Ancouver Island is well known for its unusual karst features and extensive cave systems, but few realize that this distinctive topography also reaches across Discovery Passage onto Quadra Island. Hidden away in the heart of the island's forests, Quadra's karst has kept a relatively low profile for many years, but word is starting to get around.

Karst is a porous landscape created by the dissolving action of water on soluble bedrock, such as limestone, dolomite or marble. As rain falls through the atmosphere and percolates through the soil, it absorbs carbon dioxide to form a weak solution of carbonic acid. The slightly acidic rain water trickles down to the underlying bedrock where it works its way into small joints and fractures. Over tens of thousands of years, this process gradually creates larger openings for the water to exploit, eventually leading to the development of a wide variety of impressive surface karst features and complex subsurface drainage systems and caves.

The majority of the karst along the west coast of British Columbia lies within the coastal temperate rain forest, one of wettest and most productive environments on the planet. On a global scale, these rain forests are extremely rare, comprising just 0.2% of the Earth's surface. Karst within a coastal temperate rain forest setting is even more rare globally, so much so that these unique ecosystems are highly regarded internationally for their contributions to biological and geological diversity.

A narrow band of the 200 million-year-old Quatsino Formation - an exceptionally pure unit of limestone highly favourable for karst development - extends up the centre of Quadra Island from Open Bay to north of Luoma Creek. One of the highest concentrations of karst features occurs within an area northwest of Stramberg Lake. The most common features encountered are dolines (also known as sinkholes), but sinking streams, karst springs, and cave systems are also well represented.

The interconnected components of a karst system provide unique, diverse and highly specialized habitats for a wide variety of

organisms that live both above and below the surface. Those species living in subsurface karst environments depend on extremely narrow habitat parameters and are particularly sensitive to even minor disturbances at the surface.

Most of Quadra Island was originally logged in the early 1900s, but second-growth logging continues today both on and off the karst. In the late 1990s, BC began to recognize the sensitivity of karst ecosystems to the impacts of forestry operations. The Province spent the next several years developing karst inventory standards and best management practices for minimizing the impacts of timber harvesting. Most of the government-sponsored training for these standards and procedures took place on Quadra.

Quadra's karst was initially described in Canadian Geological Survey reports as early as 1913. But it took until the 1970s before the limestone caves and other karst features of Quadra began to be seriously explored by the Gold River and Discovery Passage Caving Groups, the latter of which was headed by long-time island resident Jim Leishman. Since those early days, Paul Griffiths, former member of the Gold River Caving Group and currently completing his PhD in Karstology, has been keeping a close eye on Quadra's karst from his home in Campbell River. In 2008, when BC Hydro was planning to install a power line to Granite Bay, Griffiths and his colleague, Karstologist Dr. Carol Ramsey, pointed out that part of the proposed route would cut across karst topography. Griffiths and Ramsey convinced the utility giant to commission an inventory and assessment of the sensitivity of the karst along the planned route. The inventory identified a number of known karst features as well as several

previously undocumented ones. In the end, BC Hydro adjusted their line to avoid damaging any features.

Griffiths is quick to sing their praises. "BC Hydro has been very receptive when it comes to karst," he says. "On more than one occasion, they've been willing to accommodate karst values during their operations."

Located only a short ferry ride (10 minutes) from Campbell River, the karst on Quadra Island is easily accessible for viewing and educational purposes. A fact not lost on Dr. Tim Stokes, a professor in the Earth Sciences Department at Vancouver Island University in Nanaimo. For over nine years, Stokes and his colleagues have been bringing students to study the karst and complex geology on Quadra.

For Stokes and his students, the area around Open Bay is of particular interest. Here is one of the few places along the west coast of BC where the collision between two geomorphological belts (the Insular Belt of Vancouver Island and the Coast Belt of mainland BC) is exposed at the surface. One of the most striking geological features at this location is the extensive folding of the Quatsino limestone beds visible along the shoreline.

"The karst on Quadra meets our needs very well," says Stokes. "It's a reasonable drive from Nanaimo and provides a wide variety of representative features and landscape characteristics for study purposes. What's more, the low-elevation karst is usually snowfree, making it accessible virtually year round."

While on the island, Stokes and his students stay at the B&B-style Discovery Islands Lodge. Owner/operators, Lannie and Ralph Keller, have also hosted government employees undergoing training for monitoring forest practices on karst terrain as part of the Province's Forest and Range Evaluation Program (FREP).

The Kellers are no strangers to karst. Lannie grew up in the 'cave state' of Missouri,

which boasts more than 6,000 limestone caves, and her brother is actively involved with karst and cave mapping in Alaska. "I guess you could say we're probably more aware of karst than most islanders," she says.

Her concern over the potential impacts of logging on Quadra's karst prompted Lannie to become a driving force in getting karst added to the Discovery Islands Ecosystem Mapping Project (DIEM). This ambitious communitybased initiative is developing maps of sensitive ecosystems in the entire Discovery Islands Archipelago. Using preliminary karst mapping compiled by Stokes and his students, Lannie and GIS specialist, Eve Flager, were able to include the distribution of Quadra's karst into the DIEM inventory. The ultimate goal is to provide an accurate data base for residents, government, and forest companies

to work together on improving land management in these sensitive areas.

There is little doubt that curiosity about Quadra's karst is on the rise among islanders and the surrounding area. Local recreation groups are beginning to recognize the potential of the island's diverse karst sites. The Quadra Island Outdoor Club is already conducting tours at some locations, and has taken the additional step of applying to the provincial government to formally establish two interpretive trails for viewing karst.

The residents of Quadra are fortunate to have such a globally rare and unique natural resource in their backyard. While karst is much more widely understood and appreciated in most other parts of the world, it is nevertheless finally gaining some traction here in British Columbia. What better place than Quadra to be a centrepiece for that recognition?



Save Desolation Sound

Once again Lehigh Hanson Co., company has snuck under the radar to propose to - and work with - the B.C. Liberal Govt, to get a licence to begin construction of a vast quarry in the south mouth of Homfray Channel, Desolation Sound. The only notice seems to have been in the Powell River Business Gazette.

They would first log 2000 hectares of trees and then open the mine above Lloyd Creek Bay to extract what appears to be glacial deposit gravel. The bay faces out into Desolation Sd and the noise from the rock running down from the mountain area and being loaded to the transport ships and barges will be intense and extend out across to Mink, Martin, Kinghorne and East Cortes Islands. The gravel will be taken out of the country.

Lehigh Hanson is owned by Heidelberg Cement of Germany with head offices in Texas. They are a huge, powerful company known to have supported the B.C. Liberal party. Locally they own the Sechelt Quarry and one on Texada Island.

We are trying to rally support to block the construction of a huge quarry in this magnificent wilderness area and save our common land from corporate destruction. I am very familiar with this area since I have lived, worked and travelled thru it for 45 years. The section "Other Directions" in my "Clam Gardens: Aboriginal Mariculture On Canada's West Coast" details food structures two miles south from Lloyd Creek and Bay in Prideaux Haven Marine Park. Lloyd Creek Bay also contain clam gardens which I will check next low tide.

Water Safety

One would expect the inhabitants of Quadra Island to be safety conscious since it is surrounded by water but this is not the case. In just the last year I was witness to several incidents that receded my hairline even more than it already is. Without divulging names and places in order to protect the guilty I will recount just a few of the " near misses."

1. Capsizing and loosing boat at max flood (10 Knots) in Beazly Pass with no lifejacket, current charts, vhf, or any safety gear. Boater swam ashore and was rescued by a passing vessel. RCMP put an ad in the D.I. for the person to retrieve their found kayak.

2. Woman on dock with cell phone urging several boater to go out in driving rain to rescue her husband broken down off Viner Point. After an hour of hailing boater on #16 VHF to no avail returning to dock empty handed. Woman in touch with husband on cell phone at home dry and warm with husband holed up in a bay on Viner point. Finally after firing up a 50 ft boat and searching for another hour we find him on Ch #12 and tow him in. The first order of business in any rescue is do not put rescuers at risk and maintain communication.

3. Drunken boaters wake boarding through anchorage and children swimming in order to



play crack the whip and splash scantily clad girls on an anchored boat.

4. Licensed captain and friend flipping tin boat while doing donuts and floundering in the water for 20 minutes with no life jackets. A good samaritan pulled the two to shore and averted a drowning. Once again no safety equipment was aboard. It should be noted that the one fellow was rescued just months earlier from running out of fuel at nite off Marina Island with only a cell phone{no lites, flares, or vhf}

5. A boater lost power off Read Island due to 10 year old batteries and forgetting to shut his inverter off while off shore power. In addition to requiring a thousand dollars worth of new batteries he lost a thousand bucks worth of traps due to either no weights in the traps, or not enough line, or being pulled by someone else due to his failure to mark his floats. The same cruise included not knowing which way the tide was going due to no tide charts. And to crown his stupid skipper tricks he went through Whiterock Pass without glasses and no binoculars. The only thing that kept him off the rocks was a pretty senorita kayak guide directing him through. Jim Dobbie

New Fire Bylaw Could Assist Quadra Island

In 1925, after an extremely dry July and August, a surveyors campfire near the Lucky Jim Mine, jumped into the trees and was pushed by strong northwest winds all the way to Heriot Bay and Gowlland Harbour. It consumed an estimated 50,000 acres of forest land and many homes and homesteads. Could something like that happen today?

Sometime ago in discussion with Coastal Fire in Parksville I learned of the existence of a Burn Bylaw. This bylaw may be used, once implemented, by municipalities and regional districts in formulating fire prevention strategies for local areas.

At present, Quadra Island is divided into two distinct jurisdictions in the area of fire planning. South of the sign above Hyacinthe Bay, Quadra has its own Fire District, complete with fire halls, trucks and trained volunteers. The Fire Chief makes decisions for the area.

The northern three-quarters of Quadra Island is administered by the Provincial Ministry of Forests [MFLNRO] and has a different set of standards. The Ministry's priorities relate to Crown Land. They will respond to a fire on Crown Land or threatening Crown Land. Fires on private property and house fires are not in their mandate.

The last time I checked, Quadra Island as a whole was rated as 3 on a drought scale of 1 to 4 with number 4 classed as extreme drought. It is only June.

The population of Quadra has risen dramatically since 1925, and will continue to do so. With more people living and working here and more visitors every year, the chances of a human caused wildfire rises.

I believe Quadra would be well served with a bylaw that would treat the island as one unit, with one set of fire prevention standards. This would allow the Fire Chief the ability to administer these standards across the entire island at one time. However, this does not mean the South Quadra fire trucks would be expected to extend their coverage past the Hyacinthe sign (sic). Insurance issues make that not a possibility. Living on North Quadra demands that you try to be prepared to help yourself and your neighbours should any fire on private property occur.

This is a small island and any fire getting away should be of extreme concern to everyone. Fire knows no boundaries. Anything we can do to minimize the possibility of a human caused wildfire, we should do.



More Seniors Housing - Coming Soon!

Quadra Island Seniors Housing Society's Board of Directors was excited to announce at our AGM June 20th that we plan to build a 16unit seniors residence for independent living with supports on Harper Rd. Our Board is in the process of purchasing this property which adjoins the existing 5 senior housing units on O'Connor Road. As well QISHS has applied for new CMHC and BC Housing to help finance this \$3.8 million project, with the hope of having it ready for occupancy by January 2018.

Following months of deliberation on the results of our Need/Demand and business feasibility study, looking at potential Q Cove properties and assessing our capacity to take on such a large project, we selected the Harper Rd. site as our best option. Although the site and focus on 'affordable housing only' are different than that recommended by Quadra Circle and the Joint Housing Committee, both these groups support the changes, in the interest of housing our more vulnerable seniors as quickly as possible. Quadra Circle and Island Health Community Care will provide the supports for those who need it.

Timing coincided well with BC Housing's May Expression of Interest Call for applications for new affordable independentliving housing which can be built quickly. If we are selected by BC Housing, a large portion of construction costs can be funded by BCH in exchange for their equity interest in part of the project.

The Seniors Residence will have 16 suites (1 and 2BR) with kitchens, shower bathrooms and private patios in a single-storey building with a live-in caretaker. A common area of kitchen, dining and entertainment/craft rooms will allow for shared meals and social activities. The project is intended for low-

moderate income seniors who meet QISHS residency requirements: seniors 65+ or with a partner that age, who have lived on Quadra for more than 2 years and who meet the income requirements. Our 2015 study of 264 households showed 37 households had annual income of less than \$25,000 and were were in urgent need of affordable housing within 5 years. Our project will help meet some of this growing demand. Residents will be eligible for Shelter Allowance for Elderly Renters (SAFER) and rents will be kept at low-end of market.

We are now doing the 'due diligence' studies required to determine the property's suitability for our Residence. Provided that all the studies go well and we arrange interim financing, our property contract completes in September, which is also when we will know if BC Housing has selected us for this round of funding. If so, the design work will be completed and the construction contract will go to public tender. If not, we will work with BCH to find alternate funding, which would likely require substantial community donations and much more time.

To reduce the amount we need to borrow from BCH and a mortgage, we invite community members to help us with cash and in-kind donations. Our first Seniors Housing project was only possible because of the very generous donations from our QISHS members and other Quadra Island residents. (Income Tax receipts are available for donations of \$25 and over.) We hope you will be generous once again and support our plans to provide the much-needed seniors housing to allow our older Quadra residents to age-inplace, among their friends and family.

appy Solstice, everyone! What a beautiful day! I had meetings in town this morning and am now dragging myself to my keyboard, out of the sunshine, to write this report. There is so much going on in Area C and around us that I feel you need to hear at least a bit of it.

Granite Bay Park

We just had some excellent work done by a local contractor to "maintain" the Granite Bay boat ramp. He did a beautiful job and I hope to actually get a day to go and use it. Hope you will too. Remember to pay your five dollars to help defray the costs of maintenance. Also, please make sure that those with trailers park in the designated areas, at a sharp angle to add more room for others. For those that don't have a trailer but are using the ramp (of course you will still pay!) please park beyond the boat ramp approach so that people can make the turns needed at the ramp. Thanks to all for your cooperation.

Water Access signs

The SRD is in the process of erecting some very small "water access" signs at key Highways access points. They are small and unobtrusive and are meant to let people know where they can access the water on our beautiful island surrounded by water and where they should not go! This will protect private property from trespass. Every waterfront subdivision on the island was required at time of subdivision to give land to the community to access the water. This was mandatory and all we are doing is marking a few of the spots so we can all enjoy the water access. They are not for vehicles and are not to meant to intrude on anyone's private space. Very special consideration was given to that point.

On Stuart Island

I will be going to Stuart Island tomorrow with staff to hold a public hearing for a rezoning to legalize a small tourist lodge at the entry to Toba Inlet. It has been in existence for years but totally out of compliance with local zoning and Crown leases. This should take care of that provided the public approves.

The Stuart Island Community Association buildings are partially on old SD property and we have been trying to get that given to the community for many years. Today was a very successful meeting in town with officials from the Province, the SD and the SRD. They are coming around and by Sept. I am hoping the property will be remaining in the public domain through these efforts. I will also meet with the Stuart Island Community Assoc. tomorrow

Owen Bay dock

As you will remember from previous reports, we took over the wharves at Owen Bay, Port Neville and Surge Narrows from Transport Canada when they threatened to tear them out. I will be meeting with the Owen Bay community and our staff to figure out what it is they need for a facility and how we are going to make it work. We are in the process of applying for the Crown Land tenure under the present wharf. We want to get this right.

Hospital Pay Parking

The Government and Island Health are still insisting that we will need to pay for parking at the new hospitals. This could be devastating for the most needy and those that are brought in for emergency care, not to mention the underpaid staff. So we continue the fight and we are making some headway with them at looking at options. So far I don't like any of them but will continue to fight for your right to receive health care at no extra cost.

They wanted to fence, gate and lock our depot at 4pm and have it open only a few days a week and get rid of our super-contractor, Mike Windrim. I have "just said NO" over and over. So it looks like we have won. They are going to leave us alone, finally! And Mike will still being doing the excellent job he does for all of us. The things I have to fight over! The one negative is that this mega-corp is not going to recycle glass! Stupidest thing I have ever heard of. Even if they just crushed it at the landfill and used it as cover, it would be better than putting it in one's garbage and taking up more and more space at the landfill, which we pay dearly for. All of you should write letters to the Comox Valley Regional District and tell them how stupid this is... they are in charge, not the SRD.. Barrage them with emails and phone calls. Let them know we want glass recycling on Quadra. Other directors on the Board weren't as concerned. They just allowed it to happen.
