Jim rescued one of the island's overlooked historical sites – the **LUCKY JIM MINE** (lower right) – from potential destruction when he got provincial funding and organized volunteer labour to restore the site and make it safe for visitors.

RD Minutes Tell the Facts

It appears that Michael Stahnke did not appreciate my comments in the October 28 issue of this paper, concerning the Regional Board's sprinkling of our tax dollars on the application for a major subdivision at April Point (District Lot 208) in order to help that application overcome all its conflicts with our new Official Community Plan.

Fortunately the Regional Board has a reasonably comprehensive web site with all the meeting minutes and staff reports for the last two years, when this application kept coming before the Board. If you are interested, have a look! You'll marvel at the contortions the Board went through in order to remove the obstacles that the OCP places in the way of these developers. You will find many lengthy staff reports, multiple re-writes of a "cleaned-up" OCP and similar re-writes of the Zoning Bylaw. Count some pages and make reasonable assumptions about staff time needed to prepare all this - you are quite likely to end up in the same ball park as I did, when it comes to the cost of staff time devoted to help these developers subvert our new OCP.

Another recommended webexcursion, this time to the Local Government Act (not bed-time reading), will show you just how unnecessary the whole exercise was - it did have to go to first and second reading but could have been voted down at that stage. Having an Official Community Plan would make zero sense if all proposals had to go to public hearings.

I treasure and appreciate our community - you have shown that you also enjoy working hard, and with me, to help ensure that our area continues to be a place where we love to live.

I want to continue to work with you to balance our needs and expectations and continue to bring us together as a community that is prosperous, as well as more resilient to future, unprecedented challenges. Some of our needs are immediate: young people and families are leaving the island because it has become unaffordable. Seniors are being forced to leave because of a lack of facilities. There is pressure upon our natural resources and these must be managed with care to avoid disturbing the delicate balance of all living

things around us and protect our food sources for the future.

At the same time, we must derive a living from what is available here, and so the need for balance is obvious. From knowing me, from Regional Director's Reports that I have published, and from election campaign literature, you will have learned of some of the creative solutions that I've been working on and have come up with to help solve our problems. Rather than reiterating them here I just want to say that I feel that these ideas can bring good results and I will continue to work toward that goal.

I've always disliked election jargon involving promises. I will stay on the steady course I have been on because it has brought positive results. I have some new ideas to involve even more of you in the process of nurturing all of the communities in our area and helping make the important decisions that will arise. We are not isolated in our challenges, and I will continue to network with other elected people whom I have come to know in B.C. and across Canada who are working on the same problems that we are. I will never hesitate to pick up the phone and talk to my contacts at the federal and provincial levels when there is a need to draw them into helping us achieve something for our area.

I have attended many forums over the years addressing the problem of voter apathy, especially amongst young people. When I was first old enough to vote I was excited, so I wonder, considering how much things have changed since then, if there is now a feeling that one person can't affect the way the world turns. I feel that getting involved locally and learning how to deal with our local issues helps a person take further steps to get involved at other levels when it is required. It's important to feel a sense of empowerment in dealing with big problems that appear before us and to not feel intimidated by the "size" of an obstacle, especially when it affects our daily lives. Ferry corporation? Gather some people and show up at the Legislature. Giant corporations trying to destroy the rivers, streams and fjords that nurture us in so many ways and are part of our livelihood? Show up and say how you feel, and persevere. On a local level, participate!

I was heartened by an endorsement from a young person who said that he had never voted before because he'd never trusted the system. He said he would vote to re-elect someone who had proven himself and that I had helped him have some faith in the system. He had been involved in our Local Area Plan for the Cove for 18 months as a "youth representative". Obviously the hard work and long hours of this process inspired rather than discouraged him, so I feel that I am not off course in my philosophy that it's important to try to get people involved in our local issues! Let us go forth, boldly, together!

Quadra Cultural Committee Welcomes Trio'86

At 7PM on Sunday November 20th Quadra Cultural Committee will welcome Trio'86, an ensemble of clarinet, viola and piano to the Quadra Community Centre for the first classical music recital of the season.

This unusual grouping of instruments was first brought together by Mozart in his "Kegelstatt" Trio K498 in 1786. The name "Kegelstsatt"

(bowling alley) was given by the publisher, it supposedly having been composed while playing skittles. Others were inspired to write for this combination of instruments, explaining the title "The Kegelstatt Legacy" for this program, which comprises the original Mozart and works by Robert Schumann, Max Bruch, the modern Hungarian composer Gyorgy Kurtag, and Canadian composer Jerry Semchyshyn.

Trio members for this occasion are clarinettist Krysta Martynes, violist Pemi Paull, and pianist Marc Wieser.

Krysta Martynes studied in the USA, continuing in Europe at the National Conservatory in Paris, the Accadamia Perosi in Italy, and earning a Masters in Musicology at Paris VIII University. She is a prime researcher at institutions specializing in mixed media, and as a classical musician has toured in Fance, Germany, Mexico, Ukraine and China. As a contemporary musician she has featured as a soloist at festivals in France, Italy and Austria.



Violist Pemi Paull specialises in both new and early music, both as soloist and chamber musician. He is founder and artistic director of Warhol Dervish, an unorthodox chamber music collective in Montreal, and was awarded the 2002 CBC Galaxie Rising Star Award for Chamber Music. He is a member of three important new music ensembles, and is one of the few violists in the world to present, with critical acclaim, full programs of unaccompanied repertoire for viola. In historical performance he appears with Ensemble Caprice, Ensemble Arion and Theatre of Early Music.

Winnipeg-born Marc Wieser lives in Montreal where he is working towards a PhD at McGill University. Past appearances in Montreal included a six-performance tour with Pazzia Contemporary performing Collective featuring seven newlycommissioned works as well as Bernstein's La Bonne Cuisine. A passionate proponent of Schumann's music, his playing has been described as "Impressive, imaginative and seamless", "awesome and breathtaking." As a chamber player he has given collaborative performances throughout Canada, the USA and France, most recently with his sister Soprano Ellen Wieser.

This Trio '86 concert promises to be an unusual and exciting program performed by a group of extremely talented artists. Notices from Quadra RCMP

Police Record Checks

Many agencies, employers, and volunteer groups are increasingly requiring individuals to provide a police record check prior to them being involved or employed with their agency or company. The requirement of a police record check is a prudent step in any application process.

Over the past year, there have been changes to the police record check program as it relates to individuals who will be working in a paid or volunteer capacity with vulnerable members of the community. Vulnerable members of the community include persons who, because of age, a disability, or other circumstances, whether temporary or permanent are in a position of dependance on others or are otherwise at a greater risk than the general population of being harmed by a person in a position of authority or trust relative to them. Examples of positions involving members of the vulnerable sector include teachers, day care workers, sport coaches and volunteers.

If you are seeking a police record check to support an application for paid or volunteer work with vulnerable members of society, a distinct and separate query of your name and birth date will be conducted against criminal records databases and flagged pardoned sex offender records. This query is called a Vulnerable Sector Check. The rationale for this distinct and separate query arose from a recent analysis of name based queries that determined that an individual could potentially avoid being linked to their pardoned sex offence(s) if he or she used a different name during the police record check query. This scenario could occur if a legal name change was used for the query, and the name change went unreported to the RCMP for updating criminal record information. This distinct and separate query of name and birth date assists to ensure that an unreported name change would not allow a pardoned sexual offender to avoid being identified through a vulnerable sector query.

If your gender and birth date match to a pardoned sex offender, you will be asked, by letter, to provide fingerprints that will be forwarded to the **RCMP** National Identification Services to confirm your identity. Currently, if there is no match to the submitted fingerprints, the wait time for identity confirmation by fingerprints is ten weeks.

Most individuals attending to the Detachment for a police record check involving a vulnerable sector query have not been requested to submit fingerprints. There have, however, been instances where fingerprints have been requested and individuals are reminded of the potential for delay of their police record check should they be requested to submit fingerprints to support identity confirmation related to a vulnerable sector query.

If you are requested to provide fingerprints to confirm your identity to support an application for paid employment, a fee of \$25.00 will be applied. If you are requested to provide fingerprints to confirm your identity to support

an application for volunteer work, the fee is waived and you will be asked to provide a letter from the volunteer agency confirming your application to volunteer.

As always, fees are not applied to police record checks that do not involve fingerprint submissions and most police record checks not involving fingerprints will be processed within two weeks.

Police record check applications will only be processed for individuals permanently residing within the Quadra Island Detachment jurisdiction and must be submitted in person, at the Detachment, with photograph identification.

Police Telephone Line

The non-emergency telephone line at the Quadra Island RCMP Detachment has recently been upgraded to include a general voicemail box and individual voicemail boxes for each officer. If you call the Detachment outside of weekday office hours, you will be prompted to either leave a message on the general or an individual officer's voicemail box or be connected to a communications operator. If you are calling the Detachment outside of weekday office hours to report an in progress or recent incident, or an incident that requires a prompt police response, do not leave a voicemail message - please press the #1 to immediately connect to a live communications operator to report the incident. If you are reporting an emergency situation, call 911.

Acclaimed Iranian director Kiarostami sends English academic William Shimell and French antique dealer Juliette Binoche on a Sunday odyssey to a Tuscan hill town where they debate originality, authenticity, and value. The dialogue is ripe; a playful mockery of the clichés sustaining both art house and mainstream film.



This exceptional film plays with what is real and what is imagination. While exploring language and communication, this drama is both funny and intense. Viewers think they are witnessing a romantic one-day interlude between a middleaged couple. After a while, though, they start to realize they're on shifting ground. We're not really sure who the two people are, whether they knew each other before or are just pretending.

This is Kiarostami's first venture into European art-house territory and he manages to keep the audience guessing about the protagonists and the nature of relationship.

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BC Ferries: Let's Get Back To Basics Notice from Ferry Advisory Committee Chairs

VICTORIA BC - The Ferry Advisory Committee Chairs (FACC) are telling the BC Ferry Commissioner that it is time for the ferry system to get back to basics. They want to see the Coastal Ferry Act amended to replace the existing six principles with one simple, customer-oriented principle: to provide a safe, reliable, affordable ferry service.

"Affordability means that fares should increase in line with the Consumer Price Index (CPI). Instead, fare increases have been several times higher," says Bill Cripps who Chairs the North Sunshine Coast Ferry Advisory Committee. The FACC is recommending that government contributions be sufficiently increased in April 2012, to support a major roll-back in fares on the non-major routes.

The FACC have submitted their comments to BC Ferry Commissioner Gord Macatee in a paper entitled "Ferry Governance: A Matter of Ideology". The Commissioner has been directed by provincial legislation to conduct a review of the Coastal Ferry Act - which lays out the governance model for the ferry system. He will deliver a final report to the BC Government in early 2012.

Since the Coastal Ferry Act was adopted in 2003, communities have suffered economically and socially as substantial declines in minor route traffic have led to businesses shrinking or closing, families being isolated, schools losing enrollment, young people leaving and tourism plummeting, according to the FACC submission.

"The Act signalled a disastrous ideological shift in approach to ferry service that

needs correcting if ferry-dependent communities, and BC Ferries itself, are to survive in a sustainable way," says Brian Hollingshead, chair of the Southern Gulf Islands FAC. "WAC Bennett created BC Ferries to provide reliable, safe, affordable transportation to coastal communities that depended on ferry service as a lifeline. The principles included in the Coastal Ferry Act do not address these objectives. Instead they focus on the sustainability of the ferry operator and a requirement to reduce government contributions in favour of user-pay."

The FACC believes that this ideology has allowed ferry fares to increase by up to 100% since 2003.

Escalating fares have been followed by steadily declining traffic. In addition to impacting communities, this drop in traffic means that BC Ferries is nowhere near meeting its target for return on equity. This is eroding its ability to operate sustainably.

"The Province needs to get away from the concept that BC Ferries should operate as if it is a commercial enterprise when in reality it is a regulated natural monopoly providing an essential transportation service," says Tony Law, Chair of the Denman-Hornby Ferry Advisory Committee. "The bottom line is that ferries provide the same basic function for coastal communities as highways do for other communities. This is what we mean by getting back to basics."

The FACC is comprised of the chairs of twelve local and regional Ferry Advisory Committees appointed by BC Ferries.

Climbing Nepal's Heights for the **CR Hospital Foundation**

My name is Tak Ogasawara.

I am currently in Nepal from Oct. 8th to Nov. 17th to climb Mt. Baruntse (7129 meters/ 23,389 feet). Mt. Baruntse is situated between Everest and Makalu. One of the reasons for my climb is that I would like to raise funds for the Campbell River Hospital Foundation.

In the past 24 years, I have been admitted to the Campbell River General Hospital for at least 300 days in total. In 1987, I was diagnosed with gastric cancer with a complete gastric resection. After the operation, for various reasons, I never gained my health back 100 %. I eventually had several more operations on my digestion system. Since 2006, my digestion system has been cured and cancer has never come back, but in 2008, I was diagnosed with Aplastic Anemia, a disease that affects about 1 in a million people. I thought I would die for sure. However, many doctors and nurses in Vancouver General Hospital and Campbell River Hospital helped me beat the disease. Now I am healthy again and I would like to raise money for the Campbell River Hospital. I have never given up my dream to climb mountains in Nepal. I am 67 years old.

In order to climb Mt. Baruntse, we are setting up a base camp at 5300m level on the Baruntse Glacier, and then we will set up Camp One at 6100m, Camp Two at 6400m. From Camp Two we will climb to the summit of 7129m.

Please support me to raise funds for the Campbell River Hospital by donating a lump sum or pledging for every 200m in elevation I gain from the Base Camp. For example, if you pledge \$1 for every 200m I climb, and if I am able to reach the summit, your total pledge would be \$9. I will be collecting money after I come back on Nov. 27, so that the pledges can be calculated accurately with how high I am able to climb.

The Campbell River General Hospital has been there for me and my family through many illnesses, and thanks to the hard work of the nurses, doctors and support staff we are all healthy.

I know that there is an election taking place but the business of the regional District must go on! And it does. We have had a number of meetings since my last report and there are a few items that I should report to you.

BC Ferry Commissioner

I am not sure how many of you saw the tiny ad in the Campbell River papers about the request for additional input by the Commissioner "on a number of key issues described in a series of discussion papers". They are listed on his web site at www. bcferrycommission.com/reports-press/ whats-new/coastal-ferry-act-review Now that's a mouthful! So, after hearing from more than three dozen communities we now have to continue the discussion. I do hope that all of you will. I am sure that you will be able to glean from the papers what direction he is leaning towards and then you can comment on it! I have meetings arranged with the other coastal regional district chairs and the Islands' Trust to meet with the Minister of Transportation and the Premier in January and February (as the Vice-Chair of the SRD). We will be given the opportunity to discuss the Commissioner's report prior to government making their decisions. So, please provide feedback to the Commissioner and copy me, if you don't mind.

"Mass Burn" garbage facility in Campbell River?

Some of you may or may not have heard about this issue. The Comox Strathcona Solid Waste Management Plan is being reviewed at this time. It is reviewed about every 5 years. One of the options to landfilling is called Waste to Energy (WTE) and it is what Gold River is in the process of negotiating with Vancouver to burn their processed garbage (not the raw product). So, at our meeting on Thursday, it came out that Campbell River also has hopes for a facility at the Elk Falls mill site for a "mass burn" site... that means no sorting, just dumping raw garbage into an incinerator and lighting it up. As you can imagine, I was horrified, having spent so many years monitoring the pollution from the mill along with the Cape Mudge Band. There were only three directors that spoke for having the application be required to go

through the solid waste plan rather than just allow the municipality to do it on their own. Myself, Brenda Leigh from Area D and a Director from Area B near Comox all spoke against this and it passed. So, in spite of the beautiful clean air that has resulted since the pulp mill closed down, the air that we sell as a commodity to our tourism industry customers, we may be looking at another huge smoke stack with noxious fumes covering our island. I thought you should know about this since it will be a very major dispute in the next few months. This WILL effect us. I must say here, that so far we have no details and it may never happen. But keep informed just in case.

Internet

There seems to be lots of confusion around the Telus information I provided last report. I gave you the verbatim info that I got from the Telus executives. I will be working on getting them to join us into their fiber-optic system that covers a considerable part of the island. If they are looking at wireless service, I am sure that will be a start, but I want true high-speed internet for those who want it and will do whatever is necessary to get them to provide that service. I would hope to set up a meeting in early December with their team to see where we are going. I cannot give you more than I have in the way of info, so hang tight! More to follow.

Local Area Plan for Q. Cove Village

For those of you that might have missed this item in the last report, we have given the by laws 1st and 2nd readings for both the OCP and LAP and have passed them

on for First Nations' consultation. They will then go to the public hearing stage hopefully in January or February. If the community agrees with the plans then they will be given third reading at which time they will need to go to the ministry for approval prior to the SRD giving them final adoption. Once that is complete then people wishing to develop some of the great ideas in the plan can get started!. I am looking forward to that time.

We are going through the draft as a group and editing. Those who come out have a lot of input at this stage. SRD Annual Budget

The 2012 Strathcona Regional District's (SRD) budget process is beginning this month at the SRD board. Given that we are in an election year regionally, the budget schedule has been varied with more attention being given to it by the board in the early new year. For this reason, the community budget input session this cycle will occur in February rather than late fall as was the case last year. However, I am happy to field any questions or input at any time.

Klahoose Shellfish Gorge Application

Klahoose's deep water aquaculture rezoning application in Gorge Harbour received first and second reading at October's board. Prior to setting a date for a public hearing, which I anticipate will be either in December or January, staff have been given direction to negotiate an operational agreement with Klahoose Shellfish Limited Partnership. This application has received all required permissions at the Federal and Provincial levels.

Advisory Planning Commission (APC)

I am looking for a few new APC members. When I began three years ago, I inherited an excellent APC. A couple members have left and I am now looking to welcome a few new people. The APC is a body that advises me and the SRD board on formal land-use planning matters, and only meets when there is formal business from the SRD, which has been about 4 times per year. It is one of the most direct and practical ways of contributing to local land-use decisions. Interested? Have a recommendation? Call me.

Comox-Strathcona Waste Management Public Process

Last week at the Regional Solid Waste board, we received the first draft of our Solid Waste Management Plan. We are dealing with major choices in this region when it comes to our garbage. The Campbell River land fill is very close to being full and the existing permitted Comox Valley land fill is also within a few years of reaching capacity. Should we expand one or both? Should we seriously consider waste to energy (garbage incineration) as a long term option? Although we are now diverting a greater percentage of our garbage than in previous years, our average annual regional waste generation has risen from 0.67 tonnes per capita in 2000 to 1.14 in 2009! How can we further reduce our waste stream through composting and recycling programs? What facilities should we provide for household hazardous waste? Are you happy with our collection system? How can we reduce illegal dumping? This winter there will be a community input session to seek your input. Stay tuned.

North Island Hospitals Project Update

We at the Comox-Strathcona regional hospital board (CSRHD) are continually being updated by the Vancouver Island Health Authority (VIHA) on the progress of the two hospital project - one new hospital each for Campbell River and the Comox Vallley. VIHA is finalizing the business case for this, their top priority project, which will then go to the Project Board in December. It is anticipated that the project board will review the business case and then forward it onto the BC government Treasury Board for financial approval at the provincial political level. There, it will compete for funding with infrastructure projects from around the province. The CSRHD proposal has three major things in its favour. First, the proposal has unanimous support from the RHD, which is a 40 percent financial contributor to the hospitals' capital costs. Secondly, as a sign of good faith, we funded the \$3 million dollar business case development to get this project

moving. And finally, we already have \$47 million in reserves to contribute to this project, for which we will pay 40 percent of the anticipated \$600 million dollar final price tag for the completion of both new hospitals. Once the provincial government approves the project it is estimated to take five or six years for tendering, construction, moving into the new facility and beginning operation. ELECTION SPECIAL

The DI Questions **Area C Candidates**

We've had one opportunity to date to hear from the candidates publicly, at the Cape Mudge All-Candidates meeting, and a second meeting is scheduled for Sunday, November 13 at the Quadra Community Centre at 7 pm.

But there's nothing quite like 'getting it in writing' so here's a snapshot of questions and answers on issues on our mind here at the Discovery Islander. Thanks to Shawn O'Connor and Jim Abram to taking the time to answer these for all our readers and for working within the limitations of available space.

Area C is geographically large and demographically very diverse please explain how you plan on consulting with area residents in the coming term to ensure you can provide as effective representation as possible.

Shawn O'Connor: As Director for Area C, I would maintain an office in Quathiaski Cove and be available for meetings upon request. My home / office phone and mobile phone numbers would be available. Email is always a good way to reach me. I would represent Local Government at community events, as much as possible, and when invited to do so.

I have travelled throughout the boundaries of Area C and recognize the logistic difficulties of staying in touch with the residents, and staying abreast of the issues facing the outer Islands and Mainland Inlets

I would appoint an Area C Advisory Planning Commission with representation from the outer Islands to ensure that Area C planning and services do not focus solely on Quadra Island.

Jim Abram: Thanks to Philip Stone for the opportunity to answer the following questions that he has posed.

I have always kept in touch with my constituents through reports in the Discovery Islander and more lately through thegumboot.ca site.

I advertise all public gatherings and attend numerous committees as they happen and meet with local groups and individuals. I make my contacts available to everyone and am available at all times to all.

I will continue to use social media and keep my website updated regularly.

I have already committed to establishing an advisory body that I can refer issues to, and have them bring concerns or issues to me for consideration. This will be done.

I also make trips to Stuart Island and Surge Narrows as often as needed to discuss issues of concern with them. The outer island perspective always adds critical information to my considerations.

Do you support the proposed Alterra-GE hydrodevelopment in Bute Inlet Yes or No? Explain why you hold that view and how you would back it up if and when the project ramps back up?

Jim Abram: I was the first to notify our communities of the pending developments in Toba and Bute Inlets and worked closely with the Friends of Bute Inlet. Included were 17 run-of-the-river Independent Power Projects that would generate power in our most pristine wilderness and transmit it via massive linear clear-cuts through our inlets down the Sunshine Coast for export to the USA for use in continuing uncontrolled development. Our existing businesses would be adversely impacted: tourism, ecotourism, bear watching, fishing, back country guiding, sightseeing, mountain climbing, kayaking and more. At a BC **Environmental Assessment** Office public meeting that I organized on Quadra Island, we had approximately 350 people crowd our Community Centre to oppose this project. I took that as clear direction to oppose this development and I will do it again, should it be back on the table. Tourism creates more jobs than any other industry. The areas that tourists visit must be preserved.

The promise of providing "green power" from this project is a complete myth. The project will endanger prime habitat for grizzly bears, mountain goats, fish and the ecosystem. We cannot risk this. This power will all be going south across the border. Destroying our local economy for such a project is wrong. The promise of jobs is also a myth. Only short-term construction jobs, mostly to out-of-area contractors, are being offered. The finished sites provide possibly one or two caretakers

vs. the incredible loss to our environment and our economy. The community direction can allow me to answer with a resounding NO!

Shawn O'Connor: I support advances in the area of "Green Energy" technologies, whether those advances are in the form of wind, solar, tidal, or glacial waterfall capture. I favor anything that moves us away from the burning of fossil fuels, or the devastation of a landscape, and provides a sustainable source of clean and renewable power. Area C has incredible capacity to generate energy; the trick is to harness nature's power, without damage to the natural world.

I understand that the Alterra Power Corporation has application for pursuing hydro generation within the boundaries of Area C (Bute Inlet), and delivery of this power into the North American Power Grid. I also understand that there will be a significant public process and environmental assessment before any development will be allowed to proceed. I am sure that most of us can agree that electricity is a direct benefit to our daily lives, and that any impact resulting from power generation should be mitigated and sensitive to our environment, before it is allowed.

There is a lot of turmoil and uncertainty in the world. Please explain ways that you believe we can prepare to meet these challenges at the community level and how as Regional Director you will work to achieve or assist them.

Shawn O'Connor: Yes, we do live in a troubled world. I often wonder how Governments from around the world intend to stop warring by dropping bombs on those who do not share their political perspectives. In a less dramatic sense, our community would be better served if we took

the time to consider the perspectives and opinions of others, before deciding to throw a hate bomb at the first sign of an alternative point of view.

As Regional Director, I may not be able to bring peace to the Middle East, or feed all those who hunger around the world. I will however, always listen to constituent concerns, and offer any assistance to issues that are within my mandate and duties as your local representative. I would maintain impartiality in the rendering of a decision, and base my actions on the truth and the facts.

Jim Abram: Most of what I have talked about to date has centred around sustainability: jobs, economy and the environment. We have bigger fish to fry globally: Climate change, peak oil, demographics. Right now on Quadra Island there is a group looking at Transition Towns. It is not a new concept, but it is becoming more and more necessary to look into. It looks at the broader plan for food sustainability, energy, health, education, and the economy to name a few. We must look at resilient communities, look at adaptation with impending climate change and ways to get away from our dependence on fossil fuels. What we want is a community that is more self reliant than at present. I support investigating this transition and will be looking for community desire and direction.

Please summarize why you believe residents should elect you to represent Area C at the Strathcona Regional District Board?

Jim Abram: You will never find a harder working, more dedicated person to represent you. I have the knowledge, the contacts, perseverance, integrity and love of this community. I will always do my absolute best for you as your elected representative.

Shawn O'Connor: I believe that residents should elect me as Regional Director because I have a track record of getting the job done. In this case, the iob is to build consensus on issues that have been stalled in process, and salvage what we can of the cost and inputs to-date. A lot of effort has gone into developing our Official Community Plan, and I do not intend to see any of the hard work and valuable contributions wasted. To achieve consensus we need to shed polarized views of the issues and work toward compromise.

Once consensus and a clear path forward is determined. any project needs to have funding sourced. This will help ensure that there is no additional tax burden levied against residents for capital expenditures. The funding opportunities offered in the last few years during the greatest spending spree in Government history could have funded projects from sewer and water systems to recreation facilities, parks, trails and many other community projects. These missed opportunities are preventing our community from reaching our greatest potential.

If elected Director, I would assist staff any way possible to ensure funding applications are submitted in a timely manner, so that community projects do not go unrealized due to a lack of funding.

Let's work together to make Island life better. On November 19th, vote for change. Vote O'Connor.

Hospital Plan NOT a Partisan Local Election Issue

Citizens For Quality Health Care is concerned about the attempts of some local municipal election candidates to resurrect the 2006 VIHA proposal of ONE 'regional' hospital on the North Island. This plan would have eliminated an acute care hospital and left Campbell River with little more than a clinic, replacing the Campbell River hospital and St. Joseph's with one hospital at Dove Creek Rd. and the inland highway, inconveniencing 100% of the people in both communities as well as the entire North Island population from Qualicum to Port Hardy.

Over 19,000 people signed a petition which was presented to the legislature in November of 2007, demanding that the government and VIHA "ensure that fully functional acute care hospitals are maintained in the Comox Valley and Campbell River, that VIHA provide adequate funds to upgrade and expand our local hospitals, and that the hospitals remain publicly funded and care publicly delivered." Many actions were taken from 2006 to 2008 to give voice to concerns about the ONE 'regional' hospital plan, including public forums in both Courtenay and Campbell River, delegations to

VIHA and to the legislature, letters to the newspapers and to VIHA.

In January 2009 VIHA announced that it had come up with a new plan to build two new hospitals, one in Campbell River at the site of the current hospital, and one in the Comox Valley at a new site, not the present St. Joseph's Hospital site. The VIHA announcement included the commitment to maintain all the services currently provided in Campbell River as well as to provide 'regional beds' and services at the new hospital in the Comox Valley.

Even before the original ONE 'regional' hospital plan was announced in 2006 there were opportunist appeals from some individuals in both communities to argue that if there were one hospital it should be in their community and that the other should be deprived, a divide and conquer tactic that appealed to some media and some politicians. Citizens For Quality Health Care was established for the purpose of bringing together all the residents of the North Island to ensure that nothing was lost and that hospital care would be enhanced and expanded.

Healthcare....

The VIHA plan for two hospitals, while not perfect, is more appropriate for the North Island with its scattered population and two main population centres.

Attempts to resurrect the ONE 'regional' hospital - in the Comox Valley - is ill-advised political opportunism that can only cause further harm and delay. The acute care services that VIHA has outlined for the North Island in the 'two hospital' plan are virtually the same as those outlined in the ONE 'regional' hospital plan.

We urge the politicians to pay attention to the real problems and the voters to reject the calls to re-open this divisive and unproductive debate.
