have been hounding them to the point of distraction to get on with the studies so that we will know which direction we are going and when. And here we are.. all at once, of course! Area C is taking up considerable time at the SRD. Our entire Electoral Area Services Committee agenda for August was about Area C issues!

And the last Q. Cove item for now

The Quathiaski Cove Village Planning process has come to the end of its six month "guided" process with our excellent facilitator, David Rousseau. We have had four public meetings and countless steering committee meetings and more emails than I care to remember. It has now been handed off to the SRD planners to put it into some sort of an OCP amendment that we can call a Neighbourhood Plan for the Cove. That happened at the last committee meeting and will go to the board next. We will come back to the community in the fall with the first draft of that bylaw to get community feedback. This has been an incredible community effort and will lead to many amenities for this community, especially in the way of an increase in housing options for all ages, especially seniors. So stay

In the meantime...

I have been to Vancouver on two separate "lobby" trips in the past three weeks. Both were for light stations and keeping them staffed. This is a board policy and also a policy of the UBCM and the FCM. The first trip was a two day whirlwind schedule of meetings with all of the major shipping industry representatives: the Council of Marine Carriers, the BC Coastal Pilots, the International Ship-owners Alliance, and the Washington Group (owners of Seaspan International), and the second one was to attend a private function with the Prime Minister, along with many Ministers, MP's Senators and MLA's. I was able to get time with all of them, including the PM! My travel was sponsored by the light keepers.

And closer to home...

I have been appointed by our SRD board to sit on the Pacific North Coast Integrated Management Area (how is that for a mouthful?). This initiative covers the marine areas from below Cape Mudge all the way to the Alaska boarder. It includes all of the water areas of Area C and the rest of our SRD marine areas. I have attended there first two day meeting in Campbell River on June 28 /29 and will attend the next one in Prince Rupert on Sept. 19 / 20 / 21. I will keep you up to date on any progress made. This process is the marine component follow up to the land planning exercise that I participated in for almost 5 years called the Central Coast Land and Resource Management Plan. This process has a two year sunset clause in it. So it will not go on forever!

And one more thing..

I am entering into a full court press to get high speed internet service for the entire island. The government promised this for ALL rural areas a few years ago. They have had enough time. I think it is unfair that some islanders have next to no service and I intend to do everything possible to improve all options.

So I think that brings me up to about 9 or 10 or more flaming swords all in the air at once. I hope at least some of you have stayed with me to this point. I realize this is a lot of information at one time, but that is the way I am dealing with it and I am trying to keep you informed as I go. There are more items to report on but I have probably taken up more space than I am alloted. More to follow.

And that is definitely it for this report! I am out of breath just recounting it let alone doing it all... 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Seniors Housing News

Quadra Islanders be proud of our community. So many wonderful donations from suppliers and trades people are allowing the Senior Housing Society to complete one duplex (two units) for occupancy by the end of 2010. The second duplex is being framed and we are getting ready to put the roof on. We are fundraising to continue work on the second duplex while the crew are on site. This construction crew are available to us until mid November, with the help of the Ministry of Housing and Social Development. Without that Job Creation Partnership we would still be at a fundraising stage.

The disappointing news is that the Society has been turned down for a grant through BC Housing. BC Housing is a corporation, not a provincial ministry, and administers a Housing Endowment Fund using the interest on invested capital to finance grants. They have simply run out of money for the current fiscal year. Seniors Housing will try again soon to obtain funding through BC Housing. We have no grant to help us complete the second duplex at this time, which leaves it up to our community to donate the funds needed to work towards completion of the second duplex.

We would like your help right now to take advantage of the construction crew. While you, the community, have been generously supportive of this project we are asking for more. Anyone who can make a cash donation we certainly do appreciate the dollars. If you have fundraising ideas to share with the Board please let one of the Directors know how you can help. If you know of or are connected to an agency that may have grant money available, please let us know. We do not want to tap out the community, but this is an important time in the construction phase and we definitely need the help. Watch for the first public walk through of the units under construction. In the next month, we will announce a community invitation to view the interior of the first units before they are completed.

Several Directors are on their way to Hornby Island next month to study their elder village and how they have managed for twenty years to be so successful. This is not our Society's first trip to Hornby. With one third the population of Quadra, Hornby has 11 Seniors Housing rental units completed. They have built them as funds have become available within the community. The last four units were completed in 2008. We can learn from their experience and plan to ask many questions while visiting.

The Board of Directors of the Society are Jeanne Stoppard President, Tucker Dinnes Treasurer, Val Barr Secretary, Ruth Amiabel, Kurt Hagen, Bob Lasby and Riki Winter Vogt Directors. We are all working energetically and putting in many volunteer hours to make this long time dream for Seniors Housing a reality. John Toelle has volunteered so much to this project and has many more volunteer hours to go before we are finished. Thank you again John. We are also very proud of the Society's employees Marshall Toelle Supervisor, Frank Charron - Carpenter, Bernie, Keith and Dan for all the extra effort they are giving to the project. They are all doing a great job.



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
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Solace in Geography

I ummer rain has been threatening to fall all day and finally this evening the clouds let go and gave the ground some sweet release. I went for a run along the spit and could almost hear the dirt sigh, gravel and greenery breathing deeply. Rain hissed on the glassy surface of Drew Harbour and through the ragged cloud break along Heriot Ridge, fiery hints of sunset reflected on the water. I had needed to run all day. I had needed to lose myself in the fresh air and oblivion of exercise and stunning beauty of this place.

Rebecca Spit has always been one of my favourite places on earth. I played there with my sisters and cousins when we were small and gangly, with scraped knees and bare feet and wind tangled hair. I have stood in the field to feel the furious power of a winter storm. In high school we burned our notebooks there at the end of every year, indulgent and ceremonial, watching the heart circled name of last semester's crush curl and turn black in the heat, crawling rather than bursting into flame. And every summer calls for phosphorescent skinny dipping, waking up the yacht dwellers with our delight over underwater starbursts along our naked limbs.

Whenever I come home for a visit, no matter what the time of year or time of day, I make a point of stopping at the spit, walking the length of it, and pausing at the very end to look out over the water toward Heriot Island, Open Bay and the Breton Islands. Take a moment to listen to the whispering ocean and let the salt air rest on my skin. I take solace in familiar geography and feel at once humbled and exalted by it.

Tonight while I ran I thought about the intricate weave of community. The way that as we grow together we blur at the edges so that although we exist independently of one another, we are always linked to one another. No matter how much time has passed we are still linked through history and memory and love. When we lose a friend it is as though we have lost a part of ourselves, a part of our rosy cheeked childhood. Tonight while I ran I thought about Little Joe. About his dark eyes and sweet smile. I ran, took comfort in the constancy of geography, and mourned the loss of a friend.

May he rest easy, may he find peace.

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Parks Deteriorating Under B.C. Liberals **Shows Report**

VICTORIA— An explosive new report from B.C.'s Auditor General shows that the B.C. Liberal government is failing to protect the provinces parks, say New Democrats.

"This report shows how the B.C. Liberal government is failing to protect B.C.'s treasured Class A parks and ecological reserves," said New Democrat environment critic Rob Fleming. "This is just one more glaring example of the B.C. Liberal government's environmental hypocrisy."

The Auditor General's report set out to answer three key questions about the government's commitment to conserving ecological integrity in the park system. These questions were:

- Does the ministry have a vision, plans and operational policies for conserving ecological integrity in the parks and protected areas system?
- Is the ministry ensuring that ecological integrity is being conserved in the province's Class A parks and ecological reserves?
- Is the ministry reporting on the state of ecological integrity within the parks and protected areas system?

In every case the Auditor General's answer was a resounding 'no,' noted Fleming.

"Just a few years ago, the B.C. Liberal premier promised to make our parks the best managed in the world. It's clear from this report that in ten years the B.C. Liberals haven't even done the basic scientific work necessary for informed parks planning and are failing to make and implement plans to stop the decline of species at risk of extinction." said Fleming.

"If we want to protect species and ensure that generations after us can enjoy the natural beauty of our province, we have to do better."

The report found that the B.C. Liberals have failed to offer significant protection for some of the most endangered ecosystems in the province, including coastal douglas-fir, and bunchgrass ecosystems. It also showed that while the B.C. Liberals like to talk about climate change impacting our parks, they have taken no action to help protect them from its negative impacts.

"According to the Auditor General's report, staff in the environment ministry are saying they don't have the resources to properly manage our parks and ecological reserves," said Fleming. "Given that between 2008 and 2010, the B.C. Liberals cut the budget for parks and protected areas by \$6.95 million, or 18.4 per cent, it's no wonder that our parks are deteriorating."

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Wood Stove Air Quality Survey Results Need to reduce smoke pollution continues

With 45 of Campbell River's old smoky belchers in the recycling heap, the City's Wood Stove Exchange program came to an end on June 30.

"Each replacement of an old, inefficient wood burning appliance with a new Environmental Protection Agency/Canadian Standards Association-certified unit brings a reduction in fine particulate air pollution, and we can all breathe a little easier," says Mayor Charlie Cornfield.

The City's wood stove exchange program also included a mobile air quality monitoring component. "With the preliminary results in, we are pleased to see that levels of fine particulate matter are generally very low," says Councillor Roy Grant, liaison to the City's Environmental Advisory Commission. "However, the results also confirm that there are a number of low-lying areas within the City that are 'hot spots' for wood smoke pollution, and we should continue to work toward achieving the best air quality possible for our residents."

The air quality monitoring surveys were conducted January through March, 2010 by staff using a mobile nephelometer or "Nephie." Air sampling occurred between 6 and 8 p.m. on clear, still evenings. Wood smoke tends to settle and may build over the evening hours under these weather conditions.

"Separate readings recorded at the Campbell River Dogwood Ambient Monitoring Station found average smoke levels peaked around midnight, sometimes more than twice the levels recorded by the nephelometer," says Earle Plain, an Air Quality Meteorologist with the Ministry of Environment. Real-time air quality readings for the Campbell River station can be found at http://www.bcairquality.ca.

Eleanor Setton, PhD Environmental Exposures with the University of Victoria's Spatial Sciences Research Lab, found the City's fine particulate data to be low at less than 15 micrograms. "In other areas when we monitor evening wood smoke, hot spot levels are more typically 20 to 40 ug/m3," she says. "It would be interesting to see nephelometer readings for later evening surveys."

Dr. Setton's advice has led the City's Environmental Advisory Commission to support continuing air quality surveys this coming winter and a commissioner has volunteered to conduct the surveys.

The Vancouver Island Health Authority (VIHA) recognizes that fine particulate air pollution is a contributor to many types of diseases, especially lung and heart disease. "Fine particulates are considered the most important outdoor air pollutant from a public health perspective, says Dr. Charmaine Enns, VIHA's Medical Health Officer for North Island."To view the air quality survey results, please visit the What's New section on the City of Campbell River website, www. campbellriver.ca.

Fish farms operating without valid Crown Land tenures

Biologist applies for expired salmon feedlot licenses

(August 23, 2010, Broughton Archipelago) Salmon Feedlots in the Broughton Archipelago are operating on Crown Land tenures that have been expired for years. This week biologist Alexandra Morton has applied for these licences to return them to their natural state to grow wild fish to the much greater benefit of British Columbians and the BC economy.

Crown Land is public land that the Ministry of Agriculture and Lands (MAL) leases to people and companies. MAL is also in charge of regulating the salmon feedlots.

"I don't know how these foreign companies can be in full production for years on expired tenures, but these sites are the fishiest places in the Broughton where we once found the highest concentrations of herring, salmon, prawns and other species," says biologist Alexandra Morton,

"I have made detailed application to MAL to use these sites for what they have done so well for 8,000 years - grow wild fish to the benefit of the people, the economy and future generations who might appreciate the food security in the years to

Morton's applications recognize how the natural architecture of the sites perform to produce upwellings, tide lines and back eddies that attract and feed valuable public fisheries, including prawns, rock cod, wild salmon, herring and other species. Some of the salmon feedlots violate provincial aquaculture-free zones. She writes in the applications:

"A disturbing lawlessness surrounds this industry, they post "no trespassing" signs on non-exclusive leases, that they let expire. On April 1, 2010 they slammed the door on government inspection for disease, while their pathogens free-flow into our richest fish habitat. This industry was unlawfully given to the province to manage who appears to let these companies do whatever they want. Privatizing ocean spaces and owning fish in the ocean is unconstitutional in Canada, is that why the leases have not been renewed," asks Morton? "It is time we find out what is the relationship between this Norwegian industry and all levels of our government.'

Morton thinks people in Nootka Sound, Port Hardy, Discovery Islands and Clayoquot Sound should also look into whether those leases are expired. Contact "Front Counter BC."

"Bottom line is wild fish belong to us and if we don't take a stand and look after them ourselves no one else is going to," says Morton, "there are a lot of rotten politics around this. I hope this year's legendary sockeye return reminds people of just how valuable wild fish are to us.

In May 2010 5,000 people walked with Morton to the steps of the BC legislature to tell the government to get salmon feedlots out of the ocean. www.salmonaresacred.org


Historic Tours Continue!






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HALLIDAY'S VIEWPOINT

LEMONS OR LEMONADE?

ne of the more surprising hits in the "reality" television world is the The Learning Channel's program Hoarding: Buried Alive. According to the show's website - "Hoarding: Buried Alive goes inside the homes of extreme hoarders to explore the psychology behind their compulsion to accumulate and store large quantities of nonessential things. Each episode will tell the stories of two severe hoarders struggling with behaviour that has made every day existence unbearable for both them and their loved ones. With the help of expert therapists and organizers, the hoarders will attempt to unlock the key to their obsessions in the hope of reclaiming their lives."

The reason I call this success surprising is that hoarding is hardly an unusual preoccupation, though I'll grant the subjects of the TV show are extreme examples. Just about everyone is a hoarder to some extent...the problem normally surfaces more as a result of what is being hoarded rather than the act of hoarding itself. I, for example, am a hoarder of books...not to any extreme, mind you – no books clutter our floors or hallways. But it was only a couple of hundred years ago that a man with a collection of books was considered a wealthy man indeed. And had I saved every cent I spent on books in the past 40 years I would indeed be a wealthy man. But then I wouldn't have a great bunch of books, most of which have been read more than once and many of which will be read again, and several perhaps once more after that. A few years ago I was forced by a house downsizing to shed a few hundred pounds of books, an experience I don't intend to repeat and one which is easier to avoid nowadays as the price of books continue to rise, making further accumulation a matter of careful thought and selection.

My father hoarded partially used cans of paint, thinners, oil and a variety of other unidentifiable substances, many of which presented a real difficulty in disposal when we cleaned out his workshop after the decision was made for my mom to move to town. In reality it wasn't very much stuff, but when you are confronted with an unpleasant task its difficulty often grows exponentially with your level of annoyance. Nor was it a compulsion - he was a child of the depression and found it impossible to throw away anything that might still be of use, and you never know when you might need that last 4 ounces of green trim paint. But when the object of one's compulsion becomes a financial drain it becomes another matter entirely.

Many years ago I had to do a home appraisal for a woman seeking refinancing to consolidate her debts. This woman had a well-paying full time government job and no obvious addictions other than to cigarettes, but had managed to run up enough credit card debt that she was having trouble meeting all of her minimum payments. When I first approached her home it offered no outward signs of anything unusual, but upon being invited in I was aware of the odour of mould. The next thing I noticed was an unusual amount of clutter in the kitchen, but when I passed through the kitchen to what should have been a dining area I was no longer able to discern the walls - they were invisible behind a solid layer of stacked boxes (resembling pizza boxes) that reached from the floor to about 6 foot high or so, the limit of this lady's reach, I presume. It turned out that every room in the home, with the exception of the kitchen and bathroom, was similarly lined and in some spots was more than one layer deep. The mould smell emanated from the bathroom, which was rotting away as the homeowner had neither the resources nor the inclination to repair the problem. This was because all of her money and all of her attention was absorbed by the contents of the boxes, which turned out to be "collector" plates - hundreds

and hundreds of them. In hindsight, I'd hazard a guess she had spent over \$30,000 on these objects that had a resale value of perhaps 1% of that amount. In the meantime she'd let the repairs fall behind on her home which probably ended up costing her another \$30,000 instead of the \$5,000 it would have cost to repair at the outset. I'm only one person, but she certainly was far from the first genuine "hoarder" I have met in my life and is probably far from the last.

While making the decision to purchase the business my wife and I now own, I purposely refused to let Norma see the premises until after negotiating the deal with the vendor. I doubt she would contradict me when I say that she would have dug in her heels against the purchase had she seen what we were buying. She knew from the financial statements what the numbers looked like, and she knew that the business had been around for a long time, but had no clue of what it physically looked like. What she didn't know was that it resembled an episode of Hoarding: Buried Alive...and I was paying some serious change to acquire the stuff acquired by former owners, most of which is in the back end of the shop. She was still somewhat dumbfounded when she first walked into the shop, even though I had done a bit of work preparing her for the shock, including showing her photos. Now, 4 months later, the place looks much better, even though I've only reduced the quantity of stuff by a fraction, but in our case the hoard we acquired is best described the saying "One man's garbage is another's treasure"...well, a lot of it anyway.

But to return to the TV show, I really don't fathom its popularity, particularly because every episode seems to resemble all the others...same old junk, different location. When they focus the show on people who hoard interesting stuff, something like Jay Leno's hoard of automobiles and memorabilia related to all things auto, that's when you'll have an interesting program. Or how about Jimmy Pattison's collection of companies? That's a hoard I'd like to have a look at. But no, we're stuck with endless shots of piles of everything K-Tel made and anything the Shopping Channel sells for our visual entertainment. Hoarding: Buried Alive is nothing but voyeurism into the lives of very disturbed people, which I guess helps to explain its popularity in a nutshell, since voyeurism is the new frontier of reality TV.

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Poli-Psy 101

eople keep asking me what it's like to be psychic. They're expecting me to either gush about my 'gift' or play the humble card, "with great gifts comes great responsibility".
