



What's happening with the new mall in Q Cove?

Maybe it's just me, but there seems to be a cone of silence over the proposed new mall in Quathiaski Cove. Is this because the zoning isn't at issue, so it's essentially a done deal and a non-story?

The property at the corner of Harper and Plaza Roads is zoned commercial, so the proposed new 5000+ sq ft Peoples Drug Mart/Medical Centre falls within community zoning criteria. According to the Strathcona Regional District minutes' staff report this past August, a number of bylaw variances accompanying the proposal were brought forward and duly accepted; yet it seems no public information was offered such that islanders might have discussed the viability of the variances before their acceptance. It seems odd that the only way islanders could learn of this development was if they were in the habit of reading attachments to the Regional District minutes on the SRD website.

But back to the proposal itself.

The bylaw variances that were presented and accepted at the SRD's August meeting concern parking, a landscaped public walkway, and signage.

Let's begin with the first two. The official off-street parking requirement for a building this size is 48 spaces. The applicants – Ashcon Holdings, the owners of Peoples Drug Mart in Cove Centre – proposed 26 spaces, ostensibly to enable an expansion of the area 'dedicated to the public realm.' It wasn't clear in the RD minutes whether the suggested pedestrian-friendly landscaping and walkway were to be undertaken by Ashcon, or left for future development.

Another significant bylaw variance in the accepted proposal is the area allocated to the building's signage. While the permissible area for the building's freestanding sign is stated to be 16 square feet, the approved square footage has been bumped to 10 times that figure - 160 square feet. The justification for the tenfold increase, as reported in the RD minutes, seems confused: the staff report states that each of the two individual business signs would meet the existing size requirements; additionally, the sign will be set back from the corner of the property. These statements don't quite make sense, and nor does the math: two signs of 16 square feet each equals 32 square feet, not 160. Even if you add in the soonto-be-displaced Community Centre's signage at 64 square feet - which the developers have offered to do - the total is only 96 square feet.

Do we really need a sign that stands 16 feet high and measures 160 square feet to advertise two island businesses? Maybe, say, for the Island Highway – but for Harper Road? The pedestrianfriendly values the developers are seeking to protect by minimizing parking stand to be overshadowed by the island's biggest commercial sign!

I'm left with the thought that Quadra has some uneasy recent history concerning development plans and communication thereof. Remember the Library? The moral of that story was 'a little public due process goes a long way' – especially on a small island.

In closing, I hope the developers

and project supporters will soon take the initiative to inform islanders of their plans and to invite their input – before the building starts. After all, Q Cove is the gateway to our island, and as such it sets the tone for how residents and visitors alike experience Quadra.

Dog Bylaws: Another Update

Yesterday was a great day for me and my dogs. We walked to the Spit through the campsite trail for the first time since May. I love that trail and so do my dogs. We had a lovely walk out to the end of the Spit, and as we were returning via the campsite trail, I saw a middle-aged woman approaching with a mid-sized black and white dog off-leash. Both the dog and the woman were unfamiliar to me, so I took my dogs well off the trail into the bushes and sat them down around me. As I was preparing to give them their treats, the dog charged my dogs. It's teeth were bared, it's hackles were up, and it was making a loud growling sound. This was NOT a young dog, full of fun, looking for playmates. This was an aggressive dog. The woman ran in circles around the dog blowing her whistle and calling "Jake! Jake!" repeatedly. Jake was singularly unconcerned with her. She finally managed to get ahold of him and put his leash on. She ignored me entirely. After the summer my dogs and I have had, we were all shaken.

Today we returned to the trail and the Spit, and at almost exactly the same place and at almost exactly the same time, I saw a woman below us on the beach. I thought it might be the same woman, but I did not see the dog. Not for long. The dog charged through the bushes and into my dogs doing exactly the same thing as he had done yesterday only with more forcefulness. The woman remained on the beach blowing her whistle. Jake finally went to her.

Now. I am still shaking. I have been to the RCMP to report these acts of aggression. I asked the woman for her name. She ignored me. I took her license plate number. Now. She knew from yesterday (if not long, long before) of her dog's aggressive tendencies. She chose to leave it off-leash. I guess she thought walking on the beach would make a difference. It didn't. My question - my chronic question - is this: What makes her (or any of the people on this island like her) think that she has the right to let her dog disturb the peaceful walks of other Quadra citizens with or without dogs? Would she be pleased to have that happen to her every time she took her dog out for a walk? I am unable to understand the thought processes that allow this kind of behaviour. I won't speculate on the possible rationals.

This dog is black and white. It is mediumsized, about the size of a border collie. It had upright ears. If you have had any issues with this dog, please contact the RCMP. And much more importantly, please speak out in favour of the necessity for dog by-laws on this island. Otherwise you are speaking out in favour of people not being allowed to enjoy the trails and byways of Quadra in peace. Think about that if you would.

MLA REPORT

I t seems, sadly, to be my annual complaint: once again it is fall and once again the Legislature is not sitting. The BC Liberals have made a mockery of our parliamentary democracy, calling the Legislature into session at their whim. They have exploited people's distrust of the political system and effectively said that our Legislature is completely unimportant.

I joined a group of Opposition MLAs including Opposition Leader Adrian Dix and House Leader John Horgan - on the steps of the Legislature on the day we were supposed to return to do the people's business. All 34 NDP MLAs would be willing and ready to be in Victoria to ask questions of the government, to debate issues important to the people of BC, to work together on bipartisan committees. This is what we are supposed to do; this is why we were elected. But the Liberal government thinks that 36 days in the House is adequate for accountability this year. Legislators in Manitoba, a province with a quarter the population of BC will have sat more than three times as long by the end of the year. The sad irony is that it was the BC Liberals who suggested fixed sessions of the Legislature; that should mean we are working in session in Victoria on behalf of the people of BC for a full six months.

I am angry about it and I hope that others, too, are angry. A parliamentary democracy should provide checks and balances. But a political party and a premier that prefer to govern without transparency, without debate, through diktat, are eroding our provincial parliamentary process. Continued public indifference to what is happening leads to authoritarianism, loss of rights, and eventually, dictatorship. I'm not being extremist: our rights can be lost.

While my calendar is booked with meetings, critic tours and events from now until Christmas, those should be in addition to our regular duties in the Legislature, not as a replacement. In the last weeks I have been working on a number of issues, two of which come up on a regular basis: our new hospital and high speed, fibre optic internet connectivity. I have been in touch with the Minister of Health about the possibility of keeping parts of our existing hospital to supplement the new building. I hear regularly from the medical community that the new facility will be overcrowded as soon as it opens (our present hospital was well beyond capacity, with 97 patients last week: the new one officially has space for 96 people). I also hear of the need for space for seniors, for hospice care and for other ancillary health care services. It would make a great deal of sense to keep what we can of our current building, to supplement the new building, rather than find ourselves immediately desperate for new space.

The question of high-speed internet connectivity is becoming critical for our North Island communities. Although Telus is laying cable from Sayward to Port McNeill we have places where there is a 200 name wait list simply to get a subscription and other places where the promised "last mile" of high speed connection ended miles before the community. Access to high quality, high speed internet is as important for economic development in our rural communities as electrification was 70 plus years ago. I have put this front and centre in the Opposition's economic strategy and am working with MLA colleagues to connect our rural communities.

I continue to discuss other traditional economic generators with communities. There is a real fear that the balance between logging and tourism is being lost in some areas of the Discovery Islands. While on the west coast, the Ministry of Forests assures me that Western Forest Products is rethinking its logging plans on the outskirts of Tahsis.

Contracts for the \$1.4 billion John Hart Dam reconstruction should be awarded soon. This will be hugely important to Campbell River; but we want to make sure this is the case. I am writing to BC Hydro to ask that preference be given to local, unionized companies and that, wherever possible, apprenticeships be included in the construction process. The four-year project would allow an apprentice to complete his or her full training on one job in one place. More than 60 years ago, the original construction of the John Hart Dam was instrumental in the building and diversification of Campbell River. We need to ensure the community benefits as much or more this time around.

I am using some of the time we are not in Victoria to pursue issues related to my critic portfolio for Transportation, Infrastructure and BC Ferries. This week I will be looking at problems related to the pubic private partnership (3P) that built the Port Mann Bridge and start discussions about the next proposed, 3-P bridge which the premier has said will replace the Massey Tunnel. I will also be discussing local highway issues - from chipseal to aggregate, potholes to crossing lights (at the ferry) - with representatives of the Ministry of Transportation.

Next week will take me to Washington State for discussions with bureaucrats, politicians and users of their state owned ferry system. I will be trying to find out what does and doesn't work - and how their success can be incorporated into BC Ferries. Our neighbour appears to have a state run enterprise operating smoothly without any pretense of being a commercial cruise ship company.

REGIONAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT

would like to thank all of the people who have contacted me by one means or another to comment on my last report. I realize it was long, but there was a lot going on and there still is. I appreciate hearing feedback on my reports. It lets me know that people are actually reading them! So here we go with another one!

Ferries, Ferries and more about ferries!

As most of you already know, I am part of the Coastal Chairs Group regarding BC Ferries. It is made up of all of the Chairs of all of the coastal regional districts and the Islands Trust. I was appointed by our Board to sit in for the Chair since I have been working on this file for so very many years. Thanks to him for the appointment! I think I should back up to the UBCM convention to give you some background information just in case you missed the last report. (some of this will be repetitious... sorry!)

On Tuesday, September 17th, the Chairs group met with the Minister of Transportation and the Premier. We first had an hour-long pre-meeting to get our "script" fine tuned for the Minister and the Premier. After the actual meeting we had another hour-long meeting to de-brief and plan our actions post-UBCM.

The meeting with the Premier and Minister went very well with the usual introductions and chatter about government priorities and lack of funds. We certainly were prepared for all of that and we pushed the UBCM resolution for ferries regarding putting ferries back into highways, that passed unanimously (B 12 if you look it up online) at the convention. We stressed that this is the only way that the government will ever make the system sustainable and affordable and the only way to increase economic development and sustain our populations on the islands, including Vancouver Island. We have, as one of our members, the representative from Metro Vancouver. This is an incredible boon to our cause since they have the major population in the province and support us 100%. We certainly stressed the economic aspects of the communities we represent and the hardship that is being placed on each and every one of them. In the end, the Premier asked, "What would you do, Jim?". That was an easy question to answer. I slid a copy of the resolution over to her (she sat right adjacent to me at the end of the table) and said, "This is the only way you can solve the problem." And then I reiterated the absolute need to treat the ferry system equitably as it is part of the terrestrial component of highways, and to make the ferry system part of the overall highways system and fund it accordingly.

The text of what I read aloud to her as the only solution was the following: "Therefore be it resolved that the provincial government recognize the coastal ferry services as essential extensions of our provincial public highway system and ensure that ferry fares are reduced and core service levels are maintained at current service levels until such time as the provincial government implements legislation that recognizes our coastal ferry services as essential extensions of our public highways system and creates equity between B.C.'s terrestrial and marine, interior and coast highway systems." She was, surprisingly, somewhat receptive and announced that she is assigning the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Transportation with the task of meeting immediately with our group to try and come to a solution. His name is Jordan Sturdy and he is not only an MLA, but also the Mayor of Pemberton.

His visits started last week and he is almost finished meeting with each and every one of us. I met with him on Friday, October 4th, along with our CAO in the Boardroom of the SRD.

We went over his mandate as assigned by the Premier and I then proceeded to give him our perspective on why the system needs to be changed. It was very surprising to hear him say that he had been told that the UBCM option was not being looked at seriously. It then became my job to convince him that the system has had ten years of trial under its present structure and has continued to fail and has continued to stress the government's patience and continually cost them more money. It was illogical to eliminate a proposal for consideration that had been put forward by the entire coastal group and validated by the entire UBCM. Our proposal must be part of the considered options. He went so far as to say, "Point well taken". He also heard similar comments from each of the other Chairs.

After expressing all of the usual concerns for coastal communities, families and





economic development, he did suggest to me that what we need to do is present to the government an economic impact analysis. It seemed that the door had possibly opened a crack at that time. I believe that our proposal, as backed by the UBCM, will be given consideration.

I was very encouraged by the meeting and the fact that the Premier assigned him to work with us and that it all happened so quickly.

I have since reported back to the rest of the Coastal Chairs Group and have suggested a number of things.

First of all, I have suggested that we need to undertake the work suggested by MLA Sturdy on economic impact assessment. Some of this may be done by individual groups within each RD and the rest may need to be done by a qualified person / firm. If this is the case, we will need to agree on some sort of resourcing. I would assume that this would include the possibility of a small financial contribution from each RD and the Islands Trust. After hearing from the entire group I will get back to you on this point. (if there is anyone in this community qualified to do this work, please let me know!)

The next suggestion was that we meet as soon as possible to go over all of the fine points and formulate strategy.

And lastly that we arrange to meet with MLA's McRae and Stillwell, since they are both MLA's within government and are both island representatives that could be champions for our coastal communities if they wanted to be. I am awaiting replies to all of the above from the entire group.

I believe that we are actually getting closer to some sort of buy-in from government on this issue. I believe that the reason for this is that they understand that the current model is not working and that they have a dedicated group of locally elected coastal representatives that are willing to help them find a solution.

I will keep you informed of further developments.

Kanish View Estates Road

I have been in touch with our representative at the Ministry of Transportation and she has informed me that, following my request, she has arranged to tour the road along with the Supervisor for Emcon from Campbell River. They will note what work needs to be done right now and establish a work plan for the future upgrades that ail need to take place. So, we have accomplished that goal and they are following through. This is great news for the folks that live in the area.

Esplanade Park transfer.

This Wednesday it will be my pleasure to move the motions that will finalize the transfer documents between the Ministry of Transportation and the SRD to finally transfer over the area of land known as the Esplanade, for park and trail purposes. This issue was before me when I first took office and is finally complete.

We as a community will finally have control of that area and have the backing of the SRD and not have to depend on Highways to deal with any problems that arise. My congratulations to the residents in the area who have been so helpful and cooperative in bringing this to fruition.

Granite Bay Park hydro

Just a small item to report with regard to the SRD regional park at Granite Bay. We have been working on getting hydro to the dock for the past year and we have finally completed the transaction and the work.

There is now limited power at the dock for occasional use by those who need it. This is not for use by live-aboards or any other type of residential uses at the dock, which are not permitted by by-law. This was done as a convenience to allow boaters use of power for charging batteries or a quick repair. I can put another check next to "jobs to be done"!

Heriot Bay Road upgrades

The Ministry of Transportation was on the island last Wednesday, along with engineering staff, to take a look at the needs for the stretch of road from Rebecca Spit turn off north towards Heriot Bay, along the waterfront. Only one of the engineers was able to attend as the other had family issues to deal with. Subsequent trips are planned.

We are going to finally see a useable, safe road along that stretch and I cannot thank the Ministry enough. The officials that I met with at UBCM were so up to date on our situation and so helpful in bringing this all together, after so many years of lobbying. (you can probably tell that I am very pleased!)

Q. Cove Sewer expansion meeting

On September 25th, the SRD staff (CAO, General Manager of Operations and Engineer) hosted a meeting for the residents of the area within the sewer district and for the residents of the area that a proposed expansion is planned for. It was a very informative meeting, letting people know what it would cost to add their property to the existing sewer system. The basic cost will be \$9,100.00 per property with a \$1,300.00 hook up fee (there are additional costs on the individual properties that are the responsibility of the owner and they will vary according to needs of the actual property). This is down from the last time a proposal was presented. It was for \$16,800.00 per property. The difference is due to a Gas Tax Fund contribution that I was able to convince the Board to put toward this project since it is so important to the future of the Cove. The staff suggested that the people present go away and think about it for a short time and then another meeting will be held to answer questions and give any updates. Eventually there will be a vote taken on the issue by one of the means available to local government.

Surge Narrows

I will be attending the AGM of SNCA to hear all of the issues that are important to the outer islands. They are a large part of this electoral area and I do my best to ensure that their views are represented. We have a number or road issues to deal with and I will be bringing them an update from the Ministry of Transportation regarding a tour that we did some months ago, looking at the terrible condition off their roads.

That is about it for now. 

Freediving: The Path Less Travelled

What is The Path Less Travelled? If you are Kirk and Mandy-Rae Krack, the path less travelled is freediving, testing the human limits of deep diving on a breath of surface air. Kirk and Mandy-Rae run Performance Freediving International (PFI), a freedive training organization that travels the world teaching people to freedive.

Since its formation in 2000 PFI has trained over 5000 people. Kirk trained 8 of those people to 23 world records: Mandy-Rae having set 7 of them.

"Through your presentations of your own experiences," wrote Jean Mottershead, "I gained new insights into writing and publishing. The whole experience was enjoyable and inspiring."





Toys

If we look at what makes up a {young} child's playtime, we see two elements: toys and stories.

Let's first examine toys. What is a toy and what can a toy do? A toy is an object that occupies a child's mind and thoughts. It gives the opportunity for learning and teaches concentration. A toy attracts a child through colour, shape and movement. It should be safe for the mind, soul and body, and it stimulates growth and creative thinking. It also lets a child experience accomplishment and gives an opportunity for social interaction while promoting speech and coordination. It opens the world to learning in a fun way at a child's own pace and understanding, and it teaches patience, ingenuity and concepts. With toys, children learn to make choices and develop social interests. Last but not least, the toy demands order just like life itself. As you see, a toy can be a powerful thing.

In a child's life, toys and stories are closely connected. Be it dolls, puppets, cars, blocks, trains or puzzles, all toys stimulate the children to act out creatively with their imagination, the things that are happening in their lives. Everything becomes a story. Therefore, we can greatly influence our children's behaviour by the types of toys we choose for them?

Use your own judgement. If you think a certain toy is a bad toy, it probably is. Just because it is in a store does not make it a good toy for a child. We not only have to consider the child's physical safety, but very importantly, their emotional safety.

Currently showing at the Campbell Island Art Gallery is the North Island College faculty exhibition. The college's fine arts staff possess a wide spectrum of formal qualifications in sculpture, pottery, photography, drawing, videography, painting and more.

With a broad scope of talent, Jeff Brett's porcelain and wood fired stoneware are both top notch. His chosen tones of colouration and the versatility of his work is fluent and impressive.

Another highlight of the show was realizing that Sara Viper's portions of broken ladders randomly positioned from the ceiling at the centre of the gallery were not real, but representational ladders made of gauze, starch and thread. Viper also shows a pair of two-dimensional graphite, collage and print media works that depicted a fusion of sketches of human anatomy and flora.

Alan Burgess is exhibiting a collection of six delicately crafted black stoneware pots of varying design. The simplicity of the vessels and skillful use of colour is artfully utilized to highlight the beauty of the series.

Angela Somerset is showing two groupings of two mixed media panels

serenely flanking either side of the monochromatic works of Gordon Hutchens. His contribution to the exhibition is a series of six anagama fired stoneware of varying heights and size. The anagama is a type of large kiln that was popular in Japan during the 1600 and 1700's.

Other contributions include digital videos by Jeff Brett, Megan Wilson and Blaine Campbell, and Carrie Tannant. Tannant is also exhibiting a mixed media mass of mostly small inflated foil bags which she attached together, and titled "Cumulonibus."

The show includes three colourful photographs by Paul Bailey. Two of the three giclee (inkjet) images were intentionally blurred.

Linda Perron has presented two gum bichromate over cynotype photographs. The sepia images were juxtaposed with a line of six small icons reiterating identical prints of a single pear executed with lumen paint on wood.

The three paintings by John Hooley are of somewhat different styles. Two paintings were nicely flowing works imparting a notion of abstracted views of sea or sky scape, but his more down-to-earth expression of rocks is weighted, pulling and more realistic.

Another realist piece by Elizabeth Russell is titled "Blanket Coat." This is a full-sized charcoal drawing of a long coat spread open on a flat surface. The artist emphasized the subject by cutting around the circumference of the coat and displaying it unframed.

This show is enjoyable because of the large range of artistic approaches and talents. It also provides a commentary of what is being taught at the North Island College. What do you think? Letters to the editor: <u>artseditor@discoveryislander.ca</u>

Local Film-Maker Hosts World Premiere

A ward-winning Kwagiulth film-maker Lori Lewis hosts the world premiere screening and celebration of her new short fiction film 'My Cousin Lived Next Door' this coming Saturday, October 12 at 7 p.m. on home turf in the Quadra Island Community Centre.

Says Lewis, 'This will be the only screening of the film before it has a year of touring international film festivals."

First independent production

- In 2008 Lewis received the Best Live Action Short Award at the 33rd Annual American Indian Film Festival in San Francisco for directing 'Niigaanibatowaad: FrontRunners', a film that continues to be aired on Aboriginal Peoples Television Network (APTN).

This past year, with assistance from The Canada Council for the Arts, Aboriginal Media Program, Lewis and her company, Laksakla Productions, took her script for 'My Cousin Lived Next Door', and with producer Heidi Ridgway and a local cast and crew, created the first piece of fiction to be filmed in Cape Mudge Village, with additional scenes in Campbell River and Vancouver.

Top Canadian talent - The Canada Council grant allowed Lewis the opportunity to bring on board some of the best production people in Canada: Don Chaput, director of photography, is known for his documentary work; John Gurdebeke, editor; Marie Clements, actor, is a Métis playwright, performer, director, producer and screenwriter, and her work 'Unnatural and Accidental' received seven nominations at the Genie and Leo Awards; Russell Wallace, actor and composer, is a traditional Lil'wat singer who has received Juno nominations, and Aboriginal Music and Native American Music awards.

New talent – The cast boasts a group of talented local First Nations youth, and introduces Nyla Carpentier in her first screen role. Carpentier was last seen in the North Island touring schools with Axis Theatre's 'Raven Meets the Monkey King'.

The story – 'My Cousin Lived Next Door' tells the tale of Mary and Nelly, two very close cousins and best friends who grow up on a coastal Native Reserve in British Columbia. Although they are next-doorneighbours, their childhood experiences lead them on two extremely different paths to adulthood. The film, a captivating montage of scenery and imagery, recalls their different journeys as Mary reflects upon her life through her successful and perfect façade.

Where to from here? "I would love to have the film travel to international film festivals around the world," says Lewis. "At the moment it has been submitted to the Sundance Film Festival and the Vancouver International Women in Film Festival."

ori Lewis is a Quadra Island aboriginal film-maker who has spent the past year working on a short film (12 minutes, 40 seconds) titled "My Cousin Lived Next Door." Her father was Cape Mudge's late Chief Councillor Lawrence Lewis. Lori will be honouring her home community by holding the world debut of her new film this Saturday at 7:00 pm at the Quadra Community Centre. living on reservation. Lewis says that the short film has an important message that will resonate with both native and non-native audiences. It has been submitted to the Sundance Film Festival and to the Vancouver Native Women's Film Festival, and will also be pitched to the Winnipeg Aboriginal Film Festival and the American Indian Film Festival.

Originally, "My Cousin Lived Next Door" was a short story written by Lewis, that was in



Ms Lewis grew up on Quadra Island and has a long line of credentials and experience. She became a professional actress and stage manager after securing a degree from the University of Victoria. She later earned a degree in teaching from the University of British Columbia. She toured Europe directing the play "Niigaanibatowaad" (translation: "Front Runners"), which won best live action short at the American Indian Film Festival in San Francisco in 2008.

"My Cousin Lived Next Door" is a semi-autobiographical work that chronicles the lives of two cousins that reflects on the different cultural identities between a female urban native professional and her cousin whose life is spent part inspired by components of the Pickton massacres in Vancouver, and by the Highway of Tears in BC's interior. The story was later transformed into a short film script, and finally into the finished production which was filmed at Quadra Island, Campbell River and Vancouver.

Notable associates of the film include producer Heidi Ridgeway, acclaimed director of photography Don Chaput, editor John Gurdebeke, sound designer Guy Maddin, and actors Marie Clements, Russell Wallace and Nyla Carpentier.

Admission is 5 dollars, and proceeds from the debut are being donated to Qwallawyuw Headstart Preschool Program. It is Lewis's hope that her film will be part of several film festivals and that it will touch as many people as possible.

Our aim was to learn more about the operation of seniors housing models which might work on Quadra.

Operating Structure: Abbeyfield is a notfor-profit Society with a volunteer Board, affiliated with St. John the Divine Church for financial back-up, but is non-denominational and self-sufficient. Creating an atmosphere of mutual caring, respect and "purposeful living" for senior residents is part of the mandate - to build a sense of 'family'. It was started by local seniors who fundraised and applied to Abbeyfield Canada (see www. abbeyfield.ca.) for seed money and guidance on governance, building management and fundraising. The Society obtained a mortgage from the local credit union, bought an old office building site, designed the facility with seniors in-put and an architect's help. The Abbeyfield Board sets fees to cover operating and contingency costs. The Board is hands-on to help with minor maintenance and painting rooms but hire professionals for plumbing, etc.

Suites: Abbeyfield in Courtenay is 17 years old, with10 suites all with external and internal entrances on the ground floor. Each unit's exit door has a small patio, for private and emergency access. Suites are bed-sitting room style, approx. <u>300sq.ft</u>., with toilet, sink and shower. Two suites are wheel-chair access so have 2-piece bathroom and use of the Bath/shower Room where assistance is provided. Suites are furnished by tenants, who do their own cleaning. Rooms have call buttons to Staff and medical alert. Small pets are permitted on a situation-by-situation basis.

A sheltered walkway with small trees, shrubs and plants which attract birds surrounds the building so tenants can walk safely and not get lost; it also features a shared patio with tables and chairs. Abbey-field is in a flat, residential area across from Kiwanis seniors housing, on a bus route to downtown and near walking and scooter paths; some residents drive. Lay-out: In the central Livingroom off the main entrance and Main hall residents can chat and read when they want company; it has plants and 2 aquariums. Tenants suites open into the Main hall, which runs the length of building and provides easy access to all the shared facilities: Entertainment room, Laundry room, Dining room, Kitchen, Office, Bath/Shower room (plus a wheel-chair access toilet at each end.of the Hall). The Second floor has a shared tenant storage room, a suite for overnight staff and a bed-sitting room for family visitors. A Stair-lift was installed later through fundraising.

Costs: Residents are 55+ (oldest is 94) and must have a family member or legal representative who is empowered to make medical decisions for the person if needed. Suites rent for \$1650/ month and include 3 meals/day, snacks, utilities, internet and cable TV. Residents have their own phones. Family and guests meals and the Family suite rent are at nominal cost. The BC SAFER rental allowance covers part of the \$1650 cost. The Abbeyfield Board can provide a subsidy for tenants who can't afford the full cost; others are assisted by Veterans Affairs or family.

Staff: Key to the operation is good, longterm staff, who "go beyond " to ensure residents feel cared about secure and 'at home'. Lunch and Dinner are prepared daily by Manager/Cook who arrives in the morning to help those who need minor assistance to dress; she makes lunch and dinner, assists people during the day as needed, arranges activities. Cleaning of common area is done by a cleaning service. The Night staff person has free room and board upstairs and is paid for night call-outs. A Weekend cook relieves the Manager and has been there since the start (17 years). Problems between tenants or staff and tenants are dealt with promptly by staff or a conflict resolution professional ' from outside'.

Ageing-in-place: Although the Abbeyfield model was intended for independent living, this Society has adjusted to accommodate tenants with declining health. (This makes it a very interesting possibility for our needs on Quadra). Many residents have VIHA Home Support workers who assist them daily. Hospice support was arranged for a dying resident who wanted to stay in ther Abbeyfield suite, surrounded by friends and family there. The Board expanded their mandate to allow a family member to stay in the upper suite and provide care during their parent's final days, with assistance from a Palliative Care nurse.

Advice to Q Circle: The Abbeyfield Board suggested that we plan now for expansion later. The demand has exceeded the number of suites and they have no accommodation for couples. Plan ahead also for palliative care and respite care to allow for ageing-in-place. Quadra Circle's Housing Committee is now reviewing several housing models and will soon be engaging us as a community in the process of creating housing to meet our seniors' range of needs. These tasty, nutritious meals are cooked specially for the program by the Gowlland Harbour Resort Chef. The cost is a nominal \$5 per meal. Choices range from soup/stew with bun, to a small entree to a full meal with fish or meat, vegetables and a starch. Food preferences, allergies and special diets can be accommodated. Meals can be reheated or frozen for later use. You can pick them up at the Community Centre on Wednesdays between 11:30am and 12 noon. If needed, the meals can be delivered by our volunteers. A Boater's Dream Come True...

Crowd gathers to see "Gratitude" set sail

n exciting new chapter began for retired Lighthouse keeper Gordon Schweers, on Wednesday September 18th, with the launching of his new sailing vessel "Gratitude". A fair size crowd gathered on the dock to join Gordon in the celebration. Champagne glasses were distributed among friends and family along with hugs and cheers while awaiting the arrival of the newly built ketch carefully being transported from Cape Mudge to Quathiaski Cove's boat ramp.

She began her journey as a building project for David Smith. Gracefully named by David to reflect the appreciation of the life he had lived, "Gratitude" would become a culmination of several years of determination and fine workmanship. What began as a dream for one man, became a labor of love for another who would see that the sailing vessel reached completion. Illness would change the course of David's plans and although he knew he wouldn't see this project to the end, David continued working on the boat as long as he could.

This 38' x 11.5' a British Design by Maurice Griffiths is strip built of 1.5" yellow Cedar, the keel and stem of Douglas Fir and was sheathed in cloth and epoxy in Duncan. The superstructure and hardware were built by David and close friend Kaspar Fluckiger, on Quadra Island.

Meanwhile further north on the Coast, Gordon who worked for the Coast Guard as the Langara Island Lighthouse keeper for 38 years, dreamed of one day building his own boat. When the opportunity came to purchase the unfinished boat after David's passing, Gordon had the boat surveyed and was encouraged to purchase it. This was a solid boat with great potential and he shouldn't pass it up.

For the next two years he traveled back and forth at every chance he had and set out to complete his ketch. He retired shortly afterward to devote his attention to the boat. Building such an incredible sailing vessel is quite an undertaking and demands skills, precision and great engineering, not to mention a great deal of patience. Consultations among the boating community and our local experts were many. Friends dropped by often for encouragement and to see the progress. Gordon's presence was so familiar at Cape Mudge Boatworks where the boat was kept, he became a member of the crew lending a hand when required.

Five years later, "Gratitude" was finally ready to get her feet wet. Gordon's sister Shirle had the honor of christening the boat while close friends and family of both David and Gordon cheered. Tide was perfect and the launch went without a hitch. Her new ventures had begun! With the help of a small boat tied to the stern, she was moved over to the dock for a detailed inspection. Aside from a couple small details that were quickly rectified, she was good to go. With a rigging, sails and a few more components left to be added..she will be magnificent and will soon glide the waters of the Coast.

From Lighthouse to sailboat, Gordon understands that life is richer by seaside. On the water, life moves at a different pace where time is marked by tides and weather! Full sails await!

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
