uadra Island is once again home to the coveted wagon. The Quadra Old Growth hockey team won the Pioneer League playofts in Campbell River on March 30th in a 4-2 victory against CR Glass.

Quadra scored first, and took a 3-1 lead into the half time break. They expanded their lead early in the final period, only to have CR Glass score a second goal midway through the period, really heating things up.

A late push with the goalie pulled, was not enough for CR Glass, and as the final seconds on



the clock ticked away, the crow was on their feet. The cheering was so loud you couldn't even hear the final buzzer. Quadra Old Growth, for only the 2nd time in franchise history, was awarded the classic trophy, The Covered Wagon.

There is a story behind the trophy...An islander had bought it from the Matsqui Institution. At the time it was reading lamp. There was no trophy for the league championship, so one of our industrious islanders used the covered wagon from the lamp and turned it into the icon it is today.

Quadra Island and some of our neighbors have miraculously put together a hockey team for 20 years now. This is a true love for the game considering the lack of local ice and ferries to contend with. This was the Old Growths 3rd time playing for the championship. Quadra took the trophy back in 2007/2008, and has had some ups and downs on the ice since. With some new players, team spirit and the relationships from our bond as islanders, this really is a great team.

Old Growth Captain, Bill Dubois said" It was a great game with a solid team effort. Our guys dug

deep and we had a good clean, fun game, just like hockey is meant to be. What made it even better was all the fans that came out to support us."



Ferries - "What's next?"

Dear Islanders

Since the March 11th Demonstration people have asked me, "What's next?" The minimum top-up of experience cards for vehicles and drivers is now \$115 dollars and \$65 for foot passengers. On April 1st rates for everyone increased by 4%, seniors discounts shrank by 50%. On April 28th the sailing schedule changes.

For us what's next is personal commitment. It's easy, it can be fun, it's satisfying and it is very important. I'm talking about writing letters, making phone calls and taking direct action. Will our continued protestations change anything? In the short term – no, eventually yes. It is worth giving this a try.

BCFS is the focus of our frustrations, but the real bad guy is our provincial government. That is where we must focus our energies. Here are some ideas.

Travel on the Water Taxi. It is now cheaper to ride on the Water Taxi from Campbell River than it is to travel on the ferry. The Water Taxi operates weekdays at 4:30 pm and 5:30 pm for commuters. If you ride on the Taxi you will not need to top up the \$65 minimum, it's pay as you go. If enough people start doing this perhaps the Taxi will expand business and more people will boycott the ferry. This sends a direct and immediate message to both the government and BCFS .

Ride on the Water Taxi if you are a passenger in a vehicle instead of staying in the car. Meet your ride on the other side. It's a little inconvenient, but withholding your money is an excellent way to let the government know you are not pleased.

Email Christy Clark, Todd Stone- Minister of Transportation, and every other member of the Liberal caucus. This is very easy. You write one letter and send it to everybody. Here's the thorn – send them three or more per week. Letters need not be long. Better to send many short letters than one long letter.

Letter ideas – ask for a business plan, ask for a social and economic impact study, both of which they have refused to provide. Ask for a reply. In your next letter tell them that their actions are ruining lives and communities.

Next invite them to Quadra and Cortes to see what they are wrecking. Suggest they stay in one of our many fantastic B&B's, dine in our fabulous restaurants, relax in our pubs and take home gifts from our gift shops.

Here's a brief letter – "Dear MLA, Please return our ferry system to the department of highways, or explain to me why the government refuses to do so." And a 2nd , " Dear MLA, I disagree with your government's terminology. Allocating money for the ferry system is not a subsidy, it's an infrastructure expenditure. Please explain to me why ferries are not considered marine highways."

Always ask for a reply. Someone has to read the letters, pass them on or reply to them. The key is many people sending many letters. Keep copies so when you don't get a reply you can resend them. Please ask your friends on social media to write as well.

Use the Service BC phone number <u>1-800-663-</u> <u>7867.It</u>'s Free. Talk to anyone in the Liberal caucus. Give the same message as in your letters. Remember, mla's work for you! If you are asked to leave a message, leave a long one ending with "I'll call again".

Travel with friends to Campbell River rather than driving in separate cars, but ride home on the Water Taxi.

When travelling to the US go on the Black Ball Ferry to Anacortes or Port Angeles.

Some of these ideas may seem frivolous, but they are not. This is a boycott. These are the tools available to us. This government is ruining our community and creating personal hardships, don't let them get away with it.

*The ferry workers on our boats and at the terminals are our friends and neighbours. They are not the enemy.


Latest Fare Hikes Just Prolong Ferry Troubles

31 MARCH 2014 – Ferry fares continue their relentless climb into regions of unaffordability, accompanied by repetitive rhetoric from the provincial government that is disconnected from acceptance, or even understanding, of the needs of BC's coastal region.

With the fare increases taking effect on April 1 and fuel surcharges imposed in January, most passenger fares are up 8.4 percent and vehicle fares are up 7.4 percent over last year, yet another round of fare hikes far above inflation. And seniors now have to pay for travel from Monday to Thursday.

On those northern routes that will continue to operate, fares are up only 1.5 percent, but the fare break is too little, too late. On the northern route due for outright elimination, Route 40 serving the central coast, fares increased 60 percent and traffic dropped 43 percent in a straight line since 2007, under operating conditions that ran counter to local residents' suggestions to improve the route's efficiency. Now it's considered unprofitable, and treated as unsalvageable, regardless of the damage that will result to local communities and BC's tourism industry.

Traffic and fares on all the minor routes are following the same pattern, and the response is to cut service rather than to address the root problem - unaffordable fares. Vehicle traffic this year will be the lowest in 15 years, while passenger traffic will be the lowest in 23 years. This comes at a time when provincial GDP and populations are both increasing. While this has a direct bearing on BC Ferries' revenue, it's also a surrogate for the creeping harm that undermines coastal regions that depend on the ferries as a lifeline.



Until the provincial government addresses the real problem - adequate funding to support realistic fares - all the band-aid fixes in the world will only delay the ultimate day of reckoning. While the provincial government refers to keeping BC Ferries sustainable - a red herring - they ignore the sustainability of the ferry-dependent coastal communities, as that real economic sustainability becomes more in danger every year.

User-pay ideology has been mindlessly imposed on the ferry system, up to and beyond the tipping point where it is now crippling BC's coastal region and undermining BC's tourism reputation internationally. The provincial and federal governments contributed roughly \$180 million last year to BC Ferries' operations. Ferry users contributed more than \$500 million. At this key moment in BC Ferries' history, when so many ships and terminals need replacement, more money will be needed. There is no cheap solution nor infinite capacity of customers to absorb ever-higher fares.

We call on the Province to back away from more user pay and consider these realities:

· BC's coastal region and the ferry system are intertwined and depend on each other for survival.

· It costs money to operate and maintain assets of one of the largest ferry systems in the world. · All of BC benefits from affordable ferry service. Policies that substantially change the service need to be supported by some analysis of costs, benefits and economic and social impacts.

QISES is looking for a treasurerin-training. Some book keeping experience would be an asset but not absolutely necessary. Grants application, some coordination with DFO and other like bodies, and day-to-day tallying of incoming and outgoing monies are the primary duties. Benefits include working with a fabulous group, including board members and other volunteers, and (optionally) the field work.

Volunteers are the basis of who we are and what we do. We're actively seeking volunteers for educational outreach, membership list coordination, fund-raising opportunities, and of course, stream work. The latter includes stream assessment, habitat restoration, drought-proofing activities, fry trapping and fall salmon counts, along with data reporting and mapping. We also carry out hiking and boat-access only trips to potential fish streams, including the amazing Village Bay and Main Lakes feeder streams, to check for fish presence and habitat quality.

Birds and Butterflies in the Garden

Vancouver Island nature photographer and columnist, Mike Yip will be the guest speaker at the Garden Club on April 14th, 7pm at the Community Centre. Mike retired from teaching in 2001 and discovered birding and photography in 2003. Since then he has created his own online magazine showcasing his photographs. "Denman and Hornby Nature" published in 2010, was inspired after several excursions with local biologist and conservationist Jenny Balke. His book highlights some of the sensitive ecosystems and uncommon flora and fauna on the islands and includes rare wild flower sections on Helliwell Provincial Park. It was during this time Mike employed Macro photography along with his usual telephoto techniques and added photographs of butterflies and underwater creatures from local island photographers.

There are many reasons for birds and butterflies to be attracted to the garden. Enhancing sustainable habitats is becoming a large part of present day gardening. By planting seed and berry plants we allow native fauna to flourish in our area. For hummingbirds, warblers, and butterflies food is in the form of nectar, and for other birds like robins, it also includes worms and insects. Other attractions include nest boxes, nest material, ponds and fountains. Mike will share photos of the many birds and butterflies that he has seen in his garden as well as some of the plants that attract them.

Quadra's 17th Annual Beach Clean-Up: Sunday April 27th

Sierra Quadra is once again pleased to announce our island's Annual Beach Clean-up at Rebecca Spit. April 27, 2014, will mark the 17th consecutive year that islanders and visitors have joined with local businesses and others to make this event a resounding success. It's our contribution to the Earth Day celebrations taking place around the world.

We're also delighted to announce we have a new partner working with us on the event: the Discovery Passage Aquarium. Many islanders visited the Aquarium in its first season near Campbell River's Discovery Fishing Pier, across from the Maritime Heritage Centre. The hands-on Aquarium is operated by a non-profit organization with strong Quadra Island roots and support. You can learn more about the Aquarium's clean oceans program at their display table at the Spit.

Beach Clean-up headquarters are located midway along Rebecca Spit, near the parking lot by the boat ramp. The concession tent, along with Sierra and Aquarium banners, will mark the site. Starting at 10 am you can get garbage bags from this location and then head for your favourite beach. Drop by later for a delicious (and free) hot lunch, with baked goodies and hot and cold drinks, served from noon to 4pm for all volunteers.

Many islanders start collecting beach debris before the actual day of the Beach Clean-up. Collected garbage can be brought to the Clean-up tent or left at any of the following drop-off locations. A

sign at each location marks where garbage should be piled. The last pick up at each site is at 3pm on Sunday April 27.

• Beach access at Smith Rd, Milford Rd, Edgeware Rd and Petroglyph Rd • North end of Kay Dubois Trail at We Wai Kai Rd

• South end of Kay Dubois Trail at Sutil Rd

• Rebecca Spit, south parking lot • Rebecca Spit, parking lot near boat ramp

• Rebecca Spit, centre by narrow isthmus

• Open Bay area, Valdez and Marina Roads (look for Erik Sorensen's truck: beach debris only!)

• Tsakwaluten Resort, below the Main Lodge

What to bring? Gloves can come in handy, as well as a good pocketknife to help free tangled rope from driftwood. You also can't go wrong with sun block, sun hat, water bottle and gumboots. The only items not to be taken off the beach are any flare canisters vou mav come across (aluminium tubes about 4 inches in diameter and two feet long) because they could still be active. Just note their location so event organizers can notify the proper military authorities for disposal.

Participants with pick-up trucks are still needed to help transport garbage from the various collection sites to Rebecca Spit. If you can help, please give Ken a call at 285-2580.

REGIONAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT

hat a beautiful April Fool's Day! (the weather). What a dreadful April Fool's Day (all of the announcements that impact us). So take your pick! I prefer to remain positive and know that we actually are on the upswing in our battles. (no, I am not delusional!).

Ferries!

The media interview on ferries that I did last night on Global TV at 7pm went exceptionally well and you could see in the face of the host that they are on our side. This is apparent in all of the media that is coming out on a daily basis. We have given this issue "legs" and there is no better outcome from a media perspective than being able to do that. We are rubbing the nose of the government in the mess that they have made. The Minister and the Premier are both on the defensive and we hope to keep them that way until they cave. More and more of the province is coming on-side daily. There isn't a day that goes by that there aren't a few very good media pieces showing up. So, keep your chin up and your fighting energy on "high". We will win this battle.

I am sure that you have seen the schedules that were published on-line. They will not work and will change. I am already getting calls and emails, as are the FAC, telling us which sailings do not work for them. The connector ferries from Cortes are unworkable and that will be borne out as soon as they are implemented. We are hoping to have a public meeting the first part of next week to hear your views. I know this is short notice, but that is all we have: short notice! Word will be spread as far as possible by various means.

One of the big issues that we are currently dealing with is

the loss of the night watch person. This has serious implications for the ability of the ship to sail on after-hours call outs. They do not have enough crew living on Quadra to make the required crew complement, in some cases. We need a strong case from the BC Ambulance and Paramedic groups to government and to BC Ferries to retain this position.

I know that people will be using the ferry less often and will be using creative means such as carpooling and walking on or even using the water taxi for the 4:30 and 5:25 sailings from CR (which will be at 4:40 and 5:45 come the 28th). BCFS and the govt. will see that the ridership will indeed drop since they have increased the fares. Our points of the past months will be demonstrated to both BCFS and the government. I know, you are already using the ferry as little as possible but I bet these fare increase will cause you to use it less.

Urgent -AVICC Rally

This is an "Urgent" notice, so please read it and contact the appropriate person(s)

The AVICC (Association of Vancouver Island and Coastal Communities) is coming to Parksville/Qualicum on the 11th and 12th and 13th of April.

I was just invited by them to sit on a panel discussion about BC Ferries. Of course, I accepted.

This gathering is attended by local government leaders from the Sunshine Coast, the Central Coast and all of Vancouver Island. A few years back we held a rally at the Nanaimo AVICC and it was great venue for presenting an issue that effected us all... All of the local govt. reps. came out to the event which had lots of people from all over the coast with signs, etc. It was a "friendly" protest / affirmation of our solidarity with each other on this issue. We got tons of media coverage. The same will hold true this year.

So, this is a major part of "WHAT'S NEXT?" Any takers for organizing.??? Lannie Keller and others from Quadra worked hard on the last successful event. Heidi Ridgeway has offered to help and we will be talking later today.

Let me know your thoughts... There could be between 300 and 500 delegates at the event! I will get every media outlet there.

This event IS NOT a protest. It is a support rally for the local governments that are working hard for us to change the provincial government's mind re: ferry issues. I would suggest that signs carry messages such as:

SUPPORT for local govt actions;

NOTHING anti-Liberal.. can be anti-gvot. action but not partisan remember that some of these folks will be Lib's;

Destruction of our PROVINCIAL ECONOMY;

Destruction of our LOCAL economy;

Destruction of our local communities:

Destruction of our TOURISM industry;

Put Ferries back in Highways: This is our Marine Highway;

Roll back the fares.. we can't afford them!;

Stop the cuts;

Respect our Seniors;

Etc. ... I am sure you get my drift!

This is a Support exercise and a media event to keep the issue alive, and it will do so when coming from so many local governments and their supporters.

The Panel on BC Ferries wil be on Friday, late afternoon. I have asked that it be moved to Saturday, the 12th, to coincide with the rally at noon for maximum participation by delegates.

I need to know if we have enough interested organizers (there won't be much to do other than a few more signs, and carpooling) before I start my media blitz to get them all there at noon on Saturday. So please get back to me. See my contact info at the end of this report.

The Saturday sessions and rally will be at the Qualicum Beach Civic Centre. Timing should be around 12 noon to about 1:30 for maximum participation of delegates.

Please let me know as soon as possible! This is our big chance to reach the entire province all at once. It also boosts the profile of the AVICC and UBCM position on ferries which is our position too: lower the fares, stop the cuts and put us back into Highways; leave senior's fares alone.

Quathiaski Cove Sewer Expansion

The expansion efforts have finally reached the point where we are clear on the costs (which were announced at the public sessions) and that we will be going to elector assent by referendum for the larger area (36 lots) and we will still receive a report on the 5 lots along the west side of Green Rd. I believe these 5 will be added in a very simple administrative manner so that they can proceed with hookups. They will not be subject to the cost of expansion associated with the other 36 lots, since they are already right along the existing sewer line. This should all be ready to go by June-ish if everything goes according to plan and only the effected area will vote in the referendum. Staff have been working overtime on this issue to make it happen as soon as possible.

Other Issues - ongoing work (yes, there is work beyond ferries!)

I am working with the Quadra Circle and the senior's group to look at expansion of multigenerational housing and assisted living spaces in the Cove area. Grants are being applied for and details are being looked into. I have also spent some time with the existing senior's housing folks and had a nice photo op with the people that made it happen. I was able to direct a VIHA grant through the SRD in the amount of \$7,000.00 for the completion of the last unit.

We have had numerous rezoning applications in the past months and more to come. Many of them have been for private docks for access to properties.

I continue to sit on the BC Ferries Regional District Chairs Group and we will be meeting in the very near future (probably at AVICC) to discuss next steps.

I also continue to sit on the three province wide marine planning initiatives: PNCIMA (Federal planning); MaPP (our area up to Cape Caution - Provincial and First Nations planning); RMAC (same planning process but it is made up of five areas of the coast right up to Alaska and meets jointly in Richmond).

I also sit on the UBCM and the AVICC Select Committee on BC Ferries, and on the Federal committee on Aquaculture.

So, as you can see, there is never a dull moment. I just returned from a two day meeting in Victoria sponsored by the UBCM for all of the Chairs and Administrators from all of the RD;s in the province. This was in my role as Chair of the Board.

During that same time I attended the press conference to announce the finalization for the purchase of the Merrill Ring lands to add to our parks at the north end of Quadra. So we now have a swath of protected park land right across the isthmus of Quadra joining three other park units into one. It was an honour to be there after more than 20 years of working on this process along with the dedicated volunteers that spent all of their time trying to bring this to fruition. A great deal of gratitude goes to the late Judy Leicester. Without her dedication this would not have happened. Congratulations to all of the other volunteers and to all of Quadra for your generosity.

Discovery Islands - Mainland Inlets (Area C), SRD



DIEM has been busy all winter, and we have mapping news to share. Behind the scenes, DIEM core team has been making presentations, writing project reports, identifying possibilities, and plotting future events. You'll see we've been given a beautiful new logo to connect our efforts; DIEM now has three project phases, with some activities near done, some fully engaged, and spring/summer community mapping just underway. Briefly, here's what's happening, and we hope you'll join in!

DIEM Phase One - Ecosystem Mapping DIEM's initial project, Sensitive Ecosystems Inventory (SEI) mapping is complete for all of the Discovery Islands. Eve Flager (from Read Island) deserves our thanks for her expertise, persistence, and countless volunteer hours creating SEI and watershed maps. To complete the SEI for government use, we must now validate the digital mapping through "ground truthing" as prescribed by BC Ministry of Environment Conservation Data Centre (CDC) which continues to provide advice and oversight. We switched from planning local teams and decided to pay for professional validation because we need to get the job done, and it also became obvious that consistent perspective is vital to reliable surveys. DIEM has contracted Ryan Durand (Durand Ecological Ltd.) and Cam Eriksson (Sonora Island) who will be conducting extensive field plots throughout May of this year. DIEM will be asking community to help house and feed these guys who will be working long and hard!

Mapping the area's enduring features has also been accomplished, by Gregory Kehm and Associates, Vancouver. Greg has also provided tremendous project energy and volunteered professional assistance, most recently with an enduring features analysis that informed and enabled a credible (and critical) response to government's Old Growth Management proposal for nearby mainland areas. Please contact <u>di.ecosystemsadvocacy@gmail.com</u> if you would like a copy of the report.

DIEM is collecting and presenting all maps and data on a website called Data Basin, (http:// databasin.org/galleries/3be38d72e6da457086 9d9217183c709f) hosted by the Conservation Biology Institute. With a little practice, you can view and layer the maps (any-which-way!) and you can filter the data to create new views according to your interests. We will continue to add map layers and DIEM will offer some mapping workshops for community members who (like many of us) find the technical learning curve a bit steep. (Note: the effort's worthwhile because when you "get it" the maps are like magic!)

UPDATE

DIEM Phase Two - Community Mapping The great response to DIEM's fall workshops means we'll bring on Moss Mania II – and more! Rob Wood's Landscape Patterns presentation in November spawned an interest group that has been meeting regularly to identify our islands' watersheds – soon to be plywood jigsaw maps that can be used for community fun and learning.

Hiring out the SEI validation work has allowed DIEM to plan other mapping that will be especially fun for island residents - and anyone else who wants to help! In addition to mapping rare plant communities and species at risk, we queried community interests and (while also welcoming anyone's serious personal interest/ mapping endeavour) we have decided on a few simple categories for our first community layers, including Big Trees, Big Birds, and Small Wetlands. We're also keen to create community map layers that document heritage fruit trees and past/present agricultural sites. And if a few folks would like to map Eel Grass on low summer tides (WOULD YOU?) that will be another interesting and valuable layer. Our Guide to Sensitive Ecosystems and other information about how to participate is in-theworks. We're still looking for photos of a few iconic ecosystems and special critters... If you are a naturalist photographer with photos to share, please ask for our pictures wish list.

Sabina Leader-Mense is giving her boundless enthusiasm to organizing expert presenters for DIEM's continuing lineup of information workshops.

DIEM Phase Three - Watershed Priorities Analysis If you've looked at the ecosystem mapping available on the Data Basin site, you probably have some sense that these are more than pretty maps. In fact, there is tons of information that's hidden until you go looking for it. And truth to tell, few of us have skills to find it. However, this is a huge part of the potential value in the DIEM mapping, and we've been brainstorming most-valuable analyses - and (since we're burnt out on writing grant applications) fantasizing financial support... Now our AMAZING news: DIEM has just received a significant donation that allows us to proceed with analyzing the mapped data to produce relevant information about the condition of our Discovery Islands Watershed. We are beyond-thrilled, and grateful for generous people.
