#### Letter to the Editor

Jim Abram, the local regional director, published an interesting presentation to the BC Ferry (BCF) Commissioner in the 19 August edition of the Discovery Islander. He justifiably drew attention to the unjust cost of BCF travel, highlighting it as the reason people are leaving the island, for the loss of jobs, reduction in school population, and increasing cost of products.

What is most intolerable for Quadra Island residents, ferry fares or ferry overloading? Private enterprise or even an efficient bureaucracy (don't hold your breath) would diminish both. Regrettably, it is difficult to successfully argue costs when existing ferries are incapable of meeting demand. Only a government or a bureaucrat could have realistic expectations people believe BCF has been privatised, when in reality there is one shareholder - the government. They have simply rearranged the deck chairs on the Titanic - disaster is still inevitable. Any entity operated by a government is inherently inefficient.

Mr. Abram recommends the BCF should be returned to the Ministry of Transport. That's like putting lipstick on the old pig and trotting it out again. The Ministry of Transport, however, does contract out highway construction and maintenance to the efficiency of private contractors and if part of Mr. Abram's recommendation is for all or part of ferry "highways" be contracted out to private operators, that may be a cost effective solution, conditional on well-defined parameters for scheduling and fares.

Sadly, the ferry fare issue does not stand alone as the single source of financial misery inflicted on many Quadra residents. It is unrealistic to single out ferry costs as the sole reason dozens of young families with children and business owners who employ numerous people, part and full-time, for leaving the island. Standing

alone, ferry fares would not be a brain drain on bureaucrats to resolve, however, it is not that simple. The last time I looked, we were in the grip of a worsening global financial crisis that is likely to extend well into 2013. In the meantime, waiting for recovery is not a joyful past-time for many residents.

Quadra Island needs to attract long-term resident families living and working on the island with kids at school by offering affordable housing. Most highend property attracts seasonal residents not beneficial to the local community. There are already too many pockets of expensive waterfront real estate owned by seasonal visitors to the island.

The Strathcona Regional District (SRD) now seems hell-bent on inflaming the situation by opening up waterfront silviculture land at Gowlland Point for residential development. Why the local regional director would encourage the SRD to dream up a passage through the Official Community Plan (OCP) to allow for such a development remains a mystery.

Mr. Abram used one and a half pages of the Discovery Islander rightfully preaching the woes of ferry fares, but is visibly supporting a proposal that will inflict greater misery on Quadra residents by increasing the number of part-time residents. The community and SRD spent two years shaping an ideal development plan for Quadra Island, which was accepted by and in the best interest of Quadra full-time residents. The ink had barely dried on that plan when the SRD, for inexplicable reasons, set about changing it for this specific development proposal. We need to know what is motivating the SRD to hustle this deal through the OCP by-laws when existing requirements prohibit such a proposal. And furthermore, a surplus of residential property already exists on the island in more affordable areas.

# Salmon... the debate continues

# Dear Editor;

I would like this opportunity to comment on the two letters by Deb Banta, one in the Aug 19th issue and the other in the Sept 2nd Courier-Islander.

The statements she makes in both letters are mostly quotes from the fish farm media outlets. She seems to indicate that the ISAv that is in Chile is not of the Norwegian strain when in fact it is. We don't know whether the suspected ISAv infection that is in BC waters comes from Norway or from Canada's east coast. Regardless, we all know that a species in an new environment is often invasive and cannot be controlled. We also know that eggs were imported from the east coast without record of screening for disease although it is not being admitted. Records show that since 2007, 20,082,000 of such Atlantic salmon eggs were imported by the salmon farming industry into BC coastal waters.

In her letter of Sept 2nd, she states that Dr Kristi Miller identified no actual disease agent in migrating wild Fraser River sockeye. I note, however, that Dr. Miller found that both fish leaving the river and returning (except the Harrison run) carry a virus that has been genetically matched to a parvovirus and that stress conditions can activate it. Harrison run sockeye do not pass through the web of fish farms in the east corridor of Vancouver Island. This may be the reason why they do not have the virus.

I have recently come back from five days at the Cohen Commission hearings in Vancouver. These hearings are trying to determine the cause of Fraser sockeye decline in recent years. The Commission has been gathering evidence including research documents and emails from the Department of Fisheries and Oceans (DFO), Fin Fish aquaculture, BC's Ministry of Agriculture and Lands, fish health, etc.

It is interesting to note that Deb Banta, like representatives of fin fish aquaculture, DFO managers, heads of Agriculture and Lands, Fin Fish Health, and related senior researchers, all get very defensive when their positions are questioned by presented information and the line of questioning starts showing an obvious link to fish farms and wild salmon decline. Or that fish farms are even considered to be potentially dangerous to wild salmon stocks.

In some cases, in order to hold the line that fish farms present no threat or consequence to wild stocks, some witnesses under oath are refuting their own research.

During my attendance at the Cohen Commission on Oct. 25th, it came out under cross examination that no application for a fish farm license has ever been denied due to it's location being a threat or even a possible threat to wild salmon.

According to research by Dr. Gerber, exhibit #1364 shows that a fish with the IHN virus (not ISA) sheds 2X10 5th viral

units per fish per hour. In a fish farm of 500,000 fish with a 30% infection, the study indicates, the viral units in the water is in the billions and could have a potentially devastating impact in narrow waterways.

With this knowledge it would seem to me that common sense would dictate that fish farms should not be located in passages such as the east Vancouver Island corridor that is a migration route for wild stocks. So who is standing on guard for wild salmon?

Now that the foxes seem to be in charge of the hen house perhaps Deb Banta could get a more balanced view of fish farms by going to http:// alexendramorton. typepad.com to see what is really going on. It might also be helpful to review the exhibits from submissions and the answers to cross examination on the Cohen Commission website.

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# **MLA REPORT**

has been a very interesting and busy summer for people engaged in the political world. The continuing campaign over the HST referendum and election speculation kept many people on their toes.

The defeat of the tax was dramatic; in the North Island alone, 57 percent of people voted to get rid of it. The majority of people in the majority of BC's constituencies said they wanted a return to fair taxation with BC control over tax policy and tax exemptions. So the Finance Minister has indicated that we will be returning to the situation as it was on 30th June 2010 - with the GST and the PST with the exemptions which helped so many people.

When the Legislature resumes sitting in October, we in the Opposition will be asking why, if it only took a year to introduce the HST, it will take 18 months to switch back. Many business people I have talked to say that once the details are clarified the change will be relatively easy as it will simply be a matter of updating their bookkeeping software. However, builders, painters and other trades people are very worried that the delay will severely impact their businesses as customers put off repairs or renovations for 18 months when they will not have to pay that extra 7 per cent through the HST. So a shorter timeline for the transition to GST and PST is essential.

The overwhelming victory in the referendum swiftly ended election speculation. While Premier Clark said it was because people did not want to go to the ballot box again, her decision not to try to win her own mandate - which she said she would do since becoming Liberal leader in the spring and when the BC Liberals were gearing up for an early election - was clearly driven by the polls. I completely understand people's concern about being election weary - it was only two years since our last

provincial election, we've recently had a federal election and we are due in the fall for municipal votes - but my concern is the impact another two years of Liberal government will have on BC.

My community office in Campbell River is constantly trying to assist people who have lost their WCB pensions; or people with disabilities who, already living well below the poverty level, find they are not able to get assistance for essential nutritional supplements that their doctors say they need; or families with special needs children who cannot get the help their children need. So often we look at the big picture; but it is real people - in Campbell River, Port Hardy, Tahsis, Quadra and in every other community in BC - who bear the brunt of Liberal policies.

There is also the undeniable damage that the government's policies have on our environment. It's not only that there's logging at break neck speed for the foreign markets - but there is now no one providing public interest oversight in the forests. It's not only that mining companies feel they have the right to explore in all corners of the North Island, it's that there is now no one inspecting the impact they will have on watersheds. Of course we need the jobs that our resources can provide but we have to be aware of, and cautious of, the

These are some of the concerns I will take up when we return to the Legislature in a few weeks time. And they will be busy weeks divided between my work as the critic for the Minister of Children and Family Development and with visits to a number of communities and organisations around the constituency. These include attending the Mount Waddington Health Network's meeting on homelessness in Port McNeill as well as VIHA's board meeting, where hopefully we will hear positive news about the continued operation of the emergency room at Port Hardy hospital.

Unfortunately, I will be at the Union of BC Municipalities conference in Vancouver when the ferry commissioner, Gord Macatee, holds his public meetings on Cortes (2pm) and Quadra (7pm) on 26th September. I met with him earlier in the summer and told him that people on the islands would accept no less than an immediate fare freeze and a rollback of ferry

I do hope to see some of you at the Women 4 Women walk and run (I walk!) in Campbell River this Saturday (10th), raising money for bursaries to help women attend North Island College. The following Saturday I'll be at BC Hydro's 50th Anniversary celebrating public power at John Hart Dam and the weekend after at the Haig Brown Festival.

I must congratulate the Campbell River Creative Industries Council, which works hard to bring new businesses to the city, for the significant digital art exhibition it has brought to the Campbell River Museum. This is a coup for the city, the only place in Canada to host these works. The show is on until 22nd September.

And a final note: I will be opening a new office in Port Hardy shortly - at the former Robert Scott elementary school. Watch for announcements about an Open House. 

# For the Record

A letter to the editor by Deb Banta errs on many points and for the record I think that it is only fair that your paper points out these mistakes:

- 1. Disease data released to the Cohen Commission showed that many farmed fish are NOT healthy, contrary to what the author of the letter quotes Mary Ellen Walling of BCSFA as saying. (Quoting from salmonfarmers.org is obviously a biased source!) In fact, farmed Chinook salmon at the Conville farm site that the failed 2009 sockeye run swam by as fry in 2007 were so diseased that they finally stopped farming Chinook that year. The released records showed a disease present at that site every year as far back as the records that were released (2002).
- 2. There have been many studies, eg. Hedrick and Antonio 1995, that showed healthy salmon remained healthy in waters as high as 21degrees. Mortalities in diseased salmon increased with increasing temperatures, suggesting that warmer temperatures made the disease agent, or parasite, more active.
- 3. Just because a disease agent is not identified does not make the illness, or it's symptoms, any less real. Rather, it is all the more reason to study it.
- 4. Before the Cohen Commission, BC Salmon Farmers Association had openly declared that they would not release their disease data. Records were not released until the federal court demanded that they do so. They did not have a choice.

Thankyou for correcting this information. It is important that the problems that big international aquaculture corporations are creating in our marine environment be exposed.

The male's disappearance and death is not suspicious and the circumstances surrounding his death are being jointly investigated by the Quadra Island RCMP Detachment and the British Columbia Coroner's Service.

It is believed that alcohol played a significant role in the male's death and people are reminded that alcohol and water can lead to very dangerous, and in this case, tragic consequences.

The name of the deceased male is not being released.

# A Thought Becomes a Fair

After several years of discussing the thought that

Quadra Island needed a Fall Fair, last spring two friends decided to stop talking and take action. A third friend was recruited and 'the apple core' was established.

These three people who had never organized anything larger than a small dinner party quickly attracted several more people with no experience!

And so a core group was formed and within weeks an elaborate structure of positions was formulated and half filled. From there it was an eight month process of brainstorming ideas and possibilities. Each time something new opened up, a volunteer appeared to fill the slot. (some with experience!!) It seemed unanimous that Quadra was ready for a Fall Fair and even better, Quadra Island was prepared to make one!

The core group of organizers would like to express a resounding THANK YOU to the many, many volunteers for making the First Annual Fall Fair happen. Without the volunteers, we would just have been an apple core, but all together we were an apple, or maybe even better... an apple pie. There were in fact so many volunteers who helped orchestrate and man this event (well over 200) that we would be hard pressed to list every single one - even with our pages and pages of names and shifts. Because you see, there were the volunteers who were team leaders and organized entire areas of the fair, there were groups who took on sub areas and individuals who worked within those groups. There were people who donated their equipment and people who set it up; people who volunteered their trucks and other people who drove them. Some stuffed bags of

candy, baked a cake for the cakewalk or made a special trip to drop off gumboots.

There were vendors who insisted on donating a door prize even when they knew it was too late to have a recognition tag. Several volunteers good naturedly braved the parking lot to drive off and print more programs or get more burgers. An entire team of seamstresses were found on a remote driveway one night (long after the sun had set) still sewing – by hand – because our banner was too big for a machine, and they were committed to finishing it. Some volunteers spent days and days on their computer working layout and design while others took computer lessons so they could keep up.

Judging teams, registration teams, admissions teams and display teams brought their own equipment to assist in their jobs. Demo people set up and performed cheerfully all day in the heat.

A few volunteers sewed hundreds of flags and pennants, someone else strung them and someone else hung them. One volunteer made our entrance archway, others decorated it. Several different woodworkers took on cutting the signs, the zucchini track, the indoor exhibit display blocks. Several others took on painting and lettering them. A few volunteers manned community service booths, ran demos and kept the dunk tank toddler safe until it opened. Some volunteers put together



our Fall Fair pantoume; some ran back and forth to their farm with week old pigs in need of suckling, some led ponies or misted goats; one unclogged a toilet, some emptied garbage, one directed traffic and several had the where-with-all to refill the paper towel dispensers. There were people who signed on for a one hour shift and stayed at their posts for 4 hours. There were the people who got called up at the very last moment to fill an unanticipated void and there were the people who worked diligently for months .... And there are still so many more ....

So we tip our hats to you, Quadra. Our community united and pulled off a major event that left our neighbours, families and friends grinning. For this we thank you – every single volunteer, sponsor and donor.

# Too Late to Classify

Then we brag to friends in the city about the peace and quiet of Island life, we somehow fail to mention the problem of recurrent aerial bombardment. Most days in late summer and early fall, missiles suddenly rain down on the roof of the woodshed beside the house, and the corrugated steel rings under the onslaught. Then, just as suddenly, the attack stops. When he's satisfied that the coast is clear, the squirrel scrambles down the big spruce tree and begins to collect his cones.

The squirrel lived in our woodshed for almost three years. He would nip off unripe cones from the top of the spruce, and drop them, clanging, on the metal roof. He - or perhaps she - stored them in the spaces between chunks of alder and fir, until every crevice was packed with his winter supplies. In the early spring of the first year, after we had burned about half of his shelving units, we uncovered a tidy nest, constructed of moss and lined with bits of insulation. The squirrel, undeterred by the demolition, re-appeared in the fall. We stocked the shed with wood, and he stocked it with cones. As we were away for most of that second winter, he didn't have to worry about somebody stealing his bedroom while his tail was turned.

The dogs knew perfectly well who lived in the woodshed. Max, the Border terrier, reconnoitered on every possible occasion, attempting to climb the stacks of wood, tail rigid, poised to demolish his prey. The squirrel sneered. They enjoyed the relationship quite a lot.

With the heavy snow of this past January and February, we began leaving birdseed at the entrance to the woodshed, where it would stay dry. Juncos, fox sparrows, towhees and a few variegated thrushes dropped by to investigate, and were promptly repulsed by the master (or mistress?) of the woodshed. Only after he had carried off all the sunflower seeds were the birds allowed in. Even when there was

nothing left except corn and millet, at which he turned up his nose, he still made occasional lunges at the birds so they would know who was

Then, one cold day in March, Bruce called me out to the yard and handed me a cardboard box. Our small tenant was wrapped in my old blue and white flannel nightgown. He wasn't quite dead. Some predator must have grabbed him, then left him lying, still breathing, on the concrete floor of the shed. He had two dark patches on his sides; his forepaws were drawn up to his chest. There was a small smear of blood on his nostrils, and his breath came in barely audible gasps.

We brought him into the house, in the almost certainly forlorn hope that he might recover in the warmth. Every ten minutes, we folded back the flannelette and had a look. Still breathing, eyes still closed, his small paws pulled up to his chin. We gave ourselves deadlines. If he doesn't die by X o'clock, one of us will have to deal with him. But when one deadline passed, we set a new one. We thought he might be dehydrated, so we filled an eyedropper with warm water and dribbled it into the side of his mouth. The tenor of his breathing seemed to change, so we tried another drop, and a moment later, he kicked one hind leg. It was the first time he had moved. It was also the last. I suppose the whole sad episode lasted about four hours.

The ground was too hard for gravedigging, so I wrapped the squirrel in blue tissue paper, put him in a shoebox, and kept him in the freezer for a week or so. Now he's buried under a young oak tree, about fifty feet from the big spruce.

Max still charges into the woodshed, tail in combat position. If the scent is there, he's sure the squirrel must be somewhere. It's hard to know where to advertise, but we'd like to put up a notice: "Tenant wanted for cozy rural accommodation. Rent negotiable. Suitable for single squirrel, or small family."





# Friday Flicks is Back!



It's 1968. London is swinging, Paris is rioting, Prague is steaming, another Kennedy is shot. Revolution is in the air. But away from the cameras and Carnaby Street, at a sweatshop in the English suburb of Dagenham, unanticipated unrest is simmering.

In a vast modern plant, Ford employs 55,000 men on a gleaming assembly-line. Next door, under a leaky roof in an outlying building that dates back to Dickens, 187 women are plying their trade at sewing machines, stitching the cars' leather seats. Old and young are



stripped to their bras in the steaming heat heads bent to their work. These are the women who helped give birth to a most profound revolution.

Rita (Sally Hawkins) is a cash-strapped seamstress, adrift in a late-60s era of rayon, crimplene and rampant male chauvinism. Outraged when she and her fellow workers are dismissed as unskilled labour, she sparks a mass walk-out that electrifies the media and exposes the cosy relations between an intractable management and the blustering union officials.

The film is robust, amiable and warm-hearted. Hawkins gives a winning performance as the working-class sparrow who grows slowly in stature. Rosamund Pike is superb as the tragic trophy wife who finds her Cambridge history degree is the perfect qualification for her new career passing the cheese-board around at dinner parties.

The 1968 Ford motor strike lasted three weeks and laid the ground for the Equal Pay Act of 1970. That's because revolutionaries come in all shapes and sizes. Some are gilded posterboys, some are Marxist militants, and some are seamstresses, hunched over their Singer sewing machines, expecting an honest day's wage for an honest day's work.





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# Fear and Faith

Being stuck or immobilized by fear at one time or another in our lives has happened to us all. It is definitely not an easy place to be especially when we lack a good support system that can guide us through a decision or help us to release the fear.

Fear is a protective response, a fight or flight action based emotion that has allowed us to survive. Fear floods the body with chemicals that encourage action. When we are faced with physically dangerous situations fear kicks in and helps us to protect ourselves.

So what kinds of circumstances produce this feeling of fear in our society today? Perhaps the fear of losing your job, not having enough money, not being "good enough", etc; Fear can take many forms including panic, dread, and worry and can cause internal conflicts like procrastination, overwhelm, and powerlessness.

There is an acronym for F.E.A.R. = False Expectation Appearing Real.

When you are in a place of immobilization it is often helpful to Stop....Breathe.... Reflect. By taking the time and space to examine what your fear is, where it is coming from and then developing options/ actions to deal with it, you create the energy to release and move forward. Byron Katie developed a process that is simple yet effective. It is called The Work and involves answering 4 basic questions:

- 1. Is it true?
- 2. Can you absolutely know that it is true?
- 3. How do you react, what happens, when you believe that thought (fear)?
- 4. Who would you be without the thought?

After you have thoughtfully answered these questions and perhaps written them down in a journal, develop a turnaround statement, a statement that will bring release, action and peace. For an example and free worksheets on The Work go to www.thework.com

So how does faith influence our fears? The type of faith I am referring to is the trust and confidence in Life and in your self. Gratitude and acknowledgement of all that is good in your life, all that has worked out well, and will work out well creates the energy and positive movement needed to move out of fear and into action. Being responsive instead of reactive in our daily lives allows us to live from a place of groundedness and peace rather than anxiety and fear.

# Haig-Brown Fesitval 2011

The Haig-Brown Festival has reached a milestone, and this year is celebrating its 10th anniversary!

The festival takes place on Sunday, September 25th, from noon to 4pm and was created in honour of Roderick Haig-Brown and the values of the Haig-Brown family.

Haig-Brown was a fly fisherman, lay judge, and author, who became famous through his writings, some of which are considered to be classics today. Haig-Brown was an avid conservationist, and spoke of preserving the natural environment long before environmentalism became a popular issue. He is credited with creating a positive impact on the future of Campbell River through his foresight.

The original festival held in April, 2002 was an ambitious five day event that coincided with the opening of a special exhibit at the Museum entitled "Return to the River, the Legacy of Roderick Haig-Brown." It took place at various venues throughout the city, including the Museum, the Community Centre and the Haig-Brown property, and was affiliated with Campbell River's first writer's festival, 'Words on the Water'.

Since festival organizer Terry Hale became involved with the festival in 2005, it has been a single day event taking place in the fall on World Rivers Day at the beautiful Haig-Brown Heritage Site property. As Hale says, "It's a small festival, really more like a community gathering". It continues to explore the themes of fishing, literature and conservation, with the addition of outdoor recreation and safety.

Located on the banks of the Campbell River, adjacent to the Kingfisher Creek conservation area and surrounded by woods, the site's location by the river is a focal point for the celebration.

A variety of music is on offer by talented First Nations performers, and includes the 'Brenda Hanson Band' who play country and rock music, Todd Lumz Smith and Duane J. Hanson who play with the Laichkwiltach rock group 'Bentwood Boyz' and performances by singer/songwriter Chris Thagard.

Admission is free, with fly tying demos, fly fishing lessons, children's games and crafts, good food, readings from Haig-Brown writings, great displays, property tours and more that appeal to all ages.

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# FROM YOUR SCHOOL BOARD TRUSTEE

new school year has brought many new faces to both Quadra and Cortes schools. Not only do new students arrive and old ones leave, but staff can also change remarkably in a short period of time. The staffing of our island schools is taken very seriously by our superintendent, Tom Longridge, with involvement of principals in selecting teachers, and involvement of parents in new principal selection, as on Cortes. We wish those who have retired or left for other reasons the best, and welcome new students, parents, and staff to our wonderful school communities.

In the larger picture, School District 72 has undergone many changes in the last 5 years. I've attached a copy of a letter I wrote this summer to the Minister of Education, George Abbott, and in it I have given examples of the transformation of district-wide goals and staff. The Board of Education awaits the Minister's response with interest.

On a personal note, I have made the difficult decision to resign as the Island school trustee at the end of November. I have had a satisfying six years on the Board, three as the chair, and although I have very mixed feelings about leaving, I have other responsibilities which can be onerous at times, and leave me little discretionary time. There are always things left to do in life, and in my last column, I will write about some contributions I was able to make, and some "wants" that are still on the minds of island residents.

Meanwhile, there will be an election soon, and I would be happy to talk to anyone who might take an interest in running for the Island school trustee position.

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#### Dear Minister Abbott:

At our most recent meeting, the School District 72 Board of Education requested that I convey to you some of our pressing thoughts and concerns, and invite you to meet with us prior to the school trustee elections this fall. We appreciate the acknowledgement and respect you paid to both our staff and our Board in the May 17th Legislative Assembly with your response to MLA Claire Trevena's funding question. Your statement: "We in our experience have found SD72 to be very well managed school district.... We're very confident of the ability of the School Board to make appropriate decisions to deal with their challenges. And they do have some challenges", certainly had the ring of truth for us.

Minister, we are glad that you appreciate that we have challenges, and as a responsible and mindful Board, we have discussed at length how to rise to these challenges. Within the District, we have created and nurtured a culture of cooperation and collegiality among our partners which has sustained a high level of commitment to our children and their education. We have had a complete turnover of our senior management staff within the last five years: superintendent, secretary treasurer, assistant superintendent, Directors of Human Resources, Student Services, and Instruction, and Manager of Operations. The foundation which guided us through the change successfully was a strong, well articulated district culture, excellent staff, and a Board which is determined to govern in the best interests of public education.

We have put into place a three year strategic plan which is guiding the vision and goals of our entire educational community. We have enacted policies to improve our financial and operations side: an audit committee policy and a fraud prevention policy to name two. We have developed policies to improve the safety of children: examples are a revised Emergency Preparedness Handbook and an "Equality, Equity, and Diversity" policy.

We have recently signed our third Aboriginal Enhancement Agreement. Although lower than we would wish, our aboriginal graduation rates are the highest on Vancouver Island, and by any measure in British Columbia, the achievements of our students are more than respectable.

Minister, these are remarkable, highly committed achievements among many more achievements, and yet, something is wrong. And yes, it's funding, but it's more than funding. We are elected officials who have accepted the responsibility of maintaining a high quality public education system, but we exist in an environment of unpredictability and unsustainability. Each year, we are confronted with a structural deficit, and we all know that a structural deficit isn't about net dollars: it's about sustaining a system.

The conversation we would like to have with you is not about net dollars; it is about our need for predictable and stable funding, with no surprises. Our strategic plan is a three year document. Our Aboriginal Enhancement Agreement extends five years. We maintain a 10 year plan for maintenance. In every way possible, we attempt to be planful and yet at times, that planfulness is misrepresented and held against us.

Here is the conversation we would like to have with you: a conversation that includes the cost of NOT educating all children well; a conversation that honours the work that is being done; a conversation that recognizes the need for a predictable funding environment; a conversation that is in the interest of children and a civil society, not politics. We very much hope you will make time to accommodate our request.


