



Cat facts: Quadra Cat Rescue marks 10th anniversary with U of Q presentation on all things cats

Cat curious? Quadra Cat Rescue will mark 10 years of working to reduce the number of unwanted cats on Quadra Island with a U of Q presentation on all things cats (including door prizes!). Join us, 7 p.m. on Wednesday, May 15, at the Heriot Bay Inn.

"We'll be highlighting what Quadra Cat Rescue has done to date, and the work yet to do, especially with getting pet cats fixed before they can reproduce, and ongoing trapping programs in areas where the cat population has been left unchecked and turned into a colony," says cat rescue volunteer Kristene Perron, who also runs a cat boarding facility in Quathiaski Cove. "Since spring is kitten season, it's a good time of year for a reminder about the importance of spaying and neutering before kittens are six months old. We need all pet owners working with us to control the cat population -

and we urge anyone needing help to contact us."

Over the last 10 years, Quadra Cat Rescue volunteers have raised funds and coordinated spay and neutering as well as vaccinations for approximately 650 cats and kittens.

"This has prevented thousands of births, and still we have far more kittens being born here than we have homes for," says volunteer Valerie van Veen. "Thankfully, over the last few years, Pacific Cat Clinic in Victoria has been willing to help us adopt dozens of those kittens into good homes."

Fundraising is a constant effort, and the group has recently received news that one source of grant funding will be substantially lower this year than in past.

"It's a struggle to make ends meet with the number of strays and abandoned cats in need of fostering and medical care, and all funds raised pay directly for cat care," van Veen adds. "We are fortunate to have Tru Value Foods Spirit Points that help us buy cat food, and art cards for sale featuring six original pieces of artwork by Michael Duncan that help support our cause."

The art cards are available for \$5 each at Inspirations in Quathiaski Cove. People can also donate to Quadra Cat Rescue through the island Coastal Community Credit Union branch.

If you miss the U of Q presentation and would like more information about homeless cats and kittens, contact Quadra Cat Rescue. Opportunity to Comment on Preliminary Price Cap Decision for Next Performance Term

On April 1, 2019 the British Columbia Ferries Commissioner ("Commissioner") announced his decision regarding the preliminary price caps for the next performance term. The Commissioner set the preliminary price caps at a maximum increase of 2.3% annually from April 1, 2020 to March 31, 2024. The Commissioner is seeking public comment on his preliminary price cap decision by June 30, 2019 as part of the process of making a final decision on the price caps for the next performance term by September 30, 2019.

Quadra Cycling Coalition Cycloquest

Quadra Island Cycling Coalition (QUICC) will be hosting Quadra CycloQuest – The MAYhem Edition, on Saturday May 18, 2019. Cyclists, both locals and friends from farther away, will gather in the morning at the Heriot Bay Inn for a mass start, led off by the RCMP, then break up into smaller groups to explore the far corners of the island, experiencing the island's scenic wonders, local history, epic hills and favourite places for coffee and or a cool beverage.

In previous years, the Coalition has hosted a New Year's Eve event, 100 kilometres of road and trail riding to all corners of the island. In the interest of safety and better weather, the event has been reinvented as CycloQuest, a cross between a treasure hunt and a Choose Your Own Adventure novel. Riders will be provided with a passport that includes a variety of destinations with points assigned to each and a stamp to prove they have been there. Riders can choose an epic 100 kilometre gravel and trail adventure or a tour of the island's most scenic views or anything in between. There will also be a youth program to encourage as much family participation as possible.

At the end of the day, there will be a wrap up party at the Heriot Bay Inn for awards and a chance to share stories over dinner and drinks.

There is an entry fee for the event. The money collected will be used locally for food and services, providing an economic boost to businesses in the shoulder season. Any remaining funds will go to local cycling and pathways network.

This is always a busy weekend so organizers are working with the local RCMP and first-aid responders to make sure that road safety is paramount. Riders from off island are being encouraged to leave their vehicles at home and arrange for a shuttle pick up. Direction signs, destination markers and portable toilets will begin appearing around the island a few days before the event and be removed the following day.




ACTIVITY CENTRE: Spring is a great time to get our bodies into motion. Warmer weather and longer days encourage us to get out and get moving –

The 2019 Beach Clean-up: A Warm Thanks to So Many

Our 22nd Annual Beach Clean-up was another remarkable success. The day was sunny, warm, bright and full of Spring's promise. It was held one week later than Earth Day this year because of conflicts with the long Easter Weekend. Once again, Sierra Quadra extends thanks to the many Islanders who scoured our beaches for unwanted detritus — mostly plastics — and did an amazing job of bagging it, bringing it to the designated collections points so it could be loaded on pickup trucks and then transferred to the larger vehicles for disposal.

Large styrofoam was abundant again this year, but tires were still plentiful, as was miscellaneous material from the shellfish industry.

The total volume of all beach garbage was up this year over last year. In all, we managed to completely fill 4 tandem dump trucks, one low-bed truck, and a large 35 cubic-yard bin that represented about two truckloads. Our computational expert on these matters, John Barclay, has determined that our total collected beach garbage in 2016 was 142.6 cubic yards, in 2017 it was 95.1, last year it was 76.1, and this year it was 105 for a total of 418 cubic yards in four years.

For your interest, if we assume that the last four years have been typical, then the average cubic yards per year removed from Quadra's beaches has been 104.5, multiplied by 22 years would equal 2299 cubic yards. Assuming each tandem truck holds 15 cubic yards, then we have removed 153 truckloads of garbage from our beaches since this annual community project began.

The majority of this was plastic, a global pollutant that is being acknowledged as an increasingly serious problem for the health

of both humans and animals. The volume we collected certainly helps to reduce the microplastics that are becoming a major contaminant in the oceans we share with so many other creatures.

Beach Clean-up has truly become a community event. Although Sierra Quadra organizes the basic logistics, the important work has expanded into a self-organizing operation involving hundreds of Islanders. This Earth Day event has become an expression of our deep caring for our beautiful island home, and a measure of the accomplishment that is possible when we work together as a community. It is noteworthy that everything to make this remarkable event happen was donated by volunteers and businesses.

Over the years, Quadra islanders have continued to support this event with increasing energy, enthusiasm and efficiency. For our 22nd annual event, we offer special thanks to the many people and many businesses who made this event possible. Beyond the many Islanders who provided pickup trucks, we want to acknowledge the owners of the large trucks who committed their big machines and time to the task: one truck from G. Roy Dahlnas Excavating, another from Sorensen-MacDonald Enterprises, one more from Nigel Phillips, 2 trucks from On Track Excavating (Chris Phillips), and a large 35 cubic-yard bin from Waste Management. All this equipment plus the numerous pickup trucks were crucial to this project's success.

We must also thank B.C. Ferries for providing free passage for all the trucks taking the garbage to the distribution site in Campbell River, to the Strathcona Regional District for free tipping at the dump (in collaboration

with the Manager of Solid Waste for the Comox Valley Regional District). And we wish to thank BC Parks for its co-operation, and to Susan at Rebecca Spit for her assistance. The Discovery Islander gave a helpful profile to the event as did The Gumboot, and Robyn Budd's colourful posters. Intense Rentals (Jim Thievin) provided the large tent that housed our central food station. Coastal Community Credit Union provided their tent, along with bags, coffee, contributed generously to the lunch, and about a dozen employees from both the Quadra and Campbell River branches worked the beaches.

Food and refreshments are a highlight of the Beach Clean-up because they provide an opportunity to meet, visit, relax and indulge. The spicy carrot soup came from Heriot Bay Inn and vegetable soup from Tsa Kwa Luten. And the invaluable Spirit Points from Tru Value Foods (Heriot Bay and Q. Cove) provided additional food. Sierra Quadra is very grateful to this year's bakers, cooks, chili and sandwich makers, servers, and the many others who helped in many large and small ways — including musical entertainment by Kris Wellstein and John Walton.

But our most special thanks go to all Quadra Islanders who wrestled styrofoam and tires over driftwood, and who collected and bagged the unwanted beach garbage. Without your many hours of work, the Beach Clean-up would not have been a success. Once again, you have all made Quadra Island a healthier and more beautiful place in which to live. After a successful Beach Clean-up enhanced by a beautiful April day, "Simply Paradise" seems even less like an exaggeration to describe the place where we live.

Living with Wildfire - Part 3

Firesmart is a great defensive strategy to protect your property against the ravages of wildfire. The BC provincial government has chosen to invest more money into preventative measures such as the Firesmart program. Millions spent up front might save tens of million in offensive firefighting expense, protecting homes and ultimately lives. There is still more that can be done. Fighting wildfires alone without individual citizen action will not solve the problem.

Offensive action. I am a firm believer in Sprinkler Protection Systems. We know over 50% of home ignitions occur due to burning embers generated by the wildfire. These embers start spot fires sometimes several kilometers ahead of the actual fire front and can easily include a home as a fuel source. If those embers land on a wetted surface, they simply extinguish. An SPS system delivers a coating of water to the roof and homes immediate vicinity forming a high humidity bubble. The embers have no place to gain a foothold. This very effective strategy and is used all over the world, particularly Australia, where rooftop sprinklers are considered standard equipment for rural

If in danger during a fire, you may be asked to evacuate. Typically, residents will first be given an evacuation alert. This allows time to prepare personal effects and plan relocating. As wildfires are very unpredictable, it could be hours or days. If danger is immanent, an evacuation order will then be issued. It is imperative you leave immediately. Your FireSmart defense preparations working in conjunction with a Sprinkler Protection System could make all the difference.

Sprinkler Protection System design considerations. The first element is water supply. If using a domestic water supply as the SPS water source, you must know how much water you need and the well systems capacity. For example, 2 sprinklers on your roof with a flow rate of 2 gallons per minute = 4 gallons per minute or 240 gallons per hour. The system should run for a minimum of 2 hours (480 gallons) and operate twice a day. This will thoroughly soak surfaces and maintain the surrounding humidity. Therefore the well system needs to deliver at least 1000 gallons a day. If the well can't deliver adequate

supply, consider creating additional water storage. This can be a pond, above ground pool or water storage tanks. To extend the stored water capacity, consider trickle feeding the reservoirs from your domestic water system.

Once you understand how much water you have and need, picking the right sprinkler is important. Any sprinkler is better than no sprinkler but there are certain characteristic considerations. Fan sprinklers work well for coverage but can easily tip over and loose effectiveness in windy conditions. They can be stabilized by adding angled PVC leg extensions and then placed straddling the roof peak. Low volume straight stream sprinklers are better under windy conditions but take much longer to soak surfaces. The key advantage is they typically gutter mount so climbing on to the roof may not be necessary. As well, they use a low volume of water and will operate effectively at low pressure. Impact style sprinklers do both elements well but need higher pressure and consume more water. Again, the type and number of sprinklers is specific to the home and what coverage you are trying to achieve. If ample water is available, you may consider

the use of a gas driven fire pump SPS.

There are several advantages. A fire pump is independent of electricity so will continue to operate if power gets cut off. It can run many sprinkler heads simultaneously. It can also be used in conjunction with a high volume wildfire hose nozzle used to soak large trees and other unprotected areas like woodsheds or under decks.

For illustration purposes, I'll describe the actions I would take in the evacuation alert stage preparing for an eventual full evacuation. First, I would move all outdoor furniture, BBQ and combustible materials 10 meters or more away from the house. Next, I would clear any fine combustibles with a broom or leaf blower. If I'm no longer planning to use household propane, it would be shut off, disconnected, and if possible, the tanks moved to a safe location. All windows would be closed with blinds pulled shut. I would then set up the SPS equipment whether a single sprinkler on the roof or a full-blown system. Because I have access to plenty of water, my system consists of 4 straight stream

roof top sprinklers and 5 ground level impact sprinklers. This many sprinklers require the power and volume of a gas driven forestry pump. The system also uses dedicated forestry style hose lines so as to be consistent with equipment connections for QIFD and Coastal Fire. Depending on the urgency of the situation, I would run the system for 2 hours in the morning and 2 hours at dusk. I would repeat these soakings until the situation changes. This creates the humidity levels I'm looking for and extinguishes any errant firebrands. If forced to evacuate, I would turn the system on and leave it running.

During an active wildfire with full evacuation, QIFD resources will be stretched thin. It's hard to be everywhere at the same time. There will be an evaluation or triage of any properties directly in the wildfires path. This means properties with the highest odds of survivability will gain priority. Homes built with fire resistant materials, displaying signs of FireSmart remediation and operating SPS equipment will move up in ranking. Additionally, QIFD could take additional action such as refuelling SPS fire pumps, topping up external water tanks, moving sprinklers to improve coverage or simply move on to the next home. The more a property owner has done to assist the fire department increases the odds of successful protection.

This simply brushes the surface of what can be done. What's most important is recognizing we coexist by choice with wildfires destructive force. It is up to all of us to mange the risk appropriately while staying within our personal means. Any action is better than no action. Working together as a community to face this challenge is what we do best.




Chamber Music Fundraiser

SEAFEST 2019 is May 18 on Cortes Island

For several decades the Cortes Island Seafood Association (CISA) has put on a seafood festival to celebrate our heritage from the sea. The purpose of the festival is to bring together those Cortes Islanders who make their living from the sea with the larger community, to promote a mutual understanding and appreciation of aquaculture farming, and to celebrate the bounty of the ocean. CISA is a non-profit society whose mandate is to monitor the water quality of the area surrounding Cortes Island, and who uses funds raised from the festival to conduct a water testing program in local waters.

The gathering began as The Seafood Festival in the late 1980s and was held at Smelt Bay Park for many years. It migrated to the lower lawn beside the Cove restaurant as The Oyster Festival, and two years later moved to the field beside the Squirrel Cove Store as SEAFEST. Kristen Scholfield-Sweet and John Shook began cooking in 2003, and began coordinating the entire phenomena in 2011. Although there have been years when the spring skies gave a few sprinkles, and once when it was moved to a community hall because rain seemed imminent, and once when the wind blew over some tents - so far with the blessings of the sky deities - the festival has never been cancelled due to poor weather conditions.

Seafoodies are a hardy lot who in years past have stood under dripping trees as well as in the hot sun for a chance to eat poached oysters in miso sauce, oysters glazed with lime marmalade and mustard, oysters with fermented black bean sauce, oysters drizzled with jalapeño, Pico de Gallo or Pernod sauce, oysters panfried in corn flake crumbs, oysters Rockefeller, and angels on horseback on the barbeque, mussels steamed in white wine, steamed clams bordelaise, and prawns in a sweet chili Thai sauce served with shrimp chips.

In 2014 SEAFEST moved to the lawns of Gorge Harbour Marina Resort to accommodate the increasing number of community members and off-island visitors who now make this a "go to event" to welcome spring and celebrate island life. SEAFEST 2019 will again be held at the Gorge Harbour Marina on Saturday May 18 with the help of more than 75 volunteers drawn from seafood workers, our organizational partner the Whaletown Community Club, and a very helpful Cortes community. We begin serving at 11:30 and anticipate fixing approximately 700 gourmet lunches on camp stoves and barbecues. Just watching the oyster shucking and cooking show is worth the attendance, even if you are planning to enjoy the non-seafood offerings from many vendors.

Adult tickets are \$22.00 for a feast of three cooked and three barbecued oyster dishes, prawns, clams, little potatoes, artisan salad and toasted garlic bread. All ovsters are fully cooked and certified safe to eat. There will be a kid's menu and prices. A ticket is not necessary, but if you want a ticket, they will be available at the Cortes Natural Food Co-op, Squirrel Cove Store, and the Gorge Marina store from April 27th until festival day. In a world where nothing is fixed and everything shifts across time and space, the currently configured music line-up includes Laurel Bohart, Shirley Dawn, Louis Belcourt, Rick Bockner, Andy Vine, Ruby & Smith, and hopefully Larry Hansen, who always closes Seafest with a big bang of cosmic vibrations. A free shuttle will meet every ferry arriving at Cortes. You don't need to call for a reservation, just step off the ferry and your ride awaits, or will be right back. Each year we have more vendors and organizations requesting space for their tables. We ask for 10% of your day's sales if you are for-profit. There is no fee for non-profit organizations.
