

Breton Island Protected by Family Donation to Nature Trust



he Nature Trust of BC is in the process of receiving an exceptional gift that will be a valuable addition to the protected areas in the Discovery Islands - South Breton Island.

Breton Island is a 12.6 acre island located off the east coast of Quadra Island and has been in private hands for many years. The island has excellent conservation values because it has no existing structures or docks and supports thriving plant and bird populations.

Breton Island-Whitridge Reserve contains three sensitive ecosystems: mature coniferous forest, herbaceous rocky shoreline, and shallow marine area. All three ecosystems are in a relatively natural state. A community of the critically imperilled Roemer's Fescue – Junegrass may occur on this island.

This is a bird lover's paradise. The shallow marine area provides important habitat for

sea ducks, shorebirds, seabirds, and other waterbirds. Among the bird species using the island are the threatened Marbled Murrelet, and three species of special concern – the Ancient Murrelet, Cassin's Auklet, and Great Blue Heron.

Provincially recognized species at risk that use the island include Brandt's Cormorant and Common Murre.

Other birds using this paradise include Bald Eagle, Black Oystercatcher, Black Turnstone, Common Loon, Common Merganser, Double-crested Cormorant, Harlequin Duck, Lesser Scaup, Pacific Loon, Pelagic Cormorant, Pigeon Guillemot, Red-necked Grebe, Rock Sandpiper, Savannah Sparrrow, Surf Scoter, Surfbird, and White-winged Scoter.

Breton Island is a local landmark and popular recreation location for kayakers and boaters.

By protecting the island, this acquisition will protect 1.2 km of coastal shoreline and approximately 22 acres of shallow marine area surrounding the island by ensuring that no infrastructure will extend over or through this important habitat.

Two other properties have also been recently acquired: Marsden Face – Rixen Creek with 80 acres in the West Kootenay, north of Nelson; Cowichan River – Gibbins Road comprising 36 acres of forest and riparian corridor along the Cowichan River near Duncan, on Vancouver Island.

Acquiring the property is only the first step. The Nature Trust is fundraising for immediate and future land management costs to care for the reserve in perpetuity and is appealing to the public for donations. 


Quadra's **Covid Christmas** Light-Up!

RCMP BEAT

Shout out:

On Friday October 30th, there was a major collision at the intersection or Heriot Bay Rd, and West Rd. I would like to thank the many citizens that stopped to provide assistance in the moments immediately after. Three people were injured, and transported to hospital. Luckily no one ended up suffering from critical life threatening injuries. I would also like to thank Fire Chief Sharon, and her crew. If you have never seen our local fire department in action, I can tell you they are a very professional and experienced group of dedicated volunteers. The speed in which they attend scenes is nothing short of incredible, especially considering they are not waiting around the fire hall for a call like big city departments. Many members of the Quadra Fire Department have years of experience and training behind them, and they operate like a well oiled machine. We are very lucky to have them. The BC ambulance service also responded in full force, sending the local ambulance, as well as one from Campbell River, and a helicopter. The response time was impressive.

Impaired Driving:

Despite many educational campaigns across the country, Impaired driving continues to be a major safety concern across Canada. Please do not risk driving if you've been drinking. We will be ramping up our enforcement in this area as we approach Christmas, as part of a National Campaign. We would prefer it if our stats at the end of the year were down in this category, as it would mean Islanders were making good

judgment calls. However, there will be no breaks given to anyone caught driving under the influence. I believe this is the biggest safety risk to people living on these islands.

Fraud Scams Continue:

I'm sure everyone is getting sick of the never ending phone scams. As many have likely noticed, in the past few months these calls seem to be originating from local numbers, making it more likely that you will answer. These call centres are almost always located overseas. These scammers are using voice over internet technology to place these calls, and programs that generate a call display from the local area. These call centres are clearly making money by defrauding unsuspecting Canadians, as new ones pop up faster than authorities in the country of origin can shut them down. I don't see this trend abating anytime soon, so we all have to be educated and aware. Please discuss these scams with any vulnerable family members or friends, as prevention is by far the best option available to us. Services Canada does not cold call people threatening arrest, and I can't imagine a scenario were vour social insurance card could be compromised, leading to your arrest.

Mental Health:

Our calls for service for mental health related issues has increased slightly this year. However, when I dig deeper into the stats, our apprenshions under the Mental Health Act have gone up three fold. We apprehend people under section 28 of the Mental Health Act, only if they are an immediate threat to themselves or others. Usually these calls result from

people expressing suicidal thoughts. Once we apprehend someone under the Mental Health Act, we are required to bring them to a physician for a proper medical assessment. I can only assume that COVID is contributing to this sharp increase. The extra stress and anxiety may be pushing people further to the edge of their abilities to cope. Although COVID isn't something that most dwell on every minute of the day, the threat is always there, and the news is increasingly dark. I imagine it's like that App running in the background on your phone, you don't realize it's open, but it's slowly draining the battery. I'm bringing this topic up, because it's clearly effecting people in our communities. Please support each other as best you can during this time of uncertainty. Check in on each other, listen, and support each other. If you have concerns about the mental health of a friend or family member, intervene early. Usually there is indication someone isn't doing well long before they take action or begin making comments about self harm.

Hot Water from the Sun

brief overview from the ICAN Energy Team
When most people think of solar energy the first picture that comes to mind is an array of solar panels connected to a bank of batteries. This is generally a complicated

of batteries. This is generally a complicated and expensive proposition. However, the simplest and most cost effective way to begin taking advantage of the sun's energy is to harvest the heat as heat, and not to convert it to electricity.

Solar heat can be captured in a number of ways and used for domestic hot water, home heating or larger commercial situations. This can result in significant savings on energy bills. On average, home hot water usage represents 15–20% of energy bills and thermal solar systems can provide up to 50–80% of your hot water needs. The following is an introduction to the various methods of producing hot water from the sun.

When considering a solar hot water system you must look at your location and orientation. A link to a map showing the amount of sunlight one can expect on Quadra is listed at the end of this article. The heat-gathering panels should be located facing south and in full sun. They are typically positioned at an angle approximately equal to the latitude of the location. For our latitude the panel should be tilted to an angle of about 50°. If used primarily in summer the angle can be decreased by about 15°.

There are three basic types of solar heat collection panels. Listed in order of complexity and generally increasing cost are: 1) flat plate, 2) evacuated tube, and 3) photovoltaic. Links to detailed construction information are provided at the end of this article.

1) Flat plate solar collectors

There are several types of flat plate collector systems

A) The collector could be as simple as a black poly tube arranged in a spiral coil on the roof with water pumping through it. This is sometimes used for heating swimming pools and hot tubs and the water flow is powered by the pool pump, but use is restricted to warm seasons. This simple

design could be built for less than \$200.

B) The more common flat plate collector design is a square or rectangular box a few inches deep and covered with a glass plate. These can either be passive systems operating as a thermo-siphon or an active system operated with a pump.

The most simple example, pictured below, is a commercially produced thermo-siphon system. Copper tubing, 3/4" diameter, loops back and forth in the insulated box shaped panel. A water tank is located in the house at a level above the panel. Cold water drains from



the bottom of the tank and is gravity fed to the bottom of the panel. As it heats it rises up and returns into the top of tank. In this case the panel is connected via a black poly pipe visible against the house wall.

Because it heats the water directly, this system is limited to seasonal use in Canada and the system must be drained in winter. The advantage is its simplicity.

This system lends itself to a DIY project.



A rectangular passive collector box, a few inches deep can be constructed of plywood. The enclosed piping is painted flat black and a sheet of glass covers the box. The DIY cost would be a few hundred dollars.

It is also possible to construct an active panel operated with a small pump in which case narrow tubing can be used for better heat transfer. When a pump is used the panel can involve a smaller box containing a circular coil of PEX pipe which reduces the cost. This type of system can also be built for a few hundred dollars.

C) A more complex year-round system involves a closed loop containing a so-called 'solar fluid' (that is, a fluid with applications in solar energy projects) which is actively pumped through the panel and then transfers the heat to the domestic water through a heat exchanger.

As the fluid is being actively pumped, the copper tubes are smaller in diameter and usually fitted with thin aluminum fins to maximize heat gain. The fluid is an antifreeze so the system can be active throughout the year.

The two examples pictured below utilize two collector panels connected in series and provide enough hot water for a family

of four or five. One panel would be sufficient for a family of two or three. These installations have been functioning since the early 1990s.

The pump can be a standard plug-in type but in both photos, you can see a small 30 watt photovoltaic electric panel with the thermal panels. The photovoltaic panel provides electricity to power a pump that keeps the fluid moving. When there is little sunlight, the

pump turns slowly but still moves the fluid, maximizing the heat gain. Excess heat can also be re-directed to other uses.

A commercial system generally costs several thousand dollars and has application in situations where more heat or higher temperatures are required, such as community centres, larger buildings, and pools.

2) Evacuated Tube Solar Collector:

This system involves an array of double walled glass tubes. The space between thei; two walls is evacuated to provide insulation, and the interior chamber of each tube is filled with a solar fluid. (In some cases, water is used since the amount required is so small it turns to frost rather than ice when it freezes, and so causes no damage to the system.) The liquid is heated by the sun, vaporises and rises up, transfers the heat to a copper rod and then condenses, dropping back down to heat again. The copper rod extends into the horizontal water tank transferring heat to the water. The amount of hot water needed determines the number of tubes. A system with 30 tubes would do a typical household.



This photo shows two separate systems installed for individual rooms on a B & B and has been in operation for over 6 years. This type of system is too complex for a DIY project. It is more expensive than DIY flat plate systems and costs several thousand dollars. Like closed loop active flat plate systems, evacuated tube collectors are most effective in situations where more heat or higher temperatures are required.

3) Hot Water from Photovoltaic Panels:

Until fairly recently photovoltaic panels were only used to provide electricity to batteries and households. Over the last five years the cost of panels has been significantly reduced and now it is cost effective to heat water directly with a PV array.

A series of panels is wired to a charge controller which maximizes the electricity flow and passes the electricity directly to the element of a domestic hot water tank. While the technology of PV panels is complex, their installation is relatively simple.



Except for the DIY flat-plate systems, the PV system is now the least expensive and is likely the home-sized option to consider first. It's simple to install, lasts a long time, and requires the least maintenance.

Charge Controller

It is critical that solar PV panels are located in full sun as even a few leaves on the panels or the shade cast by a small branch will significantly reduce the electrical output and the heat contribution. This may influence whether the panels are roof or ground mounted.

On a sunny day an array of PV panels totalling 1 to 2 kilowatts will heat enough water for a typical household of two to five people. But even on an overcast day, some electricity will be generated and maximized by the charge controller. Although prices continue to

evolve, this system will be approximately \$1000 to \$2000.

Record your fall finds with iNaturalist

Fall's cooler, wet weather brings a whole host of new opportunities to observe nature in a new light. In recent weeks a multitude of mushrooms of all shapes and sizes have been popping up between roots, on branches and stumps, and amidst the carpet of fallen leaves. And from their damp digs, these fungi subsequently pop up on the Discovery Islands iNaturalist Project!

The project's "recent observations" page is full of fantastic fall fungi photos, from vibrant coral mushrooms, to bright jelly cones, to the many classic umbrella-capped varieties. Take a look at a few and get inspired for your next forest walk at the project page linked below.

If keeping your eyes glued to the ground doesn't appeal to you, look to the skies, trees, and shores for feathered friends. On the water, redbreasted mergansers and harlequin ducks are bobbing about, while shorebirds like dunlin and black oystercatchers look for food along the shoreline, and colourful songbirds and woodpeckers flit between trees.

Strong seasonal storms also bring tangles of seaweeds and seagrasses ashore. Look closely to find delicately branched red seaweeds, various kinds of kelp, as well as shells and other tidal treasures that get swept to shore too.

With extra consideration for current COVID protocols, exploring nature remains one of the safest activities we can do. By sharing your photos on iNaturalist you connect with an online community of nature-lovers and naturalists both near and far, and contribute to biodiversity science. Products of the program include: an obstetrician-gynecologist, a university professor, 7 school principals and many teachers, nurses, midwives, social workers, lawyers, agriculturalists, foresters, etc. Another project that Quadra's fund-raising has contributed to in the past is The Gift of Peace Program which has benefitted many families and communities in the Kalinga area of the northern Philippines over the past years. Last year IAT Philippines was able to access some

local funds for this project and now after many years of success, it is in the process of being downsized.

The following is excerpts from a letter from Odessa Ngaway who is the current social worker for IAT. She updates us regarding the sponsorship program.

Greetings from the Native land of the Philippines!

Together we are facing an exceptional situation indeed. The year 2020 has proven itself to be a year of re-evaluation and challenge to everyone This global pandemic is affecting all of our families, communities, businesses, the world as a whole and our very way of life. We here at IAT pray for your community's health and safety.

We would like to convey our heartfelt gratitude to your community for the precious support you have extended to our programs over the years. The compassion you have shown will ensure a better future for all of the children you have helped. Your support isn't just monetary but builds a bridge for these children to walk towards a life with more opportunity and capabilities, with less discontentment and regrets. We would like to update you on how we are approaching this current situation in regard to your sponsored students, Zeah Mae Paclay, Analiza Macad and their respective families.

Local public busses and jeepneys are still not operating and so getting around is very challenging. Elderly persons and children under 18 have been prohibited by quarantine regulations to leave their home area. In regard to IAT students, staff have been visiting them in their villages to deliver their allowance

and help them with letter writing to their sponsors. We hope the following letter from Analiza helps to give you insight into how she and her family have been coping during this challenging time. IAT staff having also been attempting to make videos as they visit the students as a positive way for you

to visually experience the children's lives in their home environment. Hopefully, these will be available for your viewing in the not too distant future.

The following was written by Analiza over the past few month....

A very sweet greeting to you my sponsors at Quadra Island. I do hope you are doing well and staying in good health.

In our community we are still following social distancing and the healthy protocols to avoid transmission of the virus. Many of the establishments here are closed and if anyone goes to a public place, they must wear a mask and faceshield and only go there to buy important things. Our Barangay officials and health workers are strict and do not allow those under 18 or senior citizens to go outside of their area. As of now, Covid-19 cases here are decreasing and there are 1 or 2 cases reported in our area each week and many are recovering too. Unlike the past few months where there were 10-15 cases every day. Anyway, I just hope this will end soon.

During my extra long vacation due to Covid 19 I spent the whole time helping my parents at home doing household chores and going to our swedden garden where we planted beans and palay (rice). I see my parents working so hard and I always say to myself that I will do my best to pursue my dreams in order to help them and even my siblings in reading and writing. This is one way of bonding as I share stories with them.

With regard to school, I am now in grade 8. We cannot have face to face classes due to the pandemic. The Department of Education announced that we will now learn through modulars and some on line classes. I expect this kind of learning will be difficult for me but I will try to adjust and do my best with the modular activities even without the presence of my teacher. I am hoping I can understand the lessons because I have a small sibling who may disturb me at home. Still I will try to do my best. Now the IAT social worker was able to get a travel permit to go visit IAT students and she picked up this letter that I am writing to you so that I can share about my studies and family situation.

My dear sponsors, I really hope you enjoy reading my letter and thank-you so much for your generosity. It is a big help to me and my family. Stay safe always!
