Islander *Benefits* is a local, Discovery Islands 'loyalty' or 'rewards' card. The card promotes the idea of shopping locally and supporting our local merchants and services. In exchange for your loyalty to both the DI and to local businesses, participating businesses offer cardholders a variety of deals, special offers and discounts and the Discovery Islander promotes them.

Islander Benefits works like this:

• The Discovery Islander newspaper is delivered directly to all mailboxes on Quadra, Cortes, Read and the Outer Discovery Islands free of charge. However, on payment of a voluntary, annual subscription to the Discovery Islander each subscriber will receive an **Islander** *Benefits* card (to a maximum of two per household) for that calendar year.

• The Islander *Benefits* card features the 'Shop Local' logo, promoting this umbrella campaign, reminding residents to support local businesses with their purchasing choices.

• Local businesses participating in the program offer a variety of special deals and/or discounts to card holders. Look for notices (and eventually decals) at local businesses or ask directly if they offer any 'Islander *Benefits*'.

There is an ongoing display advertisement in the Discovery Islander highlighting a selection of the special offers available for cardholders and a complete list is posted online at www.discoveryislander.ca.



There is no obligation for businesses offering specials under the program to advertise in the DI, and the DI will continue to be distributed via Canada Post free of charge, the subscription and **Islander** *Benefits* is purely voluntary. Shop Local is a community effort after all, but it is of course hoped that the DI's efforts in this area will be supported to some degree by new advertisers. We're all in this together!

There will hopefully be many innovative ways to get the most out of this program but the bottom-line is that it promotes a buy local ethic within the community, facilitates a way to encourage and administer a voluntary subscription program for the D.I. while also providing additional value for those that contribute.



ISLAND FORUM Thank You Quadra Community!

Dear Community of Quadra Island,

As the weather warms up and the rejuvenating scents of spring fill the air, my husband Bradley White and myself have a renewed appreciation for life. Maybe it was a miracle, or maybe it was luck or the power of prayer and positive energy. Or maybe it was the top of the line medical intervention. Whatever the case, we are eternally grateful to be here together, grateful from the very core of our beings.

It was just 5 (long) weeks ago when Brad was fighting for his life. Early on the morning of January 13th he was admitted to the Campbell River Hospital where he was diagnosed with Necrotizing Fasciitis, a rapidly spreading bacterial infection that destroys underlying tissues causing irreversible damage. The infection attacked Brad's upper left arm causing him extreme pain and threatening to enter his chest cavity and heart. Thanks to the quick acting medical team at the Campbell River Hospital and specifically the orthopedic surgeon Dr. Andrew Crosby, Brad's life and his arm were saved.

But we were still far from 'out of the woods.' Brad was kept unconscious and transported to the Intensive Care unit at the Victoria Royal Jubilee Hospital where he was given extensive intravenous antibiotic treatments. Thankfully, the deadly bacteria responded to the antibiotics and diminished. Brad was gently brought back into consciousness. He was then transferred to the Critical Wound Care ward where he remained until released.

Because there was a significant amount of muscle and tissue

that had been compromised, over the next week Brad underwent a very painful skin grafting procedure to rebuild the area on his arm. The medical team at the Royal Jubilee were unbelievably understanding and ever so caring. These dedicated men and women deserve the utmost respect for the very important work that they do. We are so lucky to live here and have access to such fantastic care facilities.

Today Brad and I are back at home feeling overwhelmed and speechless over the outpouring of support we have received from our community in this time of need. The kindness displayed by friends and strangers alike has confirmed our belief that we truly do live in paradise. Because of this support I was able to stay by my husband's side every minute through this nightmare without worrying about a thing, a true blessing to anyone experiencing such stress and trauma.

TimberWest Has No Plan Except Cutting Until It's All Gone

The Ancient Forests Alliance rally for BC's old growth trees this past weekend in Victoria, attended by a thousand people, seems timely to what is happening here. We have been in discussion with Timber West, with the help of a Forest Practices Board mediator over some last remaining stands on Sonora Island. Several cutblocks containing old growth trees are to be logged this summer.

Sonora Island is in the Thurlow Landscape Planning Unit where old growth forests are in a 8415 hectare deficit. (This figure is from the Central and North Coast/ South Central Coast Site Series Surrogate Representation Table, 2011.) This does not meet the Landscape Level Biodiversity objectives found in the South Central Coast Order. Timber West has told us repeatedly over the past several years that they are not cutting old growth here because there is such a deficit. In a letter dated to us July 5, 2010 concerning the development plans for this summer's cutblocks near Hole In The Wall, we were told "All of the proposed development is within second growth timber ... "

Yet in one block alone we recorded 160 tall, straight, beautiful old growth trees, mostly Douglas fir, the rest red cedar, about 700 years old. We brought these to the attention of TW with photos and were told there are not enough of them to count as an old growth forest! Our forests have been so fragmented with logging, of course there are no huge stands anymore. Timber West has absolutely no Old Growth Management Plan for this area. We are requesting a halt to any further cutting of old growth trees until an appropriate OGMP is in place – one that acknowledges the huge deficit and rarity of original Douglas fir and red cedar stands in this LPU.

Vancouver Filmmaker Takes on Big Timber with New Cortes Island Documentary



VANCOUVER – Local filmmaker Daniel J. Pierce is shining the spotlight on BC's forestry woes with a new feature-length documentary about a small coastal community's fight to protect old-growth forests from Wall Street investment firms, and create a sustainable, community-driven forest and tourism economy.

The film, entitled Heartwood: Forest Guardians of Cortes Island, follows a group of citizens on Cortes Island that has united under a common vision of healthy forests and thriving communities. As one faction of the island launches a blockade against timber giant Island Timberlands, the Klahoose First Nation is joining the Cortes Forestry Co-op in the push to create a Community Forest on much of the island's Crown land.

In addition to chronicling the Cortes community's struggles on the ground, it will also explore the broader picture of a new logging boom in the Discovery Islands that local eco-tourism operators say is coming at the expense of sustainable tourism jobs. With new clear-cuts being carved into the hillsides, and even more new contracts on the horizon, the Discovery Islands Marine Tourism group says that their pleas to protect the views in this pristine wilderness have fallen on deaf ears. "When it comes to forest management, tourism companies are treated like bystanders, as though we are just in the way."

Pierce says, "We are reaching so many limits in this worldecological limits, economic limits, social limits. Our forests, if cultivated with love, could be one of our greatest assets in fighting climate change, healing our planet, and sustaining communities. But the liquidation of our ancient forests and their conversion into tree farms, combined with the export of raw logs to foreign mills, is not the way to go. The time to make this film is now."



UBCM Releases Election 'Platform'

VICTORIA, BC-(Marketwire) - The Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM) has released its 2013 provincial election platform, setting out points of discussion for British Columbia's four main political parties and the next provincial government.

"Initiatives like the Community Charter have advanced the role played by local governments in British Columbia over the past decade," said UBCM President Mary Sjostrom. "We want to engage with all parties throughout the campaign to talk about the current needs of BC's communities, and how local government can work together with the provincial government to seek solutions." The platform, Building Tomorrow Together, highlights five key priorities of local government: governance, finance, infrastructure, economic development and the environment.

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"Will you still need me, will you still feed me - when I'm 64?

"Will you still need me, will you still feed me – when I'm 64?" (or 84? or 94?) "Don't count on it – just stay healthy and set up your own housing and care services on Quadra!" summarizes the advice that Quadra Circle seniors received from 2 recent lunch speakers on Housing and Care for seniors.

Despite the projection that by 2030 over 25% of BC's population will be seniors, local residential care facilities are now so overloaded with demand that beds are filled on a crisis basis. VIHA Home Support (services to assist seniors to stay in ther homes) can't find enough employees to meet current demands. VIHA expects to be short-staffed in all areas of medical care for at least 20 years. According to the 2007 Housing Survey our island's population is already 25% seniors; VIHA Home Support serves about 20 clients on Quadra presently.

Fragile seniors who become hospitalized but can't live at home any more due to unsafe conditions get priority for residential beds over those barely managing at home but who aren't yet in crisis. Mary Cook, Co-ordinator of Home Support Services, acknowledges that Home Support services have been cut so severely in the last 10 years that her staff are no longer allowed to provide help with house-keeping, meal preparation, grocershopping or companionship. Her home support workers can do up to 4 visits per day for those who need help with dressing, grooming and taking their meds but only until 6pm.. The Home Support worker can prepare breakfast, heat up lunch (eg open a can of soup) or dinner and provide a bath once or twice a week. Also there is no home support in the evening on Quadra though there is in Campbell River. The client must manage alone the rest of the time or get help from family or friends.

Home Support service is provided by VIHA at no cost if the person's income is under \$17,000 (\$38,000 for a couple). Otherwise, the person pays a percentage of their income per day for the service. Some families have had to discontinue service because they cannot afford this.

Admission to the Assisted Living and Complex Care residences in Campbell River, whether private or publicly funded, are all based on VIHA's assessment and

referral. 'Being on a waiting list' is no longer possible, because of the urgent demand for beds in order to free up hospital beds. The person must already receive 40 hours per week of Home Support and at least 2 personal services. Assisted Living and Complex Care beds subsidized by VIHA cost 70% and 80%, respectively, of the person's after-tax income (a minimum of \$958 per month for a single person receiving only \$1200 OAS and GIS monthly, plus a surcharge for hydro, and cable, phone, personal items and outings.) For many seniors, not much is left. Some have to apply for an 'Involuntary Separation', so that the spouse who doesn't need care can have some of the income from the spouse-in-care to live on. Those with higher incomes pay up to \$6000-\$8000 per month for Complex Care facilities (24-hr. residential care for those who are no longer able to direct their own care).

Terry Fulton, who manages the Willow Point Supportive Living residences has a 200% waiting list. Supportive Living provides low-rent apartments for seniors who are able to live independently. His non-profit society financed the apartments using money donated by business people as a down payment, pre-selling the patio homes with a covenant in place specifying that they could be bought back by the society at a price-fixed by a formula. As a result they made a profit of \$20,000 on each property; this \$120,000 was used for down payment to build apartments (40 suites) and daycare building. The latter is leased by VIHA for a Senior Day Care Centre. They now have \$1 million in assets in the patio homes which currently rent at \$750/ month plus utilities.

Coastal Community Credit Union gave them a good mortgage deal where though the rate was a little higher than competitors, it was less expensive because they did not demand the purchase of CMHC insurance. They got 3.8% fixed for 5 yrs. at time when general rates were 6.8%. Trial and error, a dedicated Board, plus astute business and tenant management practices have made the project financially sound in recent years. The Society and residents set the rules of admission and tenant guidelines. The residents can get income-based rent assistance from the BC SAFER program; rent is \$600 (\$425 with the rent subsidy), including heat and hot

water though not hydro. VIHA now has a 'cluster care' arrangement there, whereby one Home Support worker assists several of the residents throughout the day. The residents have a weekly dinner together, otherwise they provide their own meals. Terry's aim is to one day finance a Complex Care facility on the property, with its own nursing staff and food services, so that the residents can move there when needed and still be in familiar surroundings with friends.

Terry's advice to us about developing more seniors housing on Quadra was "Don't involve VIHA or you will have no say about admissions and discharging or moving your residents, plus constantly changing VIHA rules. He suggests we do a questionnaire with people 5, 10, 20 years away from needing the care, asking which of 4 or 5 options the majority want/need.

Funding possibilities he listed were: Businesses including those in CRiver. Charitable Foundations. A benefactor, a partner who would get involved and enjoy helping. Property development money is sometimes available. CMHC gives a grant of \$10,000 for up-front costs and may lend another \$10,000 interest free. CMHC gives lots of advice. Different housing models such as Abbeyfield, Equity Co-ops, co-op housing, shared homes, Life-Leasing will suit various people.

Mary Cook of Home Support suggested we look at the ideal seniors services we might want to create on Quadra - ways to help seniors to stay in their homes as long as possible (including groceryshopping, house-cleaning, yard and home maintenance), to have healthy meals, to exercise and socialize regularly (possibly at a Seniors Centre), to have transport to appointments and activities, and to provide respite for families caring for their elders. In other words, we could make Quadra an Age-friendly Community.

What's next: Our survey of Quadra seniors over 70 years old is continuing, with phone follow-up. We have had kind offers of Q Cove-area land with and without buildings for sale if used for seniors housing and services. "One size does not fit all" - so a variety of housing plus support services might best meet the range of needs of Quadra seniors. We welcome your ideas and help with next steps: Mary 285-3084, Maureen 285-2221. REGIONAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT Area C by Jim Abram =

G ood morning to you all! This report will be fairly rushed due to deadlines, but there are important issues contained herein, so please read on!

B.C. Ferries - What are we going to do?

As you are probably all aware, we will once again be experiencing another fare hike of 4.1% on April 1st, and then again next year in the same amount.

As your Director and Vice Chair of the SRD Board I had the privilege of meeting with the Minister of Transportation in Victoria on March 12th along with all of the other Chairs of coastal RD's and the Islands Trust. We had a full hour to state our case regarding the ludicrous consultation that they did that will help them determine which of our scheduled runs they will cut right after the election, should they form government. We impressed upon the Minister all of the reasons why the ferry system needs to be considered as part of the entire Highways system and why the fares need to be rolled back, not increased. She listened but made no commitments except that there will be cuts to service. We did make some headway on the issue of considering the ferry system along with the rest of the highways infrastructure.

We then met with our MLA Claire Trevena, Maurine Karagianis, the critic for B.C. ferries and Nicholas Simmons of the Sunshine Coast who is a staunch supporter of our communities regarding ferry issues. We also had a brief moment with the leader of the Opposition, Adrian Dix. We explained all of our issues as community representatives and asked for support of our points should the NDP form government. There is no doubt that all of them understood the concerns we brought to them and that they shared with us. The ferries will be considered as part of the highways infrastructure and some level of roll back will be considered if they form government. The one caveat is what they will inherit in the way of a budget. Will there be any money to do the things we asked for? That will not be known until after the election.

We made it very clear to both the Minister and to the NDP members that this is an election issue. Now, it is important that each of you understands the same. This is our one chance in the foreseeable future to make some changes in favour of our dying communities. You must reach out to everyone that you know in all regions of the Province and ask them to go to their all-candidates meetings and to ask the important questions of the candidates: will they treat B.C. Ferries as part of the highway system and fund it accordingly and will they roll back the fares? They need to write letters to the editor and spread the word via email and social media to get the word out. We are being extremely discriminated against as taxpayers of the Province. We pay taxes for all roads in the province and we pay a portion of the "subsidy" that goes to B.C. Ferries and we pay the lion's share of the operations of the vessels through user fees (fares). Does this sound fair to you?

So what are we going to do about it? Are we going to just roll over and take another kick in the side while our communities continue to diminish due to high fares or are we going to make a real fuss over this? I am hoping that you will rise up and make this an election issue that cannot be ignored. It is up to you. I am counting on you. Your ideas are welcome. This is a priority for our communities. Think! What can we do?

Other major issues

I am out of allowable space, so I will need to leave the issues of Q.Cove Sewer and my work with the Minister and our recycling issues for the next report!

Gardening with Native Plants

The use of Native plants in our gardens has been a sustainable and practical gardening style for over twenty years. In BC, several nurseries are dedicated to solely growing native flora, not just for reclamation work in our natural environment, but for home and commercial use in our landscapes. Garden styles change with time, and after copying what is considered an English style for generations, North Americans have evolved into a style of their own, using some of the beautiful plants Mother Nature has created, from grasses to Oregon Grape.

Patricia Johnston is a Native Plant Gardening Consultant from Victoria who has given 200 workshops on the use of natives in the garden. Over the last 12 years, she has partnered with the Victoria Capital Regional District's Water Department, Swan Lake Nature Sanctuary and helped to develop many native plant demonstration gardens in the Victoria region. Her presentation will discuss the values and benefits of using native plants in your garden. Tula Set Up Quadra Weather Station

Quadra's Tula Foundation have launched a weather station and webcam from their base in Hyacinthe Bay.

Tula Foundation's Lab/Office Manager Megan Foss explains that the station is based on the same technologies used by Environment Canada across the country for weather stations of similar size.

"On Quadra, an image from the webcam and the latest weather information is automatically published to the internet every 5 minutes using 4G satellite internet services."

The instruments are Campbell Scientific and include: a CR1000 Data Logger, wind speed and direction, solar radiation, PAR, relative humidity, barometric pressure, rainfall, leaf moisture, and temperature. Data is collected in five second intervals and summarized for output in five minute, hourly and daily data tables.

The Tula Foundation are involved in a variety of scientific studies and endeavours on Quadra Island and at their Hakai Beach facility on the Central Coast.

Foss describes the foundations interest and need for weather data "Our main scientific mission at the Quadra site is long term ecological research. A big part of that is long term monitoring of the land, ocean and atmosphere. Monitoring weather is a great place to start:





clearly very important and relatively easy to do."

"All data will be available to the public via the internet. All the data will be archived for many years to come, so it will be possible for anyone, including the research scientists that we work with to look at how our weather is changing. We also publish the data to Weather Underground and other national and international databases."

Birth Story: Ina May Gaskin & The Farm Midwives is coming to Quadra Island!

This feature length documentary tells the story of counterculture heroine Ina May Gaskin and her spirited friends, who began delivering each other's babies in 1970, on a caravan of hippie school buses, headed to a patch of rural Tennessee land. With Ina May as their leader, the women taught themselves midwifery from the ground up, and, with their families, founded an entirely communal, agricultural society called The Farm. They grew their own food, built their own houses, published their own books, and, as word of their social experiment spread, created a model of care for women and babies that changed a generation's approach to childbirth.

Forty years ago Ina May led the charge away from isolated hospital birthing rooms, where husbands were not allowed and mandatory forceps deliveries were the norm. Today, as nearly one third of all US babies are born via C-section, she fights to preserve her community's hard-won knowledge. With incredible access to the midwives' archival video collection, the film not only captures the unique sisterhood at The Farm Clinic–from its heyday into the present–but shows childbirth the way most people have never seen it–unadorned, unabashed, and awe-inspiring.





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Tourism Businesses Slam BC Liberal Forest Policies

(QUADRA ISLAND, BC) - There's a new confrontation brewing in British Columbia forests and it's coming from an unlikely source. The latest battle to protect Vancouver Island's forests isn't being waged by an environmental organization...it's being waged by business: In particular, the tourism industry. A coalition of tourism businesses in the Discovery Islands, near Campbell River are charging the government with indifference to the needs of a major economic player in the region.

The Discovery Islands Marine Tourism Group is a coalition of businesses including the local Chamber of Commerce, which claims provincial forest policies designed by the BC Liberal government are encouraging the forest industry to clear cut forests along marine corridors which are critical to the survival of a large wilderness based tourism industry.

The group went public with its concerns by publishing a full page ad in the Victoria Times Colonist criticizing the government for its inaction. Spokesperson Ralph Keller says the group wanted to send a strong message to government that forest management polices aren't working for Discovery Islands business, employees and their families. "We've spent a lot of time and money trying to convince the government there's a serious problem here but they're not listening."

The Discovery Islands are home to over 120 tourism--dependent businesses: lodges, resorts, motels, campgrounds, marinas, tour companies, and related operations which employ over 1200 people and generate 45 million dollars in revenue every year. "The Discovery Islands have become a world class destination worthy of increased protection." Keller said. "We've become the second most important marine wilderness destination in BC, behind Tofino/Pacific Rim, yet the government is managing the forests here like its 1956. They're treating us like bystanders instead of major revenue producers and employers." Keller went on to say that in the last 15 years, Vancouver Island has lost most of its pulp mills and saw mills and with them thousands of jobs-now out-sourced to Asia. "The once great forest industry is now just a logging industry acting with impunity, completely insensitive to our needs. They degrade our operating environment then send the timber not only out of the region, but out of the country. Is this supposed to be the BC Liberal commitment to jobs and families?"

"We're not against logging, but when the government revised the Forest Range & Practices Act in 2003, they gave all the power to the logging industry and left every one else out of the planning process." He went on to say that tourism operators are kept completely in the dark about cutting plans. "We find out about forest development plans when we start to see trees being felled. We're being misled about forest industry intentions and have no meaningful way to influence cut block design. When we complain to government, they tell us to go talk to the licensees... Who's writing the rules here? Whose forests are these? It's pretty clear this government is about corporate resource extraction and everybody else is just in the wav".

Commenting on Royal Assent Making Pacific Salmon an Official B.C. Emblem

VANCOUVER, BRITISH COLUMBIA--(Marketwire - March 19, 2013) - Brian Riddell, president and CEO of the Pacific Salmon Foundation, made the following statement following news that Royal Assent has been given to the designation of Pacific salmon as an official provincial emblem. The proposed designation was included in Bill 8, the Miscellaneous Statutes Amendment Act of 2013.

Dr. Riddell said: "Naming Pacific salmon as a provincial emblem is much more than a symbolic act. It is a reminder to us all of the tremendous values associated with Pacific salmon in B.C. and that we all have responsibility for conserving and restoring this incredibly important natural resource. As the head of a foundation that is singularly focused on Pacific salmon restoration, I commend the provincial government, especially Environment Minister Terry Lake, for its leadership and for the \$22 million that the provincial government has invested in Pacific salmon conservation since 2006."

Since 2006, the provincial government has invested \$22 million through the B.C. Living Rivers Trust, which has funded more than 330 projects to support habitat restoration, increased capacity for management and First Nations, and localized watershed planning. Funds directed to the Fraser River basin were partially matched by the Government of Canada to support Pacific Salmon conservation in an area that encompasses roughly one-third of the province. The Pacific Salmon Foundation partnered with two other environmental organizations, the Fraser Basin Council and Living Rivers Georgia Basin/Vancouver Island, to implement the mandate of the Living Rivers Trust, as well as to call for the designation of Pacific salmon as an official B.C. symbol

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Biologist And Filmmaker Tour BC With Controversial New Documentary

Biologist Alexandra Morton and filmmaker Twyla Roscovich hit the road to bring "Salmon Confidential" to communities around British Columbia

(Victoria, BC) - Salmon Confidential is a new film on the government cover up of what is killing BC's wild salmon. When biologist Alexandra Morton discovers BC's wild salmon are testing positive for dangerous European salmon viruses associated with salmon farming worldwide, a chain of events is set off by government to suppress the findings. Tracking viruses, Morton moves from courtrooms, into British Columbia's most remote rivers, Vancouver grocery stores and sushi restaurants. The film documents Morton's journey as she attempts to overcome government and industry roadblocks thrown in her path and works to bring critical information to the public in time to save BC's wild salmon.

The film provides surprising insight into the inner workings of government agencies, as well as rare footage of the bureaucrats tasked with managing our fish and the safety of our food supply.



Local community groups are hosting Salmon Confidential screenings across BC, followed by discussion with Morton and Roscovich about the making of the film, the viruses, politics and how people can come together to restore wild salmon. The film is also available online at SalmonConfidential .ca.

"It is critical that people hear what is happening to this essential fish and why. We don't have to be helpless bystanders as government tries to bury the evidence. The careers of all who research these European viruses in BC are under attack, but disease in salmon cannot be a federal secret any longer if we want wild salmon to be here for our children," said Morton.

In an endorsement of Salmon Confidential, David Suzuki commented, "For years, Alexandra Morton has soldiered on providing evidence of and calling for action on the catastrophic state of wild salmon. Government and industries have thwarted her over and over again. This film clearly documents that governments do not put protection of wild salmon at the top of their priorities and Canadians should be outraged. I am."

The upcoming BC provincial election gives the film tour a sense of urgency. "This whole nightmare could end tomorrow and we could have our wild fish back if the next provincial leader commits to removing salmon feedlots from the wild salmon migration routes. All election candidates need to hear from the public that the wild salmon economy is too valuable to sacrifice to the salmon farm industry. The people of BC should understand what we documented in this film and then they can let candidates know they will be taking wild salmon to the polls," said Roscovich.

On Saturday March 23 Sierra Quadra brings BC filmmaker Twyla Roscovich to Quadra for the island premiere of her latest film, Salmon Confidential. Twyla is a filmmaker and an environmentalist who documents the ecology of the BC coast.

Salmon Confidential follows biologist Alexandra Morton as she unravels the mysteries of BC's declining salmon stocks using some of the world's top fish labs. What she uncovers should shock anyone who cares about wild salmon and the extensive food web they support. This 70 minute film documents the biologist's journey as she attempts to overcome government sanctioned roadblocks and get critical information about wild fish into public view.



This is a film about salmon, politics, science, and activism. Learn about BC's changing coastal ecology, and the inner workings of government agencies responsible for overseeing fish stocks and the safety of our food supply.

Salmon Confidential is a film for all British Columbians and indeed, all Canadians. It is currently playing across the country to rave reviews. 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
