Quadra Island Cemetery Receives Funds, Makeover

I slanders coming and going along Quadra's 'back' road this summer have seen a transformation take place at the Quadra Island Cemetery. Slowly and surely 'Scottish' Jim plied his stone mason's craft and two new gate pillars took shape and now stand proud at the entrance to the

cemetery addition.

The Quadra Island Cemetery trustees recognized the need for an expansion to the cemetery to serve the community in coming years noting increased demand emerging as a result of our local aging society. The board drew up a plan and approached Coastal Community Credit Union and other local businesses for financial and in-kind assistance to develop the expanded facility.

The Quadra Island Cemetery was established in 1915. In 1963, with the gift of 2.5 acres from Mr. Filberg of Comox Logging and Railroad Company, Quadra Island Cemetery became a Trust. The title of the land was vested in the three original Trustees: Sig Haga, Lloyd McIlwain and George Rose.

A funding proposal was prepared in order to set forth the details of a development project to expand the cemetery, and to determine if financial assistance was available in order to proceed. The development aims to

increase the visual appeal of the Cemetery and create a space suitable for family gatherings related to burials and for visitors to the Cemetery to enjoy and remember their loved ones.


The trustees were successful in securing funding and assistance from local businesses and is now well underway. The project has been managed by the Quadra Island Trustees who extend a huge thank you to: Quadra Island Builders, John Schevers, Sorensen MacDonald Enterprises, G. Roy Dahlnas Excavating, David Neville and Terry Anderson for their financial support and the volunteers that helped with the project: Mel Doak, Frank Boas, Tom Pickering and Barb Baumfield.

The donation from CCCU keeps alive a long-standing relationship between the Credit Union and the cemetery. In March 1963 the first meeting of the trustees was held at the Quadra Credit Union who seeded the new venture with a contribution of \$200.

ISLAND FORUM

Dear Editor,

A lot of new information on the Gowlland Harbour Views development has been appearing lately. In his last report, our Regional Board Member, Jim Abram, reports that the Board is giving 1st and 2nd reading to the the bylaws amending both our Community Plan and the Zoning Bylaw, as requested by the developers. Contrary to what Jim states, there have been no substantive changes to the development proposal as originally presented at two showand-tells organized by the developer, and all the major conflicts with our Community Plan are still part of what is being proposed. With many Q-Cove residents up in arms about ballooning sewer costs, and the alluring prospect that the Gowlland Harbour Views developers might contribute to the sewer costs in the far future, one begins to understand why the problems associated with this development are being ignored by many. We described the conflicts with the Plan in some detail in the Oct. 9, 2009 issue of the Discovery Islander, there are too many to try and repeat here, suffice to say that one section of the plan very specifically prohibits what is now getting first and second reading by the Strathcona Regional Board.

At their meeting of August 11, 2010, which dealt with the Gowlland Harbour Views Development, the Board accepted 2 documents, both available on the Regional District website. The first document is a submission by the developers, which is primarily a lesson in greenwashing, with many pages of pretty pictures and every environmental buzz word that can be found in the dictionary. They are clearly well aware of one of the most serious conflicts with the Community Plan, the absolute prohibition of rezoning the Silviculture Lands for housing, and therefore set out to convince us that silviculture is synonymous with large clearcuts. More on this below, but it is rather ironic for anyone familiar with the owner's, (Rick Schellinck) logging history on Denman Island, where he was responsible for one of the worst logging jobs that we have

seen. This view has been confirmed by many others who visited the site - a section of the Lindsay-Dickson Forest off the main road. Another interesting aspect of the developers submission is the listing of Thorconsult Engineering Ltd. and its principal, Joseph Bonadventure (Bon) Thorburn P.Eng. as being responsible for civil engineering and surface drainage. The web site of the Association of Professional Engineers and Geoscientists of BC shows a Consent Order signed by Mr. Thorburn on May 25, 2010, in which he admits 4 items of unprofessional conduct, all related to sewerage system design. His engineering practice is presently restricted.

If you have ever been involved in planning or zoning issues on Quadra, you should read the second document, the Staff Report, signed by the Chief Administrative Officer of the Regional Board, Brian Reardon. It illustrates the contempt with which the planning staff treat locally developed plans if they happen to get in the way of a pet project, and particularly so if the project includes Development Zones, where they get to call the shots. Mr. Reardon is well aware of the outright conflict between the Official Community Plan and the Gowlland Views proposal, which he views as a great gift to Quadra Island. The Community Plan is but a little bump on his road which he overcomes with an astounding collection of distorted facts, omitted facts and verbal acrobatics (his pages 7 to 9). The general theme is that the Quadra locals clearly did not know what they were doing and could not possibly have meant what the Plan states, and that it should therefore be ignored. The fact is that the plan provisions that are now in Mr. Reardon's way were much discussed during plan development, specifically with regard to the Raven lands along West Road and with regard to Lot 208. The intent was to discourage suburban sprawl, such as Gowlland Harbour Views, and to provide a clear break in the settled areas north of Quathiaski Cove, in addition to assuring that the Silviculture Zone would not become simply a land reserve for future development. Also omitted by Mr. Reardon is the fact that Mr. Schellinck was specifically compensated for the Silviculture restrictions on Lot 208 with \$600 000.-.of our taxpayers money when he accepted a trade of a much smaller, but more easily developed parcel of land on Denman for Lot 208 a few years ago.

The Cape Mudge Band should take notice that the Community Plan is only an obstacle to re-zoning if the Regional Board decides to make it one, the wording of the plan appears to be irrelevant. Having a well connected ex-highways approving officer equipped with a large can of green paint as your main consultant is not a bad idea either if the Community Plan threatens to make problems..

REGIONAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Tell, here we are at the end of the summer season, with Labour Day passed and the kids going back to school. It really feels like fall. The rain was needed but I would not complain if we got a few more months of sunshine and warm weather. I am not ready for this, even though most of September and October will be spent indoors in meetings and more meetings! This happens every year: Labour Day passes and meetings go crazy.

So, last report I presented a long list of things that were coming up at the Board meeting on August 26th. Many of them were to do with sewer issues. And sure enough, they were all on the agenda.

Quathiaski Cove Sewer User Fees

This item was on the agenda for all four readings to raise the annual residential rate for sewer users by \$39.00. This may not seem like a lot, but it was right on the heels of a first time ever taxation on properties within the sewer area to pay for some unexpected repairs from last year. I said in my last report that I was not in support of this increase for a number of reasons, all of which hinged on additions to the sewer area, thereby bringing in more user fees and more connection fees / development cost charges, which would be put into reserve for any possible repairs. The addition of users would even possibly bring the global user fee down over time, rather than looking at an increase at this time. Staff made a good argument to increase it now, since the new users would not be on-line in the 2011 budget year. They would possibly be on-line in the 2012 budget year. Hence, I was willing to take the chance that since we did all of the necessary repairs this last year, that there would be no urgency to increase the rates at this time. There was much healthy debate around the table (this is a full board vote, not just electoral areas). In the end, a vote was taken and the User Fee Bylaw passed. I voted against it, as I said I would do, along with three other directors.

The good news is that this rate will probably be short lived and I have talked with our Chief Financial Officer about reviewing our five year financial plan in great detail and figuring out how we can eliminate the property tax portion all together for next year, or at least significantly reduce it. I hope that we can make that happen. This action in combination with more users coming on-line in the next couple of years should make the financing of the sewer system sustainable. That is the goal.

Sewer expansion area

This received approval by the board to go ahead and draw up the bylaws that are necessary to expand the sewer area to take in some properties on the west and north ends of the defined area. Staff were also directed to develop the best method for voter assent of this proposal. There will be a vote within the sewer area!

Sewer condition and capacity study

This item was passed without a hitch, since it is the key part in this whole issue of sewer use. The study will be paid for entirely out of Gas Tax rebate funds from the Federal government to a maximum of \$25,000.00. Once we know the results of this study, we will be able to make much more informed decisions with respect to sewer issues.

Gowlland Harbour Views proposal

This development out near April Point was to receive first and second readings, but the board felt that there still needed to be more work done on insuring wildlife corridors are protected. This seemed to be a reasonable suggestion by the Mayor of Campbell River and I believe the applicant will be agreeable to having a better look at this item. It was given to staff to deal with and will probably be back at the next board meeting

Park dedication on Read Island

'Mind's Eye' Lecture with Ken Blackburn

Sybil Andrews, in her book Artist's Kitchen, said "It is a struggle to bring our idea to birth: it is our mental and spiritual growth which is of vital importance...". These words have application across all professions and lifestyles. On September 16, at 7 pm, the Museum at Campbell River will host curator Ken Blackburn's talk 'Mind's Eye'. This talk will examine the exhibition 'Mind's Eye: The Campbell River Drawings of Sybil Andrews' currently showing at the Museum. "Sybil Andrews' drawings have much to reveal" says Blackburn. "Not only are they of interest from a fine art perspective, but when examined closely and in conjunction with her thoughts from the book Artist's Kitchen, they offer a fascinating launching point for a discussion of how to live in the world". Andrews donated 126 works to the Museum just prior to her death in 1992. She lived and taught in Willow Point for over 40 years and was a noted English Futurist artist before emigrating to Campbell River after World War II. Blackburn has assembled a collection of her charcoal drawings for this exhibition, many of which have never been publicly shown before. "The Museum's collection is amazing" according to Blackburn. "Sybil Andrews is a major international artist. Her works are very rewarding when critically engaged and reflected on". The talk will also serve as the launch for the catalogue produced for the exhibition. A limited number of copies have been printed and are sure to become collector's items. "I hope the talk will begin a discussion of the value of developing an artist's eye, or a 'Mind's Eye', within ourselves. To see with the Mind's Eye does not mean one has to become an artist. Rather it is a skill that is profoundly enriching for each of us, regardless of our profession". Blackburn is an artist and independent curator. He works as the Museum's Public Program Coordinator and is also the Executive Director of the Campbell River Arts Council. The cost for the talk is \$5.00. Coal: BC's Dirty Secret-The Fight to Stop the Raven Coal Mine

Coal is the dirtiest of fossil fuels, and here in BC we are one of the world's largest exporters. The BC government is supporting a massive expansion of our coal industry at the very time Premier Campbell is claiming our province to be a climate leader.

If allowed to go ahead, this mine will have a major impact on sensitive salmon habitat, the world famous Fanny Bay shellfish industry, local air and water quality, and carbon emissions associated with burning coal.

HALLIDAY'S VIEWPOINT

MOVIN' ON

hanks again to Sheahan and Philip for their generosity and courage in allowing me this opportunity to exercise my limited creative writing skills, and I look forward to providing Discovery Islander readers with some valuable, entertaining and informative writing in future issues."

So closed the very first column of what has evolved into Halliday's Viewpoint, which appeared here in the June 2, 1997 issue under the heading Money Matters; the author's mug shot accompanied the brief and largely biographical piece, but disappeared from the following 336 issues in which Philip continued to print what was submitted. Thankfully for me, that issue's photo was probably the last time that I was ever seen sporting a necktie on Quadra Island. And thankfully for me as well, I've had the pleasure of writing for an audience that has, for the most part, been a very receptive and friendly one.

Whether or not I succeeded in my lofty promises of Issue #138 would be a matter of debate, though it's clear that if my writing style hasn't improved since then I must have a truly masochistic crowd reading my output. Back in 1966 or so, my elementary school teacher wrote in my report card words to the effect of "the class especially enjoys Steve's reading to them at Storytime". I don't know how or when I developed my passion for the written word but I know it was early, and I certainly wasn't isolated in my prolific reading habits - every member of our household was or is an avid reader. But I think I'm probably the most prolific writer the family has produced, though I also have no idea where that trait came from as I was an indifferent English student, though an excellent speller.

My mother shared one of my columns that she found particularly amusing with this aunt, who promptly demolished it with a sledgehammer by way of critical evaluation of my grammatical form and correctness. However, this was as water to a duck's back since I have the privilege of having my column critiqued, on a regular basis, by Quadra's resident master of language appreciation (amongst his many other talents, that is), Paul Mortimer. I would positively pay to see Paul and my Aunt slugging out their grammatical wits, and since content over form takes it every time my money would definitely be on Paul for a TKO in Round One. Anyone who can pluck paragraph- long quotations from the air

- one perfectly suited to the subject at hand - and then quote it verbatim with proper pronunciation and emphasis...well, let's just say I'm much more likely to write to their satisfaction. According to Paul -who can - I do all right, so I've let grammar be damned, or at least be somewhat mangled, with nary a thought. It wouldn't have been as much fun otherwise.

Writing was a major and routine task of my business career. Writing letters, reports, memorandums and speeches on a regular basis helped me to understand some basic principals that made the end product fit the audience for which it was intended, be they colleagues, customers, suppliers, employees, or Directors. However, when writing for an audience that it as diverse as one would expect of readers of the DI, shaping the message to best effect is often the most challenging aspect. The retired USMC Colonel suggested I had no right to criticize their brilliant Commander in Chief, who had just completed his infamous flight to the carrier to deliver his "Mission: Accomplished" speech, and further noted that I had no appreciation of Bush's skill and courage as exhibited in making a carrier landing. Well, we all know now that Bush was as much a fraud as a pilot as he was a president, but at the time I was gratified to see the number of letters defending my column in the following issue...and that there were none supporting the good Colonel's misplaced loyalty to the hapless but dangerous "W".

As regards Cuba, a column titled "Paradise Regained" drew almost no comment from the Islander's readership, but did result in the most vociferous criticism of any piece I have written. With such a plethora of talented people being resident in the Discovery Islands I'm confident the space allotted by Philip will not be empty for long, if at all. So thanks, Philip, for the space and freedom of expression you provided me, and thanks to all of you readers who have made this such an interesting experience these many years. One thought I'd like to leave you with...while our government trumpets BC as the best place on earth, Discovery Islander's live in the best place in BC. Take good care of your special part of the planet.
