

## **NEXT STEPS**

pring seems to be upon us – earlier than usual but with the accompanying sunshine I hear few complaints as islanders bask in warm temperatures and bees are already abuzz among the early blooms.

Time for renewal all around us and the Discovery Islander is joining in the spirit.

Under one name or another the Discovery Islander has served Quadra and the neighbouring Islands for several decades. As the "DI" I've been at the helm now for around 18 years. It has been a wonderful way to make a living and be part of the fabric of our wonderful community. Importantly the DI is the only paper to be printed on Quadra itself, helping maintain a printing press in our community.

But as we're all aware print media faces many challenges in this digital age and small run papers like this are especially vulnerable as costs continue to rise while our market remains fairly static. But small newspaper also draw strength from loyalty and a unique niche.

Two years ago, around the New Year 2013, I conducted a survey in the DI and as part of the outcome introduced the voluntary subscription program and Islander Benefits card which aimed to draw our readers to support both the DI and local island businesses. The project was fairly successful and gave the DI a boost through what seemed like an especially tight financial period. But, as all things tend to do, the return the following year was dramatically lower and there was of course a new time commitment to administer the program itself. Today I think perhaps Islander Benefits has run its course.

But the needs and groundwork of the initial survey haven't gone away.

One of the comments several respondents made was that a voluntary subscription was an idea they could support, but they'd also like to see more original content in the DI.

I definitely acknowledge that as much as I fancy myself a writer my own voice is less than frequently heard in the DI. In part this is down to the time constraints of simply producing the paper - along with all the other projects that together help the overall business run. But the feedback was not lost on me.

Enter Robyn Budd. Over the past few months readers will have noticed her work and contributions. Robyn is a talented and dedicated Quadra scribe and graphics whizz. She's brought a fresh look and some needed energy to the DI and I hope reading through these pages you'll agree her contributions are breathing extra zip into our stalwart paper.

We'd like to continue this collaboration and see the DI fulfil the community role it aspires to. Over the past couple of months we've put extra effort into boosting advertising with some result, but not near enough to support the extra work. We also came to realize that looking across the passage to potential advertisers in Campbell River could be undercutting our own Quadra businesses.

Which brings us back to the whole idea of the subscription. As I said I think the Islander Benefits program has run its course so I'm proposing to phase that out (unless there is an overwhelming response to the contrary). Instead the DI will continue to invite our readers to support the paper with an annual voluntary subscription and, following in the model of other small publications, invite greater support from those who would like to be sponsors.

In return Robyn and I both aim to up the ante in terms of content and look of the DI.

It would be great to hear feedback on this idea or any aspects of the DI. There are no plans to run another survey just yet but a quick email with thoughts, ideas and other feedback would be most welcome: news@discoveryislands.ca

# Quadra Island Community School Vision

here is an exciting movement spreading across British Columbia. An Innovation Strategy has been put forward by the BC Ministry of Education and it is gaining momentum. With current discussions happening in our own community regarding the schooling of Quadra's children, I feel it is timely to share this vision. The first step to enlisting for a change is engaging in dialogue. I would like to invite you as parents, grandparents, teachers and residents of Quadra Island to participate in this very important conversation.

As a long-time member of the Quadra Elementary PAC and as someone who has been sent by the parents of Quadra Island to attend the 2013 and 2014 BCCPAC Conferences, it is my privilege to take this opportunity to lead this discussion by sharing some of the valuable knowledge that I have gained through these efforts.

It is important to note that the intentions behind this are not being driven under the pretence of any feelings that Quadra Elementary is not already a successful school with children and teachers who are doing their very best under the obvious constraints that schools everywhere are faced with. Quadra has an amazing team of diverse and dedicated staff who have created beautiful relationships with children and families in this community. The intention is not to undermine the abilities of our teachers but rather work together to build on the excellent foundation that already exists to create a modern learning environment that is reflective of current research on emergent curriculum and about how children learn best.

The objectives highlighted in the Ministry's evolving plans for education I feel, represent the values held by our community. Pilot projects such as the Burnaby Community School, Maple Ridge's Environmental School Project and the Denman Island Community School are a few examples of the cutting edge programs being developed. The idea is to create an education system that taps into and works collaboratively with other systems in a community to offer a very holistic and personalized way of learning. Children are still acquiring the fundamental skills of maths and language however the learning is delivered through means that are tangible providing children with meaningful experiences that connect them directly to the ecosystems in

We can enlist for this exciting opportunity and offer our children the best education possible - and thereby strengthen the foundations for the future of Quadra Island

their communities. In this way children are engaging partners in their education journey and are offered more opportunities to exercise their sense of imagination and wonder.

A change of this magnitude must begin at a local level within our school and community. It is a bottom up opposed to a top down approach. We have the capacity to enlist for this important change with intentions of offering our children the

best education possible thereby strengthening the foundations for the future of Quadra Island. There is no doubt that we all want the best for our children. Let's begin a conversation. Talk about it with your teachers and neighbors and to anyone who has a vested interest in the community. Share ideas, voice concerns. Together we can seize this opportunity and lead the change that we want to see.

# The Garden Club presents Jamey Lauinger

n Monday, March 9th at 7pm at the Community Centre, the topic for the Garden Club meeting will be cold or rain hardy species of succulents. It is exotic to have cacti, which are classified as succulents, survive our wet winters. Jamey Lauinger, our guest speaker, is the owneroperator of Valley Succulents, a specialty nursery located in the Comox Valley (2210 Anderton Road). Jamey explains that many of the winter hardy species are found at higher elevations and therefore can withstand the wet winters here. Have a look at the website Valley Succulents.ca to see the beautiful colours of these rare and unusual plants.

Valley Succulents started as a small window sill collection of cacti and succulents and has grown into a modest operation with two greenhouses, totaling over 2200 sq. ft. Jamey's initial business was geared towards online sale and saw success with orders from across Canada and abroad. Four years ago, Valley Succulents opened its' nursery location, a very interesting place to visit.

Our local area of BC has a species of native Opuntia cacti. These tough little cacti are at home in BC's dry interior and on some Gulf Islands. Mitlenatch Island, just south of Quadra, has a native flora created by the rain shadow of Vancouver Island Mountains. Opuntia grows on

Mitlenatch along with several native species of succulents such as Sedum. Come out to the Garden Club and find out about the other species of succulents we can grow in our home gardens.

For the show-and-tell table, bring some spring flowers: crocus, hellebores, forced Japanese plums or forsythia. Can anyone pick a bouquet of daffodils for the meeting? Anyone have cacti or succulents in pots which they would like to share? Bring along your extra seeds or seed catalogues. Drop ins welcome, \$3 at the door or you can buy an annual membership.



# **Introduction to Rock Climbing**

THE WINTER RAINS ARE GIVING WAY to spring sunshine and the rock bluffs and crags on Quadra Island are drying out ready for a new season of climbing. Local climbers have been busy through the winter developing new routes and with the kind financial support of Jim Abram and the Strathcona Regional District a special crag has been set up especially for teaching climbing courses.

Cue our good friends at Island Alpine Guides who are offering an Introduction to Rock Climbing course here on Quadra the weekend of May 9th and 10th, 2015. This is a perfect opportunity to experience rock climbing in a fun and safe environment. Take skills you may have learned at the indoor wall outside or start from scratch to learn the basics of this exciting sport, right here in our backyard.

On Day One develop your movement skills on rock, belaying, rappelling and simple anchor building.

On Day Two we take it to the next level with the building of complex anchors, using removable protection and advanced movement skills.

On completion of this course you'll feel comfortable going top-rope climbing on your own safely and with a built-in orientation to the best places to climb on Quadra.

Cost for the weekend is \$295 per person and includes professional, certified instruction, use of rock shoes, harness, helmet and group technical gear.



On Saturday, ✓ March 14th, from 1 to 2:30pm, the Past President of BC Nature, John Neville, will present a talk entitled Avian Carpenters: Canada's Woodpeckers. Neville brings his enthusiasm for the topic based on a lifelong interest in birds which began in England. He sound records in the wild

with great sensitivity and field craft awareness. His major aim is that the production of his nature recording art will make people more aware of the feathered creatures and their need for a protected habitat.

Neville is hoping to create interest in forming a naturalists' club in Campbell River that would be affiliated with BC Nature. He says, "We would like to help start a Campbell River Naturalist Club.



Currently there are 53 clubs around the province under the umbrella of BC Nature (see bcnature.ca or contact manager@bcnature.ca). Our motto is 'Know Nature and Keep it Worth Knowing'. We therefore have a strong interest in education and conservation. Any individuals, environmentally active groups or staff and students at the college studying conservation, forestry, or biology might be very interested."

Neville is a regular supplier of nature recordings to the Library of Natural Sounds and his work is now being exhibited in the new Robert Bateman Centre in Victoria. He is currently working on his most ambitious project to date, Bird Songs of Canada. He began field recording birds in 1993 after studying with the MacAuley Library of Natural Sounds, Cornell University. As Neville Recording, John has produced seventeen regional sound guides to bird identification and an ebook entitled Travelling the Dempster. He just released the 4 cd set Bird Songs of Canada, Chants D'Oiseax du Canada. He regularly presents at Birding Festivals such as the Brant Festival, Wings over the Rockies and the Meadowlark Festival. He has published articles in Birds and Blooms and journals for Ontario Nature (Seasons), Nature Saskatchewan, BC Field Ornithologists (BC Birds), Wildlife Sound Recording Society (Wildlife Sound), and BC Nature (bcnature). # Emergency supplies for your vehicle - an islander's story


#### A COUPLE OF MONTHS AGO, ONE

dark and rainy winter evening, I was merrily on my way to the ferry from the north end of the island and slowly noticed an alarming sound coming from the vehicle over the tunes on the radio. I managed to limp up to the Granite Bay junction, pulling over in the soft gravel to check out what sounded like a flat tire. Flat as a pancake it was. So there we are, in the middle of nowhere really, dark night, raining, cold and no cell service if one had a provider that even reaches that part of the island. I pulled out my 'emergency bag' to see what I could do about my situation. Even if I had wanted to try and change the tire, at that point I quickly realized that I was NOT prepared. I had failed to review the vehicle emergency kits for winter, being lulled into complacency with a long warm fall. I had one puny flashlight with waning batteries. I had candles, but had removed the lighter for some other purpose during the summer. There was no 'emergency blanket'... even though it was cold, I was extremely thankful that it wasn't snowing! There was a toque and gloves, which reminded me of the recent incident, at that time, on Grouse Mountain where some chaps were out for a run, in shorts and shirts and

running shoes, in winter, and one chap had slipped on the icy trail, fallen and broken his ankle... on a trail, in shorts, in winter with some snow about. My daughter who had been hiking and heading back down the trail, had given him her 'emergency' toque and gloves from her knapsack while they waited for SARs to come and get him.

As we are now being lulled by incredible weather, remember that it is indeed still winter, with negative temperatures every morning on the north of the island here. The days are getting longer and we are tempted to push the limit on returning to the vehicle after a hike or ride. We still need to remember to 'be prepared'... my emergency kits have good working flashlights AND a headlamp to that I could use my hands and see what I'm doing. There are candles and lighters and emergency blankets, water and granola bars. Always let someone know where you're going and when you'll be back. I was extremely grateful that there were a couple of other souls travelling the road that night, who stopped to offer help, and I thank them, again, very much, for their assistance! So, just like checking the smoke alarms for working batteries, check your emergency kits and make sure everything is up to date!

# BC Ferries petition to put it back in the Ministry of Transportation

What a crazy three days. Weeks of making media calls to line this up and setting it up with the Independent MLA and her staff, writing the script, along with the logistics of getting everyone there became quite the feat! But we did it! The details are far too great to try and tell you everything, but basically we all met up on Tuesday morning, the 24th, went to the Legislature and met with Vicki Huntington, Independent MLA for Delta South, and her staff. We went to the Public Gallery and took our seats and waited for the big moment! Vicki made the introductions of all of us and read her statement and later introduced the actual 633 pages of 20,000 signatures to the Minister. We were then subjected to a half hour of school yard behaviour by many of the MLA's as they hooted and hollered at each other over various topics of the day. How any business gets done is totally beyond me. No one keeps order. It is a total free-for-all. We then left and went to Vicki's office where we were met by EVERY TV reporter in BC along with some of the radio people. We had an incredible media "scrum" and had ample opportunity to tell them why we were there and what it all meant to the people of BC. Laural Eacott of Powell River was great in showing off the petition and explaining how she started it and how she managed to bring it to an end by presenting it at the Legislature. She asked me to help accomplish this and it felt great to help be able to do that. The media interviews went on all day and evening. Laural even took one call that I referred to her from the Globe and Mail while driving home. I went off to the CFAX studio where the petition was then totally advertised and then reopened. In less than 12 hours after that more than 3,300 more signatures were gathered. I then went on to do two studio interviews with CBC covering the entire province between the two of them, including Christy's and Todd's home towns! All in all it was an amazing success, even though our Minister is such a puppet. He suggested he "has a plan..." I called him out on TV and said, "Lay it on the table." Of course he can't because there is no plan.

The Coastal Regional District Chairs Group (of which I am one) meet with him on March

5th in Victoria... one more trip! We'll see what comes of that meeting. He will be dealing with 13 hard-cores and we are not easily fooled by empty rhetoric. #### What's next? Good question!

Glad you asked! There is a movement forming to stage a Province-wide day of action in communities all over the province to "Take Back BC". The focus will be on all of the problems we are being subjected to (e.g. Health Care increases, ICBC increases, Hydro Increases, schools, seniors, etc.) and with Ferries right out in front. The date of this event will be Saturday March 28th which is only days before our next 3.9% increase in our fares. April 1st is a Wed. and it was decided that since so many people were disappointed about not being able to go to the protest last year in Victoria because they had to work it was decided to be held on a Saturday.

By holding the protests in each community it avoids the travel time and expense and all of the organization that goes along with it. We will need volunteers to put together a sign painting workshop to air all of your pet peeves with the government, tie it all to Ferry issues, and make sure that the next government understands the importance of listening to the people. This is our province! Government is meant to serve the needs of the people, not the other way around.

So, what else is happening besides ferries?

The SRD Budgeting process is underway and actually nearing completion. We started it in September and have had it on every agenda since then (twice per month). As we are usually told, our requisition is down (you should pay less taxes) but by the time we have all of the things like Provincial taxes, Fire Protection and numerous other things added in, it usually doesn't quite work out that way. Our assessments did go down (no doubt ferries played a hand in that) but the SRD still has to collect a set amount of money to run the services that we want. So they spread that amount over the assessed value and voila! You tax bill is determined. If anyone has taxes that go down this year, could you please let me know? I am really interested in finding out if the figures we see actually translate into lower taxes. Also, keep in mind waterfront, commercial and industrial are exceptions to the general rule...

#### **UBCM**

After our monthly Committee and Board meetings on Wednesday, Feb. 11th I then flew to Vancouver to attend my first UBCM Executive meeting on Thursday, Feb. 12th and I am on the Environment and the Resolutions Committees. The Environment Committee dealt quite a bit with Emergency Preparedness and spill response and we also talked a lot about Derelict Vessels, which is a hot topic on the entire coast with both the Fed's and the Province washing their hands of the matter even though it is totally within their mandate. So that dumps it onto local government and we are currently strategizing on how to deal with getting the senior levels to accept their responsibility. I had to fly back to CR that night to attend our Strategic Planning and Budget session on the 13th. Crazy, eh?

# **Coastal Ferry Chairs Group**

A meeting was set up with the Ferry Commissioner on Feb. 16th in Victoria to present him with our submission on Performance Term #4 prior to the deadline. We had quite a long meeting and explained all of the usual which I am afraid rolled off of him like water on a duck's back. He has no power except to recommend to Govt. what to set our price caps at and to give approvals for capital projects over \$30 million and to provide some oversight of BC Ferries structure. Other than that he is totally powerless. He told us that if the government didn't raise the "subsidy" (I hate that word!), then his only tool is to recommend raising the fares. # FIRESMART - TAKING CONTROL

In the previous FireSmart article "Breaking the Wildfire Disaster Cycle" the impact of wildfire on people's lives and communities was discussed. Article 2, "Taking Control", outlines a few simple concepts for evaluating wildfire hazard factors on your property along with some basic recommendations to mitigate those hazards.

# WILD LAND FIRE IS AN ESSENTIAL NATURAL event and for the most part inevitable in most Canadian ecosystems. It plays a key role in the

Canadian ecosystems. It plays a key role in the regenerative renewal of our forests as well as reducing the overall fire fuel load. Communities can become compatible with the natural process of fire. In other words, when homeowners take direct action to protect their properties, they become a wildfire adapted community.

To understand the mechanisms of structural ignitions during a Wildland Urban Interface or WUI fire, controlled burn research was conducted during the International Crown Fire Modeling Experiments in Fort Providence, Northwest Territories. Large scale burn test sites were created. Simulated structures built using common construction techniques and materials were placed at various distances from the edge of the burn area. The burn zones were ignited and each structure was carefully observed to determine the impact. The results were surprising.

With regards to the fire front it self, if the buildings had a minimum spacing of 10 meters clearance from the leading edge of the fire and were built with non-flammable roofing materials, 85% to 90% survived the initial blaze. It was not the intense radiated heat from the wall of fire that ignited the structures. More than 50% of constructed fuels that did ignite were caused by an accumulation of burning embers driven by the blaze generated convective winds. Once the constructed fuel load ignited, total destruction was the rule. It is a simple statement with enormous implications....Fire spreads only into and onto locations with fuels that support combustion and this includes your home. In a WUI fire event,

unless you have taken appropriate mitigating measures prior to the blaze, your home will be part of the problem.

A house burns because of its interrelationship with everything in its surrounding "Ignition Zone". These zones are prioritized based on the distance away from the structure. Priority Ignition Zone 1 includes the house and its immediate surroundings extending out to 10 meters. Zone 2 encompasses all elements out to 30 meters and Priority Zone 3 extends outward up to 100 meters. The first step is a Priority Zone 1 assessment starting with the home and its immediate surroundings. Using a FireSmart Structure and Site Hazard Assessment form, homeowners evaluate their property based on key structural criteria, building materials used, landscape elements, aspect and vegetation. Points are assigned to the observations. These points are then tallied to provide an overall score. The lower the accumulative score, the safer the property is. Once the risks have been identified, measures can then be taken to alter wildfires potential relationship with the property. The process is repeated for Priorty Zones 2 and 3 but the

specific elements being evaluated are different. The biggest bang for your buck will likely lie within Priority Zone 1 so this is the best place to begin.

#### START BY LOOKING AT YOUR

roof, gutters and soffit system. If the roofing material is non combustible such as metal, tile or asphalt, you would score well. Unrated wood

shakes provide no fire protection and score poorly. The roof should be clear of debris such as branches, small twigs, moss and pine needles. Accumulations of these can be easily ignited after long dry spells. This is particularly true for gutters as they have a bad habit of collecting combustible materials. Any overhanging branches should be cut back or the offending tree should be considered for removal. Eaves with closed off soffits and underside vent screening (mesh no larger than 3 millimeters) will score well. Open eaves with non screened vents are not desirable as burning embers may collect under the roofline during a wildfire.

Outdoor living spaces such as decks and balconies, built out of non-combustible

materials score best. Those built of flammable materials are less desirable. They should also be fully sheathed in below or they will score poorly. These spaces often trap embers and ignite any stored materials. Once ignited, the structure above is quickly consumed.

Siding made of non-combustible materials such as concrete, brick, stone or hardi-plank would score best. Next best are log and heavy timber walls as they provide more fire resistance than board siding. Scoring worst is wood shake or vinyl siding finishes.

#### WINDOWS ARE OFTEN A WEAK SPOT IN

the structure as extreme heat can cause the window glazing treatment to fail. As the window collapses, an opening is created allowing firebrands to enter the interior space. The larger the window, the more vulnerable they become. Tempered or thick plate glass is most heat resilient while single pane windows score poorly as they provide virtually no fire protection. It is not expected that a homeowner would choose to change out the windows but where the window space has the highest exposure potential, particular

attention should then be applied to the vegetative treatments.

The location of adjacent combustibles play a huge roll. Fire wood or construction supplies stored on or under decks or directly next to an exterior wall are extremely vulnerable to collecting embers. These should be moved at least 10 meters from your

home. Small quantities of heating wood can be brought in closer seasonally when wildfire potential is minimal.

Propane tanks should be located an appropriate distance away from structures, 10 meters is preferred. Any flammable vegetation should have a minimum 3 meter clearance from the tank.

#### VEGETATION MANAGEMENT WITHIN

Priority Zone 1 is paramount. The idea is to create a fuel modified area in which flammable vegetation surrounding buildings is either eliminated or converted to less flammable species. This fuel free zone should extend outward in all directions 10 meters on flat terrain. In particular, continued next page

continued from previous page coniferous shrubs such as Juniper, Mogul Pine and ornamental Cedars are notorious for explosive combustion. If they are located adjacent buildings, they should be moved or substituted. Deciduous replacements, consistent with ecological factors can have additional positive benefits retaining valuable moisture and humidity during the dry seasons. Buildings located on slopes will need different criteria and firebreak spacing. The key consideration here is how to break the path fire takes towards or away from a building.

The aspect and location of the structure in reference to slope plays an enormous roll in FireSmart scoring. South facing slopes dry out quicker than those facing North. Fire has a tendency to be driven uphill with greater speed therefore structure setbacks with proximity to shrubs and trees become unique scoring considerations.

#### **ROOF MOUNTED SPRINKLER SYSTEMS**

rate well and provide a good layer of protection during a wildfire event. They soak the structure lessening the impact of firebrands contact as well as increasing the surrounding areas relative humidity. Unfortunately, power may fall victim to flames and pump systems often rely on electricity. If they can run independent of power and have an adequate water supply, they will be effective. Keep in mind you may be asked to evacuate in which case their reliability would be uncertain.

#### CLEARING SURROUNDING VERTICAL FUEL

load is a key element to improving your FireSmart score. Removing ladder fuel (low hanging branches) up to 2 meters from ground level will break ground fires path to the trees crown and is an easily implemented precaution.

#### WE ARE SCRATCHING THE SURFACE ON

Priority Zone 1 and it may seem overwhelming. The fact is, many elements on your property may already score well. It might take only small modifications to improve the overall score you're trying to achieve.

To truly make a comprehensive FireSmart plan, many more details should be considered which also include Ignition Priority Zones 2 & 3 extending outward to encompass the entire neighbourhood. Article three will discuss this evaluation process and what programs exist to create a FireSmart community.






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

# **Artist Profile: Frank Boas**

Frank Boas is a painter, a photographer, a horticulturist and a bryologist (a moss, liverwort and hornwort expert) who was born in Seattle in 1939.

When Frank was four, his parents relocated the family to Victoria. Frank grew up and lived there until he finished regular schooling and successfully completed a baccalaureate degree. Notably, his was the first class of graduates from the University of Victoria (1964).

After finishing at UVic, Frank moved to Youbou – a community located on the north shore of Cowichan Lake, west of Duncan – and later relocated to Vancouver where he did post-graduate studies and worked at the Bryophyte (moss) and Hepatic (liverwort) Herborium at the University of British Columbia.

Frank is a well-known and respected photographer. In the late 1960s he was invited to fill the Queen Elizabeth Theatre in Vancouver with his photographs. His pictures have also adorned the covers and pages of several books, including Plants of the Pacific Northwest Coast: Washington, Oregon, British Columbia and Alaska; Plants of Northern British Columbia; Field Guide to Ecosites of West-Central Alberta; Some Common Mosses of British Columbia; Plants of Coastal British Columbia; Edible and Medicinal Plants of Canada, and Alpine Plants of BC, Alberta and Northwest North America.

An astonishing photograph created by Frank is housed at Victoria in the British Columbia Provincial Archives. The picture is a close-up image taken in 1966 of Western Mines tailings at Buttle Lake on Vancouver Island. Tailings consist of ground rock and process effluents that are generated in the

mining process. Frank's image is a black and white photograph. It is a striking composition that displays a shiny flow of metallic bubbles which he captured on film. At the time, Frank was employed as a prospector.

Years later, Frank and his partner Maureen

McDowell decided to leave the arctic (Cambridge Bay) for warmer climes and came to settle on Quadra Island. Their love of plants is evident at their home, where there are palm and banana plants from Pakistan growing in their living room, and a unique yard with a creek and a large two-

level greenhouse that contains a wide array of exotic flora including goji berry and tower of flower plants.

When he's not got his hands in the dirt, he's got them occupied with the tools of a visual artist.

Frank's paintings are on display in a group show at the Heriot Bay Inn and at the Aroma Cafe. His subjects are varied from geometrics to real and imaginary beings, and his ideas are coming in fast and furious. It's clear that fun motivates Frank. Currently, he is creating a series of patterns in watercolour and pencil on paper.

Frank describes his art as 'tending toward the strange.' His work is prolific and his process is spontaneous. Frank says that artists who inspire him include Turner for his landscapes, Escher for his patterns and Van Gogh for his colours. He jested that his favourite colour is 'somewhere between black and white.' However with some gentle prodding, he settled on 'yellows, oranges and reds.'

Frank is an amiable, creative and smart talent who believes in observing the need to enjoy his time. He is a survivor of a difficult five year struggle with cancer, treatments and surgeries and an inspiring person with great talents and an infectious laugh. Frank is doing what he likes to do and he is having a blast. All reasons to celebrate!


