

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Friday Flicks: Jan 24 & Feb 7

JANUARY 24: ALL WE IMAGINE AS LIGHT

(France, India, Netherlands, Luxembourg, Italy in Malayalam and Hindi), Friday Flicks' second film of the spring series, rolls on January 24 at the Quadra Community Centre. Doors and concession open at 7:30, showtime 7:45.

Writer-director Payal Kapadia's fiction feature debut follows two women at turning points. Moving from urban bustle to seaside idyll, All We Imagine as Light locates dreamlike reverie in emotional shifts and everyday experiences. Prabha (Kani Kusruti) and Anu (Divya Prabha) are roommates and nurses at a Mumbai hospital. Prabha is married, but her husband went abroad to work many years ago. Now drifting into middle age, she focuses on her job. Anu, by contrast, is young and full of dreams for her future, which she hopes will include the handsome Muslim boy she's secretly seeing.

Far from the city's perpetual clamour, the women's feelings and sense of life's possibilities are given free rein. Working again with cinematographer Ranabir Das, Kapadia crafts exquisite beauty from images as simple as people wending through a crowded marketplace or women retrieving laundry from a rooftop clothesline. Yet for all the rapturous visuals, nothing in this heartfelt film is more striking than seeing Prabha and Anu forging their connection. Their sisterhood emerges slowly and is all the more moving for its measured pace.

FEBRUARY 7: GHOSTLIGHT (USA). A

melancholic middle-aged construction worker, finds himself drifting from his wife and daughter after his son's suicide, he discovers community and purpose in a local theatre's production of Romeo and Juliet. But as the drama on stage starts to mirror his own life, he finds the tragedies of the play too close to his own. "Funny and heartwarming." (TIFF)

Ghostlight is an authentic and powerful film that earns the tears and moments of joy through the reality that its cast brings to it, and through the sincerity of its portrayal of the ways families alternately hurt each other and lift each other up. It's a classically dramatic story with a sense of grand theatricality, yet it remains rooted in real life – for me, it stands as a true classic for the ages. (Patrick Gibbs)

Investing in a Safer Future: A Replacement Fire Hall #2 for Heriot Bay

A REPLACEMENT FIRE HALL IS NEEDED IN HERIOT BAY

The South Quadra Island Fire Protection District has been working for the past few years on a plan to improve the safety and functionality of the fire hall in Heriot Bay. The current hall was built in 1970 to meet the urgent need for a fire hall in Heriot Bay. The needs of the community and standards for fire halls have changed significantly since then. The hall in Heriot Bay is no longer safe, adequate, or compliant with current standards

We initially looked at retrofitting and renovating the existing fire hall. However, we determined that this is not practical given the age and construction of the building, seismic issues (it is unlikely to survive an earthquake), the lack of water and septic on site, and the fact that the lot is quite small and leased.

In 2021 we purchased land for a replacement fire hall at 1525 West Road in Heriot Bay, across the street from the current hall. Now we need to build the replacement hall. To do that, we propose to borrow the funds to finance construction. We know that the longer we wait to build, the more costly it will be.

HOW MUCH WILL A REPLACEMENT FIRE HALL COST?

The cost of building a replacement Fire Hall #2 is estimated to be \$2,900,000 if we commence construction in 2025. This budget was created based on current market prices for a hall that will cover the basics required for modern day fire halls, while also considering the future needs of a growing population. It will not be fancy or frilly.

The design of the replacement fire hall is based on similar fire halls throughout Vancouver Island and will meet current building and seismic post-disaster standards while providing much needed space for fire fighting apparatus and equipment. It will survive an earthquake and be available for use as a Command Centre during a major emergency. It should be completed by 2027 and last at least 50 years.

HOW WILL WE PAY FOR THE REPLACEMENT FIRE HALL?

We need to borrow money to pay for the construction of the hall. Capital grants are not available to Fire Protection Districts and the cost is simply too much for us to fundraise, though any donations we do receive will be used to reduce the amount of the loan.

The loan would be repaid through property taxes. The properties within the South Quadra Island Fire Protection District would pay an estimated \$23.50 per \$100,000 of taxable property value per year. This would start in the month of July following the completion of construction, so not for a few years. The term of the loan would be a maximum of 20 years. Property owners outside the Fire Protection District would not be impacted. If you would like to view a map of the District please go to www.qifirehall2.ca/map.

WHAT DO I DO IF I OPPOSE THE BORROWING OF FUNDS TO BUILD THE HALL?

Before we borrow the money, we are asking for the approval of eligible property owners in the South Quadra Island Fire Protection District through an Alternative Approval Process (AAP). This means that if you oppose the borrowing of funds to build a replacement fire hall #2 in Heriot Bay, you can register your opposition by signing and sending in an Owner Response Form. Forms can be sent, by email or mail, between February 20th and the deadline of Thursday, March 27th, 2025 at midnight.

Who can submit an Owner Response Form? Any property owner within the Fire Protection District boundaries who is a Canadian citizen,

over the age of 18, has been a BC resident for at least six months prior to the date they sign the Form, and is entitled to vote in British Columbia, is eligible to submit a Form. This includes owners who live on their property that is within the Fire Protection District boundaries, as well as non-resident property owners who live elsewhere in BC. Owner representatives are also eligible if they are Canadian citizens, over the age of 18, entitled to vote in British Columbia, and EITHER an authorized agent of a board or corporation that owns property in the District, OR an authorized agent of any person who has died, become insolvent, or is incapacitated, and owns property in the District.

If ten percent of eligible property owners (or 167 people) submit Owner Response Forms, the Board of Trustees cannot proceed with borrowing the funds to build a replacement Fire Hall #2 in Heriot Bay. If the borrowing of funds is not approved through the AAP, the Board of Trustees may proceed with holding a Referendum or a Special Meeting at a later date.

Starting on February 20th, 2025, Information Packages and Owner Response Forms will be available between 9:00 am and 3:00 pm, Monday to Thursday (unless staff are responding to an emergency), at Fire Hall #1, 844 Heriot Bay Rd in Quathiaski Cove. The Information Package and Form can also be downloaded at www.qifirehall2.ca starting on February 20th.

HOW CAN I SUPPORT THIS IMPORTANT PROJECT?

for Residents of Quadra Island

QUADRA ISLAND Health Society, as a member of the Discovery Islands Community Health Centre planning team, is hosting presentations by Marguerite Vickery, our project lead, and Val St John and Catherine Aw, leaders from BC Association of Community Health Centres.

All of the above are partners of the DICHC planning team along with reps from both First Nations groups on Quadra and Cortes, Cortes CH Association, SNCA at Surge, QI Health Society, and the Primary Care Network from CR Division of Family Practice.

These presentations are about the DICHC project to develop an application to the Ministry of Health for a multi campus CHC using the present health facilities and programs already in place on our islands, and about Community Health Centres in BC in general.

Presentations will be made at separate times on Quadra, Read and Cortes over two days, January 29 and 30.

The Team will do a presentation at Surge Narrows for outer Islanders on Wednesday and then travel back to QI by private boat. The Cortes presentation will be on Thursday January 30 on Cortes.

QICSS & Covenants

QUADRA ISLAND CONSERVANCY and

Stewardship Society, also known as QICSS, is a land trust which owns the property on Morte Lake, and is in the process of constructing a greenhouse at the school for native plant propagation. QICSS also has the ability to hold covenants on privately owned land.

Covenants are a useful tool which a land owner can place on their land to protect aspects such as ecosystems, wetlands, trees, organic farming, trails, etc from being tampered with from now and into the future. A covenant is a legal designation which is registered with the BC land title office and is attached to the property. As such it applies to any future landowners in perpetuity and can only be modified by mutual consent of the covenant holder (QICSS) and the land owner.

As a charity, QICSS can also offer tax receipts for any reduction in assessed value of the property due to the implementation of environmental covenants, such as "cannot develop a wetland."

QICSS holds covenants on a number of properties on Quadra and the adjacent islands and monitors these covenants on a regular basis. 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REGIONAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Hello,

This report updates on Trespass Act provisions which may affect you and an upcoming online public hearing for a Zoning Bylaw amendment application in Bute Inlet.

PRIVATE PROPERTY SIGNAGE

Many islanders have wooded land which may or may not have fencing or signage to indicate that it is private property – this information may be of interest to you. Recently an island property owner brought to my attention concerns regarding hunting on private property and highlighted some learning that others may benefit from. The information I'm sharing here I learned through conversation with Conservation Officers.

When Conservation Officers (& RCMP) are asked to investigate trespassing issues regarding hunting on undeveloped private land they are guided by the Trespass Act. Wooded or undeveloped private property needs to meet the threshold of the Trespass Act for enforcement. If land isn't enclosed by a fence, it must have clearly visible and legible signs which prohibit trespass posted in each area where a person may ordinarily access the land. This signage needs to be visible in areas which share a lot line with Crown/public land, through which someone may be travelling.

In addition to the Trespass Act is the Wildlife Act, which states there is no open hunting season for any species of wildlife within 100m of a home, farm building occupied by people or domestic animals, church, school building, school yard, playground or regional district park. These restrictions are important to community safety, we know Quadra Island has many residential nodes which back onto forest, woodlot and tree farm license.

PUBLIC HEARING FOR BUTE INLET AMENDMENT APPLICATION

Bylaw 586 proposes to amend the Quadra Island Zoning Bylaw for an application in Bear Bay, Bute Inlet (the Quadra Island Zoning Bylaw includes all the islands & inlets in Area C other than those included in the Desolation Sound Rural Land Use Bylaw).

Bylaw 586 proposes to rezone two adjoining parcels of land totalling 56 acres and an associated foreshore Crown tenure from Rural Three (RU-3) and Access Two (AC2) to Commercial Two D (C-2D) and Marine Commercial One (MC-1). This would legalize the existing use and buildings associated with the resort (operating for 25+ years), allow for additional lodging, and permit helicopter fuel sales.

Due to the remote location of the application, staff proposed an online Public Hearing as the best option to accommodate adjacent property owners and those in the Outer Discovery Islands and Mainland Inlets area who may be most impacted by the amendment. The online Public Hearing is scheduled for Wednesday February 5 at 7pm.

Please visit srd.ca/government/land-use-bylaw-meetings/ for complete information on the application and login info for the Public Hearing, which will be posted at least seven days prior to February 5th.

STRATHCONA GARDENS

Our community is engaged on this topic! Many folks are concerned with the potential for Area C ratepayers to be taxed for Strathcona Gardens: I'm receiving calls & letters sharing a range of concerns and have also heard of activities afoot. The Board has yet to receive the 'additional recreation participation report' and no further steps have been taken by the Board. I'll continue to report on this process as it unfolds.

Update from The Philippines

AS MANY OF YOU are aware, Quadra islanders have been supporting the education of two young girls in a remote area of the northern Philippines over the past years, through the International Association for Transformation. (IAT). The founder of IAT, David Durrance tells us that "Part of IAT's activities in the Philippines involves having several of our sponsored students participate in a Summer Literacy Program whereby they take some training and then volunteer to spend a month in one of the remotest villages to teach the elementary students. Many of these small village schools have poorly trained teachers and children who irregularly attend classes because their parents need them to work in the fields or gather edible plants in the forests for the family meals. And therefore, many of their children struggle to learn the basics. The SLP not only greatly helps the village kids but serves our student volunteers to develop their confidence, competence, patience, leadership, planning and ability to work as a team. Analiza Macad, one of the students that Quadra has been sponsoring, volunteered to teach this past August. Your support is making a great difference to her life. As we move into the new year, she shares with us a very exciting and rewarding experience from the past year!"

Here is her story:

I am Analiza D. Macad, IAT scholar now in grade 11 and also an SLP Volunteer teacher deployed in Balawag, Tabuk Kalinga. As a first-time teacher, I felt a rush of emotions. For me being a teacher was not easy, because a teacher is not just an instructor but a guide, mentor and supporter. A teacher helps their students navigate their educational journey, inspiring them to achieve their full potential. It was challenging to me, but I am so lucky to be involved and have this opportunity I was eager to teach but also worried about meeting the expectations of my students and the community.

I never expected that I would become a teacher for one month. This program has given me a chance to grow and learn so much. On my first day in Balawag, I was unfamiliar with the area, so I relied on my group for guidance. We conducted house-to-house visits to inform everyone about our program. It was heartwarming to see the excitement in the children's faces.

We dedicated our time to teaching the children how to read, write, sing, and dance, among other activities. I proved to myself that I could share my knowledge and inspire the children to study. It was a profound

realization that I could teach and motivate these young minds. Living in a new place for a month and teaching the local children was an unforgettable experience. Many community members expressed their gratitude, saying our program was much needed. The children, who had been spending their summer idly, were now engaged in learning. We focused on teaching them to write their names and read, and their progress was remarkable. Seeing their improvement and discovering their talents brought me joy.



I experienced a range of emotions that inspired me to continue teaching, even when I faced challenges. Children's smiles and eagerness to learn motivated me to continue. Despite the emotional challenges, there were times I felt like giving up, but knowing I was making a difference in the children's lives helped me persevere. The support and gratitude from the parents and community members were also encouraging.

Before I went to teach in the community, I was a person who could not be separated from my family, but in the place where I was deployed, many people welcomed us, so all those worries of being away from family were replaced with the joy of being welcomed and feeling belonged. My shyness gradually disappeared, and I started talking. This is the best thing that has ever happened to help me bring out an outgoing attitude.

Volunteering is about willingly helping others without expecting anything in return. It requires strength, patience, and self-confidence. As a volunteer teacher, I've learned that these qualities are essential in making a positive impact and fostering growth in the community. I am so grateful for the continuing support of the Quadra community for my education that enabled me to have this worthwhile and heart warming experience! - submitted by Carol Foort

Draft Active Transportation Network Plan

THE SRD (Strathcona Regional District) is pleased to announce the release of the draft Active Transportation Network Plan (ATNP) for Electoral Area C focused on enhancing transportation options for residents through walking, cycling, and wheeling. This initiative is supported by funding from the Province of BC's Active Transportation Infrastructure Grants Program, which aligns with the CleanBC commitment to increase alternative transportation solutions.

The draft ATNP provides a strategy to improve active transportation conditions on Quadra Island and its connections to outer communities that align with the policy goals, objectives and targets that are most important to the community. The draft plan identifies and maps out priority network improvement projects aimed at increasing safety, removing or minimizing barriers, and facilitating connectivity across the community for people walking, cycling, and wheeling.

Developed through engagement with the public, key interest groups, and First Nations, the plan includes:

- Electoral Area C's community profile and existing active transportation conditions and infrastructure
- Vision and goals for the long-term active transportation network
- Long-term active transportation network map
- Priority corridors and projects
- Priority spot and infrastructure projects
- Funding and partnership opportunities The SRD is conducting a second round of engagements to ensure the draft ATNP reflects the needs and aspirations of the community. Public input received will help refine the draft ATNP and prioritize projects for future investment, including the selection of one top priority project to apply for funding through the B.C. Active Transportation Infrastructure Grant program.

THE QUADRA PROJECT

Changes Causing Changes

WE LIVE IN A TIME of rapid change. Such periods have been recorded in our earlier history, but nothing quite compares to the present. If this change could be represented in a graph, it would indicate a nearly vertical rise in almost everything from technology and population to species extinction and climate change. We are remaking the world, from the micro to the macro, with consequences that are unprecedented.

Two book reviews in the Atlantic magazine of December 2021 by Rebecca Giggs identify some of these changes. The first, which deals with the micro, is by Thor Hanson: *Hurricane Lizards and Plastic Squid: The Fraught and Fascinating Biology of Climate Change.* These are some of the changes that he identifies:

- Anole lizards living in the Turks and Caicos Islands of the Caribbean have developed larger feet and toe pads to keep them from being blown away by increasingly frequent storms.
- Lizards are "heliotherms", that is, they regulate body temperature by moving in and out of sunshine. Too much heat and they have to spend excessive amounts of time in the shade. This can so reduce their food intake and impair their reproduction that they eventually become extinct.
- The Humboldt squid was thought to have disappeared from the Gulf of Mexico after a protracted hot spell in 2009 2010. The squid, however, remained profuse, but the species had shrunk to a fraction of its size, lived only half as long, and so radically changed its diet that it didn't look or behave like the previous version of itself.
- Finches in cities have developed shorter wings for greater manoeuvrability because they have to fly shorter distances and avoid

more obstacles in their urban environment.

- Bird mating calls of urban species have changed pitch so they can be better heard amid the din of city noise.
- Male stickleback fish are losing their colourful attractive mating scales because such displays can't be seen by females in murky industrial water.
- Owls in Finland are developing more brown than white camouflage to adapt to the reduced snowfall.
- Peppered moths in industrialized England that turned darker in the 19th century sooty air are becoming lighter again as the air clears.
- Some Australian cities have more endangered species living in them than in the surrounding countryside.
- Raccoons and coyotes are thriving in Canadian cities, while leopards in Singapore and Mumbai survive in the city's adjoining parks by foraging nightly in the urban areas for domestic animals.

Change on a macro scale is addressed by Rob Dunn in *A Natural History of the Future: What the Laws of Biology Tell Us About the Destiny of the Human Species:*

- "More than half the Earth is now covered by ecosystems we have created." Animals have to live somewhere or perish, so they adapt. The ecologies that we have created have become biological experiments equivalent to Darwin's Galapagos Islands.
- "The minimum area for a snail to evolve a new species is tiny—less than a square kilometre, roughly the size of Tesla's factory in Fremont, California."
- The range of bedbugs, houseflies, centipedes, rats, bats, pigeons, parrots, crows, cockroaches, fungi, ants, and spiders are all expanding to live in the environments that we have created. We also move them around the planet, thanks to our transportation systems.

As we change environments, they, in turn, change us and how we live. Some shorelines have become unsafe places to live due to rising ocean levels and storm surges. The increasing intensity of rainfalls is making river valleys prone to flooding and hillsides subject to landslides. Even villages, towns and cities are experiencing unanticipated deluges that inundate streets, shops, homes and subways—note Valencia in Spain where cars were being washed down its streets by a year's rainfall in a day. And once appealing places to live, such as Florida, are now being so buffeted by the intensity and frequency of storms that people are leaving—some had escaped to the Appalachian states where they were recently devastated by a deluge of 150 trillion litres of rain, the equivalent volume of 60 million olympic swimming pools of water. Other places, once prized for their warm and dry summer weather, are becoming too drought stressed and too hot for comfort.

Escaping the ravages of climate change is becoming more and more difficult. We have chosen places to live, established our farms and towns and cities, and built the appropriate infrastructure for all this to function within a limited range of circumstances. When these circumstances change, the lottery can provide the losers with disruptive and expensive surprises.

Humans can only live within a narrow range of temperatures. We are already heating the planet sufficiently that some places are barely habitable. In six decades, assuming greenhouse gas emissions peak by 2050, 1.5 billion people are expected to be outside this "human niche" boundary where they can survive and prosper. If emissions continue at their present rate, then this population will swell to 3.5 billion.

We are setting in motion changes that we were warned about, but they didn't register or were never believed. And, sadly, in both micro and macro measures, they are arriving sooner than all the models have predicted.

So, why would such vague statements resonate with many people when basic critical thinking should prompt us to demand more information? What is common sense anyway?

Webster defines it as "sound and prudent but often unsophisticated judgement", and "the unreflective opinions of ordinary men". Most of us consider ourselves to be ordinary people, and believe we possess common sense, but is this enough to convince us that these ambiguous policies will align with our needs and values without understanding their contents?

By definition common sense should enable us to make sensible decisions in our everyday lives. Put on your boots and coat before you go out in the snow, don't stick your finger in the light socket when the switch is on. But is this common sense all that's required for governments to create policy about complex social issues, climatechange or the efficacy of a particular vaccine? It's likely no substitute for knowledge acquired by experience, diligent and open-minded study and meaningful consultation.

It's essential that we call out vague claims and demand an explanation of what is contained in any policy promised by any politician. Democracy requires us to remain informed, ask questions and, well, use some common sense.

Anyone under 35 may not be aware of the years of intense lobbying by such notable people as former Liberal cabinet minister Lloyd Axworthy and Princess Diana which resulted in the passage of the 1997 Ottawa Treaty – the Convention on the Prohibition of the use, stockpiling, production and transfer of anti-personnel mines. This treaty prohibits the use of landmines. 164 nations signed the Ottawa Treaty except for China, the Russian Federation and ... the United States!

Landmines are explosive weapons that are concealed or camouflaged in the ground and designed to detonate when triggered. Anti-personnel landmines take as little as five pounds of pressure to detonate often maining or killing the person or animal that steps on one.

Land mines kill long after the conflict has ended. There are as many as 45 to 50 million anti-personnel landmines scattered in 82 countries. They kill or maim 300 to 400 people every week.

Open Letter to the Board:

I AM AGAINST the inclusion of Area C in the Strathcona Gardens service area expansion.

On Quadra Island, we have the Quadra Community Centre serving the local community in a myriad of entertainment, social and recreational services. It is extraordinarily well utilized and serves as a clear hub of community activity. In the outer islands Surge Narrows is the vibrant equivalent. Although noticeably different, they are the same, creating highly valued community outreach and serving a significant number of Area C residents.

Strathcona Gardens has amenities we do not but therein lies the point. Living on the islands is different. The majority of residents are here to prove our independence and predominantly live a rural lifestyle more in tune with our surroundings. If a pool and a skating surface were paramount in our lives, we would have chosen to live elsewhere.

Area D and the City of Campbell River pay a hefty price for the privilege of having Strathcona Gardens as an approved service within their communities. As the sole participants to this service, SRD Board members from Area D and the City of Campbell River were presented with three price staggered renovation options to revitalize their facility and then selected the most expensive proposal. No one else from the board was allowed to vote and jurisdictionally speaking, that is correct as no other area pays taxes into the service. This is a key point.

Only the tax paying participants were involved in the decision. Now, Area C may be faced with the dilemma of the SRD pursuing a service area expansion featuring the overly expensive renovation financing as well as annual ongoing administrative and operational costs as dictated by the Strathcona Gardens Commission. If the SRD is successful, this will be the most expensive Area C tax increase ever faced.

Long before considering a tax for a luxury item service, we should be addressing fundamental community issues. Affordable housing, centralized water, sewer services, garbage pick up, street lighting, etc.

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Some regions of Area C do not even have a fire service. These utilitarian amenities are enjoyed by most communities but are generally lacking in Area C.

If you add the convenient inconvenience of ferry transportation, travel time and expense, Strathcona Gardens becomes even more prohibitive but in particular for outer islanders and Quadra's outlying communities.

Area C has existing hand built, community built, recreation and service facilities. The residents of Area C make great use of these and are proud of what they offer. There is a very small percentage of Strathcona Gardens users from Area C. They would be happy to pay an out of area user fee for access.

To make this decision without direct consultation is unconscionable. To make the renovation project scope and budget decision without Area C community engagement and then perpetually saddle them with the extravagance is unethical. To be clear, it is considered taxation without representation. Even the City of Victoria chose to conduct a referendum on their Crystal Garden pool project which has been in debate for years. Where is our stand-alone Area C referendum?

SRD: Please Stop!

The 250 residents of the Outer Discovery Islands take a minimum of 2.5 to 3 hours just to travel to Campbell River and, of course, require the same hours to get home. 'Home', by the way, is one of four remote islands without ANY services. Small boat access only. The SRD, after years of studying the issue, refused to even provide a single dumpster twice a year for garbage removal. They claimed it was simply too difficult for them to manage. We do not have a paved road. We do not have BC Hydro power. We do not even have a store. And, clearly, we do not have much of a voice in our tragically out-of-touch local government.

But the SRD is going to build a new pool and skating rink in Campbell River anyway and add our remote community to the tax roll. We, it seems, are going to help pay for this monument to stupidity and selfishness. Few septuagenarians are ever going to travel five to six hours by small boat and 4x4 to lounge in the pool, and virtually none will be playing hockey. The NOT-to-be taxed community of Sayward (a 56 minute drive to the north) and the exempted community of Courtenay/Comox (50 minutes to the south) can much more reasonably and even frequently access the proposed Strathcona Gardens facility exponentially easier than can we.

You are also unfairly taxing a community where many live well below the poverty line. You are going after the old and poor. Despicable in the extreme.

Urban-coddled bureaucrats and politicians living minutes away from the facility and making hundreds of thousands a year off the taxpaying public need to start better serving the people rather than just themselves. This is taxation by tyranny. You should all be ashamed.


