SRD Board approves Active Transportation Network Plan for Area C

Campbell River, BC – The Strathcona Regional District (SRD) is excited to share its first ever Active Transportation Network Plan (ATNP) for Electoral Area C! Developed in collaboration with community members, key interest groups, and We Wai Kai First Nation, the ATNP presents a long-term network plan supported by implementation actions to guide potential future investment opportunities in active transportation infrastructure. ATNP policy directions will also inform updates to the Area C Official Community Plan.

This initiative combined data collection and analysis with a two-phased public engagement process to better understand existing network gaps and establish priorities for advancing active transportation opportunities. Several key themes emerged through community consultation, including:

Barriers to walking and cycling: Inadequate roadside shoulders, blind corners, narrow lanes, steep terrains, vehicle traffic, speed limits, and a lack of dedicated active transportation infrastructure all present barriers to walking and cycling;

A need for greater connectivity across Quadra Island: A desire for increased connectivity between key Quadra Island neighbourhoods, community destinations, and commercial hubs such as Quathiaski Cove and Heriot Bay, as well as improved trail conditions;

Improved connections with other travel modes: Safe and efficient active transportation connections to Quathiaski Cove and Heriot Bay ferry terminals are critical to the community; and

Maintain and enhance community character: There is community interest to improve active transportation infrastructure that contributes to the local rural character.

The Active Transportation Network Plan identified six priority corridor improvement projects between Heriot Bay Rd and Rebecca Spit Rd, Quathiaski Cove Rd and Harper Rd, and along Green Rd from Quathiaski Cove to Cape Mudge. Community feedback indicated strong support for both Heriot Bay – Rebecca Spit and Quathiaski Cove Village connections as the most immediate need. The 450 m stretch between the Quathiaski ferry terminal to Harper Road was selected for future application to the Province of BC's Active Transportation Infrastructure Grant Program, as it fits the closest with the Grant Program criteria and commuter needs, while also aligning with active transportation priorities of the We Wai Kai First Nation.

"Big thanks to the many community members who participated in this important project" said Electoral Area C Director, Robyn Mawhinney. "Your opinions were integral to identifying active transportation priorities on Quadra Island. It's excellent to know what our community priorities are and I'm excited to move forward with next steps to improving access for pedestrians, cyclists and self-propelled commuters."



This project was supported by funding from the Province of BC's Active Transportation Infrastructure Grants Program, which aligns with the CleanBC commitment to increase alternative transportation solutions.







What Do I Want From My Computer?

A Journey Through Technology and Everyday Life - Part 1

Today, computers are everywhere — even in places you wouldn't expect! Your microwave, your car, your washing machine, and even the little remote you may use to unlock your car all have tiny computers inside. A lot of places don't even answer the phone anymore — instead, a recording tells you to visit their website. That can be really frustrating if you don't have a computer or internet.

This is the first of three articles where I will share some digital insights. Later I will describe the devices we can use to connect with the online world and I will focus on some of the tools and information Quadra Literacy (QL) can provide for you.

Digital Survival:

So, what do we actually need computers and the internet for? Well, let me share some of my favorite uses for mine. I do most of my banking online, file my taxes online, keep a calendar to track work meetings and personal stuff, read the news to see what's happening around the world, book appointments, and attend online meetings for work — something that became super popular during the COVID pandemic.

And let's not forget about the entertainment value! I watch movies and TV shows through Netflix, use YouTube to learn how to fix things, and of course, I can't resist scrolling through Facebook to check out my friends' lives and laugh at some funny memes.

And if I have a question, I just type it into Google! (For example: "What bands did Steve Winwood play in?") The internet helps answer almost any question you can think of. Pretty amazing, right?

When it comes to replacing your outdated device the choices can be confusing and overwhelming. Quadra Literacy is here to help you figure out what device and operating system is perfect for you to stay connected. This can be as simple as giving your current computer a makeover to make it more useful for years to come. Or replacing your computer with an affordable, refurbished laptop. Discovery Islands Chamber Hosts Candidates Forum

Described by some of the 180 attendees as "well-organized and informative," the Quadra Island Federal All Candidates Forum took place on April 24 at the Quadra Island Community Centre, hosted by the Discovery Islands Chamber of Commerce.

Candidates participating in the forum included Tanille Johnston (NDP), Jennifer Lash (Liberal), Jessica Wegg (Green Party), and Independent Glen Staples. Notably absent was Conservative Party candidate Aaron Gunn, prompting a few attendees to leave early upon learning he would not be present.

Before the formal proceedings began, candidates engaged with community members at their information tables, while the open doors of the community centre welcomed the warm spring evening air.

Once on stage, each candidate shared their background and vision for Canada. Moderator Sarah Bradshaw then facilitated a Q&A session, fielding questions from the audience. Bradshaw later described the event as a resounding success, praising the candidates for being "eloquent and very respectful of each other and the audience."

"It gave us a chance to meet the candidates and get a clearer understanding of where they stand," said Quadra resident Dan Mooney, who also appreciated the lighter moments throughout the evening. For those unable to attend in person, the event was live streamed with technical support from ICAN's coordinator Melissa McKinney and audio expert Chris Thompson. Special thanks were given to Robyn Mawhinney for designing the event poster.

"It was a fabulous example of teamwork in action," said Chamber President Carol Ann Terreberry.

Let's keep the conversation going. Perhaps we will see you on May 7th. -Quadra Island Foundation





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

Truly, Rudi's journey from deathbed to the final resting place was respectful, compassionate, and efficient.

My family and I are incredibly grateful to the many who were involved, but naming names might mean an accidental oversight--you all know who you are and I hope you know our deep appreciation. Quadra Island - Birding Big DayPart of the 11th annual Global Big Day



May 10, 2025 A full day of spotting birds on Quadra Island!

The idea is to see and record as many species as possible within the 24 hour period. This is a part of a Global Big Day,

timed for peak spring migration the second Saturday in May in the Northern Hemisphere. The October Big Day, also the second Saturday of the month, gives the Southern Hemisphere a turn to tally their spring migration and for us to participate in autumn birding in our hemisphere. Birders will be busy all over the globe on both days! For now we're focussing on May 10th, Quadra Island (and Global) Birding Big Day.

Last year's event set a world record for bird data collection in a single day. Over 63,000 birders compiled more than 156,000 checklists in 203 countries. 13,581 of these checklists were submitted from Canada! A record 7,847 species were documented. Let's see how many we can come up with on our island!

To participate:

- Get out and look for birds!
- Keep a careful list of what you see
- Report your results...

There will be prizes!

You can enter the Quadra event, individually or as teams (maximum 4 participants and counting together).

The categories include:

- Backyard Birds spotted from a single location (within a 10 meter radius, eg. in your yard)
- Unmotorized transport limited to foot, bike, horse..... no motors!
- Open anywhere on Quadra, any form of transportation
- Youth birders 16 and under
- Bird Photo (or Birder!) must be taken during this 24 hour period - pictures of birds or of people looking at birds.

Photo categories include:

Smart or cell phone,

Compact/digital/point-and-shoot/bridge Digital SLR & mirrorless

How It Works

- no need to pre-register just get out and look for birds!
- keep a list of the species you see (and correctly identify)
- binoculars and spotting scopes are ok
- birds positively identified by sound may be counted
- no audio lures, please
- for unusual or rare species, please add a few notes of documentation: description of the bird, the location/habitat where it was seen, who else saw it, etc
- this event relies on the honour system so please be honourable...

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REGIONAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Hello!

Sun and showers for a cascade of May flowers! This Director's Report is rather brief, an update which shares news from the April 23 Board meeting.

VILLAGE BAY LAKE PAYPHONE RESEARCH CONTINUES

The loss of the Village Bay Lake payphone is significant for the Village Bay Lake Family Water Society, which represents 75+ recreational property owners who are 'very concerned about the lack of telephone access in the event of an emergency.'

In October the Board supported allocating staff time to report on options for reliable telephone service to the Village Bay Lakes area. The resulting report, received at the April 23 Board meeting, states that "through conversations with Telus it appears the decision to discontinue the payphone service at Village Bay Lakes was undertaken as part of a larger corporate program of service reductions based on economics... and it is unlikely that Telus would be interested in reinstatement of the service without a change in the economic circumstances".

After some discussion, the Board supported staff to continue researching, to determine the costs of reinstating or maintaining a phone service at Village Bay Lake.

REGIONAL SERVICE REPORTS

I don't always write about reports which have been requested by the Board: it is often months before they are brought back, and the learning is what's included within. However, it may interest residents of Area C that April 23 there were motions for three reports supported by a majority of the Board: a report regarding a Regional Tourism Service; another regarding a Regional Arts and Culture Service; and a third regarding municipalities participation in land use and regional planning. I'll be sure to provide updates on these as the reports are written and returned to the

Board. Visit srd.ca/government/agendasminutes/ to access minutes of previous Board & Committee meetings — these documents include direct links to the staff reports.

UPCOMING VIRTUAL PUBLIC HEARING

The SRD has received an application for a site-specific rezoning which would, if adopted, permit rural liquor sales and/or a microbrewery accessory to the principal use at Fisherman's Landing Lodge in Cordero Channel. A virtual Public Hearing is scheduled for May 7 at 7pm. The Hearing is being held virtually to make it more accessible for those who live near the remote location to weigh in. 

Nature is Big Business: Conservation is key economic driver in BC amid global uncertainty

The resource economy isn't Canada's only trophy. Rising demand for ecotourism makes nature the province's most precious and profitable asset.

Vancouver, BC — April 24, 2025 — As economic uncertainty continues and political unpredictability rises, British Columbia's greatest asset may well be its super, natural spaces.

According to the Tourism Industry Association of BC (TIABC), the tourism sector — underpinned by nature-based experiences — contributes \$22 billion to the provincial visitor economy.

"Investing in BC's natural ecosystems isn't just good for the environment — it's a sound economic strategy," said Walt Judas, CEO of TIABC.
"Nature supports more jobs and long-term economic value than any other sector in our province."

"Nature is the foundation for our economic and community wellbeing," said Tori Ball, Conservation Director at Canadian Parks and Wilderness Society, BC. "Prioritizing conservation and keeping our commitments to protect ecosystems will have guaranteed return for the future of British Columbians."

Protecting more of the land and waters that underpin the province's prosperity also allows for nature-based tourism to flourish – the cornerstone of a sustainable and resilient provincial economy. The health of this critical resource is essential not just for tourism but also for job creation in rural and urban communities. According to 2023 figures, the BC visitor economy employs more than 126,000 people – that's compared to just over 29,000 jobs created by the mining, oil and gas extraction industry.

"Canada and BC are in a consequential moment. We have the choice to shape the type of province we want to hand to our children," said Ball. "We know that people want a high quality of life that includes intact ecosystems and protected nature. Keeping Super, Natural BC a viable and enduring asset means sustaining a healthy environment that attracts tourism and supports outdoor recreation."

From breathtaking wilderness to Indigenous-led eco-tourism, BC's natural beauty is drawing Canadians who are staying closer to home, as well as travelers from around the world who are choosing to redirect their US vacation plans. Recent trends show a strong uptick in travel bookings across the province. According to a summer travel outlook released by Deloitte Canada, 74% of Canadians plan to travel domestically for their major vacation.

"Canadians are reconnecting with travel at home, and interest in authentic Indigenous experiences is growing," said Chris Tait, Tourism Manager at Klahoose Wilderness Resort. "Bookings in all our key markets are up this season, including from Europe and the US, with domestic travel within Canada showing the largest increase year-over-year."

With international tensions continuing to mount, tough decisions lie ahead. Investing in land use planning that will deliver on BC's nature conservation commitments will also protect BC's nature economy – the innovative solution we need in these times to sustain and grow Canada's economy.

Charging ahead: BC Hydro triples its EV fast-charging network size in just one year

VANCOUVER: BC Hydro has hit a major milestone, tripling its electric vehicle (EV) public fast-charging network over the past year to 591 charging ports across B.C., installing an average of more than one port per day.

"B.C. is home to one of the fastest-growing EV communities in North America," said Adrian Dix, Minister of Energy and Climate Solutions. "With more than 98 per cent of BC Hydro's electricity generated from renewable sources, EV drivers in B.C. are driving the charge toward lower greenhouse gas emissions and a cleaner future. Together with BC Hydro and other partners, we have built one of Canada's largest public EV charging networks to help reduce range anxiety and encourage more British Columbians to make the switch to electric vehicles."

Since the early 2000s, BC Hydro has been a trailblazer in promoting EV adoption in the province. Leveraging renewable and affordable electricity, the company has enabled EV drivers to cut greenhouse gas emissions by up to 70 per cent and reduce fuel costs by up to 80 per cent compared to gas-powered vehicles. With about 195,000 EVs now on B.C.'s roads, that number is projected to soar to between 700,000 and 900,000 within the next decade.

BC Hydro's new report, Driving Forward: BC Hydro's EV Charging Progress Report, highlights its decade-long efforts to build a robust EV charging network across the province. Recent milestones include:

Network expansion: In the past year alone, BC Hydro has tripled the size of its public charging network, adding 418 new charging ports.

State-of-the-art hubs: Twenty-two new hubs have opened in every region of the province, each featuring 8 to 22 charging ports, to help minimize wait times for drivers.

Next-gen fast chargers: BC Hydro deployed new 350-kilowatt chargers at some locations, capable of delivering up to 100 kilometers of range in just five minutes.

Boosted power output: The network's power output surged from 10 megawatts in April 2024 to 41 megawatts by March 2025. About 85 per cent of charging ports are fast chargers and the network supports CCS, NACS and CHAdeMO connectors.

Recognized for excellence: BC Hydro is among six public EV charging network providers in North America top-rated by ChargeHub for its excellence.

Completion of the Electric Highway: With fast chargers placed about every 150 kilometers along major routes, the Government of B.C. completed the Electric Highway in September 2024. BC Hydro operates 111 of the highway's 155 charging locations, making up more than 70 per cent of the network.

"At BC Hydro, we're proud to be a key partner with our customers as leaders in North American EV adoption," said Chris O'Riley, President and CEO of BC Hydro. "We are paving the way to a cleaner, more sustainable and convenient transportation future for British Columbians through investments in infrastructure, technology and partnerships."

Looking ahead, BC Hydro will continue to foster B.C.'s leadership in enabling the EV experience:

By spring 2026, BC Hydro aims to expand its charging network to 800 ports.

This year, BC Hydro will debut its first 400-kilowatt chargers, offering 100 kilometers of range in just three minutes.

Meet Our Young Musician!

Jack Campbell is not your typical 22-year-old.

The first thing he will tell you about himself is that he is deeply grateful for the people and opportunities that have allowed him to be where he is today. Jack is the Youth Musician at this year's Quadra Island

Festival of Chamber Music, and while notable, that does not begin to show you how unique he is. If you have read his biography on the chamber music website quadrafestival.ca you know that he has quite a collection of feathers in his cap and has performed or collaborated on many events in many countries: France, England, Switzerland, Germany, the U.S and Canada.

Like most musicians, Jack found his passion for violin at an early age. Music was a constant in his life as he grew up, surrounded by a family who sang and imparted an appreciation for the positivity and joy music brings. While in high school he started composing music and came to the realization that he wanted to be a professional violinist. He received several scholarships to UBC which enabled him to pursue his passion and he continues to study privately with artists he admires.

Jack strongly believes in the natural union of dance and music, both being intrinsically connected to humanity's historic-, ancient-, spiritual-, and social groups. He and his friend, Antony Knight (composer, creator, choreographer and performer), collaborated for a few years to produce "a piece for a quartet of modern ballet dancers working in structured improvisation and a quintet of classical instrumentalists working from a strictly notated score" to create a work they call Absence and Creation.

An entire performance concept, the Enigma Project, was birthed over a 5 year span of touring in Canada and Europe. A multidisciplinary approach created at Bletchley Park, England, devised a way to compose

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music based upon the Enigma encryption and numbers. (Codebreakers at Bletchley Park famously broke the Nazi radio codes during WWII. It was referred to as the Enigma Project.) Jack felt that a fusion of music, science, and math could be used to create pieces that link "the perils of history and culture" in a positive way. The resulting compilation is currently being performed by Jack at cities across Canada and will soon be performed in the UK and across Europe. While these two major projects would

While these two major projects would be a complete resume' in themselves, the performance of which Jack is most proud took place September, 2024, at the opening of the United Nations Summit of the Future. The summit focused on how minority groups around the world make sure their voices are heard through political, activist, social, and scientific channels. Jack was the only musician there and his program included both modern and traditional pieces from every continent – "except Antarctica. I couldn't make a sound like a penguin."

Jack feels it is of paramount importance that the classical music community embrace the creation of works that are relevant to today's world and the problems it faces. In his opinion, "artists cannot have their heads in the sand... imagination also needs to...include our current reality." He feels musicians are obligated to help make others aware of the needs of the earth and its people.



Jack's final comment: "I consider myself a very, very lucky person."

You can enjoy seeing and hearing Jack's performance on his 1897 English violin (created by a French luthier) on Monday, June 23, at 7 pm in the Quadra Island Community Centre. He will be performing a short violin suite of his own composition, and also a solo caprice by Canadian Sophie Carmen Eckhardt-Gramatte'.

The Quadra Island Festival of Chamber Music will be held on Quadra June 23-27, 2025.

Tickets are \$25 and available on Quadra at Inspirations in Quathiaski Cove or Copper Coast in Heriot Bay. Tickets are also available online at quadrafestival.ca. Children 12 and under are free with an adult so bring your little ones to be inspired by our young musician!





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
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PHILIPPINES CONNECTION

Unexpected Death and the BC Coroner Service



When someone dies suddenly it can be difficult to know what to expect. Unless there's a Notification of Expected Death in the Home or No CPR form already

in place, all deaths are treated as unexpected, and the first step is to call 911. This connects you with BC Emergency Health Services, who coordinate the response from ambulance, police, and fire.

Firefighters are often the first to arrive on the scene. They manage the situation and provide first aid, CPR, and other life-saving interventions while waiting for paramedics. When paramedics arrive, they assess the person's condition, offer emergency care and, if needed, arrange transport to a medical facility. If the person is clearly deceased or resuscitation efforts are unsuccessful, they'll notify the RCMP. When possible, the paramedics will remain with the body until the RCMP arrive.

When the RCMP arrive, they'll contact the local coroner and begin gathering medical and background information from family or others at the scene. The coroner will then determine whether they need to travel to the island to conduct an in-person investigation, or if the situation can be assessed remotely, with the RCMP assisting on-site.

If the death appears to be natural and someone is present to take responsibility for the body, the coroner will recommend the family contact a funeral home, and the RCMP will step back.

If the circumstances are unclear, suspicious, or more complex, the case is handed over to an investigative coroner. In consultation with the person's doctor and other healthcare

providers, and through a review of medical records, they work to determine or confirm the cause of death. Again, if the cause of death becomes apparent and someone is available to take responsibility, the coroner will direct the family to contact a funeral home, and the RCMP—if still present—will leave the scene.

However, if the cause of death remains unclear, or if no one is available to take responsibility for the body, the coroner will take possession. They will arrange for the body to be transported to the nearest hospital morgue with available space—which may be as far away as Nanaimo. In the meantime, the RCMP may remain until the transport team has removed the body. In some cases, the RCMP will secure the home and leave the body unattended, maintaining contact with the transfer team.

If the coroner determines an autopsy is required, they will arrange for it—typically in Victoria, though sometimes in Vancouver or the Lower Mainland. Once the procedure is complete, the body will be returned to the hospital morgue it was originally taken from. This process can take some time. If the cause of death is clearly identified during the autopsy, the family will be informed relatively quickly. However, if the initial findings are inconclusive, it may take a year or two for the final report to be completed and shared with the family.

Autopsies are medical procedures focused on discovering the cause of death, and as such, they can be quite invasive. The priority is understanding what happened, rather than preserving the appearance of the body. Incisions are made, and while the body is respectfully handled, it is often not restored in the way a family might hope.

If there will be a viewing, involving a funeral home can make a significant difference. They

can take the time to gently clean and care for the body, re-stitch incisions more carefully, and, if appropriate, offer embalming. They can also help prepare the family for what to expect. A compassionate funeral home can help ensure this part of the journey feels as dignified and supported as possible. When deaths are sudden, spending time with the body of the deceased can be particularly helpful.

While each procedure follows standard provincial protocols and can be difficult no matter where you are, they can feel especially hard in a rural setting like ours, where services are limited and response times can be long. It may take hours for a transport team to reach the island. Saying goodbye as a loved one is taken away in a body bag can be deeply painful. When no one is present to take responsibility for the body, communication may be delayed—both in understanding what has happened and in learning where your loved one has been taken. In some cases, a body may need to remain in the home overnight, which can be distressing, until a funeral home is able to attend.

The BC Emergency Health Services, RCMP, and BC Coroner Service all do their best to carry out their roles with care. But these systems are stretched, and families are often bewildered and caught in the gaps. This article is based on the best information I've been able to gather as it currently relates to Quadra Island, in an ever-changing landscape.

Most importantly, know that you don't have to go through this alone. These situations are not ones a grieving family should have to navigate without support. Please don't hesitate to reach out to Way To Go—we're here to help.

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New Paper Reveals Extent of Crime in Canadian Sea Cucumber Fisheries

A new research paper by the OceansAsia Research Team reveals the extent of sea cucumber fisheries. The paper, entitled "Characterizing Canadian sea cucumber fisheries: history, regulation, and compliance," was published in the 2025 issue of the Pacific Community (SPC) Bechede-mer Information Bulletin.

Sea cucumbers play important roles in marine ecosystems and are sometimes referred to as the earthworms of the sea. While these marine invertebrates are often forgotten in conversations around wildlife crime, they are highly valuable and targeted for poaching globally. A lack of attention on the part of the authorities, media, and the public leaves these animals vulnerable to organized criminal activities and overfishing.

The paper explores the history, regulation, and criminal activity within Canadian sea cucumber fisheries using data from media, legal cases, and law enforcement records between 2015 and 2022. Through this approach, researchers identified 22 cases from law enforcement records, one case from court records, and one case from news media stories. Most cases involved administrative violations like misreporting, with only a few instances of illegal fishing or quota overruns. The majority of cases occurred in British Columbia, with a peak in 2017. Legal case reviews revealed only one directly relevant case, R. v. Zhu, which involved illegal harvesting using prohibited gear, but the overall legal action has been minimal.

It is noteworthy that the paper was written prior to the recent case involving BC resident Scott Stanley Matthew Steer, who was recently found guilty on six counts relating to his illegal harvesting and selling of sea cucumbers in BC waters. The authors are available to speak to this case, sentencing is scheduled for May 1st and 2nd, 2025.

The authors concluded that when compared to case studies in other jurisdictions, crime in the Canadian sea cucumber fishery is of a lower scale and severity, and receives less media attention. The new paper fills an important and large gap in our understanding of marine wildlife crime targeting sea cucumbers in Canada, and provides context on the global trade, risks of illegal fishing, and Canada's regulatory landscape as it pertains to sea cucumbers.

"Conserving sea cucumbers is ecologically critical as they provide central ecosystem services similar to earthworms for seabeds and are an important part of marine food webs," said Felix P.C. Morrow, Memorial University Master's Student and OceansAsia Researcher, and lead author of the paper. "Proactive conservation measures are important as sea cucumber populations are very slow to recover their populations once depleted."

"Around the world, illegal sea cucumber fishing has had a devastating impact on populations of this important marine invertebrate," said Teale N. Phelps Bondaroff, Director of OceansAsia and co-author of the paper. "Illegal fishing undermines conservation efforts, destroys wildlife populations and ecosystems, hurts legal fishers, robs potential tax dollars from governments, undermines good governance and social order, and fuels organized crime."

The paper adds to the OceansAsia's Research Team's growing body of work exploring crime in sea cucumber fisheries around the world, which includes articles on the phenomenon in India and Sri Lanka, and Mexico, and a recent book chapter exploring the issues more broadly.

"While it was reassuring to find that crime is less prevalent in Canadian sea cucumber fisheries as compared with some of the other fisheries our team has examined, this should not fuel complacency," said Phelps Bondaroff.

Globalization - Part 2

The wide-ranging application of tariffs by the United States, imposed unilaterally by President Donald Trump, will radically restructure 80 years of international trade that was engineered by the Bretton Woods Agreement following the end of World War II. Trump's actions will have a plethora of consequences, but the economic strategy is "madness", a term used by Justin Wolfers, a Professor of Economics and Public Policy at the University of Michigan (The Cost of Living, CBC Radio, April 6, 2025).

"Trump comes from the world of real estate," explains Professor Wolfers. "He thinks that business is pure competition. I win, you lose. If the price is fixed, a loss on you is a win for me—this is a zero-sum mentality. The problem with this is that it fails to understand the basic principle of economics. Economics is basically about cooperation, so we can do things more efficiently."

If Trump's goal is to make the U.S. more self-sufficient, explains Professor Wolfers, there may be a military advantage—for which North Korea is a perfect example. But this would deny Americans the rich diversity of products that are available to them from the rest of the world.

According to Professor Wolfers, Trump sees a trade deficit as a subsidy that can be fixed with tariffs, but this is "crazy". It would be like going to buy food at your local supermarket and then declaring that you have an unfair trade deficit with it because it has your money. Such an attitude completely misses the cooperation that goes into the production, processing and distribution of food.

Consider a bag of flour. Without the cooperation of trade, we would each have to grow our own wheat, harvest it, grind it, and store it safely until needed throughout the year. The reason we can buy the flour at an affordable price is because of the network of agreements that exist between the farmers, the builders of their tractors, the truckers, the millers, the packagers, and those who constructed the supermarket and run the generation stations that provide the electricity for the lights, freezers and cash registers. And all this is supported by those who have made the trucks, built and maintained the highways, produced the necessary fuel, operated the ferries, and manufactured the lumber for



the farmer's house so he has a place to live while growing the wheat. An economy, in other words, is a complexity of interrelationships that benefits all participants, and it only works when founded on cooperation and trust. Trade is sharing resources for everyone's gain, and the more we trade the more we gain as we build efficiencies and economies of scale. Trade gets us computers, the internet, coffee, tea—and provides us with bananas, avocados, mangos, and a convenient bag of flour throughout the year.

Many economists are skeptical about the benefits of tariffs because they impair trade. History has confirmed that trade benefits everyone who participates. Indeed, it's one of the first transactions that occurs when one culture meets another. And the fairer the negotiated agreements, the greater the benefits. America has, as much as any country, benefited from the Bretton Woods Agreement that globalized trade, communication, technology, diplomacy, governance and human values. The Agreement has not, as yet, produced the perfect world order, but it's far better than the alternative of isolated and individual countries struggling against each other to survive, which was the recipe for creating two world wars.

Trump's tariffs are essentially regressive, and wholly incompatible with the values and workings of the modern world. Which raises the issue about America's trade deficit with other countries, and Trump's rationale for imposing tariffs on their goods. The obvious explanation is that the superiority of America's industrial and technological capabilities is being challenged, so unless it finds a new way to lead the world into the 21st century it will continue to experience the sunset on its economic and political dominance since the Bretton Woods Agreement at the end of World War II.

The restructuring of global economic, political and military forces are serious and disquieting enough, but the unfolding disaster that needs the attention of the worldwide community is global climate change. Without the concerted and coordinated effort of all countries working co-operative and strategically, the likelihood of an environmental Armageddon is increased. Significantly, because of Trump, America has withdrawn from the very international organizations that we need to combat an environmental and humanitarian crisis.

We live together as a human species on Spaceship Earth, and we have reached a time in history when we must understand and accept that reverting to the fractured schisms of tribal chaos will be a disaster for the diversity of life on our planet, including ourselves. We cannot live together without cooperation, and we cannot have cooperation without trust. If we abandon these two guiding principles of civilized human behaviour, then we can be almost certain that the future will be considerably worse than even the worst of the present.
